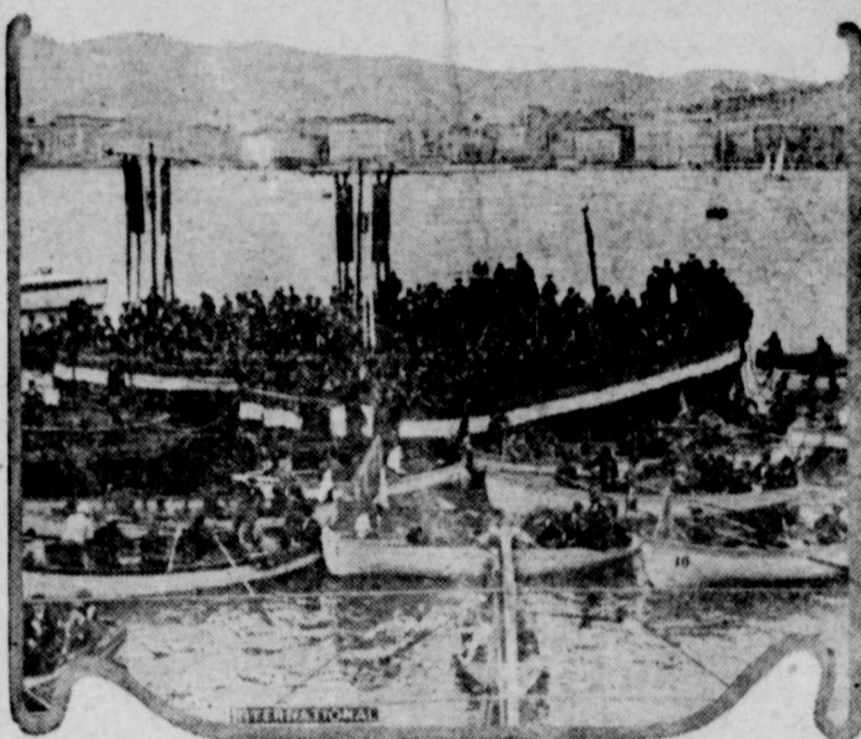

## JACK DEMPSEY KNOCKS OUT CARPENTIER IN FOUR ROUNDS

### Italy Formally Annexes Trieste



Hundreds of thousands of Italians from all parts of the "redeemed" territories crowded Trieste to attend the ceremonies in connection with the formal annexation of the former Austrian port to Italy. RINGSIDE, Jersey City, N. J., July 2.—Georges Carpentier finished flat on his face, his legs and arms outstretched in the fourth round. Jack Dempsey, the world's heavyweight champion, knocked him out a few seconds after the fourth round opened, sending the Frenchman heavily to the canvass with a short right hook to the chin. The actual time of fighting in the fourth round was one minute and sixteen seconds.

Previous to the knockout Carpentier was floored with a left to the body and a right to the chin. Carpentier took a count of nine before springing to his feet, where the grim, determined Dempsey measured him with a punch to the chin which ended the battle.

Dempsey stood over the fallen French idol until the count was finished and then he tenderly picked up the bleeding and dazed Frenchman and dragged him to his corner. It was an unmerciful beating for Carpentier, while Dempsey was apparently enjoying a practice bout.

Dempsey opened with an upper cut under the Frenchman's eye and batted him so viciously around the head with vicious rights and lefts until Carpentier's face was swollen and bleeding. Carpentier fought gamely back at the champion, but he was out-classed. Once he was half knocked and half pushed thru the ropes and most of the time was going a way from the champion and working on the defensive. Dempsey kept after him, driving him to the corner whenever he had an opportunity.

Carpentier revived after a few seconds when he had been counted out, and his manager, Francois Descamps, applied for first aid as quickly as the dazed Frenchman dropped to his chair. The police immediately climbed into the ring and made a path for the champion and Carpentier to go to their dressing rooms.

ROUND 1.—They were sent away at 3:18. Carpentier landed a light left and they clinched. Carpentier landed a right. They fought at close range in a clinch. Dempsey was shot with a left to the head. Carpentier missed. A right, but connected with a left hook. Dempsey punished him, beating him unmercifully. Carpentier was groggy at bleeding at the nose. Dempsey missed a right swing but beat Carpentier as they clinched. Carpentier fell thru the ropes trying to avoid a punch. He flew into Dempsey when he crawled back into the ring.

ROUND 2.—Carpentier missed with a left hand clinch. Carpentier backed away and Dempsey looked him with a right to the jaw. Dempsey followed after him, beating him around the head with rights. Carpentier was short with the left hook, but he staggered the champion with six rights and lefts to the jaw. Dempsey staggered back a bit and split the Frenchman's left eye with a hook. The cut was under the eye. Carpentier missed a right swing. Dempsey missed a right swing. They exchanged body punches in the clinch as the bell rang.

ROUND 3.—Carpentier ducked a left hook. Dempsey backed into the ropes and hit him with a

short right. Carpentier landed two uppercuts to the body in a clinch. As they clinched Dempsey punched the invader in the jaw and Carpentier nearly fell down when he missed the swing. Both missed lefts to the head and Jack punished Georges viciously in the infighting. Dempsey landed a left and a right to the head without a return. They exchanged left hooks to the jaw. Carpentier's right swing was short and Dempsey clubbed him on the jaw with left hooks in the clinch. Dempsey battered Carpentier into the corner with rights and lefts at the clang of the bell. The bell saved Carpentier from a knockout. Dempsey's round.

ROUND 4.—Dempsey rushed Carpentier to the ropes and a left to the box made him wince. Carpentier landed a right to the head and tried to hang on. He was counted out. Dempsey wins.

91,600 seats were sold for the fight. In the preliminaries no decisions are allowed under the

### CROWD COMING LARGEST ARENA FOR 4TH JULY FOR PRIZE FIGHT

While no elaborate program has been arranged for Monday in observance of the great national holiday, it is expected that many people will be here. Business will be suspended in nearby towns, and many country people will take the day off, or at least part of it, and come here to take part in the celebration.

The day is regular First Monday or "Trades Day," which was recently revived here, and the forenoon hours will be devoted to rodeo events, and stock judging, prizes having been offered for best livestock exhibited here on that date. The visitors who wish to bring their baskets and spend the day in Ballinger have been tendered the use of the park as a place to spread dinner, and picnic parties will be formed for both the noon lunch and evening meal.

The big attraction of the day, and which promises to run up another record for attendance will be the double-header baseball game between the Ballinger Bears and the Ranger Nitros. The Nitros are playing winning ball, having defeated San Angelo two straights this week, and are battling in the third this afternoon, and the locals will do their best to start the second half of the season with a winning record.

The first game will be called at three o'clock, with a few minutes interval between the first and second game which will follow.

NEW YORK, July 2.—The arena where Dempsey and Carpentier staged a boxing match today is the largest prize fight arena ever constructed. It was designed and constructed under the direction of George L. "Tex" Rickard, promoter of the big fight, and exceeds by far the amphitheatre in which Jack Johnson and Jim Jeffries met in 1910 at Reno, Nevada, and also is much larger than the one where Jess Willard lost his title to Jack Dempsey at Toledo, Ohio, two years ago. It was built at a cost of \$200,000. Two and a half million feet of lumber, equal to 475 miles of boards laid end to end, or about 140 carloads, were used in the construction of the arena. The seating capacity of the arena is 70,000, and long before the gates opened at ten o'clock this morning, it was estimated that the sale of tickets had passed the \$1,300,000 mark, the tickets selling from \$5 to \$50, according to the distance from the ring. Work on the arena began on April 28th and 600 men were employed and the big octagonal saucer sprang up rapidly under the tattoo of many hammers.

Only twenty-five minutes from Broadway and 42nd Street, thousands began to pour into the arena as soon as the gates were opened. 700 newspaper reporters were on the scene early and a net work of telegraph wires connected the stage with the outside world.

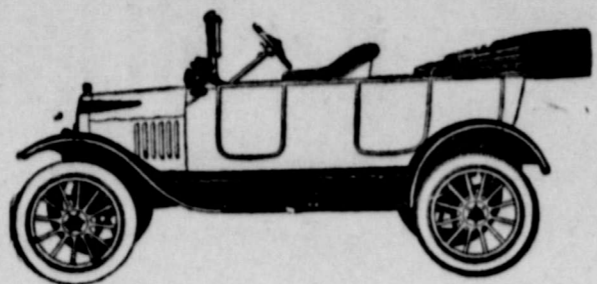
