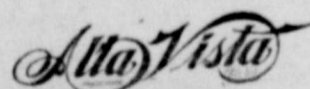

## ASKS NEFF TO STOP KU KLUX KLAN

**AUSTIN, July 8.**—Gov. Neff received a message today from Fort Worth, signed "A Committee of Democratic Friends," urging that he order an investigation of the operations of an alleged secret organization in that city. The telegram charged that a man was lynched in Fort Worth about three months ago and another tarred and feathered recently under the guise of an alleged secret society. Continuing, the telegram said: "This is a deplorable condition to have in a community. Newspapers are afraid to question their purpose. Good citizens deny such operations. We demand a secret investigation from the department immediately."

Governor Neff stated that he had no comment to make regarding the communication received by him, pointing out that it was anonymous.

**FT. WORTH, July 8.**—Newspaper reporters and local officers called at the telegraph office here today to learn if possible who was responsible for the message sent to Governor Neff asking that he order an investigation of the operations of a secret organization here. The manager of the telegraph office stated that the message was received by mail with instructions to forward it to the governor.

## LYNCHINGS SHOW BIG INCREASE

**TUSKOGEE, Okla., July 8.**—There were thirty-six lynchings in the United States during the first six months of the year, a gain of twenty-four more than for the same period last year, according to a report issued today by the department of record and research of the Tuskegee Institute. The lynchings include two whites, thirty-four negroes. Two of the negroes were women, the report said, and eleven of the number lynched were charged with rape.

**AUSTIN, July 8.**—The House-Senate appropriations committee met today and began work on the appropriation bills to be presented at the special session which convenes on July 18th.

Miller represents Clyde and John Cahndler, convicted of violating the Dean law in Kaufman county.

A bride of only a few days, Mrs. Katherine Stevens Fagan, daughter of the late Calvin A. Stevens, millionaire reclusive of Broad street, New York, will shortly come into possession of a large share of the \$15,000,000 estate left by her aged father. Mrs. Fagan is only eighteen years old, and her husband, Richard Fagan, a student at Dartmouth, is but twenty. The young couple eloped.

## LABOR LEADERS SENT TO JAIL

**COLUMBUS, Kans., July 8.**—Alexander Howat and August Dorely, president and vice-president respectively, of the Kansas Miners' Union, were sentenced to six months in jail and fined \$500 each in the district court here today.

The two men were convicted last week on charges of violation of the Kansas industrial law by calling a strike of the miners last February.

## ANGELO FIREMEN RECEIVE \$400.00

The fire chief of the San Angelo volunteer department received a \$400 check from the Pierce Oil Co. yesterday morning in appreciation of the brilliant work they did in trying to check the great fire in that city last week. Many of the fireboys who went to the fire did not take time to change their clothes and when they had worked about an hour they found that their clothes were a complete wreck. The check covered the loss of the clothes.

## LARGE FRUIT CROP IN BROWN COUNTY

The watermelon and peach crop in Brown county, and especially around Bangs, is said to be the largest in several years. In every locality in Brown county there are said to be very fine melons and cantaloupes, but the peach crop is mostly around Bangs. Melons and peaches have been arriving in Brownwood and have been bringing a good price.

## KILLS RATTLE SNAKE IN FRONT YARD

A negro, while mowing the lawn in the yard at the home of D. Reeder, on Eighth Street, Thursday, killed a young rattle snake. The snake was about sixteen inches long, and was making himself at home in the front yard at the Reeder home. This is the second rattle snake killed in this city this summer. Paul Kirk, son of Mr. and Mrs. B. C. Kirk, killing a rattler in the back yard of the Kirk home on Seventh Street, a short time ago.

## TO UNMASK OIL MEN IN MEXICO

**MEXICO CITY, July 8.**—The Mexican secretary of interior today told Mexican newspaper men that the government is "preparing to unmask the American oil producers operating in Mexico." The secretary made the statement informally, and charged the American oil producers with "scandalous actions against the Mexican treasury and the United States."

## WEST TEXAS LEAGUE MEETING HERE TONIGHT

A meeting of the West Texas Baseball League will be held in Ballinger this evening, according to John A. Weeks, president of the local club. The meeting was scheduled for Abilene, but was transferred to Ballinger, and J. Walter Morris, of Fort Worth, president of the league, and each club president and other representatives from each club in the league, including Sweetwater, will be here.

This meeting has been called for the purpose of settling the controversy between Sweetwater and San Angelo, and to determine whether Sweetwater shall be reinstated and Ranger dropped from what now forms the four club circuit.

There seems to be a general preference for Sweetwater to remain in the league on account of being more conveniently situated, and Ranger dropped out. This will be determined at tonight's meeting.

The change incident to cutting the league to a four club circuit, is responsible for a shaking up in practically all the clubs, and in addition to changes in line-ups which have been maintained for some time, other changes will be effective Monday, when it is expected that the schedule for the second half of the season will be announced.

It is reported that changes in officers of the league will be made tonight, and a citizen of one of the towns represented in the league will be made president instead of maintaining a president in Fort Worth.

The meeting here tonight will be the first of its kind ever held in this city.

## PLAN PROGRAM TO FINISH SURVEY

The directors of the Colorado Valley Irrigation Association have accepted the challenge of the Federal government, and will raise the \$4,000.00 which is required to match the \$4,000.00 appropriation made by the Federal Water Department. This was the decision made by fifteen directors and other interested parties at a meeting held in the Court House yesterday afternoon.

Representatives were present from Bronte, Rowena, Miles and Ballinger. San Angelo would have had her directors present but for previous engagements. Word was received from Sweetwater that they were interested and anxious to help.

After reviewing the situation and outlining the advantages to be gained by all of the towns above mentioned, a quota committee was appointed, consisting of H. W. Robinson, Miles; W. A. Halamicek, Rowena; Howard Wilkins, Bronte; and N. K. Freeman, Ballinger.

This committee assigned the following quotas to the various towns: Ballinger and San Angelo, \$2,000.00; Bronte, Sweetwater and Tennyson, \$1,000.00; Miles, \$500.00; Rowena, \$500.00.

An attempt will be made to secure an appropriation from the special session of the legislature to cover this amount, but regardless of the action taken by the legislature, \$4,000.00 will be raised in this section between now and July 15th, according to the plans of the association.

Plans were also discussed for holding a big barbecue and celebration as soon as the survey is completed.

## ENGINEER MURDERED; BODY THROWN FROM TRAIN BEFORE WRECK

**EL PASO, July 8.**—Engineer Bohlman, of Sanderson, was murdered and thrown from his train, and after four miles of uncontrolled speeding the boiler of the engine of the freight train exploded, seriously injuring Fireman Robertson, of Valentine, according to advices received at the local offices of the Galveston, Harrisburg & San Antonio railroad today. The train was wrecked by the explosion ten miles West of Alpine.

## PEACE PROCLAMATION IS READY FOR PRESIDENT

**WASHINGTON, July 8.**—A tentative draft of the proposed peace proclamation to be issued declaring the United States at peace with Germany and Austria, was taken to the cabinet meeting today by Attorney General Daugherty. It was intimated later that the document might be ready for the president's signature before next week.

## MEXICO SENDS MORE TROOPS TO TAMPICO

**MEXICO CITY, July 8.**—Additional federal troops have been dispatched to the region of Tampico by the Mexican government, it was announced today. The troops were sent for the purpose of guaranteeing to citizens of Mexico and foreigners protection.

## GREAT BRITAIN WANTS CONFERENCE OF NATIONS

**LONDON, July 8.**—It was stated in reliable quarters today that Great Britain is believed to have made overtures to the United States, Japan and China, on the possibility of holding a conference for the purpose of discussing the whole Eastern situation.

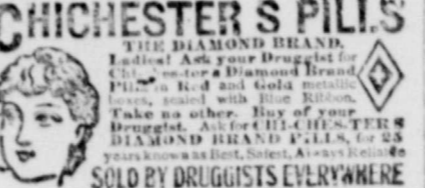

## BRONCS TAKE FIRST GAME

Local fans were chloroformed and San Angelo fans came to life here Thursday afternoon, when the Bronchos, in their first game on the local lot since Ballinger broke into the West Texas League, rallied in the sixth inning and overcame a lead of a half dozen scores the Beareats were going easy with.

It was another one of those games which is sometimes referred to as a "cinch," but which resulted in a general blow-up and defeat for the home team.

The game started with a hit by Truesdale, who scored on a two base run by Robinson aided by an error by Briscoe, the visitors scoring one in the first. Cantrell tightened up and did not allow the visitors to hit again until the fifth frame when they drove in two hits and one run. At this stage of the contest the score was eight to two in favor of Ballinger. The locals did nothing in the first session, but they came up with two hits in the second and two runs, four hits in the third and three runs, four hits in the fifth and three runs, and here they stopped, while the Broncs pounded out Cantrell for ten hits in the sixth, seventh and eighth, evening up the score in the seventh and breaking the tie with four runs to the good in the eighth. Burlison tightened up in the 6th and refused to let the locals hit with the vim with which they started, only two little bingles being charged against him in the last three sessions.

Up until Cantrell weakened it looked like an almost shut-out for the visitors, the unearned run in the first being the only thing to their credit. The grand stand was packed with fans, the bleachers well filled and auto row filled to the fence. Angelo drew a good crowd, just as was expected and the two teams will battle again today and tomorrow.

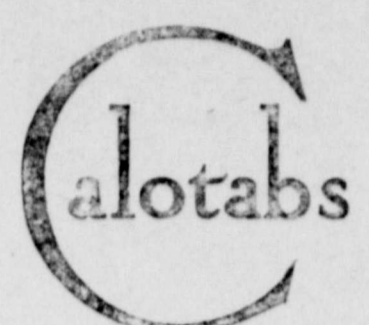

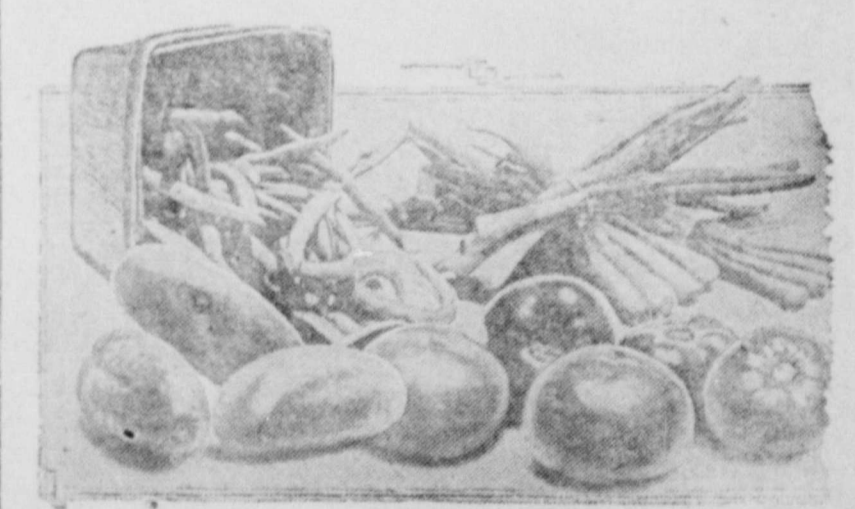
