FIREMAN HELD FOR MURDER

EL PASO, July 11.—Preliminary hearings of Charles Robinson, fireman on the Southern Pacific railroad, who is being held in connection with the death of Engineer W. F. Bohlman last Friday near Alpine, when a freight engine exploded, are in progress here. Robinson will be questioned until it is learned where Bohlman was killed, railroad officials announced this afternoon.

Fireman Robinson was four miles from the train when the engine exploded, and it was at first reported that Engineer Bohlman was killed in the explosion, but it developed that he had a bullet hole in his head, and the fireman stated that he was slugged and knocked from his engine.

CHIEF OF POLICE IN AUTO COLLISION

Chief of Police Pileher and a man from Rowena, whose name The Ledger reporter failed to get, were in an auto collision on Eighth Street near the post office Monday afternoon. The traffic officer was driving his Ford sedan when the Rowena car darted out of an alley and the two came together with a pretty good bump. The damage was about equal, and after figuring the whys and wherefores of the accident it was decided that it was one of those cases where both parties were in the clear, and the damage to the respective cars was charged up to their owners.

SAN ANTONIO MAN IS KIDNAPPED

SAN ANTONIO, July 11.—According to a statement of Harry Adams, of San Antonio, gardener of the Southern Pacific, he was the victim of kidnapping by masked men at Gliden last Friday night as the result of which he received severe bruises.

Bronte Raises Her Quota to Complete Survey Work

A telegram received from Bronte late Saturday afternoon stated that the citizens of that town went over the top with its quota of the cash being raised to complete the irrigation survey in short order. According to the message Bronte put up \$1,000 in less than one hour. The citizens met and launched a drive and in less than one hour the money was on the "barrel head," subject to order of the treasury, to be used in meeting the Federal appropriation to carry on the survey.

Miles sent word that \$300 was raised in short time. Miles' quota was \$500, and with more than half of the amount raised in a short time it goes without saying that the other will be forthcoming.

No word has been received from Rowena, or from San Angelo, Ballinger and San Angelo were allotted \$2,000 of the expense. Miles \$500, Rowena \$500 and Bronte \$1,000. The quotas were not apportioned so much on a basis of the size of the towns, but in proportion to the benefits to be derived. Miles and Rowena will be in the center of the big field when the water is turned on.

Ballinger will come in with her part of the cash, it is believed. If the Federal government has confidence sufficient to warrant the sending of engineers here at the expense of the government and making the survey, Ballinger cannot afford to stand back and not do everything possible

to put the scheme over.

What a few years ago was considered a visionary dream, is about to become a reality. With the stamp of approval of the United States government on the enterprise, and with the favorable report of the engineers, the creating of an irrigation district and the issuance of bonds to put the proposition over will be only a matter of unwinding a little red tape, and then the land owners within the irrigated area will own one of the largest and most feasible gravity irrigation projects in the Southwest, and as a result Ballinger will be a city of fifteen thousand people as fast as houses can be built and the municipal improvements, including a system of interurban lines to the big dam, up and down on both sides of the river and throughout the irrigated district, can be constructed. The question of power will be settled by the water power which will be a natural consequence of the building of a dam one hundred feet high, two hundred and fifty feet long, and the impounding of four hundred thousand acre feet of water.

Added to the natural advantages for growing almost all kinds of crops here when water is applied to the fertile land, will be the increase in value of from \$100 to \$1,000 per acre for land. The possibilities of the successful perfection of the big project are too large for the average man to comprehend.

OFFICERS CLOSE SUNDAY BOX BALL

Flagrantly in violation of the law, Brown's Box Ball Alley was doing a thriving business Sunday when the officers appeared on the scene and closed the place, serving notice on the proprietor that he could not operate such a business here on Sunday. Mr. Brown stated that he was operating on Sunday to furnish amusement for the boys who did not have anywhere to go or no other way to pass the time away. It was announced that a complaint would be filed against the proprietor.

Brown's Box Ball Alley opened for business here Friday, and the proprietor met with more trouble Monday when the county attorney called on him and advised him that he was operating in violation of the law as he had not paid the license required of such enterprises. It is understood that the State, county and city tax on box ball alleys figures about \$250, and the proprietor of the new place of business informed the county attorney that he could not pay this, as he did not have the money and declared that the license was unreasonable.

Under the law Brown is subject to a penalty for operating without a license, but officers

stated Monday that no complaint would be filed if he closed the alley and quit business, but that if he persisted in operating that the penalty would be enforced.

METHODIST WANT BLUE LAW PASSED

NASHVILLE, Tenn., July 11.—The enactment of the Sunday "blue law," prohibiting among other things, Sunday trains, and excluding Sunday newspapers from the mails, will be urged by the Methodist Central Sabbath Crusade Committee in a petition to be presented to Congress this week, committee chairman Noah W. Cooper announced today.

PRISON COMMITTEE MEETS IN AUSTIN

AUSTIN, July 11.—The members of the joint penitentiary committee investigation committee are in Austin today preparatory to meeting this afternoon for consideration of committee affairs. The committee was authorized by a resolution adopted at the regular session to investigate the charges of brutality to convicts. The findings of the committee will be reported to the special session which convenes on the 18th of this month.

SURVEY MEETING HERE TONIGHT

A meeting will be held in the Ledger offices tonight at 8:15 to discuss ways and means of raising Ballinger's quota of \$2,000.00 on the irrigation survey fund. No more important meeting has been held in Ballinger this year, and every business man and property owner and individual who is interested in the future of this city is expected to be present. The meeting is called by the officers of the Colorado Valley Irrigation Association.

Judge W. H. Gross, of Mineral Wells, owner of a large tract on the Colorado River, has written the Association that it may draw on him for \$100.00, which leaves only \$1900.00 to be raised this week.

Word has been received from Bronte that the citizens of that little city put over their quota of \$1,000.00 in just thirty minutes. The population of Bronte is not one-sixth as large as that of Ballinger—and the example which they have set is an excellent one.

On the strength of statements by the officers of the Association, the Federal Department has ordered the engineers to proceed with their work, and is preparing to enter into a new contract with the Board of Water Engineers.

MAD DOG BITES FOUR AT SANGER

GAINESVILLE, Tex., July 11.—Mrs. J. M. Atkins and her three children, and one child each from the families of O. G. Melton, G. W. Ramsey, and A. O. Wood, of Sanger, Texas, were given Pasteur treatment here yesterday following bites by a pet dog eight days ago. The animal's head was found to show indications of rabies.

SUES STATE FOR IMPRISONMENT

AUSTIN, July 11.—Chattanooga dispatches in today's news papers state that Andrew L. George has obtained a promise from the Texas legislature to the effect that he will be allowed to sue the State of Texas for damages because he served six years in the state penitentiary for an offense which he was not guilty of.

Legislators here state that the dispatches were the first they had heard of the proposed suit.

DISARMAMENT PLANS BEING FORMULATED

IRISH MEET TO END TROUBLE

LONDON, July 11.—Eamonn deValera will come to London Thursday for a conference with Premier Lloyd George to discuss a basis of settlement of the Irish problem, it was officially announced today.

DUBLIN, July 11.—A truce with Ireland went into effect at noon today. A complete disappearance from the streets of all military police lorries, and armored cars marked the official beginning of the truce in Dublin.

BELFAST, July 11.—Curfew was re-imposed here today as the result of disorders Sunday. Belfast is now the only place in Ireland under curfew regulation, despite the truce terms under which curfew was raised generally.

HUNS MAY NOT SIGN U. S. TREATY

BERLIN, July 11.—"No economic benefits offered by the United States could be sufficient by attractive to induce Germany to voluntarily affix the second time her signature to the disgraceful peace treaty fixed at Versailles, with all its humiliations, privations and confessions Germany built," says the industrial conservative organ "Der Tag," in commenting upon the Porter-Knox resolution which has just been made known here. The German industrial organ expresses dissatisfaction at what the Germans were forced to sign under the promise of economic benefits to be derived from the United States.

TOM OSTEEEN DIES AT BRECKENRIDGE

T. M. Osteen came in from Breckenridge Sunday, where he had been in charge of a bankrupt stock. He close out his work there and would have been at home earlier, but was detained in Breckenridge on account of the death of his uncle, Tom Osteen, who died Friday.

Mr. Osteen was a former citizen of Ballinger, having located here in the early days of Ballinger and for many years was engaged in the restaurant and hotel business here. When this country was a wide open country, strictly a stock country, deceased fed thousands of cowboys, his restaurant being well known and one of the popular eating places in West Texas. He moved away from Ballinger about twelve or fifteen years ago.

Deceased is survived by a wife, three sons and three daughters. His remains were shipped to Wichita Falls for burial.

LONDON, July 11.—President Harding's note regarding the conference on limitation of armaments arrived at the American embassy here yesterday, and was forwarded to Ambassador Harvey who is at Chequers Court conferring with Premier Lloyd George. It is understood that the subject will be discussed today at the British cabinet meeting.

LONDON, July 11.—President Harding's message looking to the calling of an international conference for the purpose of discussing the placing of limitations on armaments was received with utmost pleasure by Great Britain, Lloyd George declared before the House of Commons today.

Mr. Harding's proposal was the one topic of conversation in diplomatic quarters today. Expressions of satisfaction were general. The belief was expressed that the conference if agreed upon, would only be comparable in importance to that of the Paris peace conference.

WASHINGTON, July 11.—The course of the United States is definitely set today towards two goals of international importance—the limitations of armaments, suggesting to the nations interested in disarmament a conference at Washington for the consideration of disarmament, and a consideration of all matter bearing upon their solution with a view of reaching an understanding in respect to principals in politics for the far East. These goals were suggested by the president of the United States in notes to the interested nations of the world.

PARIS, July 11.—The White House counsel of the American embassy called at the French foreign office today to talk with the director of political affairs on the possibility of holding a disarmament conference.

ABSURD NAMES WORK HARM

May Be Witty, But They Too Frequently Tend to Put Community in Disrepute.

Frankish and absurd names given to communities, villages and counties by some waggy wit in the primitive times, have a way of persisting, clinging to the community, so that it is most difficult to get rid of them when a new people have succeeded to residence there. Some of these absurd names are so ridiculous they harm the community, tending at all times to put it in disrepute, make it a jest and byword.

All over the country are to be found places where the old-time wit left his contribution of harmful levity, against which the community struggles. In the northern part of Missouri was a little community that was given, in the days before the war, the rather startling name of Burnshirt. The name grew out of an incident that took place when some big-game hunters were encamped at the settlement. The name appealed to the risibilities of the community and for two generations it was compelled to bear that name. It had a small degree of comfort from the fact that a lesser community, hard by, had won the name of Pinhook. Hoopole township in Posey county, Indiana, is quite the most widely known of any township in the Hoosier state, yet strangers might not be induced to locate there because of the attractiveness or promise found in the name.—Ohio State Journal.

LIKE RAINBOW IN THE SEA

Gloriously Tinted Water That Washes Bermuda's Shores is an Ever-Fascinating Marvel.

Hundreds of miles from any coast, surrounded on every side by the restless surges of the great Atlantic—a mere speck in a waste of sea—lies Bermuda. While not strictly one of the West Indies, yet its fauna and flora, its products and its formation, are so similar to many of the Antilles that we may well consider it as a West Indian island gone astray, and set down—or rather pushed up—a thousand miles and more from its fellows.

If the ship arrives at Bermuda by daylight there is ample opportunity for the visitor to view the island as the vessel steams slowly along the northern shores and threads her way through the tortuous channel between sharp-fanged reefs toward Hamilton.

Perhaps nowhere else in all the world is there such gloriously tinted water. Indigo where deep, azure and sapphire nearer shore, opalescent turquoise in the shallows, and marbled with royal purple and amethyst where reefs and corals dot the white sand of its bed, the sea that laps Bermuda's shores is an ever-changing, ever-fascinating marvel; a thing of wondrous beauty impossible to describe in words or to reproduce in pigments.—A. Hyatt Verrill in "The Book of the West Indies."

Color-Blindness.

It may come as a surprise to many to learn that fewer than fifty-five people in every thousand are more or less color-blind. The commonest form of color-blindness is not—as is usually supposed—the inability to distinguish red and green. That affects one person in fifty-five. The most usual symptom is to get mixed between blue and green. One person in sixty cannot distinguish between brown and green. Color-blindness is more common among educated than among uneducated people, and is far more usual among men than women. Only about one woman in a thousand is badly color-blind. A very odd fact is that musicians are more liable to this affection than any other class or profession. Blindness may cause color-blindness. There is a case of a woman who became entirely color-blind after a form of ear disease, while a signalman who had suffered from lock jaw or tetanus became equally unable to distinguish color.

Real Sea Serpents.

The Indian ocean and the waters of the tropical Pacific are inhabited by a great number of wholly aquatic, venereal sea serpents that possess deadly fangs, and sometimes swim in schools of countless thousands. These snakes have a paddle-like tail to assist them in swimming. An offshoot of this species is the sub-family containing the formidable cobras and their allies, according to Raymond Ditmars, curator of reptiles at the New York zoo, who are treacherously deceptive in appearance. All of the very large serpents are members of a single family—the Boidae. None is poisonous, and the members of this family kill their prey by constriction.

Getting Rid of a Knot.

It is often a difficult business to get rid of knots, especially if these are of long standing. By following the plan indicated it is a simple matter to free the hardest knots, whether these be in straps, harness, rope, cord or anything of a similar nature. As a first step place the knot on some hard surface and give it a good hammering on all sides with a mallet or a thick piece of wood. Now boil up a little water with soap in it sufficient to make rather a cloudy solution. Then soak the knot for two or three minutes in the liquid. At the end of this time it will be found that it can be quite easily untied, often enough with the fingers. The loosening can be done with some sharp implement.

Profitable Companionship.

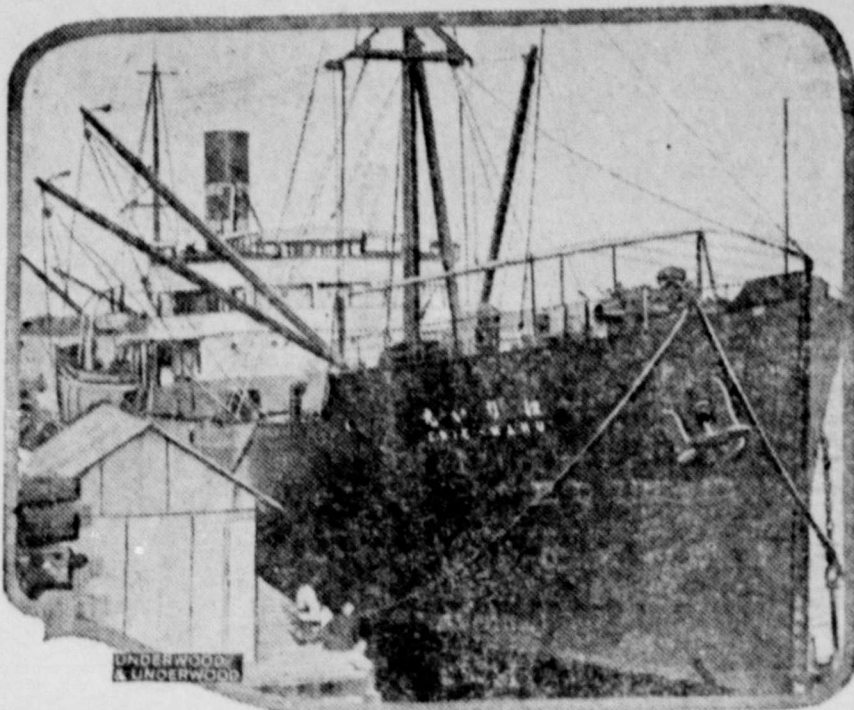
