Sheriff Holds 12 Gallons; Nie Brothers are Arrested

A. E. and W. E. Nie are in the Runnels county jail pending the fixing of \$1,000 bond allowed for each by J. P. Willingham, and Sheriff Flynt has in his possession twelve gallons of corn liquor. The charges against the Nie Brothers is possessing and transporting intoxicating liquors in violation of the Dean law.

The arrests followed a watch which Sheriff Flynt had been keeping for some time, and Nie Brothers were placed in jail within fifteen minutes after they arrived in Ballinger from a trip to Eastland Wednesday morning. Mr. Flynt apprehended the parties as they came into town about seven o'clock Wednesday morning, being on the look out at the Elm creek bridge for them. He followed the car to town and made the raid which netted two five gallon jugs and one two gallon jug and a small quantity of the "corn juice" in a bottle, the two prisoners and a Ford car.

When arraigned before Justice of the Peace Willingham, the two men waived examining trial and their bonds were fixed at \$1,000 each. They stated that they wished to employ an attorney, and would make no steps to make bond until their attorney had talked with them.

Nie Brothers live about a mile South of Ballinger, and are cultivating part of the C. S. Miller irrigated land. They claim that they are interested in oil holdings in Eastland county, and have a brother, E. E. Nie, living on the land, and they left here Sunday afternoon to go to Eastland to look after their land, one of the brothers stopping at Burkett, in Coleman county, to get a car which he had left there on a former trip, and he joined his brother again en route home.

A. E. Nie stated that he left Rising Star Tuesday afternoon, came by Coleman, and only stopped a few minutes, arriving in Ballinger about seven o'clock Wednesday morning, making the trip thru in the night.

He disclaimed any interest in the booze which he hauled to Ballinger. "A man put it in my car and told me that he would give me \$25 to bring it to Ballinger," said Nie. He stated he did not know the party who loaded his car with the booze, that he was a stranger, and said that the man promised to call at the Nie home in South Ballinger, get the goods and pay the \$25. Nie declared that he did not know what the stranger placed in his car until after he had started home and he stopped to examine and see what it was.

Nie Brothers have been living near Ballinger about four years,

coming here from Eastland county. Since the oil boom in Eastland county they have been spending part of the time in that county and it is alleged that they have been making frequent trips to that county, and this led to a clue which the local sheriff mysteriously picked up and followed to what appears to be a successful end.

BRAKEMAN HELD FOR MURDER

EL PASO, July 13.—W. E. Stirman, head brakeman on the freight train on which Engineer Bohlman was killed and Fireman Robinson injured near Alpine, on July 8, will receive a preliminary hearing at Alpine today, on charges in connection with the killing of the engineer, according to railroad officials. Stirman was arrested yesterday upon complaints sworn to by Texas rangers, the officials said.

HEAT KILLS 2 IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, July 13.—With no immediate relief in sight, Chicagoans today prepared to endure temperature running into the nineties. Thousands are seeking relief by sleeping in parks and on the beach. There were two deaths reported from the heat yesterday.

AUTO KILLS ONE AT GALVESTON

GALVESTON, July 13.—Corporal Thurlow Smith, age forty-seven, was killed, and Sergt. Jas. Hudson, age fifty, was injured, late yesterday when their automobile plunged over the seawall near Fort Crockett. Smith, who was learning to drive the car, expected to be retired from the army in a few weeks.

WACO, July 13.—O. D. Reed, W. L. Edmond, Bowden Hays Jr., are being held for the grand jury under \$1,000 bond each, after a hearing held today on charges filed against the man for white-capping. George Jackson, the fourth man arrested, was discharged. The district court room was filled with citizens when Jackson was discharged and there was a demonstration in his favor when the court released him.

The men held are charged with kidnapping a man and taking him out a short distance from the city where he was tarred and feathered.

BOMBING PLANES HIT DESTROYER

NEWPORT NEWS, Va., July 13.—Thirty-five bombing planes left Langley Field today, and are out over the water in an attempt to sink a former German destroyer off the Virginia Capes.

This is one of a series of experiments being made with bomb ine planes.

A short time after the planes went out the report came back that the destroyer was sunk by bombs from the airplanes. Martin bombing planes led in the attack, and the big DeHavillands did not get a chance at the target. The airplanes experienced no difficulty in locating the target.

CITIZENS ICE WAGONS RUNNING

It may require a day or two to get the routes established and the delivery forces organized, but the consumers will understand this and be patient.

MEXICO READY TO SQUARE UP

MEXICO CITY, July 13.—All countries whose nationals suffered damages from the Mexican revolutions have been invited by President Obregon to appoint delegates to meet Mexican representatives and form a permanent commission to pass upon the claims of such countries.

The invitation took from the presidential decree promulgated last night, in accordance with a law passed in 1913, at the instance of President Carranza, to give whatever official stamp as necessary to assure a permanent Mexican commission to deal with indemnities.

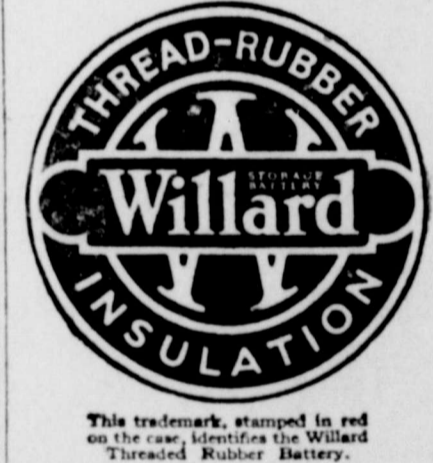

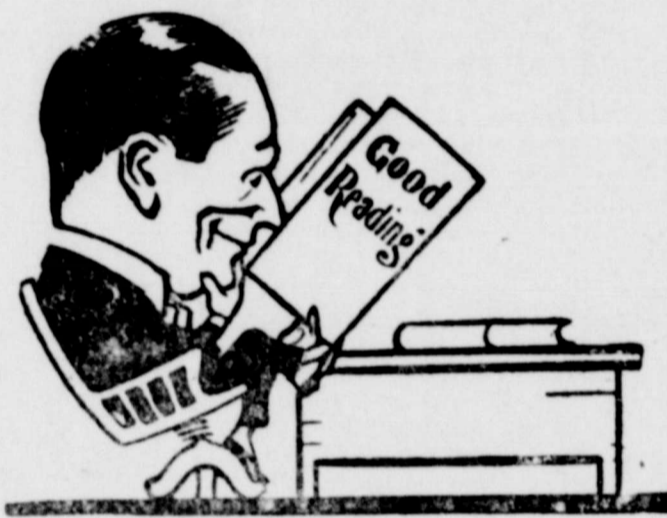

BRONCHOS ALSO DRAW GOOSE EGG

SAN ANGELO, July 13.—A record of 80 consecutive games in which San Angelo had scored at least one run was shattered here Monday afternoon when Sweetwater whitewashed the Bronchos, 4 to 0, in a battle that went only an hour and thirty-five minutes. The Nags were unable to solve Fleharty's slow ball, while Hill was nicked for nine blows, including two doubles, and one lone error behind him let in one score.

The clubs battled for six full innings without denting home plate. Then Thrash opened the 7th by walking, was sacrificed to second by Byers and was advanced to third on a single by Whitney, who pilfered second. Pipkin flew out to Higginbotham and Thrash scored. Lewis then fumbled Fleharty's grounder and Whitney registered.

In the 9th, with one out, Fleharty singled to left and went to third on Mason's two bagger in to the same territory. Both counted on Obst's single to right field. A double play ended the session, Ezell's flying out to Higginbotham, who caught Obst off first. A somewhat similar play was made in the third when Mason was safe on the forcing at second of Fleharty, who had singled. Obst hoisted to Williamson, who tossed to McKay when Mason raced around the bases, thinking that two were then down.

Hill's wildness got him in much of his trouble. Byers and Fleharty each got two hits in three times up. On two occasions, the Bronchos left men stranded at third. Burleson was one of the victims after opening the fifth inning with a two-bagger.

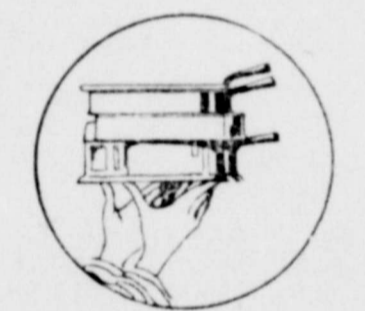
FO TO-SHO OFFERS BIG ATTRACTION

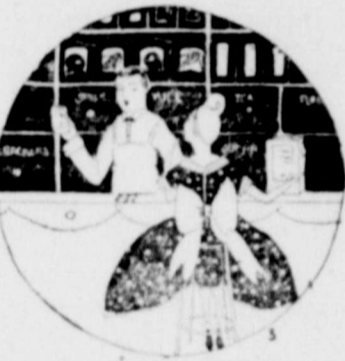

ANGELO AIDS IN SURVEY FUND

In a letter from Thomas F. Owens, secretary of the San Angelo chamber of commerce, to Stuart L. Williams, secretary of the Colorado Valley Irrigation Association, Mr. Owens stated that San Angelo was behind the big irrigation enterprise in this and adjoining counties, with her part of the financial aid.

The local committee allotted \$500 as San Angelo's quota to raise for the survey work, and Mr. Owens stated in his letter that the proposition was presented at a meeting of the directors and that it was endorsed and \$100 subscribed in the directors' meeting and that the matter would be given immediate attention. It is expected that San Angelo will come in with her \$500.

The local committee had raised about \$1200 up to Tuesday night, and while some of those who should have subscribed had not done so, it was announced that the proposition would go over in good shape, this city raising more than \$1500 of the \$4,000 called for through the Colorado Valley Irrigation Association, and which will be placed in the hands of the Board of Water Engineers to complete the survey, the Federal government putting up about \$6,000.
