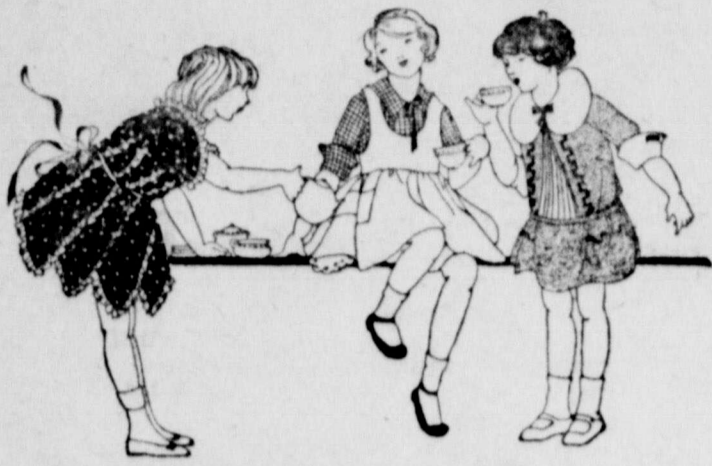

ASKS NEFF TO PROVE CHARGES

AUSTIN, July 14.—A vote by members of the appropriations committee on a request for Governor Neff to appear before them and substantiate his charges of graft in the capitol, will be taken early tomorrow. Representative Moore announced today.

Mr. Moore has prepared a resolution and it will be submitted to the committee tomorrow, and it is expected that the request will be voted for.

MOVES NEGRO TO SAVE HIS NECK

GREENVILLE, Tex., July 14.—Removal from the county jail here Tuesday of Matt Olson, a negro, charged with the murder of Orbie Standlee, a white farmer, of Celeste, probably prevented the negro's death by mob violence last night. A crowd of about eighty men gathered at the jail at midnight and dispersed only after four members of the mob had been escorted through the cells to convince them that the negro had been removed.

GALVESTON, July 14.—Theodore Debnor, night watchman at a local cotton yard, was found dead with his head crushed, by a person who went to the shed to extinguish a fire last night. A bloody instrument was found near the body.

STOCKMEN ASK CUT IN R. R. RATE

WASHINGTON, July 14.—Freight rates on livestock were held to be unreasonable from an economic standpoint, and recommendations made to the Interstate Commerce Commission that carriers be required to make substantial reductions for the benefit of business in general, is contained in a report today by Examiner Disque.

A case which was brought by the shippers of Western states and in which various state commissions are involved, will be heard tomorrow.

JAPS ACCEPT INVITE TO PEACE MEETING

WASHINGTON, July 14.—Japan's acceptance of President Harding's suggestion for a disarmament conference was received by the state department today, but no reference was made of the far Eastern question in the Japanese note accepting the invitation to attend the conference.

TURKS USING PLANES IN BATTLE TODAY

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 14.—Turkish Nationalists and Greek forces are locked in battle before Utkina, Southeast of Brussa, today. Airplanes are participating in the struggle from the mountain height near the town which is the first objective of the offensive.

FARMERS MEET TO ORGANIZE

DALLAS, July 14.—Articles of incorporation for the United Farmers of America, will be filed in a few days, according to Will A. Harris, president of the new organization. The new farmers organization was formed at a meeting of prominent farmers at Dallas yesterday, and an application for a charter will be filed in a few days.

\$1600 RAISED FOR SURVEY

The local committee for the Colorado Valley Irrigation Association engaged in raising funds for the big survey now in progress reports that about \$1600.00 has been subscribed to date. \$100.00 more will be given by the Kiwanis Club of San Angelo, and it is expected that the Board of City Development of that city will vote an additional \$100.00.

Over \$200.00 yet remains to be raised here, but the committee feels that before the expiration of this time tomorrow that the sum will be subscribed.

LABOR TROUBLES TO CLOSE MOVIES

NEW YORK, July 14.—Notice that more than one hundred motion picture theatres in Greater New York may close on August first for an indefinite period, was received yesterday by the motion picture theatre attendants' union. Members of the union said that the information came from managers and was a tentative action which would no doubt be put into effect as a result of a slump in business and partly due to labor troubles.

REPUBLICANS SPLIT ON OIL TARIFF BILL

WASHINGTON, July 14.—The first public expression of dissatisfaction among the Republican members of the proposed tariff on oil came today from Representative Treadway, of Massachusetts, a member of the ways and means committee who told the House that the duty would "aid only the monopoly which markets the product."

Four airplanes collided in mid-air over Modesto today and crashed to earth, killing the four pilots. One of the machines caught fire following the collision and crashed to earth in flames. The pilot was burned so badly he could not be recognized.

OAKLAND, July 14.—An airplane fell at Modesto killing the pilot and three passengers today, according to word received by the Oakland Tribune.

VISITS SCENES OF THE PUEBLO FLOOD

R. A. Nicholson, who has just returned from a trip to California, accompanied by Mrs. Nicholson, and their little son, says the people of Pueblo, Colorado, will be years in overcoming the loss sustained in the flood which swept that city a short time ago. Mr. Nicholson says that the flood left the city in a tangled mass of wreckage, which has not been cleared away. Mud was banked four feet deep in the main streets of the city and this is being hauled off, and so far only narrow passage ways have been made in some of the streets. Hundreds of freight cars were piled up and scattered thru the city. The water was eleven feet in the dining hall of the Santa Fe station, as shown by the water marks.

Bodies of unidentified people are being found every few days, according to the Ballinger man, and the total death list will never be known.

Mr. and Mrs. Nicholson visited practically all the points of interest in California, returning by Los Angeles, Denver and Colorado Springs. The California crop is a large one this year, according to Mr. Nicholson, and fruit of all kinds is cheap. Oranges sell for four cents per dozen, and lemons ten cents per dozen. Fruit growers and farmers are complaining about low prices.

TO BULLDOG STEER FROM AIRPLANE

"Hackberry Slim," who staged a rodeo in Ballinger last spring, is to "bull-dog" a steer from an airplane at Cheyenne, Wyoming, according to the Brownwood Bulletin. The Bulletin in reporting "Slim's" visit to that city this week, says:

"H. A. Johnson, better known to the people of Brownwood and all this section of the central west as 'Hackberry Slim,' was in Brownwood a few hours today. Hackberry Slim was in the big rodeo staged here last July, about one year ago now, and was one of the star riders of bucking bronchos wild steers, and pitching mules. The remarkable part of the riding of Hackberry is found in the fact that he has a wooden leg, and last year while riding one of the worst of the bucking bronchos, this wooden leg came loose and fell to the ground. Hackberry stayed with the bronco, however, and when he had finally ceased pitching, he hobbled back to where his leg had come loose, buckled it on and was ready for the next act.

"Hackberry and associates recently staged a small rodeo in Brownwood, but owing to the fact that it was not the time of year for such things the enterprise was not a financial success. Other rodeos staged at different places since leaving Brownwood has convinced Hackberry that it does not pay just now and so he has placed his horses in a pasture and is on his way to Cheyenne, Wyoming, where a great frontier day rodeo, with wild westerners, stage robbers, Indians and other hair raising features will be introduced. Hackberry will there undertake a stunt that has never before been attempted and that is bull-dogging a wild steer from an airplane. It will be a feat attended by every element of tragedy should the details fall short by a hair's breadth and the movie man will be on hand to catch it and reproduce it on the screen.

"Hackberry says if this feat can be done and transferred to the movies he may be able to begin to think about living on Easy Street in the city of Pleasant Days in the near future."

TEXAS ROADS TO SAVE THOUSANDS

FORT WORTH, July 14.—Thousands of dollars monthly will be saved by the railroads in Texas by the wage reduction recently ordered by the United States Railroad Labor Board, according to officials of the roads.

Payrolls of the Missouri, Kansas & Texas, Texas & Pacific, and Ft. Worth and Denver City railroads will be cut from 10 to 12 percent by the reduction, the officials said. The Katy and T. & P. lines have headquarters in Dallas, and the general offices of the F. W. & D. C. road are in Ft. Worth.

The reduction will amount to about 10 per cent saving in the payroll of the M. K. & T., or about \$100,000 a month. H. E. McGee, general manager, said today. The Texas & Pacific line will save about 12 per cent a month on its payroll in Texas, according to J. A. Somerville, general manager. The railroad employes, he pointed out, are now receiving under the recent cut effective July 1, the wages of a year ago plus 40 per cent of the 60 per cent increase granted at that time.

Griesenbeck tried to catch Knight off third, heaved it wild and the Cat's third sacker scored. White followed with a single that scored Liles. Fast fielding in the ninth cut short an attempted rally by the Eagles.

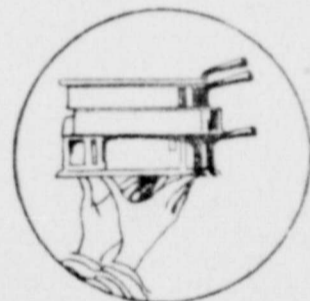

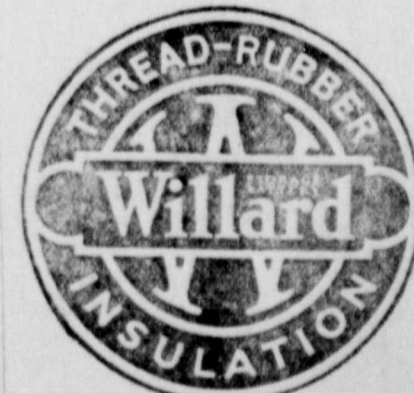

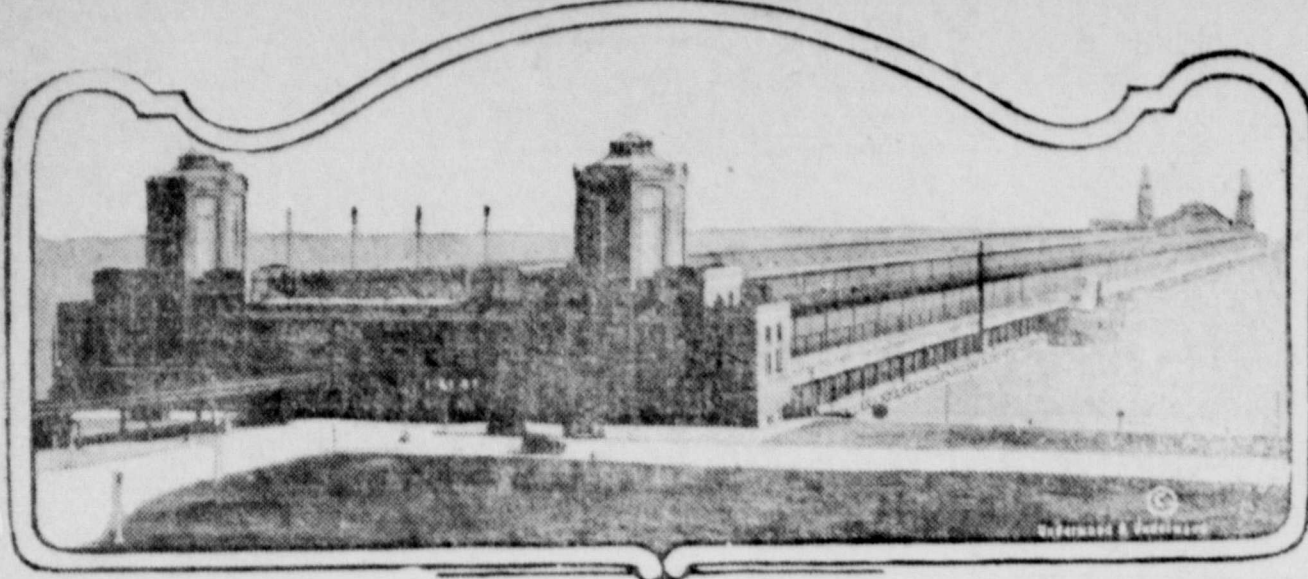
