TEXAS HAS NEW STATETREASURER

AUSTIN, July 16.—John W. Baker, State Treasurer, tendered his resignation today, to become effective as soon as he can be released from the duties of the office. Mr. Baker authorized the Associated Press to announce that he will become first acting vice president of the Breckenridge State Bank at Breckenridge, Texas. He is now serving his second term as treasurer of the state.

AUSTIN, July 16.—Following the acceptance of State Treasurer Baker's resignation this morning, Governor Neff announced that he had appointed G. N. Holton, present chief clerk of the treasury department, to succeed Mr. Baker. Mr. Baker will be checked out at once.

Mr. Baker will leave Monday for Breckenridge to assume his new duties with the bank at that place. His successor, Mr. Holton, has been connected with the department for the last ten years, succeeding Lon D. Morgan, chief clerk, about four months ago.

YOUNG GIRL IN STATE DEMONSTRATION CONTEST

EL PASO, July 16.—Mildred Perkins, 16, a member of the Clint, Texas, Girls' Home Demonstration class, will enter a number of contests at College Station, Texas, July 25 to 30, during the farmers' short course.

Clint is a small community near here. The girls of the village have given box suppers, ice cream entertainments and have sold products at fairs to raise more than \$100 with which to send Miss Perkins to College Station, where she can try for prizes in canning fruit, making bread, making button holes, sewing and other household activities.

FIRE CRIPPLES CITY TELEPHONE SERVICE

At the critical time Friday afternoon, and immediately after the siren sounded the fire alarm, about 400 telephones were thrown out of commission due to two cables burning in two. The two cables connected phones No. 0 to 299 with two positions of the switch board, and this of course interrupted all those connections.

Manager Adkins is to be congratulated for quick time in making the repairs. Nothing could be done towards making repairs until the fire had been put out and the linemen get on the ground, but in about forty minutes most of the phones were open again. However, about 50 local phones and 150 rurals were thrown out of commission until Saturday afternoon.

AUSTIN, July 12.—The report of the state bureau of vital statistics shows that 23 sets of twins and two sets of triplets were born in Texas during June. The total of births reported was 5,459.

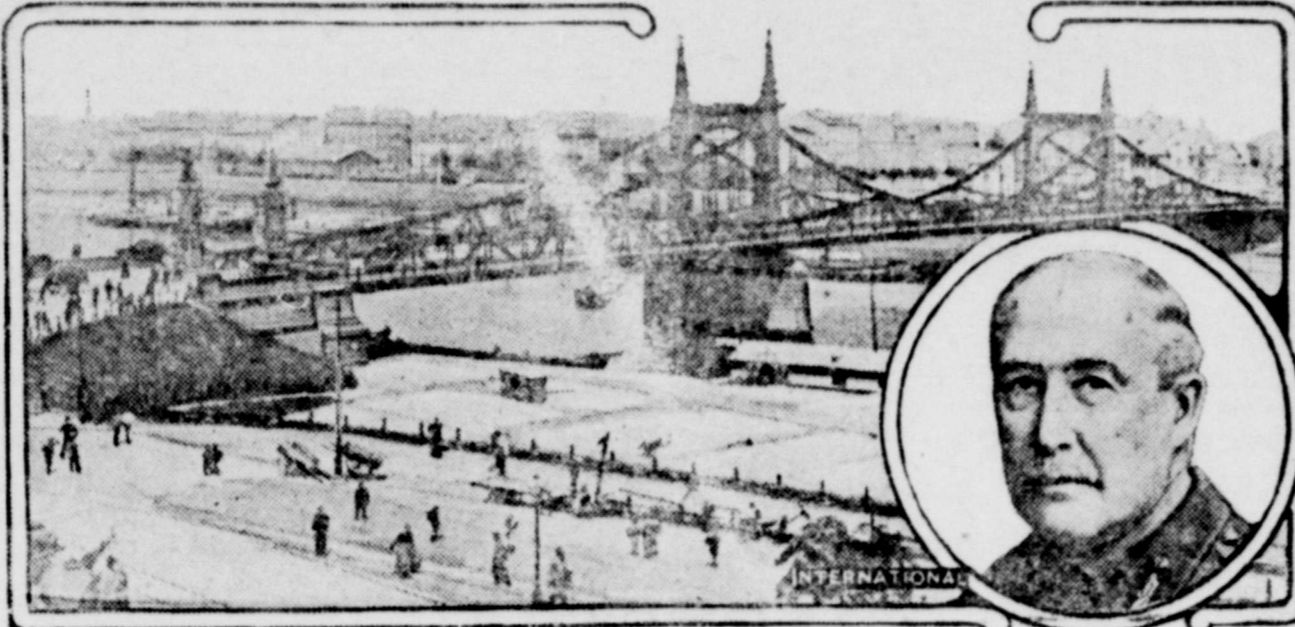

CALL FOR COUNTY LEGION RENEWS Y. M. B. L. SEC'Y. WOODMEN MEET FIGHT FOR BONUS OFF TO SCHOOL

The Woodmen of the World camps of Rannels county have been called to meet in the Ballinger hall Wednesday night of next week, (July 20). Every camp in the county has been urged to send representatives to this meeting.

R. E. Willingham, who represented the Rannels county camps at the meeting in New York, returned home Friday at noon. He went as an insurgent, being called as a witness in the ballot box stealing case, but the insurgents lost out.

The regulars were in full control of the national convention, and refused to seat the insurgent delegates, and Sovereign Commander Frazier was re-elected for a period of four years. It is expected that the Texas camps will take some steps looking to withdrawal from the head camp.

Mr. Willingham visited Washington, heard President Harding address the Senate, and visited other places of interest while in the East. He fell in with the Texas delegation attending the National Christian Endeavor Association convention at Washington, and aside from the unpleasantness experienced by being "kicked" out of the Woodmen convention, he had a pleasant trip.

BANKERS MEET TO TALK COTTON

WASHINGTON, July 16.—Governor Harding of the Federal Reserve Bank, announced today that he had called a conference here Tuesday for the governors of five Federal Reserve banks in the cotton producing sections for the purpose of framing a uniform policy for making loans on cotton during the coming marketing season.

BRECKENRIDGE, Tex., July 12.—Breckenridge has 253 more pupils in the public schools than a year ago, according to the supplementary scholastic census taken recently. The total showed a total of 2,343 pupils.

CHICAGO, July 16.—The American Legion's fight for the soldier bonus will be continued with renewed vigor, declared Major John G. Emery, of Grand Rapids, Michigan, national commander of the Legion. Major Emery made this statement in commenting on the "side tracking" of the bonus bill by the Senate.

RUN ON BANK AT DENISON, TEXAS

DENISON, July 16.—The Denison Bank & Trust Company, which closed its doors Friday when withdrawal of deposits developed a run on the bank, was unable to resume business today. The president and board of directors of the bank told the crowd which practically blocked traffic near the bank today, that the institution would probably open for business Tuesday, and the depositors would receive their money in full.

\$20,000,000 IN BACK TAXES COLLECTED

WASHINGTON, July 16.—Approximately twenty million dollars was added to the government revenue for the fiscal year ending June 30th, through recoveries made on false income tax returns, Commissioner Blair announced today.

GETS FOUR YEARS SHELLING BOAT

LEIPSIK, Germany, July 16.—Lieut. Dittmer and Lieut. Boldt, charged with murder in the first degree for firing on lifeboats after the Canadian hospital ship, Landovory Castle was torpedoed in the summer of 1918, were each sentenced today to four years' imprisonment.

The sentences imposed on the two men does not carry with it hard labor as demanded by the public prosecutor. The cases of Dittmer and Boldt differed from others heard by the Supreme Court here in connection with the trials resulting from violations of the rules of civilized warfare, in as much as the two lieutenants were brought to trial by the German public prosecutor.

The Board of Directors of the Young Men's Business League has granted leave of absence to Secretary Williams to allow him to attend the National School for Commercial Secretaries to be held in Evanston, Illinois. The school is conducted under the auspices of the National Secretaries Association and the United States Chamber of Commerce, with the assistance of the School of Commerce of Northwestern University.

This course of lectures offered for commercial secretaries is said to be the highest class of instruction offered them. Above 250 secretaries are usually in attendance on the school, and are instructed in the latest methods of chamber of commerce work, in standardization of forms, practices, etc.

Mr. Williams may also spend a week taking advanced work in the American City Bureau school at Madison, Wis., which is also near Chicago.

The Board deemed this move to be for the best interests of the organization and of the city as a whole, as the activities during the next month will be light, and the Secretary can be back on the job for the fall season full of "pep," and new ideas. The salary of the secretary will be suspended during the month of August, giving the organization an additional fund for local work.

During the absence of the secretary, Miss Stephenson will continue to conduct the work of the Retail Merchants' Association.

LABOR TROUBLE IN MEXICO AGAIN

TAMPICO, Mexico, July 16.—The followers of General Daniel Martinez Herrera, who were taken prisoners by the government forces, will be tried for treason. General Gomez, military commander here, announced today.

Governor Lopez Lara is hurrying the departure from the oil fields of workmen who were recently laid off, fearing danger of their joining the revolutionists. It is stated that some oil companies are experiencing difficulty in obtaining workmen, and later it was said that they are willing to re-employ discharged men.

ROBBERS SHOOT MRS. KARBER IS DENTON OFFICER GIVEN LIFE TERM

DENTON, July 16.—W. A. Neal, deputy city marshal, was shot in the leg at three o'clock this morning when he attempted to arrest two men whom he discovered in the railroad station. The men refused to halt and opened fire when the officer appeared on the scene. A number of shots were exchanged. A wholesale house was broken into earlier in the night and a quantity of cigarettes taken.

FIRE COMPANY GETS NICE CHECK

The Volunteer Fire Company received a check for \$100 from E. A. Jeanes & Co. Friday afternoon, following the Nance garage fire. The Jeanes produce and grocery house adjoins the garage, and due to the efficient work of the fire boys their loss amounted to very little, while otherwise they would have been wiped off the map. L. B. Stubbs, who adjoins the garage on the South side, is out of town, and W. A. Nance is also out of town. He was notified of the fire.

W. A. Nance returned from Garden City about ten o'clock Friday night, leaving for home as soon as he received a phone message notifying him of the fire. The Nance-Stroble Electric Co. presented the fire company with a \$100 check Saturday morning.

Mr. Nance stated that he would repair the building and remove all signs of the fire as soon as the insurance adjuster adjusted the loss. The building and stock was fully covered by insurance, but there was no insurance on the fixtures, and it is estimated that the damage to the fixtures will amount to several hundred dollars. There was no insurance on the filling station, cash register, show cases, counters, etc., and these were badly damaged.

AUTO VICTIM RECOVERING

Grandpa Morris, who was seriously injured by an auto some time ago, is able to be up and come down town. Mr. Morris was crossing the street when an auto struck him, knocking him down and bruising him about the head and body. Due to his age he had a close call, and it was thought for a time that he had been fatally injured.

LIVELY SESSION IS PREDICTED

AUSTIN, July 16.—Legislators began arriving in Austin today for the convening of the special session of the Legislature Monday. Most of the members express the opinion that the coming session will be a lively one in view of the Legislature's rebuke of the governor's criticism of the appropriations.

Mr. and Mrs. Dan Moser are at home from a ten days visit to the Rio Grande valley country. They also spent a week in Corpus Christi and several days at San Benito. Mr. Moser investigated the cotton crop conditions with a view of spending the early season in the markets in South Texas, but did not find things to his liking.

DALLAS, July 12.—Farm tenancy has increased considerably in Texas since 1910, according to the Texas Industrial Congress. In 1920 farms operated by tenants in Texas numbered 232,335, as against 219,575 in 1910. Of these 142,645 were share tenants and 68,374 were croppers. Texas has more share tenants than any other state, the congress announced.

CLEVELAND, July 16.—Mrs. Eva Catherine Kaber was found guilty today of first degree murder. The jury recommended that the woman be given whatever mercy the law could allow under the charge. Under the verdict she must go to the pen for the remainder of her life.

Mrs. Kaber was tried on a charge of plotting to kill her husband, who was given slow poison and later stabbed to death by a party whom it was alleged the defendant employed to kill him.

CLEVELAND, July 16.—When the jury made its official report fixing the verdict at guilty, Mrs. Kaber was lying limp in the arms of the sheriff. When asked if she had anything to say she merely shook her head. Judge Bernon then pronounced sentence upon the woman and she was carried back to her cell in the jail.

The jury took only three ballots it was said. The first two were nine for mercy and three for first degree murder without recommendations for mercy. Before balloting the jury discarded the insanity plea, holding that the woman was sane. Counsel for defense announced that the case would not be appealed and counsel for both the state and defense said that they were satisfied with the verdict.

SENATOR BAUGH GOES TO AUSTIN

Senator J. H. Baugh will leave for Austin Sunday. Mrs. Baugh will accompany him. Senator Baugh says that he will be ready to come home as soon as the appropriation bill is put over and the redistricting bill put through. These matters should be attended to and no time lost, and Senator Baugh says that he sees no necessity for a protracted stay in Austin.

NO CONFLICT IN DISARMAMENT TALK

PARIS, July 16.—A temporary mixed commission for the reduction of armament appointed by the League of Nations as provided for in the proposed conference suggested by President Harding, will not be in conflict with the league's disarmament move, it was decided by the league today.

**ANGELO CLUB AFTER
BASEBALL SPECIAL**

(San Angelo Standard)

By Friday something definite will be known regarding the possibilities of a special train to be operated from San Angelo to Abilene and return on Saturday, July 23, for the accommodation of fans attending the playoff between the Bronchos and Swatters, it was announced Thursday by Sam H. Brewer, secretary of the local club.

C. L. Carnean, city ticket agent for the Santa Fe here, telegraphed Thursday morning to Galveston to ascertain what arrangements might be made for a train to Abilene and return, via Ballinger. At the same time, Mr. Brewer talked over the telephone to Secretary Ridings of the Ballinger club, who stated that Ballinger might be depended upon to fill one coach on a special. It is likely that at least 125 fares at the straight rate will have to be guaranteed to secure a special train on either road, although a reduction is anticipated. The Orient has already been asked to quote rates for a special.

The special, if operated on either road, will likely leave San Angelo between 8 and 9 o'clock Saturday morning, July 23, arriving at Abilene during the noon hour. It will leave Abilene on the return around 6 o'clock, reaching home about 10. The game that will decide the winner of the first half of the West Texas League will likely be called about 3 o'clock.

Since a guarantee will likely be required by either the Orient or Santa Fe, fans desiring to make the trip will be called on soon to sign up for the trip and deposit the price of their tickets to make up the guarantee.

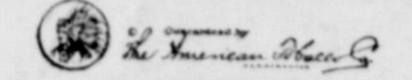

**COUNTS STONES IN
STATE CAPITOL**

AUSTIN, July 15.—The state capitol is constructed of granite from Granite Mountain, about 100 miles North of Austin.

An argument arose recently in the press room of the capitol, the newspaper correspondents' headquarters, as to how many pieces of granite it took to build the capitol. After discussion it was decided to count the blocks and the youngest, most athletic correspondent was assigned to the story.

He figured and counted for about a week and finally reported that there was somewhere in the region of 1,000 solid pieces of granite in the state house. However, a later check showed that the correspondent was in error and a recount of the granite blocks is being made by the newspaper men. The work is being done at off hours and they expect to finish the job shortly before the legislature convenes in special session on July 18.

Other data relative to the historic capitol and its construction also is being gathered by the correspondents.

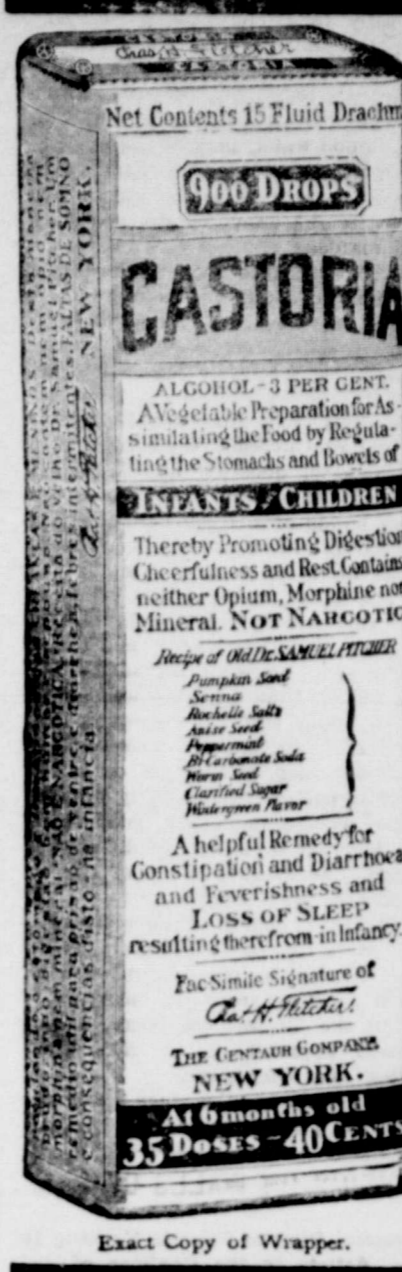
BALLINGER MELONS AT SAN ANGELO

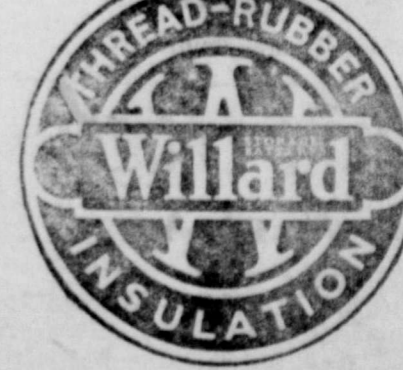

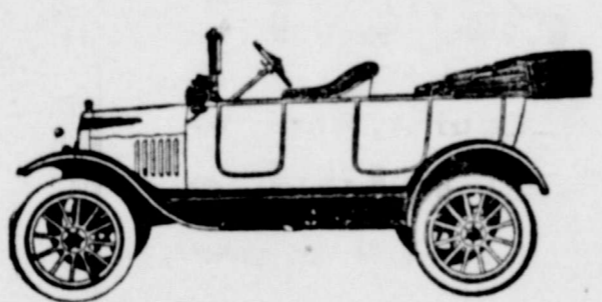

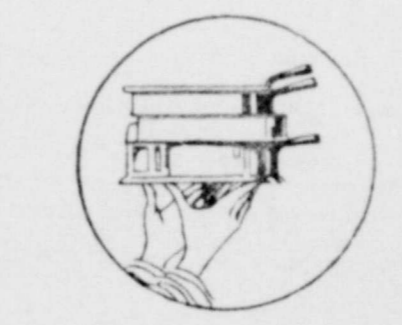
