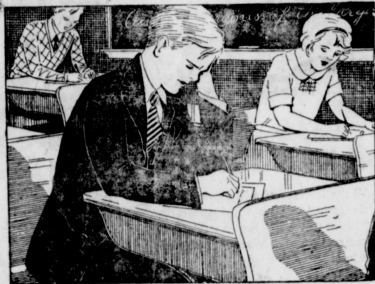

Right School Lunches



ONE of the problems in a recent final hygiene examination for fifth grade boys and girls was "Plan a healthful breakfast such as a boy or girl should eat before coming to school in the morning." This is an example of the increasing tendency of modern education to stress the home-life of children.

And the lime-light is on the lunch-box which you prepare for the noon-day meals, just as it is on the morning meal. There are right and wrong foods to put in your little son's or daughter's school lunch box. Here are some of the right ones—foods which are good for growing youngsters.

Goody! It's Lunch Time!

Nut Bread, Cheese and Fig Sandwiches: Slice nut bread thin better and spread with mashed cream cheese. Cover with canned figs which have been drained and sliced. Top with nut bread and eat as desired.

Chicken and Vegetable Salad Sandwiches: Cut up the contents of one ounce can of chicken, add drained canned peas, chopped celery and chopped pimiento. Moisten well with mayonnaise. Spread on buttered whole wheat bread and add a crisp lettuce leaf.

Principles Chocolate Milk Shake: Shake together one-half cup chocolate syrup, one cup evaporated milk or fresh cream, one cup pineapple syrup, one cup water and a little cracked ice. Shake and pour into the thermos bottle. This makes four drinks.

Cherry Tart: Line scalloped tart with pastry. Drain cherries from a No. 2 can of red pitted cherries and cook the juice with two-thirds cup sugar until glazed. Drain again and cool the cherries; then divide between tart shells. Mix one-half teaspoon cornstarch and one teaspoon cold water and add to the syrup. Cook until thick. Pour over cherries and bake in a hot oven about fifteen to twenty minutes.

Materials Evolved by Acids Drawn From Air

Silk stockings have actually been made from air! They look very well indeed, but they have one drawback: they melt in hot weather. Still, that is a disadvantage which will doubtless be overcome in time, for the science of making silk from air is still in its infancy.

Wonderful work has been done by Mr. Wallace Carothers, who has discovered that about twenty substances can be extracted from the air, each of which can be turned into a material very like those silk in appearance. A synthetic cloth has even been evolved by treating various acids drawn from the air with a waste product of ordinary petrol.

Air plays a very important part, for we could not live for an instant without it. In the future, though, it is likely to provide us with a good many other things beside breath. Salspeter, one of the most valuable fertilizers known, is already manufactured from air, and the neon gas used for filling certain kinds of electric lamp bulbs can be obtained in the same way. Not long ago, a method of extracting carbon from air was discovered, and it was predicted that from this might develop methods of obtaining both fuel and food from the atmosphere.—London Tit-Bits.

Phonograph Not Direct Idea in Edison's Mind

Edison admitted he was working on another subject when he stumbled on to the principle which made the phonograph possible. He said, "I was engaged upon a machine intended to repeat Morse characters which were recorded on paper by indications that transferred their message to another circuit automatically when passed under a tracing point connected with the circuit-closing apparatus. In manipulating this machine I found that when the cylinder carrying the indented paper was turned with great swiftness it gave off a humming noise from the indentations, resembling that of the human talk heard indistinctly. This led me to try fitting a diaphragm to the machine which would receive the sound waves made by my voice when I talked to it, and register them upon an insensible material placed on the cylinder. I saw at once that the problem of registering the human speech so that it would be repeated by mechanical means as often as might be desired was solved."—Washington Star.

I can well remember once exploring in the attic of my childhood and finding a bow and some arrows. It was no Indian bow, but a relic of the interest in archery of some years ago. And would that bow shoot! Even in my inexperienced hands, it drove an arrow right through the board wall of a cowshed belonging to a neighbor. I certainly had no thought that a cow could be leaning against the inside of that wall. I never could quite decide which carried on worse, the cow or the neighbor. University May Close School of Religion

Peiping China—Yenching university, an interdenominational institution closely associated with Harvard university and representing a union of several missionary schools, is threatened with having to close its department of religion.

The Nanking government takes the position that under its regulations foreign mission schools in China may offer for religious instruction as an elective but not a major course. The fact that students at Yenching university major in religion and study in a separate department, administered by a dean, is held to be in violation of the government's regulations.

Shower of Ducks Is New Canadian Freak

Banff, Alta.—It doesn't rain "cats and dogs" at Banff in the Canadian Rockies; it now rains wild ducks.

During a recent brief but heavy storm, a night flight of wild ducks were forced down, and mistaking the illuminated asphalt and oiled roads for streams, "dove in," breaking their necks.

Banff youngsters reaped a harvest of dimes next morning by collecting the dead birds for a local taxidermist.

Row With Mate Over Cards Fatal to Wife

Cleveland.—A quarrel during a game of rummy with her husband brought death to Mrs. John O. Steer, thirty-six. The husband, a middle-aged dentist, will be formally charged with murder, authorities announce. Mrs. Steer died of gunshot wounds and blows.

The quarrel arose over an argument concerning systems of playing rummy. Steer is reported to have confessed, and it was the first serious dispute in many years of married life.

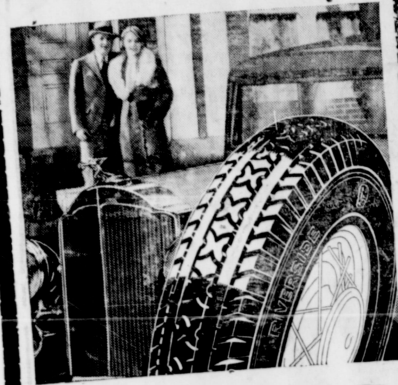
