## 8 DROWN AT PALACIOS BAPTIST ENCAMPMENT

PALACIOS, Tex., July 22.—Seven bodies of the B. Y. P. U. delegates, who were drowned yesterday have been recovered. The body of Drue Cumbie has not been found. The bayou is being dragged today for the body of Cumbie.

The dead were members of a party of sixteen delegates to the annual encampment who formed a bathing party, and were caught in the undertow of the Gulf of Mexico at the mouth of Green's Bayou, 22 miles from Palacios at five o'clock Thursday afternoon.

The bathers were members of a sailing party of 31 that left Palacios at two o'clock for a sail on Matagorda Bay. The excursionists were in bathing and were caught in the strong undertow and swept out into deep water.

The accident occurred on the last day of the encampment, which has been in session since July 12.

PALACIOS, Tex., July 22.—Three bodies of the eight persons who were drowned Thursday afternoon at the mouth of Green's Bayou have been recovered and the bayou is being dragged with the hopes of recovering the other five bodies.

All the persons drowned were delegates to the annual encampment of the Baptist Young People's Union at this place. Their names follow: John E. Price, of Palacios; Drue Cumbie, of Bronte; Miss Grace Courtney, Mrs. B. Mayes, Miss Ina Hodges, James E. Dykes, and Miss Vi Buster, all of Breckenridge, Texas; and Archie Bryant, of Abilene.

Drue Cumbie, one of the young men who lost their lives by drowning at Palacios, was a Bronte boy. He was well known through out this section of the state as an evangelist singer, especially among the Baptist people. News of his death was received here by the Ledger from the Associated Press Friday morning. The remains will probably be shipped to Bronte for burial, if they are recovered from the bayou where he lost his life. Up to a late hour Friday his remains had not been recovered, his body being one of the five missing.

## HIGHWAY MARKED THRU CITY

F. W. Jarrell, of the Texas Automobile Association, passed thru Ballinger Friday with his marking crew going West in marking the Central Texas Highway. Practically every electric wire pole on the left hand side of the street thru Ballinger bears two yellow and a blue circle stripe, and this coloring is painted conspicuously every half mile from Shreveport, La., to Ballinger and the marking crew has gone West to complete the marking from here to El Paso by the way of Ft. Stockton.

Mr. Jarrell is accompanied on the trip by his wife, and he says that they have camped out every night except one and finds this route an ideal one for tourists. "We counted fifty-nine tourist cars coming or going on this route between here and Brownwood yesterday," said Mr. Jarrell, "and as soon as the route is advertised travel will increase rapidly."

Mr. Jarrell stated that camping grounds were drawing cards, and that every town which provided good camping grounds for tourists would have many visitors to spend the night with them. The trade from tourists will amount to thousands of dollars in practically all lines of business during the course of a year.

Ballinger came up with her quota for the expense of marking and advertising the route and the work is being done under the direction of the Texas Automobile Association, and the citizens can rest assured that it will be done right, and hereafter a traveler can not lose himself in traveling over this route. Mr. Jarrell stated that the people of Louisiana and Mississippi were interested in having the route marked on to the coast, and that he felt sure that it would be done. This will make it easy for parties to travel from the Mississippi coast to El Paso over a well marked and maintained highway, and Ballinger will be on the big route.

## GOVERNOR CALLED ON FOR GRAFT EVIDENCE

### PUNISH MOTHER WHIPPING CHILD

Mrs. Ruby Russell, a San Angelo woman, must spend one year in jail where he husband has also been sentenced to spend a year, and must also pay a fine of \$500 for whipping her three year old girl baby. This was the verdict of a jury who heard the evidence in the case at San Angelo Thursday.

Russell, husband of the woman, and step-father of the little girl, was sentenced to one year in jail and a fine of \$500 the day before, and after the mother of the child had taken all the blame on herself and after she had been released, she was re-arrested and prosecuted with the above results.

Mrs. Russell plead for mercy and claimed she was the victim of epilepsy, subject to fits, and did not know what she was doing when she whipped her little three year old daughter, Helen Hall, brutally. It was charged that both Russell and his wife used a knotted rope in whipping the child on her bare back.

Complaints were at first filed against both Russell and his wife, but when the cases were called for trial the charges against the woman were dismissed on a technicality. She came into court to testify in behalf of her husband and claimed that she did the whipping and not her husband and after an eye witness had furnished testimony which convicted the man, the woman was re-arrested.

Russell's lawyers have filed a motion asking for a new trial on the ground that the defendant is a tubercular and that several important defense witnesses were not allowed to testify in the trial. Russell is a former soldier and is drawing a compensation from the government.

Mrs. Russell protested that she loved her baby as much as any mother ever loved a child and that she wanted it to have the best that the world can afford. She said that she did not want to take the baby back to raise on account of her condition and requested that it be placed in a good home. She still maintains that she administered all the whippings complained of and that her husband is not guilty. Examinations showed that the child was badly bruised on the body and limbs.

AUSTIN, July 22.—The House today accepted Governor Neff's invitation to send representatives for evidence of graft and extravagance charges which he claimed that he has in his possession. The House authorizes the chairman of the appropriations committee to call on the governor for evidence.

The legislature heard a number of bills introduced today and acted favorably on measures already pending. The pink boll worm bill recommended by the governor, was introduced by Senator Darwin.

The Senate passed finally the bill introduced by Senator Cousins carrying an appropriation of \$4000 to pay the expenses of scholastic census work where needed, under the direction of the state board of education. The senate adjourned at noon until ten o'clock Monday morning.

The rural school aid bill proposing an appropriation of two million dollars for the next two years was introduced today by Representative Whitwood.

Bills proposing the abolishing of the department of agriculture, the department of marketing and warehousing, placing these duties on the A. & M. College, were introduced by Representative Stevenson.

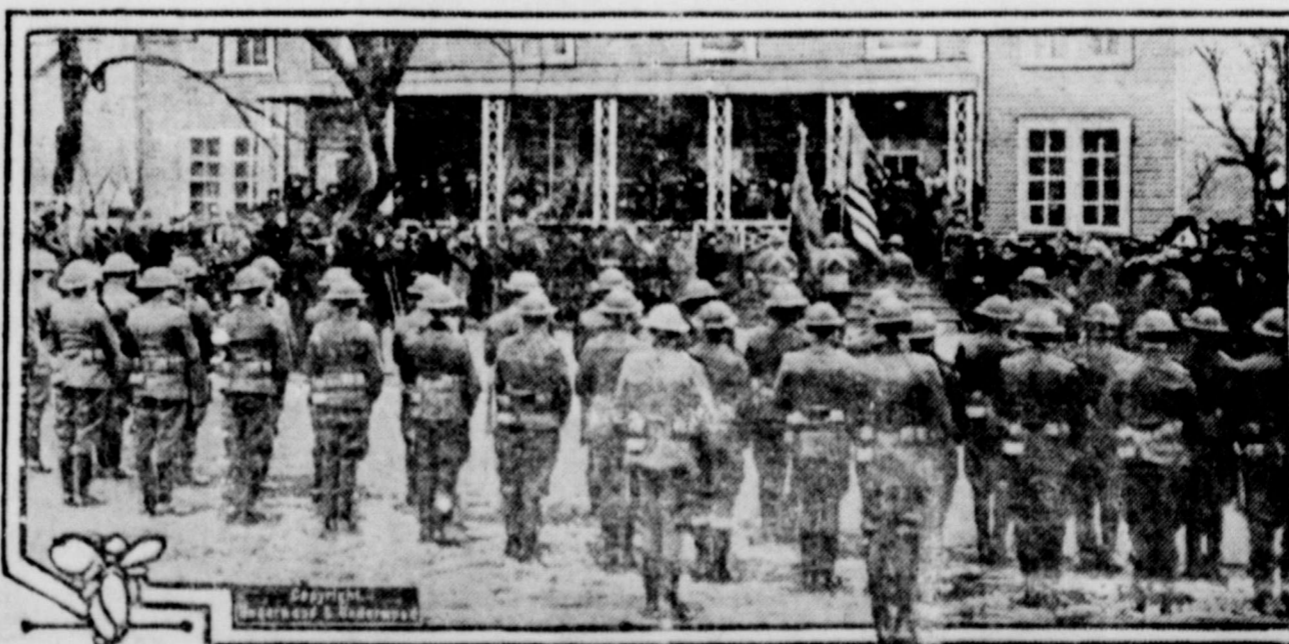

WICHITA FALLS, July 22.—Henry Adams was placed under bond at Matador today following shooting and killing of C. L. Burden, a prominent farmer of West Northfield Thursday morning. Burden was one of a party of men who called at Adams' home Tuesday night.

Four other members of the party have been placed under bond also. The members of the party a few days ago carried Adams to Matador and endeavored to have a complaint charging non-support of his wife filed against him, but they failed. Adams' wife denying the charges. The killing occurred when the party went to Adams' house again yesterday morning presumably for the purpose of whipping him, or tarring and feathering him. Excitement in the community is running high.

Ballinger will own and operate a city light plant. That is a foregone certainty, and a question settled on April 13th when the citizens voted almost unanimously for a bond issue sufficient to pay for installing such an enterprise.

There is no law under the sun, and no law will be passed in the future preventing any community of citizens from making such public improvements for the benefit of themselves.

Of course there are laws governing the issuing of bonds and the levying of taxes for public improvements, and the city officials want to comply with those laws. If they should go wrong they will go back and undo the thing and do it right, but it will be done.

In the case of the City of Ballinger her commissioners and her mayor have worked against odds. They realized that the corporation now serving the city with electric current was watching every loop hole, and would take advantage of every opportunity to defeat the city in its program. For this reason the commission worked fast, and hedged against litigation which it anticipated at the hands of the old light company.

The mayor and commissioners of this city are doing and have done what they thought was for the best interests of the city. They are level headed successful business men and no one will question their integrity. They are tax payers, and have the best interests of the city at heart, and we believe would not do anything in conducting the city's affairs that they would not do if it was their personal business at

stake. Service, treatment, and rates made it necessary for Ballinger to provide for herself one of the most important public utilities of the day. The city officials went about the work in a business way. They sent their representatives to other cities where municipal plants are in operation and made a thorough investigation of the whole matter before undertaking to put over the proposition.

What they learned was so convincing of the wisdom of the move that further argument was not necessary, and even if the city had been receiving service in keeping with the demands of the public, it would still have been the wise policy to do just what the city is doing. The wisdom of this will be more convincingly brought home to the consumers of electricity when the new plant is put in operation.

The city has made a contract which calls for a "turnkey" job, and this city will have a modern light and power plant, constructed at a cost of a little better than \$44,000 with a capacity for taking care of the present needs and a twenty-five per cent increase.

The body was buried in the Robert Lee cemetery Wednesday afternoon. Mrs. W. L. McGraw and a large family besides other relatives, survive.

**SOUTH TEXAS FARMERS FARING BAD THIS YEAR**

C. A. Doose is at home from a six weeks stay in Corpus Christi, where he carried his family, rented a cottage for the summer. Mrs. Doose and the children remained at Corpus while Mr. Doose was called back to look after business.

"I had an opportunity to ascertain at first hand conditions in South Texas," said Mr. Doose, "and as a whole I found the farmers up against it this year and badly discouraged."

Mr. Doose stated that he saw tons of vegetables, onions, cabbage, etc., decaying in the field for the lack of a market. In some instances farmers who carried their truck to market hauled it back home and dumped it in the ditch.

"I saw cotton crops which promised a bale to the acre when I first went to South Texas," said Mr. Doose. "The crops on that pretty black land was lapping in the middle and waist high when I first saw it but after the storm complaint of boll weevil began to come in and the continued rains have damaged it."

Mr. Doose stated that the farmers were protesting over the high charges being made for ginning, and he learned that picking would be cut to forty and fifty cents per hundred. In one county the farmers have constructed three gins and are ginning for forty cents per hundred.

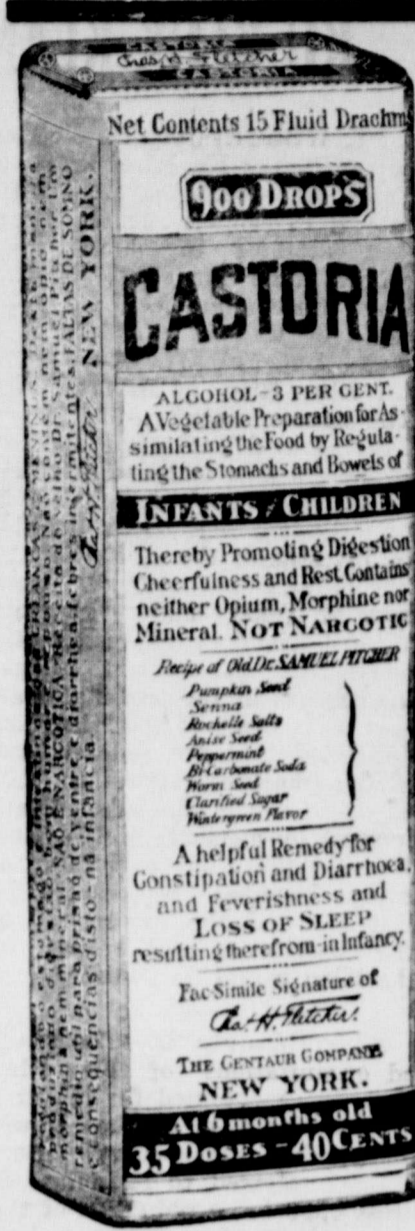

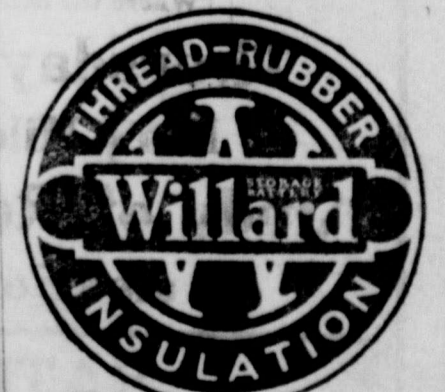

FT. WORTH, July 22.—Action to purify the Ku Klux Klan of Texas and Oklahoma from within and to combat other forces that attempt to shield their crimes under the cloak of the Klan, were announced today by Colonel William Joseph Simmons, Imperial Wizard of the Ku Klux Klan, of Atlanta, Ga. The announcement came in a message to a local newspaper.

The message stated that thirty men of the Klan's department of investigation had been detailed to investigate the activities of the organization and its members of Texas and Oklahoma. Wizard Simmons expressed the belief that the recent alleged lawlessness in the two states are acts of enemies of the Klan, and requested that the federal and civil authorities report to him any evidence of the alleged lawlessness by members of the Klan. He said that the activities of every member be carefully watched and the violators of the constitution and bylaws of the Klan would be punished.

AUSTIN, July 22.—The alleged organizations of Ku Klux Klan was mentioned for the first time on the floor of the House today when Representative Burmeister referred to it in an address opposing a reduction of the appropriation for paying sheriff's fees. Mr. Burmeister contended that better pay for the officers would aid in putting down lawlessness.
