RUSSIA ACCEPTS OFFER OF U. S.

RIGA, July 30.—The offer of Herbert Hoover to aid Russia in relieving the suffering Russians, due to the famine conditions provided that all Americans held in Russia be released, has been accepted by the soviet government which suggests the immediate negotiations in order to realize the speedy assistance, according to dispatches received here from Moscow today. Mrs. Marguerite Harrison, a Baltimore newspaper correspondent, who was among the Americans held in Russian prisons, and who was released by the bolsheviks, arrived here today.

AUSTIN, July 30.—Wallace Malone, a member of the lower house of the Thirty-seventh legislature from Fort Worth, was arrested last night by Federal prohibition officers charged with having in his possession intoxicants in violation of the Volstead act.

Malone was released when he arranged bond in the sum of \$500.

Prison Committee Reports; Endorses Neff's Charges

AUSTIN, July 30.—That a law providing for the removal of prison commissioners by trial be enacted and then such proceedings be immediately instituted to oust W. G. Pryor from office, because of "his indifference and wilful failure to discharge his duties," is recommended in the report of the joint legislative investigating committee submitted to the special session today.

The law recommended is asked for in order that the cumbersome and enormously expensive methods of impeachment need not be resorted to, the report states.

The committee recommends the use of chains as a means of punishment be abolished and that segregation and classification of prisoners be carried out by law. It is charged in the report that this is grossly neglected. Other recommendations made by the committee follow:

The creation of a board of supervisors composed of three members, two men and one woman, to serve without pay. The duties of this board to be to make visits to the prisons and farms and make reports quarterly to the governor.

The passage of a law requiring proper sanitary conditions.

The appropriation of sufficient money to support discharged convicts for thirty days after they have been discharged as a reward for meritorious conduct.

The centralization of the entire prison system without absolute sale of all lands and the relocating of the system within fifty miles of Austin.

That factories be constructed with sufficient land adjoining for employment of prisoners fitted for farm work only, and that only enough farm work be done to make the system self sustaining.

The separation of the prisoners according to sex, age, color and criminal inclination, according to prison records.

That a rock crushing plant be operated in conjunction with the state highway department.

The committee's report stated that it found that nearly every law passed for the regulation of

the system had been violated. The report stated that the committee found that Commissioners Pryor and Sam Low, the latter now a member of the House, had purchased 260 mules and horses for a total consideration of \$39,000, and that the animals were actually worth about \$15,800. The committee recommends that the attorney general's department investigate the deal and bring suit against Bassett Blakeley, seller of the animals, for damages.

The committee recommends that Gus Harris, present warden of the main penitentiary be discharged permanently, the committee finding that he had been re-employed after being discharged.

AUSTIN, July 30.—President Harding's plan for a disarmament conference was endorsed by a House concurrent resolution, adopted by the Senate today.

AUSTIN, July 30.—A Senate concurrent resolution authorizing the committee to investigate the killing of two convicts by Guard Eastham on the convict farm, was adopted by the House.

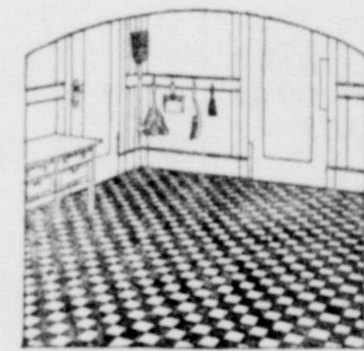

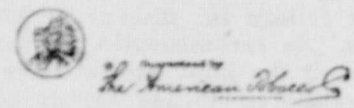

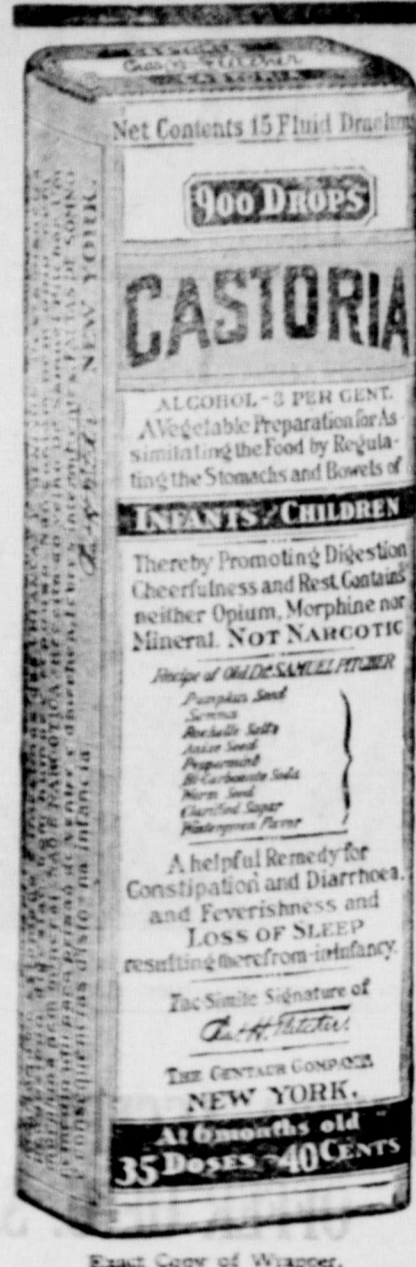

LOCALS ARE ONE PEG FROM TOP

The chances are good that by the time this baseball story reaches the reader the Bearcats will be occupying top place in the league. The locals will slide into first pew if they defeat the Swatters again today and San Angelo defeats Abilene. The locals made it five in a row for the week Friday by taking the second game from the Swatters with a score of 8 to 6. Ferguson twirled the apple over in a scattered hit fashion, allowing eleven hits for eight and one third innings, and won his game with ease. Cantrell relieved the big boy in the ninth when one man had walked, one hit for a single, and a three-bagger by Mason bringing in two scores. The game had been placed on ice by Ferguson and Manager Smith saw the chance to keep it there by sending in Joe Cantrell to his relief. The Swatters outhit the locals, but their hits could not overcome their errors made at critical times. The locals were charged with as many errors as the visitors, but they were largely of the inexpensive class. The game was featured by four doubles, each side staging two fast plays which netted two outs in each performance. Briscoe handled two of the doubles in sensational style, which sent a thrill through the spectators. In one instance "Brick" made a leap to connect with the ball driven like a bullet over second base, and unassisted covered second and then shot the pill to first in time to induce the ump to announce a double out. Ferguson

knocked a hot one down, Briscoe went to second with it and shot it to first, making double No. 2.

Riechburg, the Sweetwater "ace," was a little wild, altho hard to hit. The locals lacked one hit of averaging one to the session. In the third round the Bearcats scored twice without a hit.

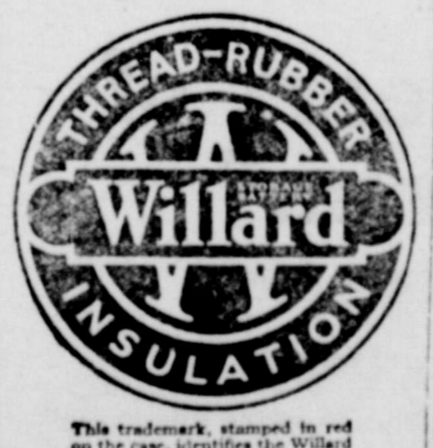

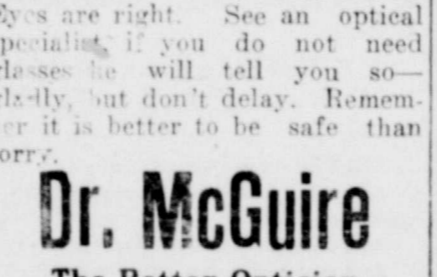
