GREEN LEADS IN SHUT-OUT GAME

ABILENE, Aug. 6.—Bert Green hurler for the Ballinger Bearcats was just a little too much for the Abilene Eagles here yesterday and as a result Popboy Smith's crew made it two in a row, winning 5 to 0. The Eagles did not get even a semblance of a hit off Green until the third, and only two clean bingles were registered off his offerings.

The Cats opened up their heavy hitting artillery in the fourth and on Briscoe's and Brown's doubles and Knight's triple coupled with an error by Burch put across four counters, and put the game securely on ice. Another count was added in the eighth by bunting of blows and an error.

The Eagles got a total of 11 men on bases and then were unable to count, three being on in the second but fast fielding cut off the chance of a marker.

SURVEYING CREW REACHES CITY

The surveying crew which is making a survey of the proposed Colorado irrigation project, and which has been at work for the past three or four months, have reached Ballinger with their work. For the past several days the surveyors have been at work along the North side of the Colorado river, running lines in the Valley Creek country, and they ran a line into Ballinger Saturday. This crew is making a survey of the proposed irrigation area, the work on the reservoir survey having been completed some time ago.

OPIUM DEALERS THREATEN MAN

PEKIN, Aug. 3.—(Delayed)—Courageous action by American Vice Consul Walter Adams, at Changsha, which resulted in the breaking up of a nest of opium dealers operating under the American flag, caused threats against the life of Consul Adams and it became necessary for him to be guarded by the American sailors in the consulate.

In a room with a hidden door, next door to the American consulate a ton of opium was discovered. Adams caused the opium to be removed to the consulate, and after much correspondence with the Peking foreign commissioner of customs he was authorized to burn the opium.

It developed that the traffic had been carried on by American commercial organizations on the premises of Americans, by Chinese employees who connected with the Chinese attached to the American consulate to give the business the semblance of legitimacy through the use of the American seal. No Americans are involved in the scheme which Consul Adams discovered.

ANTI K. K. KLAN SPENDING MORE BILL IS REVIVED THAN HE MAKES

AUSTIN, Aug. 6.—Governor Neff informed the legislature today that he will not submit any more matters to the special session of the legislature. This statement came in a message submitting several matters of minor importance.

The senate passed finally today the bill providing that material errors shall not be the cause or reversal in cases tried before the court or criminal appeals.

Under the suspension of constitutional rules the House engrossed and passed finally the educational appropriation bill today.

AUSTIN, Aug. 6.—The Patman anti-secret organization bill was brought back to life today after being killed in the committee room yesterday. An adverse report was made on the measure with the favorable minority report and today the motion carried despite an effort to table it. This brings the bill back to life and it can be considered by the House again.

AUSTIN, Aug. 6.—A bill is being prepared for introduction in the legislature increasing the guaranty fund from two million dollars to five million dollars. Gov. Neff submitted the subject in a special message today.

STOVE EXPLOSION CAUSES FIRE ALARM

The explosion of an oil stove in the Ideal Bakery about nine o'clock Saturday morning threatened a fire and caused the fire alarm to get busy. The fire company was "Johnny at the rat hole," but employees in the bakery handled the situation and had the excitement under control before the fire fighters got out their fire fighting apparatus. WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—A shrinkage in three months of three hundred and thirty million dollars in estimated government revenue for this year, based on the present revenue laws is disclosed by a statement recently presented to the House Ways and Means committee by Secretary Mellon. In the same time the government has decreased only eleven million and eight hundred and sixty-four thousand dollars.

We regret to lose Mr. Carlisle, but are glad to know that Mr. Eaton has become permanently settled and can not be run out of a home as has been the case from time to time for the past few months. Mr. Eaton is a valuable citizen, and he has received flattering offers to leave here but likes the town and the people and prefers to raise his family here.

EVERY MAN OWN STAMP PRINTER

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—New York was introduced today to a postage meter, a machine which makes every man his own stamp printer. The machine operates on the principle of similar stamp cancelling machines. As the letters are run through it a square about the size of a stamp is printed in which appears the words "U. S. Postage, paid 2 cents."

The meter can be checked up by a post office employee once a month, and the customer charged for the letters he has run through the machine at the rate of two cents each, at a saving to the government, and with much more convenience to the customer who mails letters in large quantities.

A WET DAY IN BALLINGER HISTORY

Fifteen years ago today, (Aug. 6, 1906) part of Ballinger was under water and the country was flooded everywhere. Water from the Colorado river was sweeping through the streets in part of the business district, and residents in the Southern part of the city were camped in church buildings and other houses on the hill. 11.54 inches of rain fell during August of that year, following a seven inch rain fall in July. The total rain fall for the year was 37.82. There are some people here who would be willing to pass through such an experience again just for the change.

LONDON, Aug. 6.—All American prisoners in Moscow and Petrograd will be sent across the Russian boarder by Monday at the latest, according to a message received here today from Leo Lamanoff, chairman of the Russian relief committee, to Walter Brown, European director of American relief administration.

SELLS HOME AND BUSINESS HERE

Charles E. Coons, who came to Ballinger from the Breckenridge oil fields about two years ago, and engaged in the shoe repairing and harness business, has sold his interest here and will prospect in other fields. Mr. Coons has sold his home to J. D. Carsey, of Dublin, Texas, and his shoe repairing business to Smith, Humble & Son. Mr. Coons is off to Alpine and other western points on a prospecting tour, and will return to get his family when he finds a location.

BANDITS RAID HARVEST HANDS

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 6.—Bandits who are making a business of riding freight trains in the wheat belt of Kansas and parts of Oklahoma, robbing harvest hands of their wages, are becoming more bold and several murders have been reported the last few days. Reports received here today stated that the authorities have become aroused over the boldness of the bandits and posse are being formed to run down the bandits. In several instances the bandits have held up crowds of harvest hands and robbed them of their money.

SPUR—Jordan R. McNeill, a student at the University of Illinois and a native of Spur, has been presented with a trophy cup for the cadet making the best record at the Reserve Officers' Training camp at Fort Sheridan, near Chicago, it was announced today.

MEXICO MOVES TO RENEW TERMS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—A determination on at least a part of the Mexican congress to institute a new endeavor to render acceptable to foreign interests Article 27, dealing with oil, is regarded here today as indicative of a desire on the part of Mexico to find a basis upon which diplomatic relations with the United States might be restored.

FORT WORTH—Ground has been broken for the building at Lake Worth, near Fort Worth, of the newly organized Ron and Gun club. A three story building will be erected, with a dining room, kitchen, roof garden and dancing pavilion.

Seven boats will be launched soon. A fleet of fishing boats will be kept and racing sculls will be placed on the lake. The grounds will have tennis courts and a golf course.

ODESSA—What is believed to be the first woman's auxiliary to a commercial club, in Texas is functioning in Odessa. The auxiliary which co-operates with the commercial club in the promotion of Odessa activities, was formed several weeks ago and is composed of a large number of representative women.

A plant, known as devil's bur, is causing trouble to motorist of California and Arizona. The plant produces spiny seeds which puncture the tires and are then carried on and planted many miles from the parent vine. It is a native of Southern Europe and is thought to have been introduced through burrs in the fleece of sheep imported to this country.

As a means of checking up on speeders, a device has been invented by a Los Angeles man which consists of an attachment secured to the front of the car, which is supplied with three white light shows, when continue white light shows, which continue until the rate passes the limit of the city ordinance, when a green light comes on, showing that the country rate is being used. A red light indicates the next rate of speed.

Old engine No. 999, once the holder of the world's speed record, has been restored in the New York Central shops and was run to Chicago, where it will be placed on exhibition with the old De Witt Clinton.

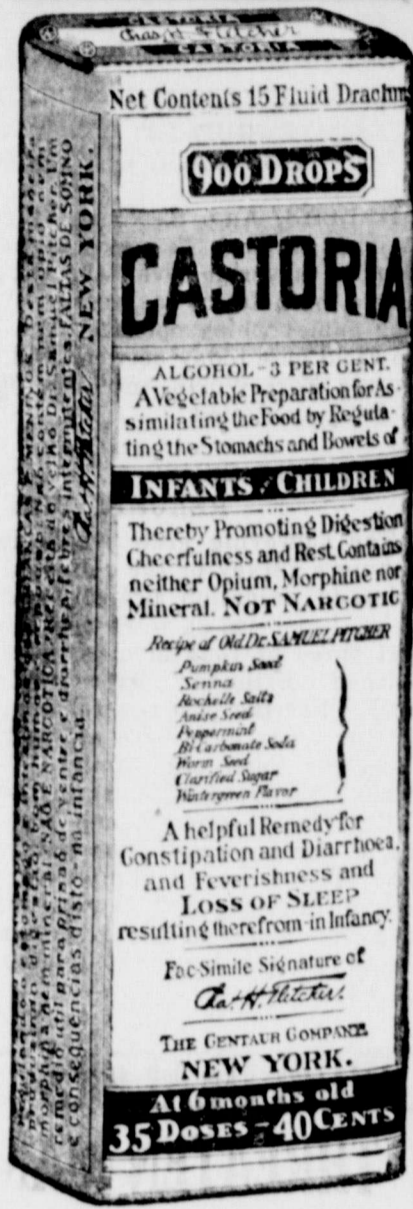

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
