## PREPARING FOR DISARMAMENT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—Because of the opposition of Senator Lodge, one of the delegates to the disarmament conference, Senator Harrison, Democrat, of Mississippi, today withdrew his amendment directing the American delegation to demand open sessions. Mr. Harrison said that he would bring up the question in another resolution and that he hoped Mr. Lodge would support it.

Senator Harrison said "in opposing my amendment I suppose Senator Lodge merely expressed the views of President Harding, and I do not desire to embarrass him at this time." Frequent references were made to Woodrow Wilson's post-war conferences in Europe during the discussion.

## AGREE ON SCHOOL BILL REDUCTION

AUSTIN, Aug. 23.—At a meeting of the free conference committee last night approximately \$75,000 for each of the next two years was cut from the educational appropriation bill, it was learned from one of the members today. This amount was sliced off by cutting the appropriations of the various departments in the state educational institutions, such as publicity, and other non-teaching branches of the work of the institutions. The meeting and its action was supposed to have been kept secret until the bill was brought up for consideration, but it leaked out.

The reductions made as no vote stated were agreed to after the members of the "people's club," favoring the reduction, had informed the conference committee that the report would be accepted by the people's club, if these departments were abolished.

## TRYING TO STOP LAND PURCHASES

AUSTIN, Aug. 23.—A bill proposing to stop the purchase of additional lands for the state university of Texas was introduced in the House today by Representative King. He claims that by stopping such purchases now that \$700,000 of the \$1,300,000 appropriated for that purpose will be saved and that sufficient land has already been purchased for the proposed expansion of the university.

A bill was introduced in the Senate today cutting \$250,000 from the appropriation for the American Legion hospital at Kerrville, and making \$750,000 available the first year and \$500,000 available the second year.

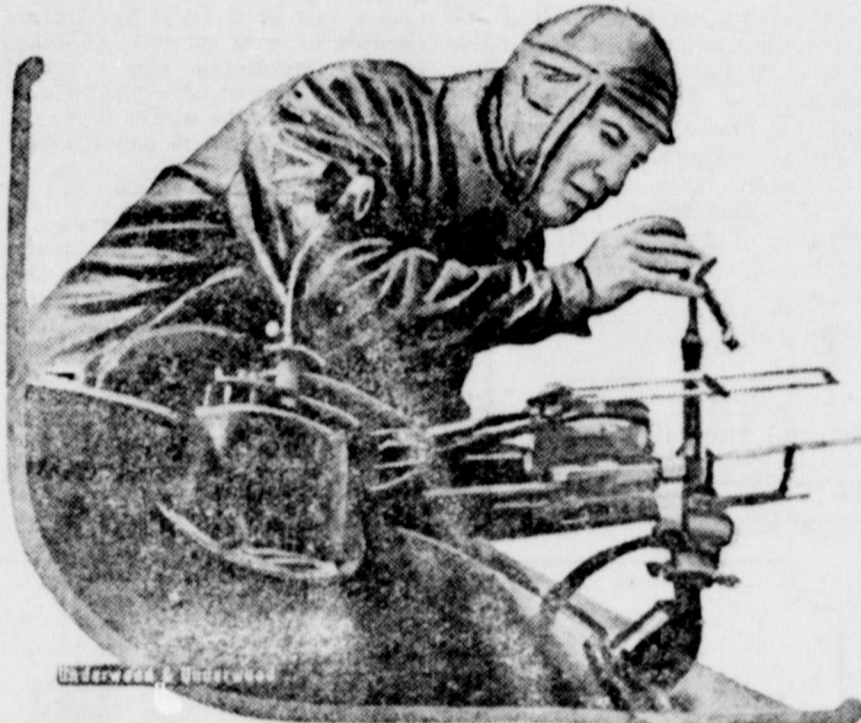
## U. S. WILL NOT PERMIT FIGHTING IN PANAMA

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—The American state department, in a note forwarded to Panama yesterday, stated emphatically that the United States would not permit any hostilities, resulting from the occupation of the Coto region by the Costa Ricans.

## SUSTAINS BAD CUT FROM GLASS WINDOW

W. F. Weathersby, of the Hub store, had the misfortune to sustain a painful and near serious cut on the left arm Monday while repairing a window at his home. In falling the glass struck Mr. Weathersby's arm just above the wrist and cut a deep gash, one of the leaders being slightly cut. It required several stitches to dress the wound, and the arm will be out of commission for several days.

## BIG DIRIGIBLE ON TRIAL TRIP

HOWDEN, Aug. 23.—The dirigible ZR-2, purchased from Great Britain by the United States, commenced its trial trip this morning. British and American officers are in charge of the giant ship, which will start on its flight across the Atlantic as soon as practicable. Today's flight is expected to be the final test.

The commander of the ground port telephoned the order, "cast off," and then came the responding sputter of the ship's six powerful motors when the silvery gas bags glided upward into a clear morning sky. The officers in charge intended maneuvering the ship over the North Sea where she could show her ability in combatting wind, and then returning Southward to Pulham where it is expected to tie up to mooring mast at ten o'clock tonight.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 23.—Clara Smith Hamon, who was acquitted in Ardmore, Okla., when tried for the murder of Jake L. Hamon, was married here late yesterday to John W. Gorman, a motion picture director. After obtaining license to marry, the couple drove to the residence of the Rev. Howard Fagan, pastor of the Wilshire Boulevard Christian church, who performed the ceremony. Mr. Gorman announced he and his wife would make their home here. Mrs. Gorman has been engaged since last April in making a film under his direction.

LONDON, Aug. 23.—The efforts of the employed workers in Russia to help the famine sufferers is greatly hindered because they themselves are weakened through a lack of proper food, say dispatches received here from Moscow.

The famine is paralyzing the strong and weak alike, the message says, and many men for whom employment is available are too feeble to work for a lack of proper nourishment.

The operations of the fleet on the Volga river, the chief means of transporting food to the famine areas, are being carried on with the greatest difficulty because of the crews of the ship being half starved and not able to do manual labor.

AN ORDINANCE

Amending Section 13 of an ordinance passed on the first day of June, 1915, regulating the operation of vehicles upon the public streets and alleys of this City of Ballinger, and declaring an emergency.

Be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Ballinger, Texas:

That Section 13 of the Traffic Ordinance of the City of Ballinger, which was passed and approved on the first day of June, 1915, and is of record in Book 2, pages 699-700-701 and 702, be amended so that same shall read as follows:

Sec. 1. That automobiles or other motor driven vehicles, and all horse drawn vehicles, used, operated or driven upon or across any of the public streets, alleys, or driveways of the City of Ballinger, shall be turned only at an intersection of one street with another street, and shall make such turn only by passing around the right hand side of the center of the intersection of such streets, and within the area of such intersection.

Sec. 2. That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any motor driven or horse drawn vehicle, in emerging from an alley onto a public street, to drive across such street before turning, but such vehicle shall be turned and driven to the right immediately upon emerging from such alley.

Sec. 3. That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any motor driven vehicle to approach or drive into any garage building in the City of Ballinger, from the opposite side of the street from that which said building may be situated, or by crossing the center of any such street, but in approaching or entering any such garage building, such motor driven vehicle shall proceed along said street on its right hand side, upon the same side of the street on which such garage is located, and shall enter

such garage by making a right hand turn and not otherwise.

Provided that Section 3 of this ordinance shall apply to all public garages, filling stations, or other supply houses in said city.

Sec. 4. Any person or persons, officer, agent or employee of any corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed One Hundred Dollars.

Provided that this ordinance shall not apply to ridden bicycles, horses or other saddle animals.

All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, are hereby expressly repealed.

Owing to the great increase of motor driven vehicles in daily operation upon the public streets of the City of Ballinger, and the resultant danger to life and property, there is a necessity for the immediate passage of this ordinance, therefore, an emergency is declared dispensing with more than one reading of this ordinance, and this ordinance shall be placed on first reading and final passage and shall become effective from and after its passage, approval and publication.

Passed and approved this 13th day of August, 1921.

Increase in Elk Herd.

A good increase from the survivors of the southern Yellowstone or Jackson Hole elk herd is looked for this year by officials of the bureau of biological survey of the United States Department of Agriculture, in view of the unusually favorable winter just past. Last year's rains, it is said, produced a plentiful growth of feed on the ranges, and as a result the elk are reported to be in excellent condition, with the prospect of only a normal death rate instead of a repetition of the mortality of the winter of 1919-20, due to lack of forage and a severe winter.

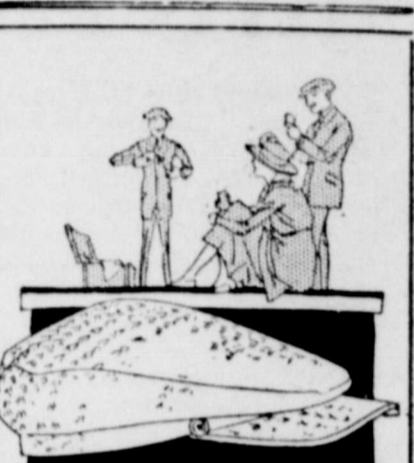

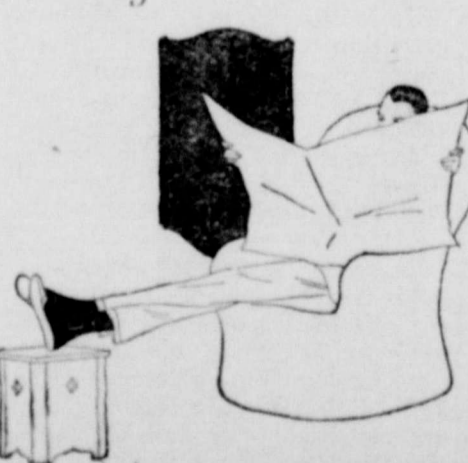

**COURT DOCKET NOT A BAD ONE**

District court convenes in Ballinger Monday, and a glimpse at the docket reveals that there are only seven criminal cases on the docket. All of these except the Boland murder case are of minor nature. There are quite a number of complaints filed against parties who are out under bond to await the action of the grand jury, and it is possible that the grand jury will turn in some business for the coming term.

The case of the State of Texas vs. J. H. Boland, charged with the murder of Charley Allen, is docketed for trial during the second week, and will be called Monday, September 7th. Allen was a prominent young farmer, born and raised in the county, was popular, and many people are interested in the case. Boland was a tenant on the Allen farm. A special venire has been summoned for this case.

The civil docket contains a total of fifty-seven cases, thirty-five of which have been filed since the last term of court four months ago. District Clerk Miss Georgia Singletary reports that this is a greater number of civil cases than were filed for the preceding six months.

There are ten divorce cases on the civil docket, six of which have been filed since the last term, four old cases having been passed over at the April term.

The grand jury will convene Monday at one-thirty and grind during the first week of court. Unless the investigators dig up something unusual the session will probably be a short one. The coming term is the first session

of court held under the new law which gives the county three terms each year instead of two.
