ORPHAN BAND CONCERT PLEASES AUDIENCE

The Carnegie Library was packed with people and many standing in the hall last night to hear the Methodist Orphan Band from Waco. The large crowd cheered from time to time, repeatedly bringing back the band or the little folks who entertained so well.

The band was composed of boys and girls, probably more girls than boys, about twenty-five members making up the band. They are all the way down the line in their teens, and displayed wonderful training and musical talent. The concert numbers by the band were splendid, the program being varied, beginning with sacred music. The members of the band were dressed in white uniforms, and conducted themselves becoming young ladies and gentlemen.

Two little tots—girls, were the stars, and brought the house down in applause with their singing and readings. The entire program was good and enjoyed by those who were present.

Prof. Barnett, accompanied by his wife, are with the children on the trip, as well as Prof. Parker, the band director. Mr. Barnett acted as master of cere-

monies, and in a brief talk took his hearers on a trip to the orphans' home at Waco. He painted a word picture of the home, grounds and buildings and told of the wonderful way in which more than 250 children were being raised.

To defray the expense of the trip a free will offering was made, and many dollars, halves, quarters and smaller coins, and perhaps larger pieces of money were contributed. Mr. Barnett stated that the band was not out raising money for the home, and the principal object was to bring the children into the homes of the people that they might know them and learn something of the great work the orphans' homes of the state are doing in raising dependent children. "It's the greatest investment any man can make—putting his money into orphans' homes," said Mr. Barnett, and the band played "Good Night Ladies."

GOOD MARKET CAUSE FARMERS TURN LOOSE

After dropping about twenty points below the high level Friday, the cotton market came back Saturday and local buyers were paying from 15.00 to 15.50 for the fleecy staple. Cotton Weigher Boothe stated that a statement in Friday's Ledger to the effect that only a small per cent of the cotton was selling, was erroneous. Mr. Boothe states that at least 80 per cent of the cotton is being sold as fast as it is gathered. The receipts are climbing faster than perhaps ever before for August in this county, due to the early crop and dry weather.

LOTS OF DUST AND LOCAL SHOWERS FALL

Ballinger received a dusting late Friday afternoon, followed by a light shower. Reports received here state that showers fell North and Northeast of Ballinger, Tuscola getting about a half inch, and showers falling in two other strips between Ballinger and Abilene. The country from Crews South towards Talpa received the best showers, but not hardly sufficient to put down dust, and of no benefit to vegetation.

MADISON, W. Va., Aug. 27.—A train of six coaches sent here to carry back to Charleston the advance party of Marnet miners who abandoned their journey to Mingo county yesterday, arrived this morning. The men scrambled aboard the train immediately and indicated a willingness to give up the march started to Mingo county to protest against the declaring of martial law in the coal fields by the governor. 5,000 people from the mine fields were in the march and it is believed the others will be turned back by the district officials of the United Mine Workers.

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—Communists of New York plan to enter the first political campaign this fall with a municipal ticket under the name of the Workers League of Greater New York. Candidates were selected at a convention attended by several hundred radicals last night.

Benjamin Gitlow, a recently convicted criminal and anarchist, was nominated for mayor by his mother.

WHARTON, Tex., Aug. 27.—The fall meeting of the board of the Texas Women's Press Association will be held in Austin probably in October. Mrs. F. M. B. Hughes, president of the organization, announced today.

GERMANY EAGER TO DO BUSINESS

BERLIN, Aug. 27.—American and German business firms will resume peace time business relations immediately, and without waiting for ratification of the treaty, it was said in well informed industrial circles in Berlin today. The establishment of credit loans and preparations for shipping into American markets the surplus products of Germany, such as newspaper, will immediately occupy the attention of industrial leaders.

WEALTHY MAN IS HELD FOR FRAUD

CANTON, Ohio, Aug. 27.—Zebulon W. Davis, a wealthy Canton and Cleveland manufacturer, was arrested here today charged with using the United States mail to defraud the public. When arraigned before the United States commissioner, Davis waived reading of the affidavit for his arrest, and was released on \$25,000 bond for appearance in the federal court at Chicago.

IMPORTANT MEETING Y. M. B. L. BOARD

A regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Young Men's Business League will be held Monday night, August 29th. The directors suspended new activities during the quiet summer period, and are now anxious and ready to start on the program of fall activities. Many matters of importance to the organization, both with reference to administration and policy, will come before the meeting.

It is rumored that the directors are considering a "Pep and Optimism" membership banquet for the early part of September that will eclipse anything of the kind ever held in the city.

FORMAL INQUIRY ZR-2 DISASTER

HOWDEN, England, Aug. 27.—A formal investigation of the ZR-2 disaster began here today with Sir Hugh Montague Trenchard, British air marshal, in charge of the inquiry. A number of British and American officers testified this morning at the first session. The work of lifting the wreck of the hull of the airship continued today.

HULL, Eng., Aug. 27.—A message expressing the sympathy of the municipality and the people of Hull to the citizens of the United States and relatives of Americans who lost their lives in the ZR-2 disaster, was sent to Ambassador Harvey by T. B. Atkinson, Lord Mayor of Hull.

ORGANIZE POLITICAL CAMPAIGN

ATLANTIC CITY, Aug. 27.—Plans for a nation wide campaign to elect members of the House of Representatives who are favorable to labor, are being made at today's session of the executive council of the American Federation of Labor.

The council is planning to form a permanent non-partisan political campaign organization to function in all local, state and national elections. The council today is considering the establishing of a chain of daily newspapers to carry on their campaign and organize for producing motion pictures to be used in the interest of the A. F. L. in political campaigns.

NO PARDON FOR DEBBS IN SIGHT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—No decision regarding a pardon for Eugene V. Debs, or a general amnesty for prisoners who were convicted under the war time laws, will be reached by President Harding until the peace treaty with Germany is ratified. It was stated at the White House today. Debs' friends have been active in their attempt to secure his release.

ORDERS SEIZED SHIPS RETURNED

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—Federal Judge Manton, today ordered the receivers of the United States Mail Steamship Co. to return immediately to the shipping board the nine chartered steamships seized by the board on the ground of non-payment of rental, and restored to the company by temporary injunction.

TAX BILL TO GET RIGHT OF WAY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—The Senate finance committee decided today to put the tax bill ahead of the tariff bill. Consideration of the revenue measure will begin Thursday, by which time the hearings on the tariff bill already scheduled will have been completed.

STORM BLOWS TWO CHILDREN FROM WAGON

DENTON, Tex., Aug. 27.—Two children of a party of campers were blown from a wagon against a barbed wire fence and seriously injured and property damage estimated at \$10,000, was caused by a storm in the Navo community Northeast of Denton late yesterday afternoon, according to word received here early this morning.

USING TAR AND FEATHERS FREELY

BEAUMONT, Aug. 27.—J. W. Borden, electrician, was taken from the office of the Silsbee Bee at 8:30 last night by two car loads of masked men and carried to the country, where he was tarred, feathered and whipped. Later he was brought back to town and freed on the streets, according to messages received from the sheriff of Hardin county.

BEAUMONT, Aug. 27.—Rev. Caleb A. Ridley, supreme chaplain of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, has accepted an invitation to deliver a sermon at the Baptist church here Sunday night. He is in Silsbee today, but will come here tomorrow, according to the pastor of the local church.

NATIVES RIOTING IN
SOUTHERN INDIA
MADRAS, India, Aug. 27.—The Malabar district of British India, was proclaimed a military area today. The move resulted from activities of the leaders of the native nationalistic movement at Bombay. Looting by riotous natives in Southern India continues, according to messages received from Calcutta.

FEDERAL AGENTS GET MORE NOTES

CHICAGO, Aug. 27.—Another ten million dollars worth of notes was added today to the notes seized by the federal agents who are investigating the alleged swindling of a ring of swindlers headed by Charles French.

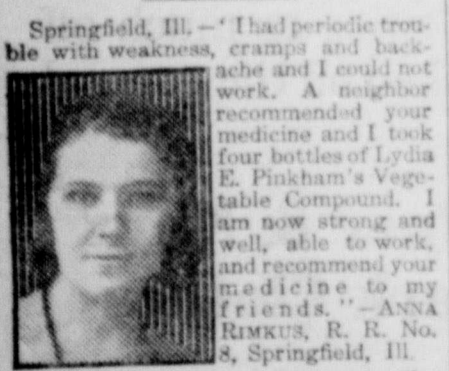
BALLINGER GIRL WEDS IN SAN ANGELO

SAN ANGELO HAS WATER TROUBLE

SAN ANGELO, Aug. 27.—That the city of San Angelo will vote bonds and install a municipal water system in competition to the system owned by the Interstate Electric Corporation, is the opinion expressed by leading citizens here today.

The problem of low water pressure in the city, insufficient in many sections even for domestic purposes, has caused the city commission to get busy. Appeals to the Interstate Corporation for relief have failed to get anywhere, and the citizens are ready to take drastic steps to bring about the desired results.

A citizens committee appointed three years ago, when San Angelo voted \$500,000 bonds for a water and light plant, has been called to meet with the city commission Monday, at which time steps will be taken looking to a solution of the problem.

The bonds voted three years ago were turned down by the attorney general, who held that the bonds should have been voted separately for water and light plants.

When the question of building a municipal light and water plant was up three years ago, the Interstate Corporation held out for \$750,000 for its water and light plant. The city refused to buy at that price. It is said now that the corporation is offering to sell its stock at 50 cents on the dollar.

It is expected that the city will demand that the Interstate Corporation make the necessary improvements to give relief at once, and if the foreign company fails to do this the city will get busy and build its own water and light plant, just as Ballinger has recently done.
