Lucky Scrap Jelly

Chop up pieces of candied fruit—you must have at least one-half cupful and you can use twice that amount if you like. If no candied fruit is around, use broken nut meats, or small bits of candy or raisins or dates stoned and finely cut.

Make 2 cupfuls of lemon or orange gelatine. Pour the gelatine into a mould and, when it is cool, begins to "set" add the diced candy. When serving time comes, turn the mould upside down over the serving dish. Wrap it tightly with a cloth wrung out of very hot water and the jelly will fall onto the dish.

A garnish of whipped cream or condensed milk, whipped, makes the dish prettier.—Child Life Magazine.

Two heavy shipwrecks and 13 monkeys were part of its cargo.
