GERMAN EXPLOSION DEATH LIST MAY REACH 1,500; MANY HURT

MAYOR TO STOP KU KLUX PARADE WILL TESTIFY IN WHITE MAN IS ARBUCKLE CASE NEGRO 10 YEARS

BARTLETT, Tex., Sept. 22.—Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, or any other body of masked men, will not parade the streets of this town tonight, according to Mayor Staunton Allen.

Notices were recently posted here stating that the klan would parade on the streets here tonight. When the notices were called to the attention of the mayor he issued a proclamation saying that should masked marchers appear on the streets they would be arrested and dealt with according to the laws of the city and the state. The outcome of the effort to prevent the klan from staging their parade here is being watched with interest.

Mayor Allen said, "It is against the laws of Texas for persons to appear on the streets disguised or masked and I intend to see that the law is enforced." The mayor added that the sheriffs from two counties and several deputies will be on hand tonight as will also the city marshal and other peace officers of Bartlett. He also stated that he would deputize other citizens and that they would be armed and prepared to enforce the law.

"I have notified the people proposing to stage the parade that it is against the law and can not be held," said the mayor.

GALVESTON DOCK HANDS ON STRIKE

GALVESTON, Sept. 22.—Longshoremen for the Mallory Steamship Co. line refused to go to work this morning when the shipping company declined to adopt the method proposed by the workers for checking the workmen. Other men were promptly employed to take their place and the docks were the scene of activity by ten o'clock and no trouble is anticipated.

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—The district attorney's office today announced that it had located Lowell Sherman, actor, and a friend of "Fatty" Arbuckle, and that Sherman had been served with a subpoena to appear for questioning in connection with the Arbuckle party.

Sherman gave the officers the dodge while en route to this city yesterday. Officers were waiting to serve him with a subpoena when the Twentieth Century Limited arrived, but the trainmen told them that the man left the train and got in an auto with a red haired woman before the train reached New York.

SHEARMAN CASE GOES TO JURY

MIDLAND, Tex., Sept. 22.—Arguments in the Shearman murder case started today and the case is expected to go to the jury late this afternoon. Both sides closed yesterday. The defense placed only four witnesses on the stand. These were used to contradict the testimony of the prosecution that the first shot was fired by the elder Shearman.

Testifying in his own behalf Shearman said the first shot was fired from behind him and knocked his hat from his head.

Shearman and two sons, John and Neil, are on trial for the murder of C. A. Wood, prohibition officer who was killed on the Shearman ranch near El Paso while running down prohibition violators.

LITTLE CHANGE IN COTTON MARKET

The cotton market was higher than yesterday during the day, but fluctuations throughout the day's trading held the market to about the same level of yesterday. Cotton sold on the local market from 19 to 19.50, and probably a few twenty cent sales.

DENISON, Tex., Sept. 22.—For more than ten years G. B. Hamilton, now under arrest charged with fraudulent use of the mails in connection with an alleged "lover lottery," lived among negroes in Denison and other Texas towns, according to the sheriff's office, where Hamilton made a confession after being arrested.

The alleged confession since his arrest revealed that Hamilton admitted that he was a white man, but had been posing as a negro.

The man is in jail at Sherman awaiting to be taken back to Oklahoma where he will be arraigned before a United States court on the charge of using the mails for fraudulent purposes.

MAYENCE, Germany, Sept. 22.—Already 2,500 persons have received treatment for injuries sustained in the explosion of the chemical plant here yesterday, and it is known that the injured will number more than that.

Up to noon today 850 dead bodies had been recovered from the ruins and rescue workers were continually bringing out others. This is the second time Oppau has been destroyed. The town was swept away by a flood in 1882 when the dam above the town broke.

MAYENCE, Germany, Sept. 22.—French troops and volunteer workers toiled throughout the night last night in the ruins of the Badische Aniline Company's war-born chemical plant at Oppau, where hundreds of workmen were killed in an explosion yesterday.

Estimates of the number of dead ranges as high as fifteen hundred early today, but definite figures are obviously impossible. More than three hundred bodies have been recovered, and it is known that at least fifteen hundred were injured in the awful explosion.

Oppau was virtually swept away by the blast, which hurled desolation over a wide district on the West bank of the Rhine between Mannheim and Frankenthal. The authorities have ordered an investigation of the explosion, but so far no cause has been assigned. Oppau is in the zone of occupation and the French troops are in charge of the situation, maintaining order under martial law.

KICKING FORD BREAKS BOY'S ARM

Altus, the little son of Mr. and Mrs. Lynn Stokes, sustained a broken arm Wednesday while trying to get a kicking Ford started. The boy was in the act of cranking the car, when the kick caught him just above the wrist, breaking the arm in two places. He is getting along as well as a one armed boy could be expected to do.

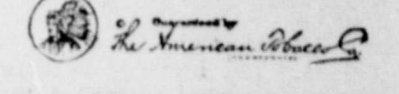

COTTON PALACE OF 1921 AWAITS OCTOBER 22 TO THROW OPEN SHOWS

Waco, Texas—It has been said for so many years past that a particular Texas Cotton Palace Exposition on a particular year would be bigger and greater in its scope than ever before, a statement which has always been borne out by the show itself, that this season with the growth of international recognition the Texas Cotton Palace has secured, words are hard to find which will prophesy the magnitude of the Exposition which for years has been recognized as the greatest in the South.

In 1920, at the request of the governor of Texas, the governors of the various states of the United States designated young ladies from their respective states to visit the Texas Cotton Palace Exposition as "Princesses" to King and Queen Cotton and to participate in the coronation ceremonies to King and Queen Cotton. This is a great feature of the exposition each year, and is held in a Coliseum on the Exposition grounds that seats 10,000 people.

Waco, Texas.—Three big football games and more in the planning herald the greatest card of the 1921 season at Waco this fall, when gridiron contests are staged on the Texas Cotton Palace Exposition field.

Dates of this year's Cotton Palace Exposition at Waco are October 22 to November 6, and the program for the great event is replete with intense interest for every one of the half million visitors who will attend.

The football program of the Exposition so far includes three major games.

Southwestern University of Georgetown will meet Baylor University of Waco on the Cotton Palace field October 22, the opening day of the Exposition.

On the following Saturday, October 29, Phillips University of Enid, Okla., one of the strongest aggregations of gridiron stars in that state, will meet Baylor University stars on the Exposition field.

The great annual tussle for the Texas championship between A. and M. of Texas and Baylor University will be played on the Exposition field on the final Saturday of the Exposition, November 5.
