## THERE SHOULD BE WORK FOR US ALL

### COUNTY GINS 17,000 BALES

Up to Saturday night 17,391 bales of cotton had been ginned in Rannels county, according to Oscar Pearson, who has just tabulated the totals. Mr. Pearson's original estimate on the crop was 25,000 bales, and he still holds to that estimate.

Following are the gin receipts by towns:

Ballinger, 2406  
Winters, 7216  
Rowena, 1929  
Miles, 1960

All other towns, 3880.

More than 17,000 bales of cotton had been ginned in Rannels county up to Saturday night, and it is estimated that about one-third of the crop is still in the fields. A conservative estimate on the crop now places the figures at from 23,000 to 25,000 bales. This is much better than ever the most optimistic expected, and with the price ranging around twenty cents, the county will wing up the year in good shape. If we can get the October rains grain drills will soon be running overtime, and with the early start for preparations for another crop, farmers should have no cause to complain.

### PAYS \$75 AN ACRE FOR ANOTHER FARM

Former County Commissioner, J. D. Smith, still has some faith in Rannels county dirt, and last week he purchased from W. F. Brigham, 240 acres known as the Byers' farm, six miles Northwest of Winters, paying \$75 per acre for the land. Mr. Brigham takes 130 acres of land situated on Valley Creek, in the deal.

### DEATH CLAIMS 9000 OLD VETS.

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 26.—The rattling of drum sticks, the squealing ancient rifles and the blare of the trumpet announced the entry of the Grand Army of the Republic into Indianapolis today for the fifty-fifth annual encampment. Many veterans answering to the roll call perhaps for the last time, are bowed with years, while others are preserved and move with military carriage as they marched behind the drum corps. Official reports show that since last year's encampment death has taken away nine thousand members of the organization.

### DENIES RIGHTS OF LABOR BOARD

CHICAGO, Sept. 26.—Representatives of the Pennsylvania railroad appeared before the United States Railway Labor Board this morning and presented a letter in which the railroad denied the right of the board to "enter the realm of management."

It was stated that in view of the fact that it was unable to discuss certain points, the board would not present oral argument. The board accepted the letter presented and sent copies of it to representatives of labor and announced that it would consider the contents.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—Members of the National Unemployment Conference, summoned by President Harding, assembled here today for the opening session of the conference. The president formally opened the meeting which the administration hopes will evolve means of putting the nation's involuntary idle back to work.

Addressing half a hundred industrial and economic labor leaders Mr. Harding described the present industrial depression as "a war inheritance throughout the world," for which, as applied to the United States he said, "would have little enthusiasm for any proposed relief which seeks either as a palliation or a tonic from the public treasury."

Mr. Harding expressed the belief that the results of the conference would be felt beyond the borders of the United States. "Fundamentally sound, financially strong, individually unimpaired, commercially consistent, politically unafraid, there ought to be work for everybody in the United States who chooses to work," said the president, and continuing he said, "our condition at home and our place in the world depends on everybody going to work; pursuing it with that patriotism and devotion which makes for fortune and a happy people."

The president told the delegates that they had not been invited to the conference to solve "the long controverted problems of our social system," and that Secretary Hoover would lay before them a program for discussion.

### LITTLE GAIN IN COTTON—SEED \$35

Cotton gained twelve or fourteen points over Saturday's market today, and Houston spots were quoted on the close at 20.75. Seed are selling here for \$35 per ton. It was a light day for receipts, the gins having worked up Saturday's picking, and the pickers began the week on empty wagons.

### NEFF PLEADS FOR LAW AND ORDER

EL PASO, Sept. 26.—The battle is on in Texas for law and order, honesty and economy, and one hundred per cent Americanism, Governor Neff declared in an address here today before the state convention of the American Legion.

The convention opened this morning with delegates from practically all of the three hundred and twenty-two posts in Texas present. Gov. Neff pledged the Legionnaires state aid in all of their worthy enterprises, inviting them to call on the state machinery whenever necessary to put over any proposition for the forward movement of the principles they fought for in the world war.

Warning the Legionnaires against partisan politics, Governor Neff urged them to take an active interest in every political question which touches the moral and material prosperity of the people. The governor reminded them that they should not permit private pursuits or any cause to neglect to do honor to the memory of the dead soldiers whose bodies are returned home for burial. He called attention of the Legionnaires to the state appropriation for the erection of a monument to the soldier dead, and also to the appropriation of \$500,000 for a sanitarium for the disabled.

### BOY SHOT AT FROM AMBUSH

Eugene Stuart, the seventeen year old son of Isham Stuart, a farmer living nine miles from Paint Rock, had a close call Saturday night when someone attempted to "hi-jack" him while he was en route home from Paint Rock, according to information brought to Ballinger Sunday.

Young Stuart carried a bale of cotton to Paint Rock Saturday afternoon, sold it, and pocketed the cash, or at least a part of it. The Presbyterian revival in Paint Rock is attracting considerable attention, and the young man decided that he would stay in town and attend church Saturday night.

He was en route home in his wagon, and was out about three miles from town when someone shot at him from the brush, firing at close range from the road side. The bullet, judged to be by the size of the hole made in the boy's clothing, from a thirty-eight calibre gun, passed thru the sleeve of his shirt, and thru his shirt collar, grazing his neck near a vital spot.


Young Stuart had a small shot gun in his wagon, and had purchased some shells for it while in town, and had the gun loaded. He grabbed the gun and fired in the direction from which his assailant shot. He saw the man run off thru the brush, while the boy decided that it was better for him to give his team a little more gas.

The would-be hi-jacker no doubt got a line up on Stuart while he was transacting his business in Paint Rock, and knowing that he had some money on his person watched him out of town and then attempted to assassinate him for the money, when his nerve failed him and he became frightened and ran off.


stating that hands were wanted there and farmers were paying \$1.00 per hundred for picking.




