PRES. HARDING AT MANEUVERS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—The president, accompanied by Mrs. Harding and a small party left Washington this morning for Fredericksburg, Virginia, where Mr. Harding will witness the fall maneuvers of the East Coast expeditionary forces of the Marine Corps, and will spend the night there on the battlefields of the Civil War in the "tent" White House.

JAPANESE ACCEPT AMERICAN VIEWS

TOKIO, Oct. 1.—The Japanese cabinet decided to accept the American suggestions on the agenda at the Washington conference on limitation of armaments and Far Eastern questions, according to the Asahi Shinbun.

PERSHING READY FOR CEREMONIES

PARIS, Oct. 1.—General John J. Pershing arrived from Coblenz this morning and went immediately to the Hotel Grillon where he spent the forenoon considering plans for tomorrow's ceremony at the grave of the "unknown soldier." The "composite" battalion, from all units of the American Expeditionary Forces on the Rhine, numbering about seven hundred officers and men, arrived shortly after noon.

KANSAS-OKLAHOMA OIL ADVANCES TWO BITS

TULSA, Okla., Oct. 1.—The Sinclair Oil Company today announced an advance of twenty-five cents per barrel on all Kansas and Oklahoma oil which formerly sold for one dollar per barrel.

LEGION DRIVE CLOSING SUNDAY

After having two teams in the field for seven days the membership drive of the local American Legion post will close Sunday afternoon at 2:30 at a meeting of the organization which will be held in the Y. M. B. L. offices. All new members turned in by the two teams and the winner of the contest will be announced.

The Legion has taken on new life and has a good program of activities planned for the fall and winter and with a membership more than doubled they will have something to work with. The losing team in the membership drive will give a supper Tuesday night for both teams and it was announced today that each one would bring a lady, which will make a total of about 70 plates.

Sunday afternoon work will also begin on the big "Hip Hurrah" minstrel show, which will be staged here on Armistice Day. It is likely that a big military parade will be given some time during the day and if the business men make it a holiday a Legion speaker will likely be brought here for the afternoon. The show promises already to be one of the biggest drawing cards ever presented in Ballinger and material is already at hand for the making of a real attraction.

A delegate from the state convention is just back from El Paso and will make his report at the banquet Tuesday night. S. L. Williams will leave the last of this month to attend the national convention which will be held at Kansas City.

FOOTBALL BOYS OFF TO ANGELO

About twenty of the local high school boys composing the football team left this morning for San Angelo to meet the Angelo high school team in the first football game of the year. Most of the boys on the local team are new this year and the outcome of the game is a gamble, but the boys left full of pep and declare that they will be home early with the first victory.

A good bunch of fans accompanied the team to see that the boys get a fair deal, all going over in the Laxson bus. CLEMENCY FOR BLACKS OPPOSED

HOUSTON, Oct. 1.—A telegram was despatched to President Harding today protesting the chief executive's clemency of sixty-one negro soldiers who participated in the Houston riot in 1917. The telegram was sent by County Judge Bryan.

H. A. Lisso and family were here from the Rowena country trading Friday. Mr. Lisso reported that the crop was pretty well out of the way and the farmers were getting anxious to have it rain.

TWYMAN PROBE NEARING END

GATESVILLE, Tex., Oct. 1.—The preliminary hearing of H. G. Twyman, military instructor of the state juvenile training school, charged with the murder of Dell Thamas, a 14 year old inmate, will probably be concluded today. No indication of the defense evidence has been offered.

LEGION ROOMS NOW COMPLETE

The Pat Williams Post of the American Legion is moving today into their new quarters over the City Cafe. The rooms were donated to them by Jim Freeman, owner of the new Acme Barber Shop, which is on the same floor as the Legion quarters.

A set of upholstered wicker furniture, rugs, chairs, pictures, reading table, game tables and writing table and stationery have been provided for the comfort and convenience of the Legionnaires. A Pathe phonograph has also been purchased. A supply of newspapers and periodicals is being ordered, and in the future the Legion members will have a comfortable place to loaf, play games and read. While the quarters are not large, the Legionnaires declare that this is only their first step toward the ownership of a large club building of their own.

The membership of the Legion will likely be increased to over 100 as a result of the membership drive which has been in progress during the week.

The first meeting of the Post in their new quarters will be held tomorrow at 2:30, and will be followed by a meeting of the committee appointed to make arrangements for the minstrel booked for Armistice Day.

UNION MINERS REFUSE TO WORK

PITTSBURGH, Kans., Oct. 1.—There is complete idleness in the Kansas coal mines today except small mines not operated by members of the Operators Association. The miners refused to work, it is stated, because Alexander Howat and August Dorchy, union leaders, were jailed in Columbus, Ohio, yesterday.

MINERS POSTPONE FIXING NEW WAGE AGREEMENT

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 1.—By an overwhelming vote the convention of the United Mine Workers of America today adopted President Lewis' recommendation to postpone until February the formulation of the demands of miners in negotiating new wage agreements to supplant the agreements with operators that will expire on March 31st.

CONFERENCE PROVIDES FUNDS FOR UNEMPLOYED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—Through recourse to "direct action" the national unemployment conference today had one victory to its credit in its campaign for the relief of the jobless. W. L. Burdick and other conference members provided funds on appeal from Urbain Ledoux and nineteen unemployed men left for North Dakota to work on farms.

MAKES RULING ON R. R. FUND

AUSTIN, Oct. 1.—\$25,000 which was appropriated by the Legislature for the rehabilitation of the Texas State Railroad, and not a penny of which has been used, must remain in the state treasury until disbursed by the Legislature, according to an opinion of the attorney general's department today. Comptroller Lon Smith asked for the ruling.

A board of managers took charge of the road and placed it on a paying basis without drawing on the special fund, and then leased the property to the Texas & New Orleans Railway Co.

LONGSHOREMEN STAGE STRIKE

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—Several thousand longshoremen checkers walked out today and protested the working terms of the agreement made recently by the trans-Atlantic Steamship Operators' Association and the International Longshoremen's Association.

The district council of the longshoremen's union announced that it did not authorize the strike.

ASYLUM INMATE HAS QUEER HOBBY

AUSTIN, Oct. 1.—An inmate of the North Texas Insane Asylum at Terrell, has a queer hobby, according to Dr. C. W. Castner, a physician in the institution who is here on business. The inmate thinks he is the governor of Texas and keeps a complete set of books. He keeps account of every bill passed by the legislature, vetoes some, approves other, and also blue pencils appropriations, issues pardons and proclamations and runs the state in general.

BALLINGER GIRL IN CALIFORNIA

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Oct. 1.—Miss Melva A. Walker, of Ballinger, stopped in Sacramento during her recent trip through California and visited a number of places of historical interest, including Sutter Fort, the first interior settlement by white men in California, and center of activities in the gold rush days of 1849.

EARTH QUAKE FELT IN NORTH

HARRISBURG, Ill., Oct. 1.—Two distinct shocks believed to have been caused by slight earthquakes, were felt here at three o'clock this morning. Houses were shaken, sleepers aroused and caused considerable alarm. There was no damage reported.

EVERYDAY SALADS.

A MOST acceptable salad may be made of a few leftovers if the combination is good. Many a good bit of food is thrown away for lack of knowing how to use it wisely.

Potato and Corn Salad.

Take a pint or less of cold boiled potatoes cut in half-inch cubes, add one cupful of green corn cooked on the cob, a bit of chopped green pepper if at hand, a little scraped onion to give it zest and enough well seasoned dressing to moisten, adding salt and pepper to season.

Hot Corn and Pepper Salad.

Take a pint of sweet corn (fresh) and just cut from the cob. Shred or mince one green pepper and cook in a little butter until well softened, add the green corn and more butter, stirring and mixing well over the fire. Season with salt, pepper and cayenne and serve piping hot. It is wise to double this recipe if the family is at all fond of corn for there is never a kernel left.

Crisp Lettuce With Peanuts.

Wash a bunch or two of tender head lettuce, drain and dry thoroughly, arrange on individual plates and sprinkle with fresh crisp peanuts that have been crushed by rolling with the rolling pin until like coarse crumbs. Serve with a French dressing passed at the table or with a good boiled dressing. Adding the dressing to the lettuce, if it stands any length of time, withers it and destroys its attractiveness.

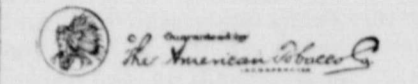

PROFESSIONAL RATING FOR FOOTBALL?

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Oct. 1.—Professional football is to be placed on a basis similar to that of organized baseball, according to plans of the American Professional Football Association. Headquarters of the organization are located here.

A comprehensive code of rules, including strict prohibitory clauses against the playing of men who are enrolled at any college or university, has been established, according to Joseph F. Carr, president, and more than 400 contracts have been signed by former university stars who will play on the nineteen teams which are members of the association.

Carr, who is a former official in several minor baseball leagues in Ohio and Pennsylvania, says that organization and administrative plans of the professional baseball leagues will be followed out as closely as possible.

Every player who participates in games played by association teams must be under a contract similar to that of major league baseball players, Carr says, and all contests will be carefully regulated and conducted only by officials sanctioned by the association.

Starting last week the teams in the organization began elimination contests on a schedule arranged among themselves, and after Thanksgiving, a series to establish the championship will be played.

The association is made up of teams in the following cities: Rochester, Buffalo and Tonawanda, N. Y.; New Haven, Conn.; Canton, Akron, Cleveland, Dayton, Columbus and Toledo, Ohio; Hammond and Evansville, Ind.; Detroit, Mich.; Chicago, Decatur and Rock Island, Ill.; Louisville, Ky.; Green Bay, Wis.; and Minneapolis, Minn.

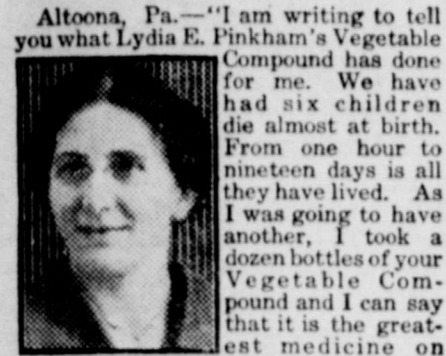

'PUTS AND CALLS' ARE ELIMINATED

CHICAGO, Oct. 1.—Board of Trade members watched the course of grain prices with unusual interest today because of the elimination of trading in "indemnities," also known as "privileges," "bids and offers," and "puts and calls."

Last spring while the Capper-Tincher law regulating grain exchanges, which goes into effect late in December imposing a prohibitive tax on this method of trading, was being framed the officers and directors of the Chicago Board of Trade recommended the indemnity trading be discontinued. The members of the Board of Trade a few weeks ago voted to eliminate indemnities Oct. 1.

"Indemnities" in substance are contracts which give to the buyers the privilege of demanding a specified quantity of grain at a named price within a certain time, or give him the privilege of delivering a specified quantity at a named price within a certain time. Hence the name "privileges."

The utility of indemnity trading, marketing experts of the Board of Trade say, lay in the insurance it provided for speculators against violent price swings in a stated period.

"Speculators," said a leading grain man today, "provide a market in which country elevator owners or farmers may protect themselves from loss by 'hedging.' Speculators are constantly on the alert to buy or sell as ordinary conditions of supply and demand indicate, but they in turn need a chance to 'hedge' against the unexpected, such as a sudden change in world political or economic conditions that would change price values."

There are firms and individuals which make a specialty of selling indemnities. The late Russell Sage was reputed to have made many of his millions by the sale of "stock privileges," and analogous process, on the New York Stock Exchange.

Years ago trading in puts and calls was eliminated at Chicago, but the trade was promptly transferred to the Milwaukee and Minneapolis markets, and as a consequence trading was later resumed here.

Many traders held the opinion

that the move would make speculators more conservative and thus reduce the volume of speculation. A reduction in volume, it was further theorized, would make for wider fluctuations in price, a situation not desired by farmers, who, for many years have sought to stabilize prices.
