NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—New York gloried today in exclusive baseball fued n ts own back yard. Easily 30,000 folks attended the battle between the Giants and Yankees in the un-ternicine quarrel for the baseball championship of the universe. The Yankees had things all their way from the first when Ruth's single brought in the first score. Douglass and Snyder started the game for the Giants, and Barnes relieved Douglass in the ninth. Mays and Schang handled the battery for the Yankees.

New York, Oct. 5.—New York awoke early today to enjoy the initial game of its own world's series. Hours before the two teams went to battle on Polo Grounds crowds of fans from the four corners of the earth were hurrying towards the park hoping to gain admittance to the mecca of the base ball world. In fact many fans didn't sleep at all last night—several fans had gathered at the entrance of Brush Stadium. It was a cold night for waiting, but the fans stuck to their posts like sentinels on duty. Some brought lunches and hot drinks in vacuum bottles and enjoyed their breakfast standing in line waiting for admittance. Towards daylight the line grew longer, and the crowd became a perfect jam long before the gates swung open.

All along the line of patient fans the Nationals found favors, while the Americans were claiming preference with many. Never in the history of base ball were two teams playing for the world's championship so evenly matched, both teams having closed the season in their respective leagues almost with the same percentage standing. The batting average of the two teams is only four points difference. The Yankees having hit for an average of .302 while the Giants hit .298.

FIRST DEATH FROM KU KLUX PARADE, LORENA

WACO, Oct. 5.—Louis Crow, one of the proprietors of the Crow Brothers Laundry, and a victim of the Lorena Ku Klux tragedy, died at nine thirty-five this morning from wounds sustained in the trouble between the klan and the officers in a parade at Lorena last Saturday night.

Bob Buchanan is doing nicely and recovery is now expected.

Ed Hoyard, a Waco policeman, who was shot in the abdomen, is not out of danger, but is doing fairly well.

Carl West and Julian Minier, two other wounded, are improving and are believed to be out of danger.

It was announced today that the grand jury would not be called until the result of the wounded men are known in all cases. Grand jury action, Judge Mon-

roe maintains, will be only temporary in the event subsequent death of any of the parties wounded takes place. In the mean time County Attorney Tiry is gathering testimony to be presented when the grand jury convenes. Tiry refused to give information concerning investigation pending action by the grand jury.

REFUSES TO BAR KU KLUX PARADE

WAXAHACHIE, Oct. 5.—E. F. Phillips, alderman and chairman of the police department of Waxahachie, resigned last night after the city council voted down a resolution designed to prevent Ku Klux Klan parades in this city. The council, however, instructed the city attorney to draw up an ordinance prohibiting parades of any nature without first getting permission of the mayor.

BIG BOOZE RAID IN TAYLOR CO.

ABILENE, Oct. 5.—What is said to be the largest moonshine still ever discovered in this section was found by Sheriff Bond and Deputies yesterday. The officers getting wind of moonshine activities went on a drive and located the still and made a big capture of equipment. Two men and two women were arrested and six hundred gallons of mash poured out, after the officers had confiscated a sufficient amount of the equipment and booze to use as evidence in the case.

RAILROAD MEN SEE DAM SITE

T. E. Brazelton, Industrial Agent of the Santa Fe Railroad, and Prof. Tinsley, Agricultural Agent of the road, were in Ballinger yesterday investigating the possibilities of the irrigation project with reference to assisting in financing the survey.

In company with Wm. L. Doose, Jr., Chairman of the Irrigation Committee of the Y. M. B. L., Roy Reeder and Secretary Williams, the visitors spent the entire afternoon in going over office maps of the project, in making a trip to the dam-site and to the camp of Chief Engineer Holder to inspect the mapping being done by the engineers. They were met at Bronte by Robert Knerim, Howard Williams and Homer Wilkins, who accompanied them on their rounds.

The gentlemen expressed themselves as being astounded at the magnitude of the proposition and the marvelous possibilities involved for this section when it is completed.

The average annual run-off of the River was higher than they had expected, the mean flow for the past five years being over 300,000 acre-feet; this including three of the driest years known to West Texas in three decades.

The figures given them on the size of the reservoir, its impounding capacity; the number of acres to be irrigated; and the size of the dam were also beyond their expectations.

It is expected that they will recommend to the Santa Fe railroad an appropriation to assist in financing the survey to completion.

WASTE WATER
Those who are skeptical about the rain fall being sufficient, or the watershed large enough, to fill the Colorado river reservoir after the big dam has been constructed; can get proof which will dispell their skepticism by taking a look at Lake Abilene. The engineer who made the survey for the new dam site and new lake at Abilene estimated that it would require five years or normal rain fall to fill the lake. Working on this estimate the dam builders came near losing their jobs before the dam was completed.

Not expecting the water to accumulate in the new lake so fast, no precautions were used to prevent a dam break, and only by hurry work in releasing the water saved the dam. The lake filled up in twenty-four hours, instead of requiring five years, as was estimated by the engineers.

Those who have stood on the banks of the Colorado and watched the flood waters pouring down that stream at a mad race for hours and days at a time during the rainy season, are not capable of measuring the water, or

even making a guess of how big a pool could be created by stopping the flood waters for one day.

The engineers who have given the project careful study, and who have spent months in making surveys are not troubled about the amount of water the Colorado river watersheds would supply. They know the supply would be sufficient to make thousands of acres of fertile land in Runnels county blossom like a rose almost every month in the year.

The problem which the engineers are trying to help the irrigation promoters solve is confined to ways and means of harnessing the flood waters, and making them do something besides helping to feed the Gulf.

It is not going to take an unusual amount of co-operation to put the proposition over, and it seems more apparent every day that the knockers are going to have a good thing thrust upon them.



SAYS BUSINESS JUSTIFIES TRAIN
The Santa Fe has not announced any changes in its schedule and no action has been taken in the matter of cancelling the night train in and out of Ballinger and cutting the service down to one train each way every twenty-four hours. The officials of the Santa Fe announced two or three months ago that the train was being operated at a heavy loss and that they would cancel same, which caused a protest here and at other points west of Coleman. It is probable that the Santa Fe deemed it wise not to push the matter until after the fall business. Parties who have been keeping tabs on the business of this train declare that the haul is heavy. According to reports most two hundred passengers were handled on the train between Brownwood and San Angelo Saturday night, and Monday night more than one hundred were handled between the two points. It will work a hardship on Ballinger to cut this train and leave Ballinger on a one train a day line.

RABBIT RACES PLANNED AS UNIQUE FEATURE FOR COTTON PALACE THIS YEAR

Waco, Texas—Ever see a rabbit race? Pronounced the world over as the greatest sport ever invented by the brain of man.

And the Texas Cotton Palace, to be held at Waco from October 22 until November 6 boasts this year of a series of rabbit races, the like of which has never been exhibited at any exposition of the great South-west.

Three hundred grey hounds have already been entered for the races from every section of Texas and representing some of the best known kennels in the United States. Eight days of racing have been scheduled to take place in front of the Cotton Palace grand stand, on what is pronounced the smoothest dirt track of the South. In addition a race will be staged in front of the grand stand every night of the sixteen days Exposition, the track glaringly illuminated by arc lights hanging from every compass point of the run-around.

Within the past week Oklahoma dogs have been entered in the contests, promises some keen interstate racing. From five to ten dogs will be entered in each race, and with at least 300 of the brutes, long of limb and keen of sight, arriving for the tests, the rabbit racing feature of the Texas Cotton Palace should this year prove the premier expository feature of the big Waco event.

MEXICAN VILLAGE FEATURE COTTON PALACE THIS YEAR

Waco, Texas—The name of the Texas Cotton Palace and Waco touches hearstrings of friendship in official Mexico.

It is no wonder then that the Mexican government, anxious to demonstrate the wealth and culture of that great land at the Texas Cotton Palace this season would cooperate in the construction of a Mexican village on Cotton Palace grounds so that the half million and more visitors who pilgrimage to the Texas exposition this season will be able to see a bit of Old Mexico amid the exhibits which portray Texas.

Dates of the 1921 Texas Cotton Palace are October 22 to November 6.

The Mexican Village will be located in Floral Hall at the Cotton Palace. There will be the typical adobe and straw huts, so peculiar to the original Mexican villages. Mexicans, coming direct from villages of the old country will occupy sections of the Cotton Palace Mexican village. They will serve Mexican dishes to the visitors. They will bring in their supplies on burros and the oxen will be hitched to the big yoke plows, as used in the fields of that realm.

How to Succeed—How to Get Ahead—How to Make Good

NEED FOR NURSES
THERE are not enough trained nurses to meet the demand. On the other hand nurses are saying that they cannot make both ends meet unless their pay is increased. Many women who might take up the work are deterred because of this fact.

To meet this, the alumni societies of the training schools are combining with a view to settle on a proper advance. The new rate of pay would be \$6 a day for 12-hour periods, and \$20 a week for contagious cases.

Nurses are going to be asked for by communities to do public work. District visiting and prenatal care at the expense of the community, where circumstances demand, will be put into the hands of trained nurses. It will be worth doing, and sure to appeal to certain types of women who like nursing, but who do not care for private or hospital work.

A girl who wants to study for this profession should select her hospital with care. She will have to expect to do hard and disagreeable work. But in a number of institutions the eight-hour schedule is being adhered to, more salary is being paid, and other matters that have given rise to discontent are being improved.

A trained nurse is one of the most important members of the community. There is now a great need for more of her. Most hospitals accept only college-bred women, and no women without the equivalent of a high school training will be accepted. If you who read this feel a call for nursing, get the address of a good hospital, write to the matron of nurses there, and follow her directions. You cannot enter upon a finer walk of life.

THE ROMANCE OF WORDS

"COUNTY."

WHEN a Saxon king created an earl, it was the natural thing that he should be endowed with a certain section of land over which he held jurisdiction, therefore a "shire" of ground was assigned to him to govern—a custom to which the English "shire" is directly traceable. But, at the time of the Norman conquest, the Saxon earls were replaced by Norman counts, titles borrowed from the later Roman empire and originally meaning "companion," one who had the honor of being closest to his leader. The "shires" or "shires" therefore became "counties" or lands governed by the counts.

In that singular fortune of words which causes some to disappear, even under circumstances most favorable to their life, while others hold their own when everything seems to oppose them, the title "count" has vanished from the roster of British nobility and "earl" has recovered its place, though the wife of an earl is still known as a "countess," thus proving the essential identity of the two words. In England the "shire" and the "county" still survive, while county is the accepted American term and shire, remains only in names, like New Hampshire, have been imported bodily from across the Atlantic.

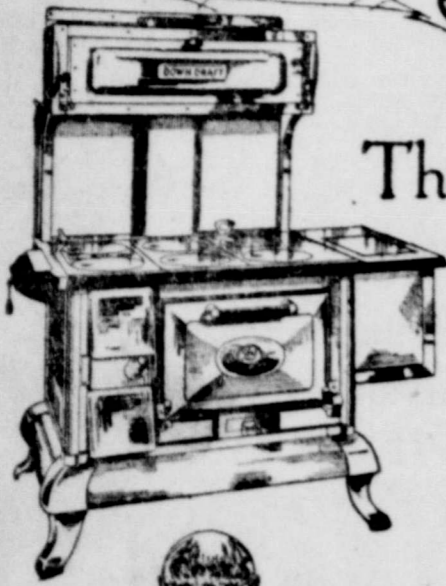

BORLAND GOES TO PENITENTIARY

At the eleventh hour J. H. Boland waived right of appeal and left with other prisoners Tuesday afternoon for the state prison at Huntsville. Sheriff Flynn received notice to deliver all prisoners ready for the pen to the transfer agent at Brownwood Tuesday night, and when this became known Boland made ready to go.

Boland was convicted here at the last term of court for the murder of Charlie Allen. He was given a ten year sentence, and when denied a new hearing he gave notice of appeal and Judge Woodward fixed his bond at \$7,500 which the man had been unable to make.

Rather than remain in jail perhaps a year while his case was pending in the higher courts, and then take chances of having to go to the pen, he decided to accept the verdict of the court, and he was conveyed to Brownwood, together with three other prisoners Tuesday afternoon, where Sheriff Flynn turned the four over to the transfer agent. Thus Runnels county increases her representation in the penitentiary by four.

Boland will serve one hundred months, if he serves out his term, ten months constituting a year in the prison, and in so doing he is paying the price for the murder of Charlie Allen, and suffering the punishment inflicted by a jury for firing the shot which robbed his wife and little children of his support and protection as well as robbed the home of the man he killed of a husband and father.

In less than one year from the time Boland killed the man upon whose land he was living, he will find himself in the state prison. Boland was a tenant on the Allen farm and shot Allen as the result of trouble over gathering a cotton crop. He pleaded self defense, and attempted to prove that Allen had threatened his life, but after hearing the evidence in the case the jury inflicted the light punishment of only ten years.
