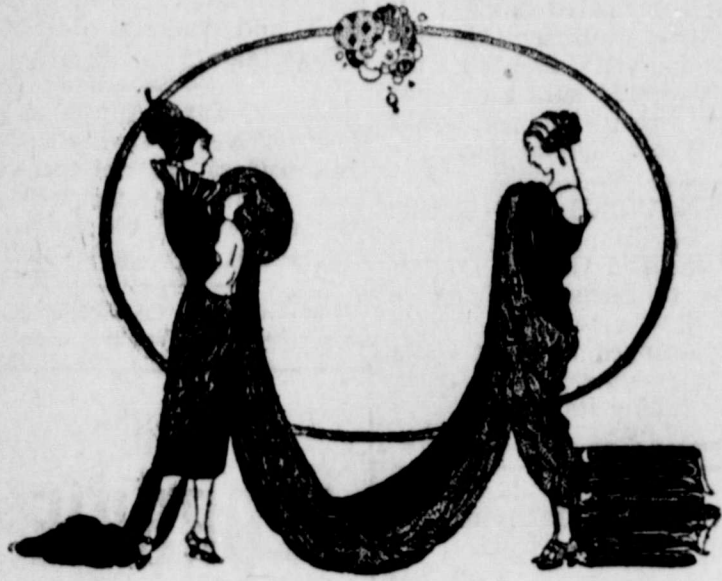

INCREASE TAX FOR ALCOHOL

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—A tax of \$4.00 per gallon on all alcoholic spirits, and with a bond for industrial, medicinal and other purposes, was agreed upon by Republican leaders as a part of the tax revision program. This increase of \$1.80 per gallon is expected to yield \$75,000,000 additional revenue this year.

CISCO, Tex.—The name of the postoffice at Leera, Texas, has been changed to Ray Lee, according to announcement of the post-office department. No reason for the change was given.

WICHITA FALLS, Tex.—Several Mexicans who were returned to their native homes at the expense of the Mexican government last spring are returning to Wichita Falls, according to Jimmy Gonzales, Mexican attaché of the police department.

SHERIFF REFUSES TO LET MOB 'VISIT' DALLAS JAIL

DALLAS, Oct. 7.—A large crowd of men came here from Fort Worth in automobiles early today and announced that their purpose was to lynch David Bunn, a negro held in connection with the robbing of members of a house party at Lake Worth last Tuesday night. However the mob disbanded shortly after arrival here.

The fifty occupants in twelve automobiles that arrived here after looking over the big eight story jail building approached the main entrance. Here they

were met by Sheriff Hartson and Police Captain John Ryan.

"We want the black," one member of the mob shouted. "Boys it's no use to try this and you had better go home," the sheriff said. The spokesman for the mob asked permission to send a committee through the jail as they did at Ft. Worth last night. "Nothing doin'. Not a single one of you can enter this building," Hartson replied.

There was considerable whispering among the crowd, which soon began to break up in smaller groups.

HATTON SUMMERS CONFERS HERE

Congressman Hatton W. Summers stopped in Ballinger Thursday afternoon while en route to his home at Dallas, after a tour thru the Western part of the state for the purpose of conferring with the farmers, stockmen, and business men in order that he might learn at first hand conditions as they prevailed and get suggestions for his work as a member of the committee on agriculture.

Mr. Summers was accompanied by Clint Williams, assistant secretary of the Texas Cattle Raisers' Association, and the two gentlemen were traveling in an auto and maintaining a schedule for their own convenience.

While in Ballinger an informal conference was held at the office of the Young Men's Business League in which a number of citizens—business men and farmers, heard Mr. Summers briefly review the agricultural and livestock conditions in the South and West. He stated that these industries were suffering for a lack of markets, and on account of economic conditions.

Mr. Summers is serving his fifth term in Congress, representing the Dallas district. He has visited towns along the T. & P. as far as Monahan, and returned by Ft. Stockton, San Angelo, and from Ballinger he will stop at towns along the Santa Fe and Frisco back to Dallas, and will go back to Washington to take up his duties on the agricultural committee of the House and furnish the committee with information which he hopes will be of much benefit in solving the problems confronting the stockmen and farmers at this time.

"It is a tragedy," said Mr. Summers in discussing the conditions on the cattle range today. He stated that pioneer cattlemen who had devoted their lives to the business and who had been feeding the world almost for a lifetime, were being pushed to the wall in their old days on account of marketing conditions. He said that many stockmen were being forced to dump their cattle on a low market, or carry them over on high priced feed, and either route amounted to bankruptcy for them.

The world is short on cattle, and this is the time when calves and stock cattle should be conserved for rehabilitating the livestock industry of the world. Some plan for financing the stockmen should be adopted, he said, and unless the industry is given aid West Texas will suffer a heavy loss.

Quite a number of citizens met with Congressman Summers here, and it was agreed that the livestock industry was in much worse condition than the general farming industry today. Where anything like a fair crop was raised this year the farmers are in good shape, but the cattlemen throughout the country are up against it. While cattle are cheap today, and stockmen are without funds to go through the winter, Congressman Summers stated that the shortage of cattle sooner or later, will affect the entire country, and it will not be a matter of high cost of living, but a problem to get beef at any price.

Mr. Summers promised to render all the aid possible as a member of the commission appointed by congress to investigate conditions among the producers and to recommend legislation necessary to provide life for them.

POLO GROUNDS, New York, Oct. 7.—The Giants emerged from their batting slump today and batted three Yankee pitchers hard and submerged the American League leaders 13 to 5, in the third game of the series.

38,000 fans saw the McGraw gang rain base hits all over the field in the seventh inning and when the dust had cleared away they had scored eight runs. The Yanks took the lead by scoring 4 runs in the third inning, but Shawkey was unable to hold the Giants and they tied the score in their half of the same inning. No more scoring was done until the seventh when the Giants went on a batting rampage. Both teams scored in the eighth.

POLO GROUNDS, New York, Oct. 7.—The Yankees backed the staggering Giants against the fence today in the backyard quarrel of the world's baseball championship. The Nationals staked their all today on the big Tennessee mountaineer, Fred Toney, to stop the American League champs in their mad rush.

Shawkey and Schang started for the Yankees, and Toney and Snyder for the Giants. The Yankees took first half of each inning this afternoon, the Giants wearing the home uniforms.

Railway Officials Inspect Proposed Site for Dam

J. R. Raymond, and J. S. Purdy, Division Freight Agent of the Santa Fe, were in Ballinger Thursday in conference with officials of the Colorado Valley Irrigation Association securing maps and added information to complete the report which is to be made to the "higher ups" of the road on the irrigation project.

These gentlemen state that the irrigation scheme has been brought to their attention frequently thru the liberal newspaper publicity which it has received, and that it has been their intention for some time to investigate fully its possibilities. The present investigations are

the direct result of a meeting of the irrigation committee of the Young Men's Business League, attended by C. A. Doese, R. A. Nicholson, and A. K. Doss, at which meeting was suggested the possibility of getting the Santa Fe to assist with the survey in a financial way.

All of the Santa Fe representatives who have looked into the proposition are enthusiastic over it, and express themselves as being surprised at the character and amount of work which has been done. It is entirely possible that Ballinger and Rronte will be connected with a rail line when the project is completed.

HOUSTON, Oct. 7.—Lieut.-Gov. Lynch Davidson today issued a statement which suggested the calling of a special session of the legislature to enact legislation to prevent parades being held by the Ku Klux Klan in Texas.

In his statement Mr. Davidson said, "Every state officer of Texas should throw his influence in the balance for the government by duly elected authorities and not by secretly organized clans or gangs, who tar and feather women and drag helpless men from their homes and firesides."

In his statement Mr. Davidson said, "No doubt the Ku Klux Klan following in the Civil War was the salvation of the South. My kith and kin, including my father, played a strong hand in its affairs. The present day Ku Klux Klan may have done some good things and cured some evils, none of which, however, could not have been reached by constituted authority. Southern hearts are warming their memories of the original organization and this has caused many citizens of this land to join the ranks of the present organization. What little good it may have accomplished at the outset has been offset many dozen times by acts of violence and lawlessness, emanating either from the Klan itself or from men or sets of men operating under the cloak of the Klan. The source is immaterial as lawlessness and want of respect for the law are the results. Every good citizen of Texas who is a member of the Klan under impulse of its organization, now that it is seriously and solemnly striking at the very heart of this government and threatening to raze its foundations and create civil strife, should just as quickly face about and strike down what threatens to be a serpent in our midst."

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—An investigation of "each and every secret organization in the United States" was asked in a resolution introduced by Representative Upshaw, Democrat, of Georgia.

STATE FAIR OF TEXAS SEASON IS AT HAND

Outline of Big Show of Year For Texans Reveals Interesting Events.

The State Fair of Texas, with all its alluring round of entertainment and interest-gripping educational features, is upon us.

The great Fair of the year for Texans is ready to go. Its dates, October 8 to 23 are so near that it seems that just a few hours intervene between the time we'll take "the rattlers" for Dallas and make the rounds of the big show.

Reports from State Fair headquarters declare that the grounds are a beehive of activity with exhibitors and concession men from the four corners of the earth pouring in to arrange their offerings. Then, too, the agricultural and educational exhibitors are getting on the grounds, while the Mexican National Exhibit is practically in place.

From the general viewpoint of the visitor—or rather, prospective visitor, to the Fair—the 1921 exposition of October 8 to 23 offers a greater variety of entertainment and practical education than any of its predecessors. This comes of the natural expansion of the Fair from year to year, and from business conditions, the sudden revival of the past few weeks leading to many new demands for an opportunity to show commercial and educational exhibits, and amusements, to the million or more visitors of the Texas exposition.

On the educational side of the Fair the 1921 season will see many important factors at work. Chief among them will be the Mexican National Exhibit, a general showing of the wealth and resources of the Southern republic, and its progress in the agricultural and industrial field; the general agricultural exhibit by Texas counties and individuals; the implement, machinery and automobile shows rated the world over as the representative eye-its of their kind for the Southwest; the textile and fine arts exhibitions; the boys and girls educational encampments, which brings 1,000 boys and girls to study the educational features of the Fair; and the Inspiring Texas Centennial Pageant, which will formally open the Fair of October 8, with the historical renae which will bring 5,000 characters into play.

As an amusement center the 1921 Fair will be worthy of the great crowds who find occasion to patronize it, according to Mr. Stratton's view. The range of entertainment will be all the way from the prove-bial eight-legged calf to gridiron clashes between some of the major college teams of the South. Some of the major events will be: an unusually attractive musical revue in the Coliseum, running the entire Fair Season of October 8 to 23, a show which comes straight from a phenomenal success in Chicago; three days of automobile racing and one of motor cycle racing; four major college football games; a night scenic to be staged before the grandstand, known as "Montezuma" or "The Last Days of the Aztecs," being a historical presentation of the Spanish invasion of Mexico; a profusion of outdoor carnivals led by Wortham's shows; an outdoor circus before the grandstand which includes a wealth of variety; and several bands of international reputation, of which the great Estado Mayor Band of Mexico is the outstanding.



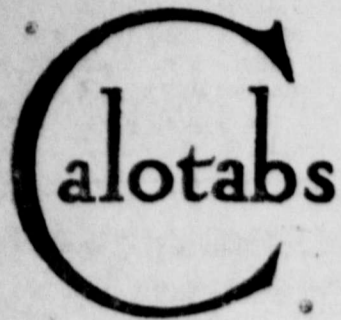
