LEGION POST CONDEMNS INSULT TO U. S. FLAG

HOUSTON, Oct. 8.—The local American Legion post last night adopted resolutions stating: "We do hereby individually and collectively condemn Rev. J. M. Kirwin, of LaPorte, Texas, for an insult rendered to the flag of our country personally and in the funeral ceremony of one of our comrades and condemn Rev. Kirwin for using the dead body of one of our comrades as an instrument for flying the organization to which he was opposed."

The resolutions represent a sequel to the funeral services some weeks ago of Lieut. Edmund L. Riesner, at which Father Kirwin stated that for the first time in his life he had passed the American flag at half mast that day without doffing his hat. He said he could not pay tribute to the organization which had erected the flag.

WORLD SERIES MAY LOOSE RUTH

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—George H. ("Babe") Ruth announced this morning that he would not play in the game this afternoon against the Giants on account of an abscess on his left arm. He carried his arm in a sling. The friends of the "homer" king expressed the opinion that his playing in any further game of this series was in doubt.

WINTERS MAN THIEF VICTIM

Sheriff Flynt was called to Winters Friday to arrest a suspected thief at that town, but when the officer arrived the thief had "blown," and Mr. Flynt was delayed until 10:30 last night before he located and got his man. The particulars in the case as related by Mr. Flynt to a Ledger reporter are as follows:

A man by name of Morris who is farming in the Winters country came into town and sold his cotton Friday and was spending the night in Winters, stopping at one of the wagon yards. Late in the afternoon he met a man named Pickens, who he had worked with on the Humphrey ranch during the summer. Pickens told Morris that he was "broke" and had no place to sleep and Morris took him to supper and then gave him a place to sleep in one of his wagons at the wagon yard. As stated by Morris, Pickens told him during some conversation after supper that he could make more money stealing cotton from the farmers than he could working if he only had someone with him, and Morris immediately told him that he did not make his money that way, and the two went to bed.

Upon awakening in the morning Morris found that someone had relieved him of \$25.00 in cash and also taken three checks, for \$119.88, \$10.80 and \$8.17. He then looked for his guest and found that he had left without even saying goodbye and immediately suspected him of taking the money. Sheriff Flynt was notified to come and he left at once.

The sheriff spent the day Friday looking for his man in the Southern part of Taylor county but failed to find him and last night returned to Winters and placed some men to watch a house he felt sure the man would return to, and at 10:30 last night he was notified that his man was there, and went over and made the arrest, bringing the alleged thief here and lodging him in the county jail. Mr. Flynt stated Saturday that he thought other arrests would be made, as he had some other men under surveillance that he was sure were implicated with Pickens.

Albert Sledge accompanied the football team to Coleman Saturday to assist in rooting for the local boys. A good sized crowd went with the team to Coleman and the lads will not be without support.

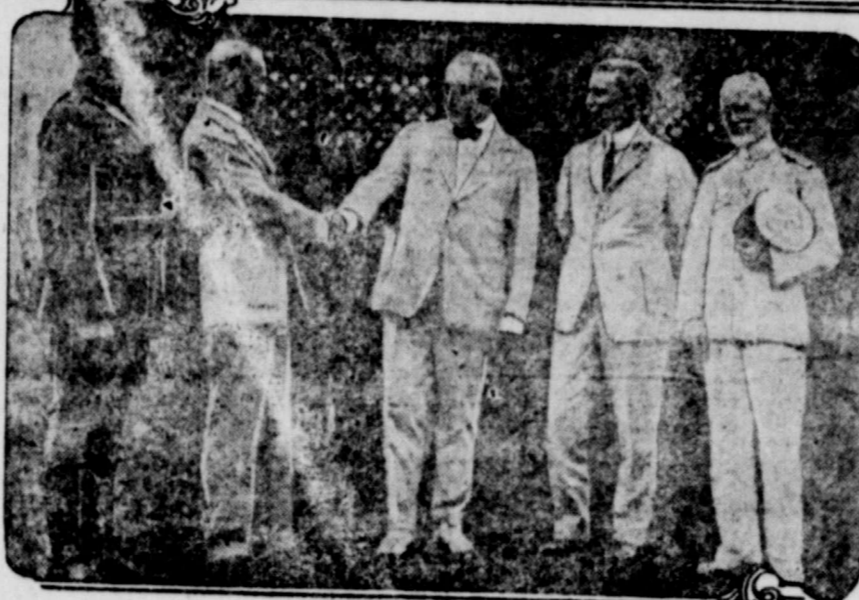
SCHOOL INQUIRY TAKES RECESS

SALVATION ARMY LEGION'S PARTY NAMES DELEGATE IS BIG SUCCESS

The local advisory board of the Salvation Army met Friday afternoon to hear a report from a Salvation Army representative, Envoys Chas. V. Mayfield, special efforts representative of the Southwestern Division, briefly told of some of the achievements of the organization during the past year. He stated that more than three hundred new posts had been established and the facilities for caring for orphans and dependent old people had been increased to include places for 700 who needed homes. It was brought out that one old person from the county had been given a home in the Kansas City home of the Army and the names of two others were furnished to the proper authorities and effort will be made to get them to accept homes in the institution.

Envoys Mayfield stated that the Salvation Army gave those who were able to do some work a place to work and paid them one dollar per day which made them feel that they were not altogether dependent on the Salvation Army for their support and had a great effect in making them better satisfied.

The annual meeting of the advisory boards of this district will be held at the new Texas Hotel in Fort Worth on Friday, Oct. 14th. T. S. Lankford and A. W. Sledge were elected as delegates from Ballinger, and W. C. McCarver and E. Sheppard were elected as alternates. The local board is composed of Paul Trimmer, R. T. Williams, Judge A. K. Doss, Judge O. L. Parish, R. G. Erwin, E. Sheppard, T. S. Lankford, W. C. McCarver, and A. W. Sledge.

Envoys Mayfield stated that the Salvation Army was ready and anxious to co-operate with the local advisory board in handling any case which needed the help of the army, and the local board is working under instructions to report any work here which the army should look after. An orphan's home, an old folks' home, a home for fallen girls, and other charitable work is looked after by the Salvation Army.

SEEK TO STANDARDIZE COTTON BY LOCALITIES

DALLAS, Oct. 8.—Standardization of cotton by localities is the remedy which J. T. Orr, of the Texas Farm Bureau suggested when asked what ought to be done about long staple cotton being ruined by gins run at too high speed.

"Ginners will be helped by this standardization," said Orr, "because the gin can be run at a uniform speed for all the cotton of the community."

OIL EXPLOSION KILLS THREE AT BEAUMONT

STATE FAIR IS OPENED TODAY

DALLAS, Oct. 8.—The thirty-fifth State Fair of Texas, expanded for the second successive year into an international exposition through the Canadian and Mexican exhibits, opened here at nine o'clock this morning, and is scheduled for a sixteen day program.

This year the agriculture and livestock exhibits are more extensive than ever and the amusement features are more elaborate than any preceding fair, according to the directors. The feature of the opening day was the dedication of the Dallas Stadium, which is said to be one of the largest athletic bowls in the entire South. Simultaneously with the dedication was the staging in the stadium the Texas Centennial Pageant. This is scheduled for eight o'clock tonight with more than 5,000 persons from all over Texas participating. Governors from thirty-four states and the governments of Canada and Mexico will be represented by "duchesses" in the pageant. The queen will be adorned by jewels, said by fair officials to be worth approximately \$500,000.

TWYMAN MAKES FIRST STATEMENT

GATESVILLE, Tex., Oct. 8.—H. G. Twyman, who is held here on the charge of murder in connection with the death of Dell Thames at the State Juvenile School, made his first public statement today, declaring:

"This is the first time I was ever charged with any kind of trouble." The statement sketches Twyman's career from the time of his birth at Petroleum, West Virginia, and says, "I am thankful for the words and deeds of kindness coming to me from those who have known me since I have been in Coryell county."

WHAT THE 'ELL DO WE CARE?"

PARIS, Oct. 8.—William B. Leeds Jr., son of Princess Anastasia and the late William B. Leeds, "the tin plate king" of Richmond, Indiana, and Princess Xenai, a niece of King Constantine of Greece, were married with civil ceremony here this afternoon.

LIGHT FROST IS REPORTED

The first cold wave of the year proved some worse than most observers supposed and today the government weather forecaster announced that the temperature dropped to 37 degrees Friday night. Hardly anyone thought there was any danger of the weather being cold enough to bring old man Jack Frost from his hiding place last night, and after a summer we have just finished it was quite a change to have the gentleman make his appearance. Frost was not heavy enough to kill last night, but will precipitate the falling of leaves from trees and give many extra work cleaning yards. Old timers and would-be weather prophets are saying that the winter will be just as severe on the other extreme as the summer we have just gone through, and with the coming of an early frost it looks as if we are going to get an early start.

BEAUMONT, Oct. 8.—Two men are dead and the third may die as the result of a disastrous "still flash" at the Magnolia Petroleum Co. refinery at four o'clock this morning.

Henry W. Davis, age 30, was killed instantly, his face being blown off. H. A. Clampitt died at a hospital from burns. W. R. Smith is reported in a critical condition. The accident is said to have been caused by pumping oil into a hot still.

DALLAS, Oct. 8.—The Magnolia Petroleum Company today announced an advance of twenty-five cents per barrel on crude oil, this price following other Texas crudes of Electra, Burnett, Henrietta, Moran, Ranger, Stephens county, Strawn and Thrall districts.

FARM BUREAU INSURANCE WILL PROTECT COTTON FARMERS IN FLOOD AREA

DALLAS, Oct. 8.—Owners of thousands of bales of cotton which were damaged by floods in Central and Southern Texas recently will be fully protected from loss through a blanket insurance policy which the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association has on all cotton in its pool.

The moment a member's cotton leaves the gin it automatically comes under the protection of the big policy covering all cotton owned by the association. Members of the association in Central and South Texas were not aware that they were protected to the extent of the full value of their cotton until several of them were notified by the Association to that effect. Flood damage to cotton in Central and South Texas amounted to thousands of dollars but the Texas Farm Bureau membership is fully protected.

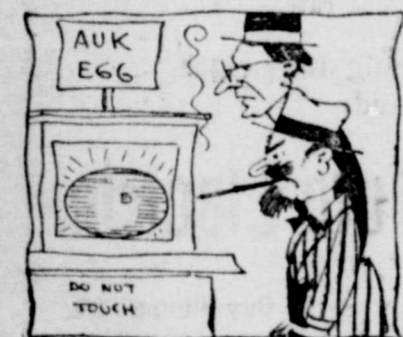

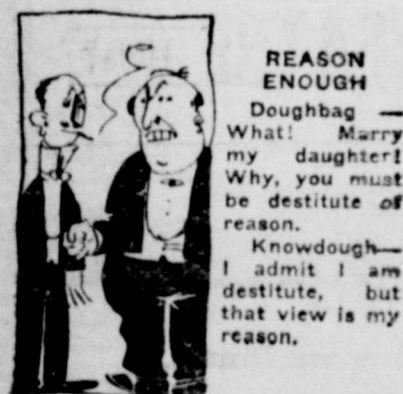

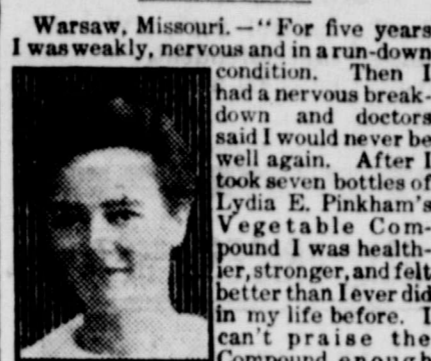
