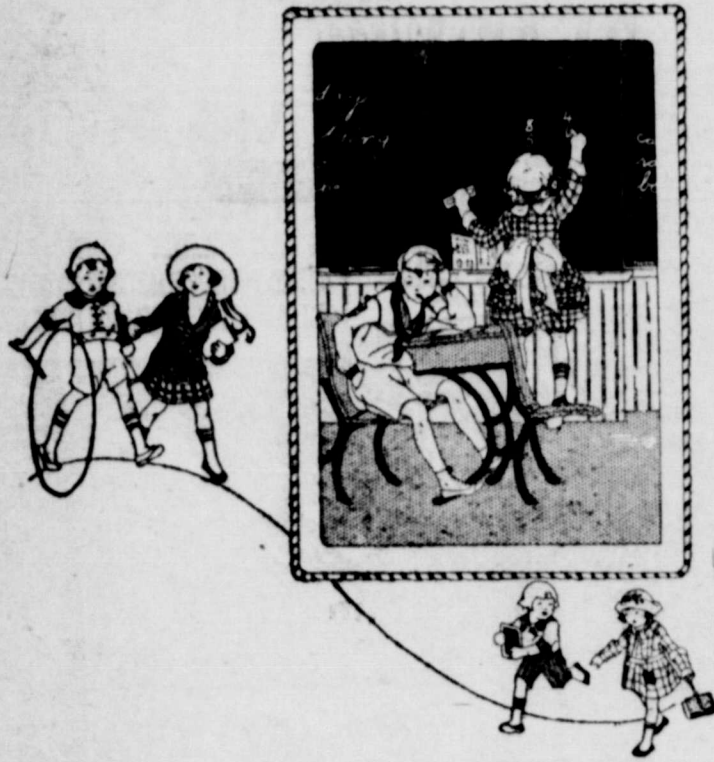

WACO GRAND JURY CALLED

WACO, Oct. 10.—Judge R. I. Monroe this morning called the grand jury to meet in special session next Wednesday at ten o'clock to take up the work of investigating the tragedy at Larena growing out of the attempt of Sheriff Buchanan to stop a Ku Klux Klan parade. Sheriff Buchanan, and the others who were wounded in the fight, are reported to be improving, and it is now thought that the death of Louis Crow, who was buried last Friday, will be the only fatality as a result of the trouble.

THREE DRY ONES ALL IN A ROW

The weather record kept at Ballinger for the last twenty-five years shows an average rainfall for July of 2.31 inches; August, 2.11 inches; and for September, 3.40 inches. These three months for this year are falling short. In fact not enough rain fell in the three months to count for much, and at the present pace October will fall short also. The twenty-five year average for October is 2.02 inches.

TEXTBOOK BOARD MAKES CONTRACT

AUSTIN, Oct. 10.—The State Text Book Commission met here today for the purpose of preparing bids and awarding contracts for certain books, where the contracts expire on Sept. 1, 1922. The board will also consider the renewing of the present contracts, if they deem it expedient to do so.

LOCALS WIN IN LAST QUARTER

Ballinger's defeat, 6 to 0, of Coleman High on Coleman's grounds last Saturday, furnished the most thrilling climax seen in a football game in this section in years.

With but one minute left to play and the ball on Ballinger's thirty yard line, the Coleman full-back started on a sweeping end run, that looked as if it would carry the ball over Ballinger's line. "Cap" McAllister made a long flying tackle, throwing the runner with such force that he lost the ball. Simpson caught it up and started on a zig-zag run thru the broken field. One man made an effort to run him down from the rear, but was soon out-distanced. Another tackler was squarely between Simpson and the goal, but a neat piece of side-stepping carried the runner out of danger and he galloped over the line for the only score of the game. Thirty second of play was left, and Coleman kicked off to Ballinger, who made one or two runs and the game was over.

The first half of the game was a see-saw affair, with Coleman having the advantage. Ballinger's defensive work in the first half was not up to standard, due to lack of scrimmage practice, and their tackling was weak, but between periods Coaches Pace and Williams read the "riot act" to them in loud and unmistakable tones, with the result that there was a decided improvement in this respect in the second half. Coleman at one time had the ball on Ballinger's eight yard line and four downs in which to push it over, but the "Cliff Dwellers" tightened up and held them finally on their four yard line, and then bucked and punted out of danger. Ballinger also had some difficulty in solving some of the Coleman plays, but during the second half, smeared the Coleman runners repeatedly for losses.

Ballinger attempted four forward passes, but failed to complete any of them. One pass was perfectly executed, but the end was over confident and dropped the ball. Coleman tried the aerial route only once, and unsuccessfully. Both teams resorted principally to line-bucks and short end runs. Very few penalties were assessed for violations of rules.

The local team made only one substitution during the game, Coleman replacing three of her players.

YANKS TAKE LEAD IN WORLD SERIES AGAIN

NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—The Yankees again swung to the forefront in the world's series today, defeating the Giants 3 to 1 and gaining the edge over the Giants, three games to two. The Giants out-hit the Yanks today, but the American Leaguers made their hits count for runs, while the McGraw crew could not bunch their hits effectively on Wait Hoyt save in the first inning when they scored their only run.

Hoyt pitched his second brilliant game of the series, holding the hard hitting Giants practically helpless when hits meant runs for them. Hoyt finished strong, fanning two batters in the ninth inning, with a runner on second base. The "Bambino's" efforts today were limited to an infield hit, and he fanned three times, but the home-run king's single paved the way for a winning run which he scored on Bob Meusel's long double.

NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—On even terms the Yankees and Giants met here today for the fifth game of the series for the world's baseball championship. Both teams are expected to try for the edge with the hurlers used in the second day's game, Waite Hoyt going to the mound for the Americans and Artie Nehf for the Nationals.

There has been a lot of talk about the Giants' "lost and found batting eyes," and now the Yankees are having their say. They assert that they will pound Nehf or any other pitcher that McGraw sends in against them.

"Babe" Ruth is recovering from a troublesome arm, and it was reported this morning that he would be in the game today, having had a three day's rest.

Cloudy misty weather prevailed this morning at seven o'clock with an official forecast of rain for this afternoon.

U. S. SOLDIERS GUARD OF HONOR

PARIS, Oct. 10.—American troops who were held here for a week to act as a guard of honor at Westminster Abbey, in London, when General Pershing was to lay a congressional medal of honor on the tombs of British "unknown" soldiers, have returned to Coblenz. Gen. Pershing will not go to London as planned, because of the failure of the British war office to fix a date for the ceremony. He will sail for the United States on October 20th.

NEGRO HOLD UP NETS \$67,000

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 10.—Two men this morning held up a negro messenger of the Grand Avenue Bank and escaped with a satchel containing \$17,650 in cash, and more than \$50,000 in non-negotiable paper.

The robbery was committed on a down town street car and the robbers escaped on a crowded street.

CUSHIONS USED ON UMPIRES

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 10.—The riotous ending of the fourth game between Baltimore and Louisville in the "Junior" world series here yesterday, was characterized today by William Kenbelkamp, president of the Louisville club, as a disgrace. President Hickey, of the American Association, held the same view, declaring that the conduct of the fans was disgraceful. The fans protested the umpire's decision in forfeiting the game to Baltimore. 3,500 of the 6,500 spectators swarmed on the field and pelted the umpires and police with cushions and jeered them when they announced a forfeit of the game to Baltimore.

AVEN FACES SECOND TRIAL

WACO, Tex., Oct. 10.—The trial of Mrs. Bessie Keyes and W. T. Aven for the murder of Leslie Keyes set for today, was postponed and reset for Oct. 31st on account of the inability of Sheriff Bob Buchanan to attend.

The sheriff is a material witness in the case, and the state asked for a postponement pending the recovery of Buchanan.

Aven was tried a few weeks ago for the murder of his wife and given a death sentence.

BOSTON COLLEGE TO PLAY BAYLOR

BOSTON, Oct. 10.—The Boston College football team had a stiff scrimmage today as a last workout before leaving for Dallas, for a game with Baylor University Saturday. Boston will present virtually her full strength against the Texans. The game will be one of the big features of the Saturday program at the Texas State Fair.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—Amendments to the tax bill proposing the repeal of all transportation taxes, including those on oil and pipe line and on parcel post packages, and a maximum surtax rate of fifty per cent and increased estate taxes, were approved today by a majority of the members of the Senate finance committee. The committee majority approved not only all recommendations agreed to last week by the Senate leaders, but adopted some on its own account. Chairman Penrose declared that changes insured a solid Republican support of the tax bill.

SID WILLIAMS ARRIVES TONIGHT

Evangelist Sid Williams and his helpers are due to arrive here tonight for the Baptist revival, and will preach the opening sermon Tuesday morning at ten thirty o'clock. The helpers consist of Mrs. Williams and Mrs. Helen Seaggins. Mrs. Seaggins will have charge of the music.

Dr. Swindell, pastor of the church, will preach tonight and further preliminaries will be worked out of the way and the meeting will be started under the direction of Evangelist Williams without delay after his arrival here.

For the present the meeting will be held in the auditorium of the Carnegie Library. If it develops that the library will not take care of the crowd other provisions will be made.

LARGE CROWD HERE FOR SATURDAY TRADING

Ballinger streets were crowded to the curbing Saturday, and while many were here only to be with the people and spend the day, loading, many were supplying and it was a good day for practically all lines of business in this city. Merchants who staged special sales were overrun, especially during the afternoon, and the first Norther caused somewhat of a rush for winter clothing. Many farmers have not sold their cotton, and of course are buying goods on a limited scale until they realize a better price for cotton and they are holding. With cotton sales holding up pretty well from cotton on hand, business will be good until the end of the year, notwithstanding the crop is shorter than usual.

DISTRICT COURT ON AT PAINT ROCK

District Judge Woodward and Attorney Early and several lawyers passed thru the city Monday en route to Paint Rock, where they go to attend district court which convened at that place at one-thirty. The term promises to be an interesting one, altho no new developments have been reported in cases pending. The Martin case is scheduled to be tried at this term. This is the case in which a man by the name of Martin is charged with the murder of his son. Martin has been in jail at San Angelo since the commission of the crime last fall, having been unable to make \$10,000 bond. The grand jury will investigate the killing of Tom Benge recently by Sheriff Bob Miller of Comcho county. At the time Benge was killed he was out under bond awaiting action of the grand jury on charge of having killed Miller's son-in-law, Will Bryant.

Several bootlegging cases are also pending, arrests having been made and the parties are under bond for appearance.

Judges Doss & Baugh are attorneys for Martin, and also for Miller, and these attorneys left Ballinger for Paint Rock Monday morning. Judge Q. L. Parish and County Attorney Shepherd also went over Monday afternoon to represent clients.

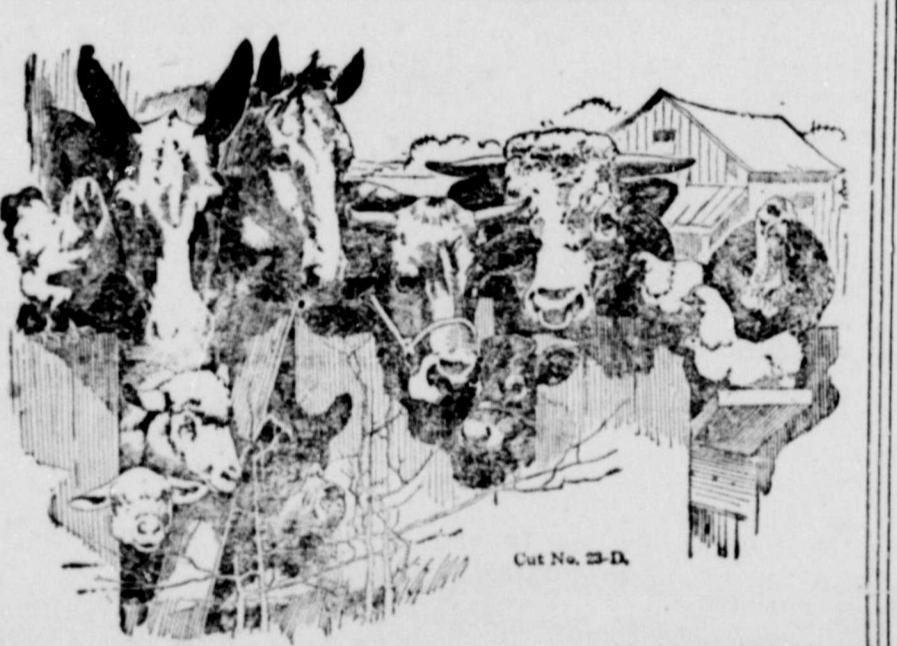
route which was recently established out of Talpa, taking in the country South of Crews, and will be known as Route No. 2.

"Yours respectfully, W. J. HORTON."

This same section of Arizona several years ago produced practically nothing, and lands were being at \$10.00 an acre. It is the best character of proof as to the beneficial effect of gravity irrigation, such as is proposed for Colorado Valley lands in Coke and Rannels counties.

"Before the irrigation system was built in Yuma county, Arizona, the taxable values of the county were \$5,000,000.00. The taxable values of the county are now \$95,000,000.00.

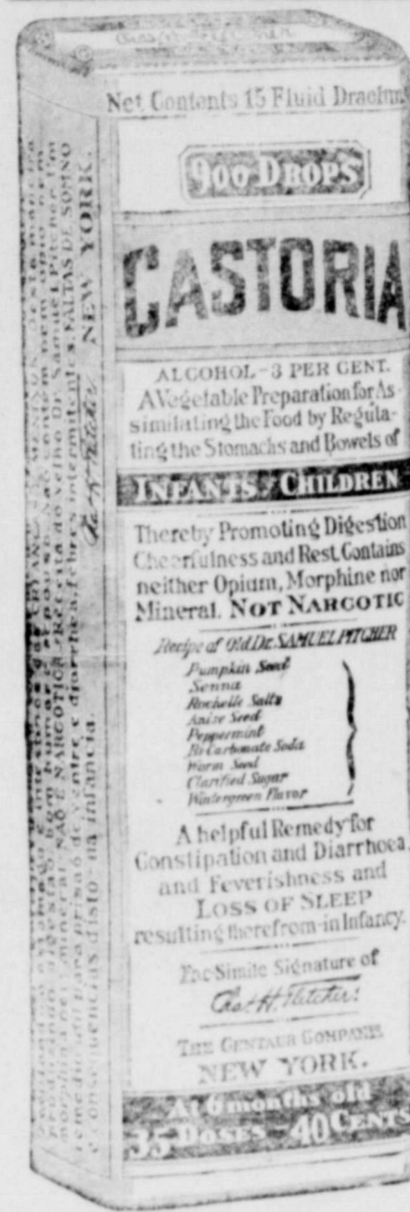
