Railroad Strike Seems Certain; Further Wage Reduction Cause

Paris Suffers Disasterous Fire for Second Time in Five Years

PARIS, Tex., Oct. 15.—Fire which raged for five hours in the business section here last night spread into two of the principal residential sections this morning. The fire was brought under control in the business section about three o'clock this morning, but was still burning in the residential district at that hour.

It was a night of terror for the citizens and a repetition on a smaller scale of the conflagration which occurred exactly six years ago.

All wire communication is badly interrupted by the fire and connection with the outside is intermittent. The fire fighting apparatus from Bonham and Honey Grove, Texas, and from Hugo, Oklahoma, were hurried here.

The blaze originated by some undetermined cause in the Rogers-Wade Furniture Company building, a five story structure in the heart of the city. Strangely enough last night marked the closing of the Lamar County Centennial Celebration and the concluding act was the "Burning of Paris," which was reproduced pyrotechnically.

The property loss is estimated at from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000. The fire was under control at four o'clock this afternoon. While there was much excitement during the night, no one was injured. The fire occurred on the fifth anniversary of the disastrous fire which wiped out a large section of the city. Reconstruction in the devastated area will start immediately it is

understood. At least ten residences were burned and other property damage was done in the residential part of the city.

FOOTBALL REPLACES BASEBALL IN SPORTS

DALLAS, Oct. 15.—Football had full sway today. With the world's series baseball over the sport lovers were attracted to the gridirons throughout the county. In Texas the first inter-sectional game of the South this season between Eastern and Southern schools will be that of Boston College and Baylor University. At Baton Rouge, Louisiana, Texas A. & M. will meet the Louisiana State University. Rice Institute and Tulane University renew their feud at Houston today. Each team has lost only one major game.

TICK INSPECTOR REPORTS MONDAY

In Friday's issue of The Ledger it was stated that the tick problem would be handled by the county officials. This was an error and County Judge Trimmer informed a reporter to this effect Saturday morning. On Oak creek is the only place in Rannels county where ticks have been discovered, and that entire infected district has been put under quarantine by Mr. Wilson, the district inspector, and he was authorized to send the county an inspector. Judge Trimmer said that he had received word that a Mr. McIntyre would be on the job Monday and would make his headquarters at Norton.

This inspector will carry on the work of dipping in the infected district until all the ticks are gone and the quarantine is lifted from Rannels county. It has not been determined just what kind of tick is bothering the cattle and it may be that it is not of the dangerous type which spread fever to stock.

BALLINGER 12; SANTA ANNA 0 A. & S. DONATES TO SURVEY FUND

The high school team from Santa Anna came to Ballinger Friday to meet the local boys on the football field in a contest, but after a few minutes of play the visitors' hopes were shattered as the Ballinger team seemed to be able to smash the Santa Anna line at will. The game was a line plunging game from the very start, and both teams resorted to that and long end runs for their gains. "Cap" McAllister was again a feature of the game and at several different times drew the crowd to their feet in running back punts thru a broken field. One time he returned the ball for a gain of thirty yards and another time for 20. His line plunging repeatedly made gains for the Ballinger team and his tackling was fierce. The two touchdowns of the game were made by Simpson and Dean. Both scores were made when Ballinger had Santa Anna off her own ten yard line and as they were attempting to kick the punts were blocked and recovered by Ballinger and each time the ball was carried on, over for a touchdown and failed to kick pass. The forward pass was tried several times and once worked perfectly when McAllister passed to Campbell and Campbell got loose for a thirty-yard gain. At one time a pass was worked perfectly and the end had a clear field for a touchdown but dropped the ball that was passed right into his arms.

In the last quarter Ballinger worked the ball on long end runs and line plunges to Santa Anna's one yard line and with one-half minute to play, put the ball over for a touch down, but an off-side play was called and Ballinger drew a five yard penalty. The game ended with the ball in Ballinger's possession on Santa Anna's one yard line.

The high school boys are showing wonderful improvement and are getting in the class to take on all comers. More men are needed and if enough would report to practice so that Coach Williams could have scrimmage practice every day the team would still further improve and in a week or two would look like a new team.

NIXON ENTERTAINS WITH BARBECUE

Quite a number of Ballinger people went out to the ranch of Green Nixon today to spend the day picking up pecans and to enjoy a barbecue that Mr. Nixon is giving on his place about 14 miles up the river. It is a custom of Mr. Nixon's to have his friends from all over the county come in two or three times a year and partake of an old time barbecue, and if you have never attended one of these affairs you should get on "his good side" and get that privilege for the barbecue is of that kind that make it famous and you will want to attend every one. Today all who attend will get to bring back a sack of pecans with them unless they eat so much that they are unable to pick them up.

Irrigation will mean much to the compress and gins of this section and some of them are realizing the fact and are putting up the money to get the proposition started.

CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—The railroad brotherhood chiefs, after a two weeks conference with the chairmen of the Association of Railway Executives committees, wound up their sessions today without issuing a call for a strike. There were no announcements made in conclusion.

CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—Sixteen railroad unions have taken a secret vote on a strike to authorize their officers to order the walk-out if deemed advisable. C. J. Manion, President of the order of Railroad Telegraphers, announced today. Although twelve of the sixteen will act independently the four big brotherhoods met in a joint meeting called for two o'clock this afternoon, at which time the brotherhoods were to submit the plan of action to other organizations.

One high union official announced that the date of the strike was set, but declined to reveal it. However October 30th is reported as the day.

B. H. S.-LEGION GAME OCT. 25

Friday, October 28th, has been decided upon as the tentative date for the football game between Ballinger High and the Pat Williams Post, American Legion.

The contest promises to be an interesting one, for the High School eleven is rapidly rounding into excellent form, and promises to give the Legionnaires a tough battle.

Many ex-college stars appear in the Legion line-up, but all of the members of the team are out of condition, and will have to fight hard to gain ground against their opponents. Work will start soon by the Legion team, as they want to get into the best condition possible for the game.

The proceeds of the game will be equally divided between the High School and the Legion. The school boys need the money, and the Legion is building up a fund for their new home, so everyone is asked to remember the date, and to turn out and give 50 cents and a 1000 cheers for the support of the team they are backing.

The brotherhoods also selected a list of ten roads on which the strike would be effective the first day the officials said.

It is understood that the strike will be ordered in additional units on ten roads every forty-eight hours or until the roads either give in or the walk-out becomes nation-wide.

All union leaders who had been hopeful of averting the strike and some who even opposed it, declared today that the action of the railroad executives yesterday in deciding on further wage reductions destroyed the last hope of peace. The sixteen unions involved have a membership of about two million men.

The president brought together three representatives of the public group and a full membership of the Interstate Commerce Commission in the meeting to consider the whole question of readjustment of railroad rates and wages.

After fifteen minutes the president left the conference and issued a statement declaring that the most part of the general effort would be in the readjustment of the railroad situation. The statement outlined that the president's belief was that the public group of the Railroad Labor Board and the I. C. C. could do the most good for the welfare of the public if they worked in cooperation.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—

Three representatives serving on the Railroad Labor Board were summoned to the White House today by President Harding, presumably to discuss means of averting the threatened strike of the railroad employes.

TRIBUNE WINS POINT IN SUIT

CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—Judge Harry Fisher sustained the demurrer of the Chicago Tribune in the ten million dollar libel suit brought by the city of Chicago against the paper. He declared that the city was without cause in the action and denied it the right to amend its petition.

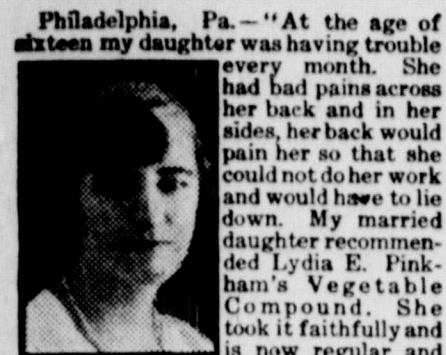

SOLDIER MONUMENT A THING OF BEAUTY

The monument at the grave of Sgt. Pat C. Williams has just been erected and is truly a work of art. Red Cross Gives \$310,000 to Aid 'Clean-Up' Drive

An appropriation of \$310,000 for Red Cross work in connection with the "clean-up" campaign instituted by the Government to bring the claims of all disabled service men who are entitled to Federal aid before the proper government bureau for action, has been made by the American Red Cross. The Executive Committee of the American Red Cross in making the appropriation authorized the appropriation of \$35,000 of this sum to the American Legion to defray the expense of the Legion representatives assigned to the various districts of the Veterans Bureau.

Young America Sends Vast Relief To Needy Abroad

Various relief projects of the Junior American Red Cross in European countries resulted in helping 237,000 destitute children during the last fiscal year, according to the annual report of the American Red Cross for that period. The growth of the activities of the Juniors abroad is manifested by a comparison which shows this figure is 200,000 larger than that of the previous fiscal year. The National Children's Fund raised by school children, members of the Junior American Red Cross, was drawn upon for \$429,557 for these projects. Receipts for the National Children's Fund during the last fiscal year totalled \$155,317.

FACTS OF HISTORIC INTEREST

Revealed by Extensive Excavation on Site of Revolutionary Camps on the Hudson Heights.

Three years of excavating on site of Revolutionary camps in the Hudson highlands, near West Point, has enabled a commission of the New York Historical society to establish interesting historical facts that have long been in dispute.

The chief source of information has been refuse heaps of the summer camps of Washington, and many facts have been learned merely from examining the buttons in the old dumps. Examination of cooking utensils and cutlery, broken pottery and other perishable articles has aided the commission. The buttons, still showing the insignia after a century and a half, show that ten Massachusetts regiments, five from Connecticut and one from Rhode Island, occupied the main fortress in the highlands. But tons worn in one camp by Connecticut soldiers bore an imprint in honor of the birth of the French dauphin, showing that the soldiers were in camp after 1781.

Similar investigation on the site of British camps show their troops lived in much more luxury than the men who won independence for America. Silver buckles, china, and much broken glass from rum containers tell the story of the invaders' rations. The Revolutionary troops used hand-forged forks, pewter spoons, and left no broken glass.

The excavations have also revealed the extent of certain fortifications and forts have been discovered of which there was no record.

THIS RIDE A REAL THRILLER

Ascent by Elevator to Summit of Alpine Peak Worth Going Long Journey to Take.

For years one of the most thrilling incidents of a visit to the Alps has been the ascent of the Jungfrau on the cog-rail road that starts from Kleine Scheidegg, at an elevation of 6,711 feet and climbs the mountain side at the startling grade of 25 per cent, or an angle of about 22 degrees, till it reaches Jungfraujoch, at an elevation of 11,339 feet.

In an illustrated article in Popular Mechanics Magazine it is told how it is now proposed to add to this wonderful experience in mountain climbing a still further thrill, by comparison with which the former will appear quite insipid. From the present end of the track the mountain soars another 2,306 feet to the summit at an elevation of 15,547 feet. By means of excavations and tunnels the track will be extended until it reaches a spot in the center of the conical summit directly below its highest point. From the end of this tunnel a shaft will be bored vertically to the summit itself, and in this shaft passenger elevators will be installed, so that Alpine mountaineers will end their long thrilling railroad climb with an elevator trip like an exaggerated ride to the top of the Woolworth building in New York city. The climax will find them landed at the extreme summit of one of the highest peaks in the Alps, with a view of a world of snow-clad, craggy mountain tops around them.

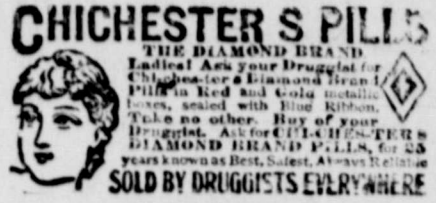

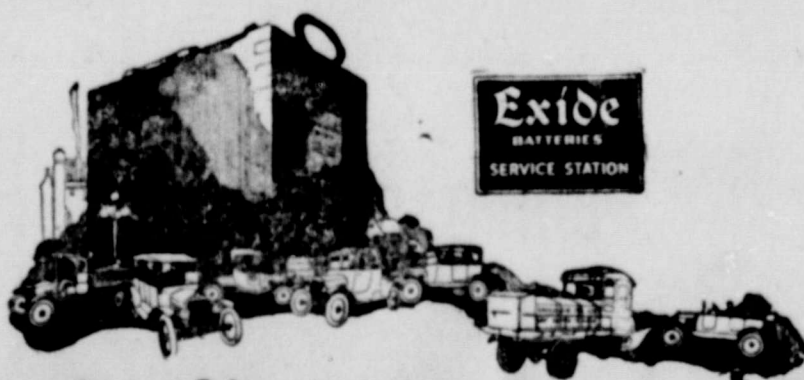
