## BROTHERHOODS STAND PAT; LABOR BOARD IS HOPFUL

### 400 School Teachers to Hold Institute in City

It is just one good thing after another for Ballinger. This time it will be four hundred school teachers spending a week in Ballinger just before Christmas. The Concho-Colorado Teachers' Institute convenes here on Dec. 19th and holds until December 23rd, inclusive, and about four hundred teachers will be enrolled in that institute.

The institute comprises seven counties, and under the law the teachers have to attend an institute five days during the year, and Ballinger will hold open house on this occasion. The institute met in San Angelo last year, and much was said about the royal reception Angelo gave the teachers. It is up to Ballinger to go there one better, and she will do it.

The county and city superintendents of the counties comprising the Concho-Colorado territory—seven counties, recently met at San Angelo and perfected plans for the Ballinger institute. Among those present at the committee meeting were: B. T. Withers, of Sterling City; R. W. Hardy, of Merton; J. K. Dozier and Horace Oliver, of Winters; C. O. Britt, of Sherwood; J. H. Armstrong, of San Angelo; John J. Bugg, of Ballinger; and R. Daveport, of Paint Rock.

The meeting was called to order by Supt. Bugg. Supt. Hardy was chosen as secretary. The following business was transacted:

Supt. Bugg was elected conductor of the institute, and Miss Ella Jameson, secretary, who were instructed to make a final draft of the program and have it printed.

Miss Nina B. Glass, of Waco, was selected to direct the section for primary teachers; and L. D. Borden, Chief Superintendent of Rural Schools, State Department of Education, was selected to direct the rural school section.

Dr. W. B. Bizzell, President of Texas A. & M. College, Dr. S. P. Brooks, President of Baylor University, were accepted as lecturers and efforts are being made to secure Judge Ben B. Lindsey of Denver, Colorado, for two lectures.

The enthusiasm shown by the superintendents indicate that this will be the most successful institute ever held in this section of the state.

Bringing four hundred teachers to Ballinger just before the holidays means much to this city in a social and financial way. The entertainment committee of the Y. M. B. L. will be called into

action at once to perfect plans for entertaining the teachers. It will be necessary for the homes of the city to arrange to take both boarders and roomers for a week, as the hotels of the city can not furnish accommodations for the large number who will be here.

The program for the occasion will offer some of the best platform lecturers ever brought here and the citizens will have the privilege of hearing these.

### SANTA FE CALLS FOR HANDS HERE

FORT WORTH, Oct. 24.—The Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe Railroad advertised in Fort Worth newspapers today for engineers, trainmen and yardmen, to take the place of strikers in the event the present employes walk out on October 30th.

The Ledger received an advertisement from the Santa Fe Monday morning, and the ad appears in this issue calling for train crews to man the Santa Fe trains in the event of a general strike. The action of the roads throughout the country indicates that they do not propose to meet the demands of the labor unions, and the strikers declare that nothing short of a satisfactory settlement will call off or postpone the nation-wide strike set for next Sunday.

### MORPHINE THIEVES GET DOPE HERE

Somebody in Ballinger is dopey on morphine today, or at least they can satisfy their appetite for the drug if they so desire. Dr. F. M. Hale reports that someone visited his office Sunday night and robbed him of two hundred morphine tablets, valued at about \$45.

Dr. Hale was at his office a time or two Sunday afternoon, and everything was in place, but when he visited his office Monday he found that he had been visited by a thief who wanted only the drug, and made a clean sweep of the stock on hand.

The drug law is very strict, and physicians are restricted in prescribing morphine. Habitual morphine victims find it hard to secure the drug, but in this case the addict or "bootlegger" got all he wanted for the time being to say the least of it.

Dr. Hale states that there were no suspicious persons around his office during the time he was in his office, and he had not had occasion to notice anyone whom he could suspect of being a morphine victim, and he is at a loss to find a clue to the robbery.

CHICAGO, Oct. 24.—The "Big Four" brotherhoods and the Switchmen's Union reiterated a warning to the United States Railroad Labor Board today, stating that "only a satisfactory settlement" can prevent the railroad strike as called for on October 30th. It was learned today that the railroad labor leaders served such notice on the labor board Sunday morning.

The labor board announced today, formally that it had great reasons to believe that the strike would be averted. The announcement warned the public to refrain from "loose talk, provocative of language on either side of the controversy."

Replying to the board's citation to appear at the conference next Wednesday at ten o'clock, the union executives sent a joint message to the board reassuring the board of its stand taken at the conference with the board last week calling for a settlement before suspending the strike.

### TWO REVIVALS ARE SUCCESSFUL

The Presbyterian and Methodist co-operative revival in progress at the Methodist church, closed the first week Sunday with conversions and additions to the churches numbering about thirty, and begins the second and last week with prospects for great success. It has been announced that the meeting will close next Sunday night.

The attendance at this revival during the first week has been unusually good, considering that the Baptists were also holding a revival, verifying the claim that if Ballinger people attended church as they should, there would be large crowds at both meetings.

Dr. Hall has delivered a series of sermons which have stirred the religious interests of the churches, and no doubt seed has been sown which will bring forth fruit in years to come. The two Sunday schools packed the auditorium of the Methodist church Sunday morning at 10:20 o'clock, and there were several who responded to the preacher's call to accept Christ. Dr. Hall preached on the subject, "The Redemption of the Home," at the eleven o'clock hour, and the evening hour his subject was, "God's Solemn Call." The subject for tonight will be "Taking Stock." A special sermon will be delivered Wednesday night on "The Second Coming of Christ." Dr. Hall announced he had been requested to preach on this subject.

The Baptist revival which has been in progress for two weeks under the leadership of Rev. Sid Williams, will close with a baptizing Sunday night that the baptizing would take place at the Christian church, the former home of the Baptist church, tonight, and that service will close the revival.

The usual morning service was held at the Carnegie Library, where the meeting has been in progress. Monday morning at ten o'clock, the service being a farewell service to those who have been so faithful in attendance and help during the two weeks.

Sunday was a good day for the Baptist meeting. Evangelist Sid Williams preached at the eleven o'clock hour, and at three o'clock Sunday afternoon the Library auditorium was filled with men to hear him in a sermon to men only. The evangelist pointed the large audience of men to the better way of living, and it was one of the best services of the entire revival. Sunday night the auditorium was filled to overflowing.

The results of the meeting is better told in the large additions to the church. About seventy gave their names for membership and the spiritual interest of the church was greatly revived. The Baptists are planning a new church, and the revival will be followed with a building campaign, it is expected, and one of the most modern church buildings in West Texas will result.

CHICAGO, Oct. 24.—The Brotherhood of Railroad Signalmen of America will not join the "Big Four" brotherhoods and Switchmen's Union in the contemplated strike, President D. W. Helt announced today. This brotherhood has a membership of fifteen thousand, and these members were instructed today to remain on their regular work, but refuse to accept assignment to other duties which they might be called on to perform on account of vacancies caused by the strikers leaving the roads. This decision was reached after several days conference of the executive officers. The signalmen's brotherhood has taken no strike

PALESTINE, Tex., Oct. 24.—The third day of the strike of several hundred trainmen and switchmen on the International & Great Northern railroad found the situation quiet today, with passenger service virtually uninterrupted, and freight movement partially restored, according to reports at headquarters of the road here. There is no indication that the strikers will heed the telegrams from the United States Railroad Labor Board virtually ordering the men back to work.

E. G. Goforth, general manager of the road, announced that three freight trains were operated over the I. & G. N. Sunday, and he expected the service to be extended today. Out of San Antonio one freight train each way was reported in operation today. Fort Worth officials said the freight service probably will be resumed out of that city in a few hours.

The strikers in Houston and San Antonio are in conference today considering reports from the leaders along the line. The railroad company continued to maintain heavy guards over its property at important places, taking no chances for a loss at the hands of some irresponsible.

### I. W. W. MUST GO TO PEN

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—Five alleged members of the Industrial Workers of the World, convicted in the federal court in Kansas for conspiracy to violate the espionage act, must serve the sentence as imposed upon them. The supreme court today refused to review the case.

### CHARLES CAUSES SOME TROUBLE

LONDON, Oct. 24.—It is reported from Vienna that the British high commission there declared that the entente will continue the continued presence of former Emperor Charles in Hungary, a casus belli, says the Exchange Telegraph Co., in dispatches from the Austrian capital this morning.

PARIS, Oct. 24.—The troops of former Emperor Charles of Austria-Hungary, are closing in without much resistance from the forces opposed to his restoration to the Hungarian throne, according to information reaching the allied council of ambassadors this afternoon.

BUDAPEST, Oct. 24.—The Hungarian government forces fighting against the attempt of former Emperor Charles to regain the throne have won a pronounced success against the Carlist forces, it was announced in reports to the government early today. The reports stated that town of Raab had been recaptured and that the Carlists are being attacked in the rear.

### BRITISH STAND PAT WITH IRISH

LONDON, Oct. 24.—Premier Lloyd George, answering a question before the House of Commons today regarding the Eamon de Valera message to Pope Benedict, said that the publication of the message, especially in the middle of peace negotiations, constituted a grave challenge.

"The position of the government on the question involved that the telegram had been made abundantly clear," the premier said, "and we do not propose to recede from it and the conference can not proceed on any other basis."

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—Three of the most prominent military leaders in Europe: General Diaz, of Italy; Admiral Beatty, of England; and General Jacques, of Belgium; are guests today of President Harding in a White House luncheon. Secretaries of the state, war and navy departments, and Alton T. Roberts, chairman of the American reception committee, complete the luncheon party.

Judges A. K. Doss and C. P. Shepherd returned home Monday at noon from Dallas, where they spent a couple of days and helped to close the State Fair. The Ballinger attorneys saw some of the starch knocked out of the Texas university football squad at the hands of the Vanderbilt eleven.

Members of the American Legion football squad are working out every afternoon at Nichols Park, and getting in condition for the game to be played Friday afternoon with the High School team.

**NO TIME TO LAG ON WATER PROBLEM**

Started with full speed ahead now it will require at least one year to put over a plan for financing and building an adequate water supply.

To say nothing of the serious situation we are now experiencing, it can rain, dry up and rain again before we can perfect what we can call a permanent water supply.

This being the case the proposition should not be allowed to lag for a day. It is certainly one case in which delays are dangerous, and which retards city development for just as many days as the proposition is allowed to lag.

Of course no dirt can be turned, or actual work start until the engineer makes a survey, makes a report and recommends something. But it will take money to put over any proposition the engineer recommends, and that part of the work can be well underway by the time the engineer's report is at hand.

Ballinger is fortunate in having on the ground an expert corps of engineers in the persons of Chief Holder and his assistants of the U. S. Geological department, who are making the survey for the irrigation project. These men will be on the Elm Creek project in a few days.

As far as we have been able to learn the citizens of Ballinger are unanimously in favor of increasing Ballinger's water supply. There are several different opinions as to which is the best plan, but all seem to be willing to abide by the recommendations of a competent engineer. Of all the problems which are confronting Ballinger this is one which should not be permitted to lag, rain or shine.

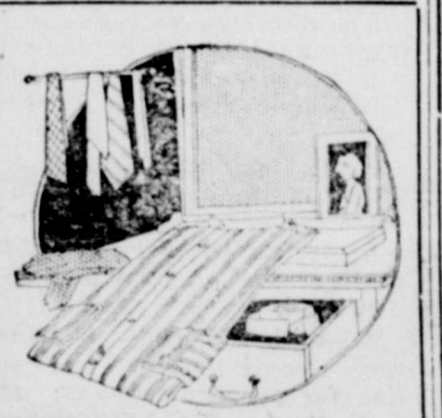

**BROTHER DIES FROM INJURIES**

W. J. Fowler went to Fort Worth last week to attend the funeral of his brother, B. H. Fowler, who died from injuries received when an auto turned over with him near Brownwood about one month ago. Deceased was carried from Brownwood to Ft. Worth, where every possible effort was made to save his life, but after lingering for a month, death claimed him. The Fort Worth Star-Telegram gives the following account of the funeral:

The funeral of B. H. Fowler of DeLeon, a former resident of Ft. Worth, who was killed when an automobile in which he was riding overturned ten miles from Brownwood, was held Friday afternoon from the chapel of the Ft. Worth Undertaking establishment. Rev. E. P. Culver, pastor of the First Methodist church, conducted the services at the chapel and the Knights of Pythias had charge at the grave. Interment was made in Greenwood cemetery.

Besides his widow, Fowler is survived by three brothers, W. J. Fowler, of Ballinger; J. P. Fowler, of Sweetwater; and John I. Fowler, of Lometa; and one sister, Mrs. Thomas Eagan, of Ballinger.

Fowler lived in Ft. Worth until six years ago, when he went to DeLeon to take a railroad position in that city. He was a brother-in-law of the late Judge W. S. Essex.

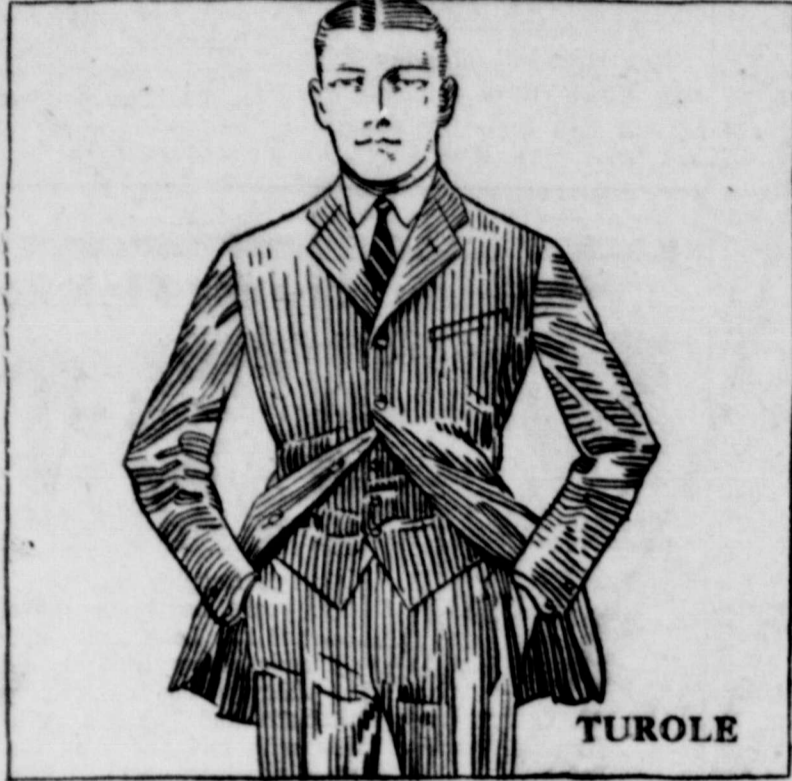

WILL BE CONFISCATED

JUAREZ, Chihuahua, Mex., Oct. 24.—The Mexican government has decided to take over 750,000 acres of land held by General Luis Terrazas, Antonio T. Villareal, secretary of agriculture, said in an announcement received at the American consulate in Juarez. The seizure, the announcement said, will be made under the agrarian law, which gives the government power to confiscate large tracts of idle land.
