## MOVE TO OUST BLANTON NOW BEFORE CONGRESS

### LITTLE ENTENTE READY TO FIGHT

LONDON, Oct. 27.—The "little entente" countries, composed of Roumania, Czechoslovakia, and Jugo-Slavia, dispatched a note to the Hungarian government today demanding the surrender of former Emperor Charles and the demobilization of the Hungarian army, and reparations sufficient to defray the expenses of the "little entente's" mobilization, according to dispatches received here from Vienna. Unless Hungary replies satisfactorily within two days the three Balkan states' troops will enter Hungary, the dispatch said.

PARIS, Oct. 27.—The allied council of ambassadors today decided that former Emperor Charles and former Empress Zita be placed aboard a British cruiser in the Danube, immediately pending another meeting of the council Saturday, when a final decision of their fate will be made.

### N. Y. OBSERVES TEDDY'S BIRTH

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—Civic, memorial and social organizations of this city joined together today in celebrating the sixty-third anniversary of Theodore Roosevelt's birth. A series of ceremonies will be held here and at Oyster Bay, the Long Island village where the former president spent the last years of his life.

### NEW CITY PLANT ALMOST READY

The question of whether the people of Ballinger will support their own light and power plant will be tested out soon. The current will be shot into the wires much sooner than at first expected, as much better progress has been made on the new plant than the most optimistic dreamed.

One of the new engines was tested out Wednesday afternoon and the engineers said "she hit perfect." The other engine will be tested in a few days, and then the connections made and the plant given several days test out before light and power consumers are notified that the city "juice" is ready for them.

Just as fast as the work can be done the city electricians will call on the consumers who want to connect with the city's plant, and make the transfer for them. It will be necessary in practically every case in the residence district to rewire the connections, changing the entrance from the front to the rear, as the city's line comes in from the alley. This change will not cost the consumer anything, the city making all necessary changes in transferring from one line to the other without cost to the consumer.

The back door entrance will be an improvement within itself. It takes the wires from the front yard and from the front of the house, and brings them in from the rear. About eighty per cent of the light and power consumers of the city have agreed to use the city's current.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—The House of Representatives today voted to censure through direct public reprimand Congressman Thos. L. Blanton, of Texas, after the resolution to expel the Texas representative had failed by the narrow margin of eight votes.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—The resolution calling for the expulsion of Representative Thomas L. Blanton from congress was called up today by Representative Mondell, Republican leader in the House. New efforts were started immediately to have all factions agree upon a resolution of censure for the Texas congressman instead of asking for his expulsion.

A resolution offering a vote of censure as a substitute for the resolution of expulsion was proposed by Representative Garrett, of Tennessee, after Mr. Blanton had made a dramatic defense of his action before the House. The resolution offered by Mr. Garrett proposed that the speaker be directed to reprimand Mr. Blanton publicly before the bar of the House.

Republican leader Mondell asked for the adoption of his resolution, saying that charges of such character should not be presented on the floor of the House. "Blanton's action in this matter is a crime against decency, done deliberately without regard to law or honor of the House," Mondell said, in concluding his speech against Blanton.

In the course of his address in defending himself against Mondell's attack, Blanton said "with God as my witness I had no intention other than the protection of citizens in their rights, in exposing just what was taking place in the government printing office."

Blanton declared that a New York lawyer informed him that the Congressional Record carrying the matter to which Mondell objected to was not unavailable.

The galleries were crowded, many visitors being women, when the House convened to take up the resolution.

### K. K. K. PROBE IS COMPLETED

WACO, Oct. 27.—The grand jury called here some time ago to investigate the Ku Klux Klan clash at Lorena, resumed its hearings today. All those who were wounded in the fight which took place when the sheriff undertook to stop a Ku Klux parade have testified before the grand jury except Sheriff Buchanan and Ed Howard. They are expected to appear before the grand jury today, and this will probably complete the hearing and the grand jury will make its report.

Nothing has been given out to indicate how many indictments, if any, will be returned, or who the indictments will be against.

### DALLAS MAN SHOT IN ROOM

DALLAS, Oct. 27.—J. E. Watkins, age fifty-nine was found dead in his bed here this morning with a bullet wound in his head. The shooting of the man is surrounded by mystery. A pistol with an empty shell in it was found by the dead man's bed, but detectives said this evidence did not substantiate suicide, and it is believed that Watkins was shot through a window from the outside.

### BALLINGER NEGROES IN JAIL AT LUBBOCK

Two negroes are being held in jail at Lubbock waiting for Ballinger officers to come after them. The negroes are charged with shop-lifting here, it being alleged that they stole goods from Ballinger stores to the amount of more than one hundred dollars.

## MAY GET COURT ORDER TO PREVENT STRIKE

CHICAGO, Oct. 27.—Ben W. Hooper, of the United States Railroad Labor Board, left the conference of union executives shortly afternoon, and said that the strike had not been settled and settlement could hardly be expected while he was at the meeting.

The labor board marked time with the meeting of members scheduled for this afternoon. The board had under consideration the question whether it should issue an order forbidding the strike, or attempt court action as a possibility for preventing it.

PALESTINE, Tex., Oct. 27.—The operation of trains on the Texas State Railroad from Palestine to Rusk, will be started within a few days, according to W. R. Scott, President of the Southern Pacific, which took over the property a short time ago.

CHICAGO, Oct. 27.—Ben W. Hooper, a member of the United States Railroad Labor Board, expected to make a final appeal in behalf of the government for letting off the threatened strike at today's meeting of the general chairman and executive committees of the five big unions.

The board's proposal, it is reported, is a guarantee that neither wage cuts nor rule changes will be considered until all pending cases are disposed of. Mr. Hooper said before going to the meeting room that he is making the final call unofficially and that he had a "vague possibility" of settlement in mind which he would outline to the union men. More than two hundred union men assembled when the board members arrived to open today's conference.

PALESTINE, Oct. 27.—A modification of the freight embargo on the International & Great Northern Railroad became effective today because of the continued improvement of traffic conditions, the general offices of the road announced.

There is a conflict in the reports from the road and from the representatives of the strikers. The road officials declare that trains are moving and that matters are being handled without regular employees who are out on strike, while the representatives of the strikers declare that things are tied up and that the strike is proving very satisfactory to them.

**LOCAL BOARD TO RAISE S. A. QUOTA**

Members of the local advisory board of the Salvation Army met shortly after noon Thursday and organized for the drive which will be made Friday morning, instead of Thursday afternoon as originally planned.

The town was divided into five sections, and two men assigned to each section as follows:

First National Bank block—R. T. Williams and O. L. Parish. Doose block—R. G. Erwin and Stuart L. Williams.

Rogers-Higdon block—Paul Trimmer and Elmer Shepherd. F. & M. Bank block—T. S. Lankford and A. W. Sledge.

Bennett Abstract Co. block—W. C. McCarver and A. K. Doss.

The five teams appointed are expected to canvass all territory adjoining the block assigned to them which is not assigned to one of the other teams.

The drive will be made for the Salvation Army and for charity, and all contributors are requested to be prepared to "kick in" liberally, and have your check ready as it will help the committee greatly. This is an obligation which the town must pay, and the quicker it is paid the better it will be.

The local advisory board of the Salvation Army, composed of Paul Trimmer, R. T. Williams, O. L. Parish, E. Shepperd, W. C. McCarver, T. S. Lankford, A. W. Sledge, R. G. Erwin and A. K. 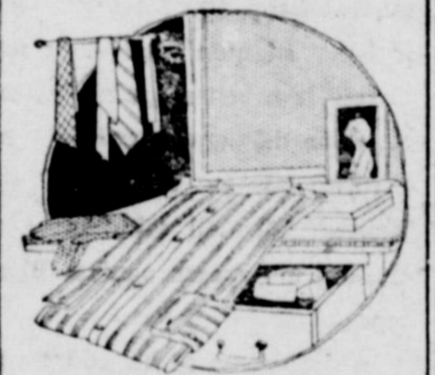

## COMMITTEE SAYS SEED ARE PURE

### MENUS OF TOWN AND FARM

Statistics Supplied by Department of Agriculture Reveal Rural Conditions Notably Satisfactory.

"How are the folks on the farm faring?" is a question that is answered with a "Very well, thank you," by the Department of Agriculture at Washington. Looking into the average American farm method of living, the department finds that the farmers are as generously supplied with meat as any other class of people, observes Gus Karger in the Cincinnati Times Star. Strangely enough, they don't use eggs as abundantly as the folks elsewhere, but they use more milk, even where there are fewer than the average number of children.

Except in Southern states, where "quick" breads are often preferred, wheat bread is the staple. A relatively large proportion of starchy vegetables is consumed and a relatively small quantity of the green and succulent kinds, in spite of the fact that farm families have the best opportunities for growing vegetables at home. The studies of the home economist division of the Department of Agriculture "bear out the general impression" the report states, that on the average the farmers' families have an abundant diet, with enough different kinds of food to insure good health. Whether the food is well cooked and attractively served the studies do not show. The fact that almost twice as much cooking fat was used by the farm families as by the general average indicates that farm housewives are inclined to cook too many foods by frying. The only recommendation is that it would be well for the farmers to use more eggs, more coarse cereals and a greater variety of vegetables and fruits, especially more green vegetables.

### FINEST TRAINING FOR YOUTH

Business Man Tells Why He Would Have His Son Get Full Newspaper Experience.

"Journalism teaches that results alone count, that excuses and equivocations are failures," writes Henry Scott, vice president of a paper company. "There is a discipline in big newspaper offices that does not exist in the average business, and that discipline is based on the motto, 'No excuses.' It is accepted in ordinary business that when a man is told to do something he usually expects detailed instructions. 'Where do I go, what do I do, how do I do it, what do I ask, and what will I do then,' are the questions that show their utter helplessness and lack of action.

"On the other hand a reporter gets this training as no one else does. He learns to lean on his own initiative. He gets an assignment, plans his campaign and then carries it out without asking any questions. When an obstacle comes up in the path of the average young man he stops and yells for help. But a newspaper man learns to either go through it, knock it down or skirt around it in a hurry. He has learned that excuses can't be cashed at the bank.

"If I had a boy and wanted to give him a right business training in order that he might bring distinction to himself some day in his profession, whatever it might be, I would like to give him about two years under a first class city editor, the kind that commits mental murder three or four times a night."

### Claims to Transplant Eyes.

New eyes for old can be given blind creatures, claims a young Hungarian zoologist. He says he can transplant sound eyes from living creatures to others that are blind. Before the Vienna Biological society he said that he had experimented first with fishes and frogs, and then with rats, moles and other small animals. He had observed that fishes which had lost their sight sometimes lost also the coloring of their bodies. By replacing their blind eyes with sound ones taken from another living creature, he had restored their sight and their coloring too. Frogs, when they became blind, gave up seeking food, but with their new eyes were as diligent as ever in this respect. Professor Kolmer declared that he had examined some of the eyes transplanted by Koppeny under the microscope and had found them normal.

### Toasted a Dead King.

Now that the city fathers of Paris have got back from their trip to Scandinavia, they are telling a mean story on M. Le Corbellier, who, as president of the municipal council, is about as close to being mayor of Paris anybody can be for Paris has no mayor in the American sense.

M. Le Corbellier was called upon, at a Stockholm banquet, to respond to the toast of "La Belle France," the president of the republic, and so forth. Raising his glass of applejack, he replied:

"I drink to the health of King Oscar, to that of the royal family, to the ministers."

"There was only one thing wrong," his friends will tell you maliciously. "King Oscar has been dead for the last ten years."—New York Sun.

### Canadian Furs.

Furs taken in Canada in the 1919-1920 season were valued at more than \$21,000,000. Ontario contributed the greatest share, with Quebec in second place. The muskrat furs were first in value, amounting to nearly \$6,000,000. Beaver, marten, mink, silver fox, red fox, ermine and skunk followed in this order.
