The day was set aside for all who wished to do so to visit the casket containing the unknown dead soldier, who arrived here Tuesday as a representative of the thousands of unknown dead who fell on the battlefields in the World War. All who could speak for groups in land or for powers of the world, were free to place floral offerings on the bier of the unknown soldier.

CITY CUTTING IN NEW LIGHTS

The linemen and electricians for the city are busy connecting consumers with the municipal light and power line today. The work is being carried on systematically, the workmen taking the houses as they come to them and making a house to house canvass are making connections for all those who want city lights.

Mr. and Mrs. S. D. Williams hold the distinction of being the first private consumers to call for city light. They completed a new home on Eleventh Street just at a time the city's plant was about to begin operation, and called for the city electricians to make the connection. G. A. Ladwig, who is also completing a new home on Strong Ave., East of the court house, gave orders for the city to tie his residence with the city's light plant.

The workmen are taking the business district first, and quite a number of business houses were connected with the city power plant Thursday, and the work will be continued until all those who want city current are supplied.

The work consists only in the simple matter of disconnecting the consumer's line with the old power plant and tying it on to the city's plant, and it is then up to the consumer to notify the old company that their service is no longer needed.

DEMOCRATS FAIL TO PASS TAX AMENDMENT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—The efforts of the Democrats to force an acceptance in the Senate of the fifty per cent surtax amendment failed today.

STATE REFUTES INSANITY PLEA

WEATHERFORD, Nov. 10.—Thirteen witnesses testified today that they believed that Willis Wayne Todd was of sound mind, was the state's reply to the defense plea that Todd was not mentally responsible when he was alleged to have asked James McNeal, a Fort Worth taxicab driver, for a ride and when he gave the signal for the chauffeur to be beaten to death by Todd's alleged companions. The testimony was concluded with the rebuttal by the prosecution at ten o'clock this morning and argument in the case began at eleven. Each side has been given three hours to discuss the case before the jury.

Todd, with two other youths, is charged with murdering McNeal near Weatherford a short time ago. Todd made a confession when first arrested in which he detailed how the three young men planned the murder for the purpose of stealing the car to go to Colorado in, but became frightened after they killed McNeal because they could not get the blood from the car, and abandoned it in Fort Worth.

WICHITA FALLS SELLS IRRIGATION BONDS

WICHITA FALLS, Nov. 10.—Sale of the \$4,500,000 bond issue of the Wichita irrigation project was consummated yesterday, according to announcement of the board of directors, Kaufman, Smith & Earnert and Compton & Co., both firms being St. Louis bond houses, were purchasers.

Nov. 15th has been set for the opening of bids of construction work, and indications point to a speedy consummation of the extensive project. It is stated that money from the bonds will be available in a short time.

U. S. Havenhill was here from Winters Wednesday advertising a rodeo which the American Legion is staging at that place on Armistice Day.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—"Sir James Craig in behalf of the cabinet of Northern Ireland wishes it clearly understood that there can be no surrender of Ulster's rights," says a statement issued after a meeting of the Ulster cabinet this morning.

BEARS CONTROL COTTON MARKET

Following a hundred point break in the market Wednesday following the ginners' report, the market went gliding downhill without breaks again Thursday, closing sixty points below the close Wednesday, or making a net loss of eight dollars per bale in two days.

Buyers and farmers with cotton on hand were hit hard, but most of them are hanging on. The hanging on is made easy for the farmers as the buyers were bluffed off the boards Thursday, and no sales were reported. "I wouldn't pay over fifteen cents," said one buyer, "and I would be gambling to buy at that price." There will be no market tomorrow—Armistice Day.

The Farm Bureau has advanced as high as \$40 per bale on a big lot of cotton, and is standing pat, declaring that they have arranged to stand by their guns until next July, and at that time will be able to renew arrangements. Many farmers have from one to a greater number of bales, and are also holding without becoming excited over the downward trend of the market.

RABBIT DRIVE GETS 'EM ALIVE

"I am going to make an effort to stage a series of rabbit drives in this county," said Farm Agent Eaton Thursday morning, "and I will be glad to hear from any communities which wish to arrange for a drive."

Mr. Eaton stated that success in driving rabbits into pens in neighboring counties proved that the scheme was entirely practical and that the plan of exterminating the rabbits was much better than the old way of going out and shooting them.

Tom Green county has recently staged several drives, and as high as 200 rabbits have been rounded up, and driven into the pen in one short drive, and those who have participated in the drives declare that the sport is great, and is a game which people—men, women and children, can engage in without being subject to the danger of being shot.

Mr. Eaton stated that a few hundred feet of net wire could be purchased by a community, and passed on from community to community, each community paying pro rata of the cost, and in the end the expense would be practically nothing, while every drive with guns cost a great deal on account of the high cost of shells.

The wire pen can be set so as to make from one to four drives without being moved, drives being made in opposite directions by moving the wings of the pen.

Mr. Eaton requests that communities wishing to co-operate in this work of exterminating the rabbit pest communicate with him at once, and he will fix a schedule of dates and make arrangements for the fun to start at once.

MARSHALL, Tex., Nov. 10.—Two men are dead and several are seriously injured as the result of two collisions on the Texas & Pacific Railroad today in which two passenger trains and two freight trains were wrecked, according to reports reaching division headquarters of the T. & P. here.

The collisions occurred at St. Delphine, just East of Addis, Louisiana, and near Longview, Texas. The dead are:

WALTER WEIDERMAN, engineer, Train No. 23

CHARLES A. SMITH, Jr., fireman, Freight Train No. 3.

Passenger train No. 23, leaving New Orleans late yesterday, collided with a tram engine last night at St. Delphine sugar camp. Both engines were wrecked.

This is the third tragedy on the T. & P. in two days, a large locomotive exploding near Abilene Tuesday and killing the fireman.

MARSHALL, Tex., Nov. 10.—Six persons were seriously injured, and a number of others bruised and cut when an Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe passenger train No. 11, South bound from Kansas City to the Gulf threw three Pullman cars and two day coaches over an embankment one mile South of here early today. Dr. A. B. Childress, of Mulhall, was one of the first physicians to reach the scene of the wreck and reported that fatalities will result from some of the injured.

Reports received in dispatches to offices of railroad officials here said that the wreckage took fire through the explosion of a car of gasoline and eight freight cars were burned. Smith's body was found under the wreckage. He was fireman for his father, who escaped injury, presumably by jumping in time to clear the wreck. Smith and his father were both in the cab of the freight engine. They lived at Longview.

A relief train, carrying fire fighting apparatus was dispatched from Longview, and reached the scene in time to be of some assistance in saving property. The passenger train was derailed by the impact of the two engines and the baggage car was badly smashed. The front end of the freight train was derailed as the two engines telescoped.

FT. WORTH, Nov. 10.—C. A. Smith Jr., fireman on the Texas & Pacific East bound freight train which struck a West bound passenger train about seven miles West of Longview at 5:30 this morning, is missing. It is believed that the man was cremated in the blazing wreckage.

LONGVIEW, Nov. 10.—Several persons are reported killed in a head-on collision on the T. & P. Railroad near here early this morning. Physicians and ambulances from this city have been rushed to the scene of the collision. At eight o'clock this morning details of the wreck were not available, wire communications being down.

BRITISH ARRIVE FOR CONFERENCE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—Arthur J. Balfour, acting head of the delegation representing the British Empire at the conference for the limitation of armaments and discussion of Far Eastern and Pacific questions, arrived in Washington today with other members of his party, which landed at Quebec Tuesday.

Simultaneously delegates from New Zealand and Australia reached the city, completing the delegation, with the exception of Premier David Lloyd George, who has promised to come later and join the British representation at the conference. A distinguished group of American and British officials received the former prime minister and his party at the station here.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 10.—Mrs. Livingston Rowe, of Schnyler, N. Y., was today elected President General of the United Daughters of the Confederacy. She is the first woman living North of the Mason and Dixon line elected to the office.

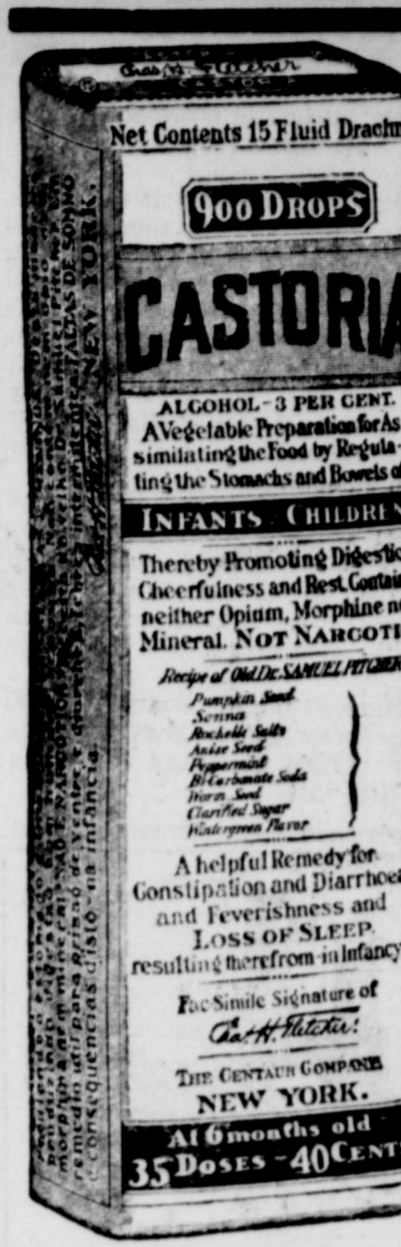

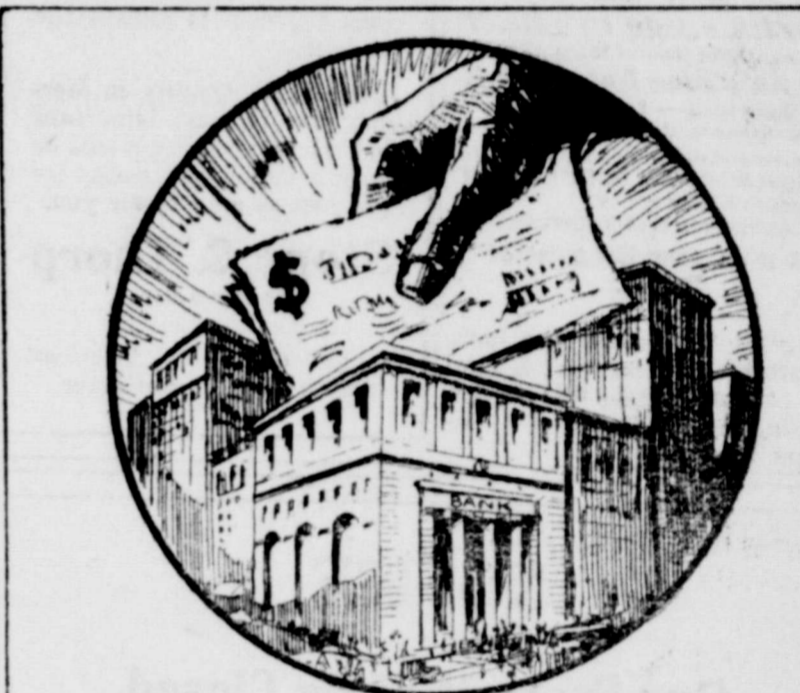

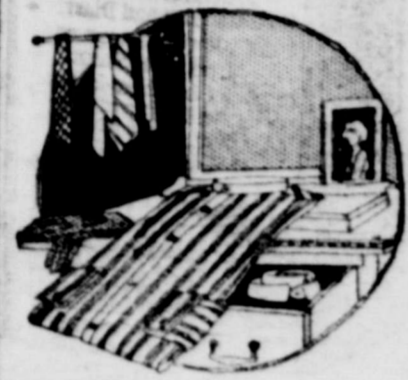
