This information was received at the offices of the Young Men's Business League Saturday afternoon from Porter A. Whaley of the West Texas Chamber.

Clifford B. Jones, manager of the Post City cotton mill, will make a short address on the benefits of cotton mills to West Texas towns.

## HEROES' GRAVES ARE DECORATED

Friday morning at ten o'clock a procession formed at the American Legion P. C. and proceeded to the cemetery for the decoration ceremonies which the Legion had planned in honor of all ex-service men of the county who are buried in Evergreen Cemetery. Graves of former soldiers, sailors and marines of past American wars had been marked each with a small flag.

J. McGregor opened the service with prayer and ladies of the town had charge of the decoration of graves with flowers. There were plenty of flowers to go around, people from all over Ballinger sending in flowers all morning until the floral offering was as large as had ever been seen here.

At 10:40 Rev. W. C. Kunze made the memorial address, paying a splendid tribute to the men who had worn the uniform, touching especially on the heroes who had paid the supreme sacrifice. At 11:00 o'clock following the request of the president of the United States, taps were sounded and everyone with uncovered heads faced West and engaged in silent prayer for two minutes.

The service was brief but in keeping with the occasion and very impressive. Those attending came away feeling a deeper respect for the men who gave their lives in the wars.

## Disarmament Conference Holds First Meeting

### American Legion Minstrel Was Success in Every Way

Everybody in Ballinger is loud in their praise of the American Legion Minstrel show which was presented Friday afternoon and night at the Maeroy Theatre. It was the best home talent show ever produced in Ballinger, in the opinion of many and all who attended say they got their money's worth and then some.

"Three Years Ago Over There," a soldier sketch presented from a trench, was the opening number. There was special scenery for this and gave the people "at home" something of an idea of what living in a trench and going over the top really meant. The act was interspersed with humor, pathos and music, and held the audience spellbound from the time the curtain went up until it dropped leaving the spectators cheering as the boys again went over after the bacon.

Mrs. Alee McGregor and Mrs. Troy Simpson entertained in the second act with a little harmony singing and the audience called the pair back several times in appreciation of their act. The "Ten of 'Sweet Wyoming'" a roar of applause.

III was announced as "Scientific Gymnastics," but when the first character appeared the crowd knew they had another laugh coming and laugh they did until the curtain fell. Bill Sharp, Grundy Sparks and Louis Tigner provoked the laughter and did a good job of it.

When Act IV arrived all the audience got set for the big professional act of the evening. The smell of incense filled the house and all knew it for a mystic act. Mr. Williams introduced Ali Ben Hagin, and assisted in the act. The act was all that any crowd could expect, any article in the house was identified by the Arabian mystery solver, and any question that was asked was immediately answered. The costuming of this act was very fitting and the part of Ali Ben enacted by Arch Crews was completely satisfactory to the big crowd that laughed at his every utterance.

In the concluding part of the program was presented the Cabaret Minstrel, which drew one laugh after another for one hour. All the songs and chorus singing were encoored time and again and everyone on the program deserves a special mention but owing to the large cast that will be impossible. However, the big outstanding feature of the program was Mr. Hippo Jones, who from his first appearance to the final curtain kept them with a smile on their faces and many declared they laughed at him until their heads hurt all night. At the evening performance he answered his fifth curtain call of his interpretation of "Wang Wang Blues," and when he was finally sung down he convulsed the crowd with a certain talk which has been classified as an African classic. The props used by him and the wonderful jewelry worn in the show was noticed and commented on all over town Saturday.

Another feature of the show was the orchestra. All the intermissions were filled with sweet music and music that was a treat to hear. Those who have been saying that Ballinger should have a musical organization all say today that she has one. The public should get behind this orchestra and make it a permanent organization.

Those in charge of the show feel that their efforts have been rewarded in the success of the two performances. It showed taste, and good management from the seating of the big crowd to the stage direction. The scenery

was good and the carpenters worked fast and like professional showmen in making changes and producing effects.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—America's concrete proposals on the limitation of naval armament—the crux of the disarmament conference—were presented today by Secretary Hughes at the opening of the first session, and were briefly as follows:

First: That all capital ships and building programs either actual or projected be abandoned.

Second: That further reduction be made through the scrapping of certain older ships.

Third: That in general regard be had to the existing naval strength of the powers concerned.

Fourth: That capital ship tonnage be used as measurement of strength for navies and a proportionate allowance of auxiliary combatant craft be prescribed.

For the United States the program would scrap all capital ships under construction and fifteen older battleships. Great Britain would stop constructing on her four new ships of the Hood type and scrap all second and first line battle ships up to the King George V class. Japan would abandon her plans on two battleships and four battle cruisers not yet laid, and in addition scrap three capital ships and four second line battleships.

As a replacement program the American government proposed that no more ships be laid down for the next ten years and that a maximum replacement tonnage figure be computed that would provide eventually, 500,000 tons for the United States and Great Britain each. Provisions would be made to include the replacement of capital ships when twenty years old and prohibiting the construction of ships built for replacement with a tonnage of more than 35,000 tons. A maximum replacement limit for Japan would be 300,000 tons.

The conference adjourned at 11:45 o'clock until Tuesday, Nov. 15th at 11:00 o'clock.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—Fresh with the memories of the soldier dead, the conference on limitation of armaments met in its first session today to seek a "rule under which a reason of righteousness shall prevail."

Prayer was offered by Rev. W. S. Abernathy, pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church of Washington, which was followed by speech of President Harding.

A minute's applause followed the president's speech and then Secretary of State Chas. Evans Hughes, who was elected chairman on the nomination of Arthur Balfour, announced that French and English would be used in the conference.

Within three months after the agreement the American proposals are that the number of capital ships in the navies would be as follows: United States 18, Great Britain 20, and Japan 10.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—The American armament limitation plans as outlined at the disarmament conference today by Secretary Hughes, were described by Admiral Kato of the Japanese delegation as "very drastic, but good proposals" have been placed before the conference.

PARIS, Nov. 12.—Interest, but not undue optimism, marks the French public's attitude toward the disarmament conference as evidenced by the comment in the morning newspapers.

LONDON, Nov. 12.—"The Dawn of Hope," "World's Hope Fixed on Washington," "All Nations Anxious for Success at Washington," these are some of the headlines in London papers this morning that attest the interest in the opening of the Washington conference on the limitation of armaments and the discussion of Far Eastern and Pacific questions.

**DENISON HIGH GIRLS START DRESS REFORM**

DENISON, Tex., Nov. 12.—Moral suasion practically has eliminated ultra short skirts, low cut waists, lace stockings—rolled down—and the use of paint, rouge and eye pencils in the Denison high school, altho the school authorities and pupils have taken no definite action, the principal of the school said.

All the girls in the freshmen and sophomore classes, said to take domestic science, the principal said, and sewing and dress-making are in the course. The instructors show the girls how to make the most serviceable and most economical clothes, pointing out that plain, neat clothes are more in keeping with class rooms. Indirectly the girls conform their attire, the teachers say.

"Sometimes the girls almost rush home to change to more fashionable attire," the principal said, "but they are game, enough to stick to the linen suits for class room wear."

**RED CROSS GIVES ANNUAL BUDGET**

\$19,361,657 Allotted for Current Program of Relief and Service.

**MILLIONS FOR VETERAN AID**

Medical Aid for European Children Will Cost \$6,000,000 This Year.

Washington.—Expenditures totalling \$19,361,657 for carrying through its program of relief and services in the United States and overseas are outlined in the budget of the American Red Cross for the current fiscal year. This total is more than \$5,000,000 lower than the expenditure during the last fiscal year, when the disbursements reached \$24,492,741, it is announced at National Headquarters in a statement calling attention to the necessity of continued support of the organization by response to the Annual Roll Call, November 11 to 24, if the vital work of the society is to be effectively carried on.

Outstanding among the items of the domestic budget is the appropriation of \$3,000,000 for work in behalf of the disabled ex-service man and his family. This appropriation represents the amount allotted to this work from National Headquarters only and does not take into consideration the millions being spent in chapters for relief of the World War veteran. It is in the chapter that the greater amount is spent in meeting this obligation of the Red Cross, the announcement continues, as manifested by figures of the fiscal year 1920-1921 when the total was approximately \$9,000,000, of which \$2,892,934 represented the disbursement of National Headquarters while the remainder was the chapters' contribution to this field of Red Cross service.

**Vast Work for Disabled**  
 Chief among the subdivisions of the appropriation for work with veterans is that which concerns itself with assistance to disabled men and women in government hospitals. This item of \$1,700,000, an increase of more than \$500,000 over the appropriation for the same work in last year's budget, will provide those personal services for the disabled and their families which are indispensable to supplement those provided by the government. The director of the Veterans' Bureau has recently expressed his desire that the Red Cross should continue and extend these "humanizing services." Other items of the appropriation for veterans' relief are proportionately increased. An additional appropriation of \$400,000 has been made for Red Cross work in connection with regular Army and Navy hospitals and with the regular Army and Navy.

For disaster relief, the Red Cross has set aside for the current twelve months an appropriation of \$343,976, virtually doubling the appropriation for the same purpose for the fiscal year 1920-1921.

More than \$2,000,000 is provided for service and assistance to the 3,600 Red Cross chapters by the national organization.

**Helping Destitute Children**  
 Other items of the domestic budget include \$498,546 for miscellaneous activities, including contributions restricted for special purposes and \$768,900 for management. Each of these items represents large reductions over similar appropriations of the previous year.

From a fund of \$10,000,000, \$5,000,000 of which was contributed through the European Relief Council campaign and \$5,000,000 allotted by the Red Cross for child welfare work in Europe, there remains \$8,765,108 still available, of which it is estimated that \$6,000,000 will be required for this work during the current year. For Red Cross participation in the joint effort to relieve famine conditions in Russia, for final Red Cross and other overseas activities including the closing of the old general relief program in Europe \$4,578,000 is made available.

In announcing the national budget, the Red Cross makes it clear that the figures do not include chapter expenditures or place any cash estimate on the invaluable service of volunteers in chapters.

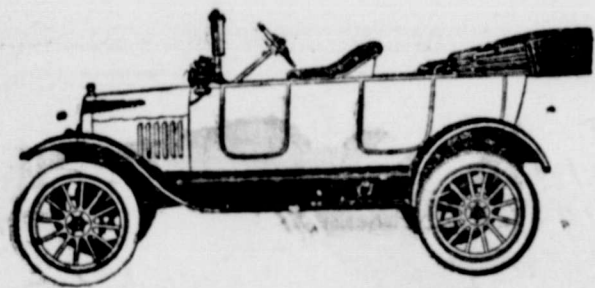

**BELIEVE THEY HOODWINK GOD**

Chinese Seemingly Have Little Respect for the Intellectuality of Their Deities.

One of the strangest things about the religion of the Chinese is the reverence they hold for their gods, despite the belief that the gods are gullible as a man of inferior intellect. Instead of attributing infallibility to the deities they worship, as all other races have done, the Chinese resort to tricks of childish ingenuity and are sure they have deceived the god.

Usually the tricks employed are to make sure the god does not betray the sins of a Chinese to the higher deities. An amazing example is the treatment of the kitchen god just before he is to start on one of his periodic visits to heaven. This trip is limited, because the kitchen god may be absent only seven days.

The householder thinks he must prevent the god from reciting his sins to the deities. So it is the general custom, before the god is to depart on the seven day's absence, to prepare large hollow balls of the god's favorite candy. The kitchen deity has a very small throat. When the candy, of which he is extremely fond, is placed before him, the Chinese say the god stuffs his mouth with it, being too gluttonous to leave any behind. His small throat prevents swallowing the confection, and thus when he appears before the ruling deities he is unable to talk, and the householder's sins remain a secret.

**"Apple-Pie Order."**

Few persons take time to trace expressions they use every day. When a thing is in "apple-pie order," for example, you mean, of course, that it is clean and neat and generally everything that it should be. The expression originated under somewhat different circumstances, observes the New York Sun.

"Apple-pie order" is an old New England phrase, and is well grounded in the blue laws of several centuries ago. Formerly the New England housewife did little work on Sunday and among the many things she didn't do was baking. Ever, 'ting of that nature was finished Saturday night. When the baking was done all the pies and cakes were ranged in a row on the kitchen shelf. With the flour still on her hands and apron, the good housewife would come out with a smile on her face ready for the Sabbath. Everything was in "apple-pie order."

**Birds That Dive**

Aquatic birds that are ordinarily able to float high on the water can also sink at will by expelling the air that is inclosed within the film of feathers surrounding their bodies, thus making them heavier than water.

This mechanical trick on the part of diving birds is probably familiar to all who have watched the kingfisher at close quarters and have noted the sudden contraction in the bird's

apparent size as it takes the plunge. This is much more easily observed in the case of the starling, which sometimes imitates the kingfisher by plunging into the water. The shrinkage of the bird is very apparent when, after hovering above the surface, it turns downward to dive.

**Some One Else's or Some One's Else.**

The expressions some one else, anyone else, everyone else, somebody else, etc., are used correctly as substantive phrases (that is, used as a noun, serving as subject or object, whether a single word, phrase or clause) and have the possessive inflection upon the first, as some one else's house. Some hold these phrases as elliptical expressions (expressions having part omitted), as, the house is some one's else (that is, other than the person previously mentioned). Therefore, either some one else's or some one's else is correct. However, some one else's is the expression in general use at the present time.

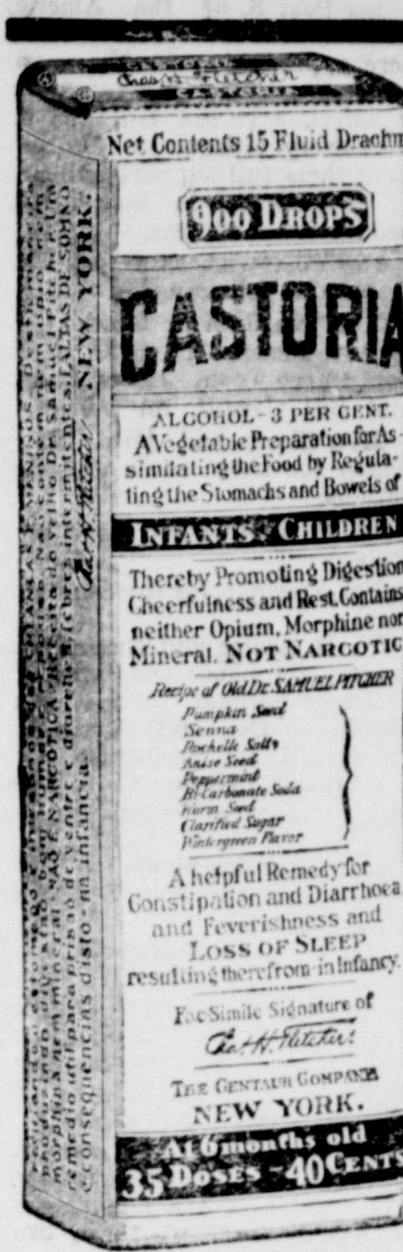

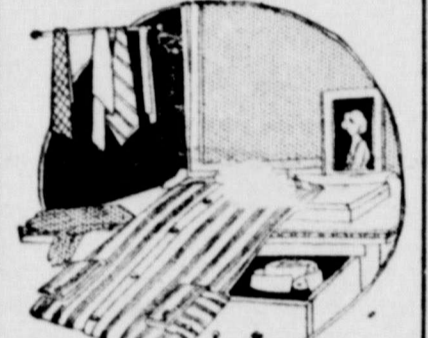
