Chamber of Commerce Meet One of Best Says Manager

One of the most successful meetings of the executive board of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in its history, concluded its work in Ballinger Monday evening as guests of the Young Men's Business League at a six o'clock dinner.

"It was one of the most successful meetings our board has ever held," said Porter Whaley, manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. "I wish to compliment Ballinger and congratulate the people for their splendid hospitality," said Mr. Whaley, "and say that the banquet was the best we have ever had, regardless of the size of the city in which we have been holding our meetings." Mr. Whaley said every facility for making the meeting a success was offered here, and every member of the board was delighted with the success of the meeting.

The banquet was given in the dance hall of the Ballinger Club, the ladies of the Eastern Star having charge of the menu. Many compliments were heard on the manner in which the ladies served the luncheon. The menu consisted of turkey, dressing, cranberry sauce, creamed potatoes, peas, fruit salad, pickles, celery, coconut pie, coffee, etc., and it was served in abundance.

C. S. Guin acted as toast master, and after each guest present had been introduced by the one seated on his right, the

toast master introduced a number of speakers, who responded with short talks. Col. Louis J. Wortham, editor of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, was the principal speaker of the evening. Others who responded were Porter A. Whaley, of Stamford; Homer D. Wade, of Stamford; Houston Harte, of San Angelo; Henry Halff, of Midland.

The executive board of the W. T. C. C. convened at one o'clock and were in continuous session until five-thirty, when a short recess was given until the directors met around the banquet table.

One of the last questions to come before the board was a renewal of the fight for the establishment of a West Texas A. & M. College. Different members discussed the needs for such an educational institution, and a committee was appointed to draft resolutions. The committee reported the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

"Ballinger, Tex., Nov. 14, 1921. We, the Executive Committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce demand:

"1st. The creation of an Agricultural and Mechanical College in that section of the State known as West Texas, which shall be fully equipped so as to make it function as the A. & M. College at College Station is now functioning.

AUSTIN, Nov. 15.—In reply to the request from the sheriff of Upshur county, a detachment of state rangers was ordered to that county today.

The sheriff said that he feared a race riot would follow the attempt, if made, to lynch a negro who killed a white man there recently. The negro is still at large and a posse is seeking him.

BELIEVES LABOR TROUBLE COMING

FT. WORTH, Nov. 15.—Gov. Neff came to Fort Worth today to attend the convention of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs. He will address the women today and tomorrow, being on the program for both days.

AUSTIN, Nov. 15.—Announcing it as his opinion, based on inspectors' reports that the breach between employer and employe is widening in Texas, Joseph S. Meyers, State Labor Commissioner, today asked all civic clubs of Texas to adopt resolutions "earnestly and respectfully" suggesting that there be no labor disputes, strikes, or lockouts in Texas between Thanksgiving and Christmas this year.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—In unison with Britain, France, Italy and Japan, today accepted in principle the proposals of the United States, made through Secretary of State Charles E. Hughes, for a ten year naval holiday and the junketing of more than sixty battleships. The nations only made reservations for suggesting modifications of detail in working out the proposed plans. The unanimous acceptance adds to American history a new anniversary which will be observed by generations to come.

In the following order former Premier Arthur J. Balfour, speaking for Great Britain; Baron Admiral Kato, speaking for Japan; Senator Schanzer, speaking for Italy; and Premier Aristide Briand, speaking for France, rose in praising in the highest terms the plans of the program suggested by the American government and gave adherence of their governments to the general terms of the proposals.

Secretary Hughes thanked the representatives of the foreign powers for their cordial expressions and declared that the time had come to proceed with the considerations of the details of the agreement. "The question now to be studied," Mr. Hughes said, "is the assurance there will come out of the conference an appropriate agreement to the end that there will be no more offensive naval war."

JUDGE ON TRIAL FOR MURDER

DEL RIO, Nov. 15.—Taking testimony started here today in the trial of Judge James Cornell, of Sonora, judge of the 33rd district court, who was indicted for the murder of W. T. O. Holman of Del Rio.

The killing took place on the streets of Del Rio last June during the Goat and Sheep Raisers' Convention. Holman was one of the most prominent ranchmen of West Texas, and Judge Cornell is a prominent Texas jurist, and the case is attracting much attention.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Great Britain's acceptance in principle of the United States' proposals for limitation of naval armament was formally laid before the arms conference today by Arthur Balfour, heading the British delegation. Baron Admiral Kato's statement of acceptance in principle and spirit for Japan followed, then came Italy and France, who joined the other powers in a general acceptance of the proposed plan.

Before hearing the statements of the delegations the conference adopted unanimously as a committee of a whole that the plan be worked out by the "Big Five."

Japan's acceptance will include some modifications of the tonnage scheme replacement.

Just after opening the gavel was sounded and the conference came to order. Mr. Balfour conferred earnestly with Lord Admiral Beatty. There was no prayer at the opening of the conference today, and the statements of the foreign delegations came without preliminary delays.

In announcing the program of decision of the "Big Five," Secretary Hughes said, "It is the intention of this committee, consisting of all plenipotentiary delegates, to consider all matters reported to the plenary sessions." He then announced the plan outlined in respect to the Far Eastern question.

Mr. Balfour, in telling how he heard Secretary Hughes' proposals last Saturday, said that he suddenly realized that he was participating in "a great historical event." "I congratulate you, Mr. Hughes, on the fact that you have added a new anniversary which henceforth will be observed in connection with this movement towards a great reconstruction."

When Baron Kato, in his speech, declared that Japan was willing to make sweeping reductions in her fleet, the audience rose and applauded for several minutes, and a hush then filled the hall for a period.

Belton Kennedy. Mrs. O'Bencham is awaiting trial here for the murder of the prominent Los Angeles business man.

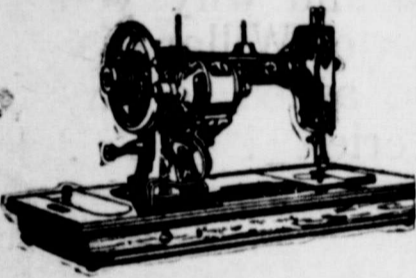

THE MAN OF THE HOUR

Perhaps admitted by his ene-
mies, but not expected so soon,
echoes from the recent Armistice
Day celebration in the nation's
capital, and the impressive cere-
monies incident to the burial of
the unknown soldier, brings to
pass a prophecy so often made
when Woodrow Wilson was the
victim of abuse and persecution
at the hands of his political ene-
mies during the last days of his
administration.

In its report of the funeral
march and ceremonies incident
to the great tribute of honor paid
to the unknown soldier, the Asso-
ciated Press correspondent says:

"Ending his voluntary re-
tirement in his S. Street home,
Wilson in endeavoring to do
honor to the unidentified Ameri-
can soldier, found himself to be
the recipient of one of the most
impressive tributes in the his-
tory of the nation. From the
moment he left the capitol with
Mrs. Wilson at his side, the pro-
gress of his carriage along Penn-
sylvania Avenue was marked by
a spontaneous ovation.

"Among the distinguished
company, which included the
President of the United States
and his cabinet, General Persh-
ing and the dignitaries of nearly
a dozen nations, Wilson alone
was applauded."

Reading an account of the af-
fair one would naturally ask
why the former president was
singled out for such a spontane-
ous ovation, and especially un-
der the circumstances when he
was only filling the place of a
private citizen in the parade.

A moment's reflection easily
brings an answer to the question.
While thousands of soldiers are
filling hospital wards, and while
thousands are marked with phys-
ical defects as the result of the
World War, Mr. Wilson is an
invited and honored guest at the
side of the grave, as a result of the
sacrifice he made with two mil-
lion other Americans. All true
Americans realize this, and so
soon is the prophecy that his
name would go down as the
greatest president in American
history being fulfilled. The
thousands who cheered him in
the Armistice Day funeral pro-
cession recognized this, and
though it was not an occasion or
a time for cheering and was a
time when every head should
have been bowed in solemn sor-
row, the feeling of gratitude
pent up in every heart exerted
itself in spontaneous applause.

"I was very glad to be there,"
said Mr. Wilson, as he was as-
sisted from his carriage at his
home after the procession, "but
it was rather embarrassing to
me, because it came in a funeral
procession."

If plans recommended at a
meeting of the West Texas Base-
ball League here Monday night
are adopted, the West Texas Le-
ague will be composed of an eight
club circuit for the 1922 season,
with a limit of fourteen men,
including the manager as a
player with a salary limit of
\$1800.

The baseball meeting was held
in the Ballinger Club rooms im-
mediately following the banquet
tendered the directors of the
West Texas Chamber of Com-
merce and the directors of the
West Texas Baseball League,
Ballinger, Abilene, San Angelo,
Sweetwater, Stamford and Plain-
view were represented.

After a general discussion of
plans for the coming season, a
committee was appointed to out-
line a basis for reorganization
and make recommendations. S.
Sellers, of Abilene; Neal, of
Sweetwater; Crowther, of San
Angelo; and Nicholson, of Ballin-
ger, constituted the committee,
and after deliberating for about
an hour they made the following
brief recommendations:

"The league to be an eight
club circuit. The salary limit to
be fixed at \$1800, for fourteen
men, including the manager who
shall be a player. Not over three
men who have had higher than
Class D experience will be allow-
ed on the team. Five of the
fourteen men shall be "rookies,"
or men who have not had profes-
sional experience. \$75 daily
guarantee, with no share in the
gate receipts. Manager and
players of each club to be re-
quired to make monthly affi-
davit certifying to salary ac-
count. No clubs to be admitted
to league without being required
to purchase franchise. Each club
to deposit with the league thirty
days before the season opens,
\$1,000, as guarantee for players'
salaries. Each club to be re-
quired to deposit \$500 with the
league thirty days after the sea-
son opens as a bonus to be divid-
ed between the players of the
winners of the first and second
half. The secretary and treasur-
er shall be required to make a
\$10,000 bond, and be required to
make monthly statements show-
ing financial condition of the
league and weekly report on
players' averages. The election
of a president who resides out-
side of the home of any club in
the league."

The recommendations made
by the committee were taken up
and discussed and adopted ses-
sion by section, and these will
be submitted to the annual meet-
ing which will be held at Sweet-
water at eleven o'clock Monday,
Nov. 28th.

The president was instructed
to communicate with Amarillo,
Plainview, Lubbock, Stamford,
Brownwood, Coleman, Ranger,
Breckenridge, and offer them
baths in the league and ask
them to be present at the Sweet-
water meeting, at which time
the permanent organization will
be perfected.

Lock Hodges, of Abilene, presi-
dent of the league, presided at
the meeting here Monday night,
and about twenty-five represent-
ative citizens, composing the
president and directors of the
four clubs closing the last season,
were present at the meeting.

...ioning. "To this end we commend to the people of the entire state such an amendment of the Constitution as to set apart for the exclusive use of state institutions of higher learning a per cent of a mill tax on all the taxable property of the State, that it not only provide a sufficient fund under which the University of Texas, State Normals, A. & M. College, and all other colleges can hereafter be established in this state, adequate support, but it take them forever out of the confusion of politics.

"2nd. That we commit ourselves irrevocably to the economic proposition that West Texas should convert its feed stuff into live stock thereby securing a profit both for its feed stuff and its live stock. We commend with equal emphasis to West Texas that it convert its cotton into the finished product.

"We demand in this connection a sensible revision of the tariff system as it applies in its economic application especially to hides and wool. We commend to our representatives in the Legislature that they follow the examples of the Southern group of states that have so successfully manufactured cotton goods within the last twenty years by exempting all cotton mill towns from taxation for a period of fifteen to twenty years, as to the grounds operated and used for these cotton mills.

"3rd. We demand that our representatives in Congress shall press the passage of the Railroad Refunding Act to the end that it be speedily enacted into law; to

"4th. We desire to commend to the limit the creation of Agriculture and Live Stock Finance Corporation with headquarters in Fort Worth in order that the banks of this section may be relieved of the heavy pressure that has been imposed upon them to carry Agriculture and Live Stock thru the present season of distress and in order that farmers and stockmen may secure time loans at a low rate of interest to tide them successfully thru unprecedented conditions.

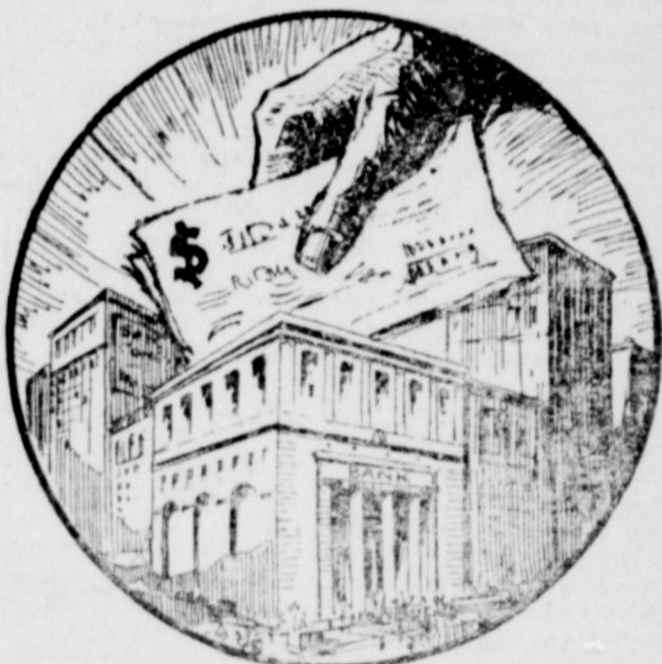

DETAIL REPORT ON DAM LATER

"It will be several days before I can give you a good report on the survey made of the Elm Creek reservoir," said Chief Engineer Holder of the federal engineering corps, who is here making the survey for the Colorado Valley Irrigation project.

"I had rather wait until I can complete the work," said Mr. Holder, and he promised to furnish us with information by the first of next week which will make the advocates of a better water system for Ballinger stand up and take notice.

When completed Chief Holder's report will show among other things, the amount of water the proposed reservoir will hold with different height dams, probably up to as high as forty-five feet. In his report Chief Holder indicated that the site of the proposed dam would prove an ideal one for storing water sufficient to supply Ballinger or a city many times the size of Ballinger for a long time, and would solve the water question.

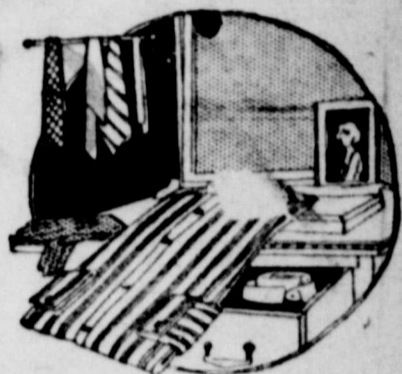

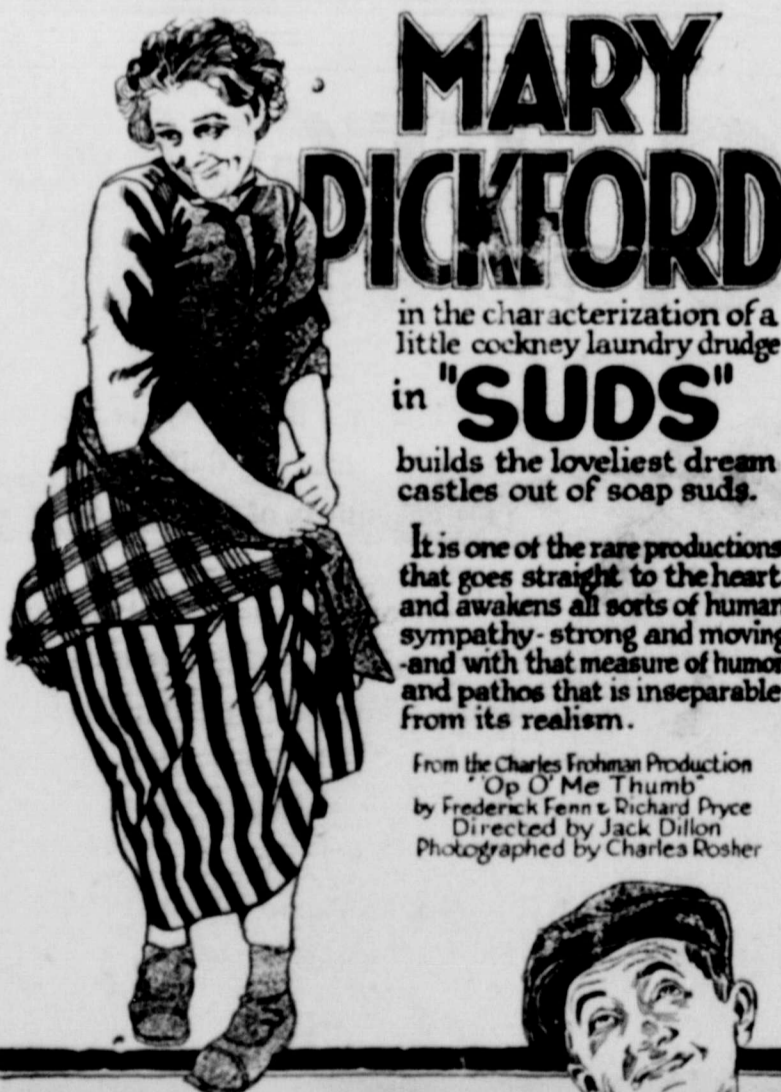
