## Notice to All <br> County Taxpayers

The Commissioner's Court de sires to call attention to the fact that at a recent session of the egislature a law was passed which proyides that where delinquent taxes are paid before January 1, 1933, no interest or penalty will be charged, regardles of the number of years they have been delinquent.
We feel that many who owe taxes do not know of this law nor bow much theg could save by paving their taxes before January 1, 1933. The following is an exsmple of the amount save ed i pad during 1932. if one in full, if paid during 1931, for 552.05. If he awed $\$ 52.05$ taxes or the year of 1930 and $\begin{aligned} & \text { d d } \\ & \text { not }\end{aligned}$ pay it before January 1, 1933 he would be compelled to pay $\$ 61.80$ or \$9.75 interest and penalty; if he owed $\$ 5205$ for the year 1828 and did not pay it before January 1, 1933 it wou'd cost him $\$ 69.82$ or 17.67 interest and penlty; If he owed $\$ 52.05$ taxes for he year 1925 and did not pay he year 1925 and 1953 not pay cost him 880.42 or 82837 inter cost him 880.42 or $\$ 28$ interest and penalty. Delinquent taxes for various years and a. mounts would inerease procortionately if not paid before January 1. 1933. Hindreds of peo. ple took the advantage of a similar law in the latter part of 1931 and paid their taxes and many are doing so now.
