HEAVIEST SNOW STORM IN YEARS RAGING

Rat Plague Hits Hungary; Cats Sell for High Prices

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Jan. 28.—Rats and mice are migrating in swarms from the Russian famine area and Budapest is overrun with them. All efforts to rid the city of the scourge has failed and the devastation caused by the rodents is becoming alarming.

So dangerous have they become that they turn and show fight when disturbed in some of the villages. Peasants have given up poultry raising for more lucrative business of cat breeding.

During the war when food was scarce, thousands of families ate cats, and the cat tribe was greatly reduced. Since then there has been an increasing demand for cat fur as a substitute for more expensive furs, and this has taken further toll from the felines, and consequently the comparatively exorbitant price of from three to four thousand kronen are being offered for a kitten by shop keepers. (Before the war and under normal times a "kronen" was equal to 27 cents.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—Wilson S. Jaynes was appointed federal prohibition agent at Tazewell, Texas, today by Commissioner Haynes.

METHODISTS TO MEET AT MEMPHIS

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Jan. 28.—Methodists from all over the South will gather here next Tuesday, Jan. 31, for what is said to be one of the largest conferences ever held by that denomination. It is expected that 500 or more leaders will be present. This number will include all of the bishops, presiding elders, and many of the pastors and prominent laymen of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

The object of this meeting is to bring together leaders of the church for the purpose of considering conditions in the missionary world in relation to the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and more particularly in relation to the Centenary of Missions movement as fostered by that denomination, through which \$37,000,000 new money was subscribed for world-wide missions and relief work. This amount, together with the \$13,000,000 coming through regular channels, set a new record, it is claimed for missionary enterprises of evangelical churches in America. On the strength of this offering, Southern Methodists opened up new mission states and enlarged work already projected in eight foreign fields and in America.

In addition to prominent churchmen of this country, there will be present at the Memphis meeting missionaries from China, Korea, Japan, Mexico, Brazil, Cuba, Africa and Europe, who will make reports for the foreign mission fields maintained by the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Home mission workers engaged in special work in cities, rural sections, mountain schools, mining and industrial centers, will give an account of their work.

Dr. W. B. Beauchamp, director general of the Centenary of Missions movement, will preside over the convention, which will continue through February 2.

GERMANY SAYS CAN'T PAY BILL

BERLIN, Jan. 28.—Germany's answer to the allied reparations commission was handed to its Berlin representative today and will be taken to Paris. The demand proposes the payment of seven hundred and twenty million gold marks and one billion four hundred and fifty million gold marks worth of goods to the allies during 1922.

The answer, suggests however, that in view of Germany's taxation burdens that the amounts asked for be lowered.

TROOPS CALLED TO QUELL STRIKE

LINCOLN, Neb., Jan. 28.—Five companies of National Guard troops, under the command of Lieut. Colonel Douglass of the 134th Nebraska Infantry, will proceed at once to Nebraska City in response to an appeal from the county sheriff, county attorney and mayor for military protection.

The trouble demanding troops is the result of alleged disorders growing out of a packing house employees strike in that city. Martial law has been declared in all the territory comprising and including the four mile precinct of Otoe county, and including Nebraska City and all its subdivisions, according to the terms of the proclamation issued by Gov. McKelvie after a conference today with the adjutant general of the state.

TWO KILLED IN AUTO ACCIDENT

PONCA CITY, Okla., Jan. 28.—James B. Ryan, of Kansas City, and Mrs. Zelma McDaniel, of Newkirk, Oklahoma, sister, were killed; and P. H. Ryan, of Hominy, Oklahoma, brother, was seriously injured, when the automobile in which they were hastening to the bedside of their sick father here, plunged from a bridge near Wyona early today.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—The states comprising the Middle Atlantic section are buried today and the section is being buried deeper as time passes, under the heaviest snowfall since the long remembered blizzard in February 1899.

The storm which began with an almost unprecedented fall of snow over a large area in the Carolinas and Virginia last Thursday, was creeping up the coast today, leaving in its wake stalled trains, disrupted trolley service and a general suspension of business and social activities.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—Washington is today cut off from the outside world insofar as transportation is concerned, by one of the heaviest snow storms in the history of the nation's capital.

Officials at the union station reported about nine o'clock that no passenger trains had left Washington since midnight last night, and that none would be started out under the perilous conditions which prevailed at this hour.

With snow continuing to fall, there is no prospect for getting trains in or out. Only three trains have arrived since midnight, two coming from New York and one from Cincinnati. The train service from the South, where snowstorms have been raging for two days, has been wholly suspended. Several Southern trains are reported stalled between Richmond and Washington and efforts are being made to get relief to the passengers.

noon and continuing today, snow has covered the capital from a foot and a half to two feet deep, drifting badly in some places and blocking the traffic. Street car service has been practically suspended.

FRENCH CHARGE U. S. DISCOURTESY

PARIS, Jan. 28.—Official notice was taken here today by the French foreign office of an article appearing in the London Morning Post, and reproduced in Parisian papers, alleging that both President Harding and Secretary of State Hughes refused to receive Ambassador Jusserand in official and political circles.

French officials were much surprised at the charges made in the article, and Premier Poincare has called on Ambassador Jusserand to clear up the report at once.

The demoralized condition of the farmers and livestock producers of America today is due to the demoralized conditions of our exchange credits.

Europe needs America's raw material today and would pay a good price for the surplus. Europe is short on gold. America holds both gold and raw material.

The recent war was a world affair, not a sectional quarrel, and the world must settle the problems. They can't be settled by any one nation.

American farmers can get together and discuss and discuss, and foreign manufacturers can get together and fret over the problems, but it is going to take a united effort to solve them.

Ex-President Wilson realized this, looked ahead and proposed a plan for stabilizing conditions, but politicians muddled the waters and sank the ship.

Mr. Wilson proposed world-wide co-operation and sacrificed his life's energies in trying to get the American people to become a part of the League of Nations.

The various conferences which have been proposed are only substitutes for the League of Nations, and all have apparently failed, because the nations of the world are not willing to accept a substitute.

Unless our economic relations with foreign countries are re-established, what the farmers and business men are now experiencing is merely a small whirlwind compared to the cyclone that is to come.

1 TEXAS COUNTY WITHOUT AUTO

AUSTIN, Jan. 28.—Texas had 461,952 motor vehicles in operation during 1921, according to the January report of the State Highway Commission. This was an increase of 31,630 over the number in 1920.

The figures of the highway commission include all registration with the commission for the year and include both passenger and commercial cars.

The counties of the state received half of the registration fees, a total of which was not announced, it was said at the commission's office. The counties containing the most automobiles and trucks were Dallas, with 33,267; Harris, 27,948; Bexar, 25,616; Tarrant, 20,678; Wichita, 12,176; McLennan, 10,884; and El Paso, 10,374.

Loving county, which had no automobiles registered during 1920, again failed to register any cars in 1921. Hoekley county had 4 registered this year, none having been registered in it last year. Andrews maintained its 1920 quota of 40 cars, during 1921.

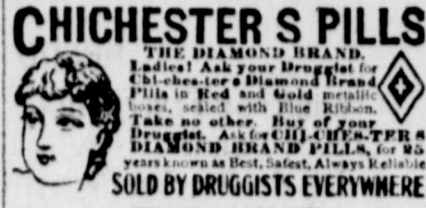

TOTAKEPICTURES OF NORTH POLE

CHRISTIANIA, Norway, Jan. 28.—Two Norwegian aviators, Lieutenant Omdal and Sergeant Odd Dahl, will accompany Roald Amundsen when he starts North again from Seattle, Washington, next May and will make a dash for the North Pole by airplane.

They will also carry a moving picture outfit and about 30,000 feet of film. Two extra men have been engaged here by Amundsen for the expedition.

Both Omdal and Dahl are expert wireless operators and expect to keep the Maud, Amundsen's ship, in touch with Spitzbergen and to receive messages from the Norwegian wireless station at Stavanger.

The two aviators will join the Maud at Seattle. The airplanes to be used in the North Pole dash will have motors of 60-horse power, accommodate two passengers and be provided with skis and wheels.

Only one machine will be used at a time and the other held in reserve. As the Maud does not offer sufficient space, a shed must be built on the ice for them.

The Norwegian army and navy have presented to the explorers the arms and munitions they may need and 60 boxes of specially selected provisions, tested by Professor Torup of the physiological laboratory of the University of Christiania, will be sent to Seattle for their use.

A WORD ABOUT INCOME TAX

Federal taxes are here to stay. When all bills are paid for the war, we shall have paid 55 billion dollars and it will take 55 years to pay for it, if we can raise 4 billion each year. It takes 3 billion to run the government and the other one billion to apply on the war debt.

Here are a few of the new rulings and exemptions:

Single man (or woman) gets \$1,000 exemption, same as last year. Married man (or woman) gets \$2,500 instead of \$2,000 as last year. For each dependent or child, you are entitled to \$400. Last year only \$200. If the net income is over \$5,000 then only \$2,000 can be claimed as an exemption.

It must be remembered that if you have made \$2,000 or more, if married, you must file a return. However, your claim of exemption will be \$2,500. If you or your business has a gross income of \$5,000 that is you have taken in over \$5,000, but have paid all of it out and have nothing to show for it, you must file a return. These new rulings make nearly all business firms and most every individual prepare and file a return.

CORN COBS MAY BE VALUABLE

RACINE, Wis., Jan. 28.—The common corn cob which heretofore has been a waste product on the farm may come to be considered a valuable article of commerce as a result of experiments just conducted by Professors E. B. Fred and W. H. Peterson of the University of Wisconsin and reported to the Wisconsin Agriculturist. Corn cobs, it was discovered, are rich in acetic and lactic acids, both of which are used extensively in the industries.

When the corn cobs are partially water soaked and inoculated with bacteria lactobacillus pentacetius, equal quantities of acetic and lactic acid are produced. If the yields on a commercial scale are equal to the laboratory results, every ton of corn cobs will yield more than 300 pounds of acetic and 320 pounds of lactic acid.

There are produced in the United States alone more than 20,000,000 tons of corn cobs yearly. A small amount of these are used for pipes or in feed, but the great bulk usually is discarded.

Acetic acid is used largely in the dye industry and lactic acid is extensively used in the leather industry. Both also are used in many technical operations in various other industries.
