Drilling Through Bridge Following Shot in Well

The bridge-over resulting from shooting the Russell oil well No. 4 Sunday night is being cleaned out today, and the effects of the explosive in testing out the strength of the well at the 1812 foot mark will not be known until the bridge has been drilled through.

The nitro was touched off at ten o'clock Sunday night. It was reported early in the day that the well would be shot at two o'clock Sunday afternoon, and many people motored out to see the work well done. It required longer to pull the casing than was anticipated and most of the crowd left before night, while others remained until the charge of nitro-glycerine had done its work.

A dull thud, a lightning flash, followed by smoke emitting from the hole, and it was announced

that the well had bridged over and it would be necessary to clean out before it was determined whether an increased oil production would result.

COLORADO WELL BRIDGES OVER

SWEETWATER, Mar. 6.—Morrison No. 2 of the Underwriters Producing & Refining Company in Mitchell county, 42 miles West of here, was shot at 6:30 o'clock Friday evening. One hundred and ten quarts of nitro-glycerine were used and there was a satisfactory response.

Oil shot several feet above the derrick and flowed 100 barrels an hour until midnight when the hole bridged. The bridge was being drilled out Saturday.

Later reports emanating from Colorado that the well had blown out the bridge and was flowing again proved groundless.

City Records are Destroyed

300 HOBOES FROM TEXAS TAKE CITY

NEW ORLEANS, Mar. 6.—A train load of tramps arrived here last night from points in Texas and are guests of the city of New Orleans today. A single freight train arriving in the city brought three hundred "Weary Willies." They traveled about forty in a car, and alighted from the train all the way from the city limits to the railroad yards, according to the train crew.

The freight train, consisting principally of empty cars, running as a through freight from Texas, brought what is declared to be the largest cargo of hobos ever hauled by one train. The train crew could not force the men to leave the train and permitted them to make the journey through to New Orleans.

Jail sentences and hard work on Texas roads as penalties for vagrancy caused the general exodus from Texas, and increasing in numbers as the journey was made to the East, the wholesale emigration resulted. It is believed that many of the tramps came from the Texas oil fields, where the officers have been on the alert recently, and where there is said to be an oversupply of hands.

The police department informed the tramps that their stay in this city would be brief.

MILES, Tex., Mar. 6.—The Miles National Bank building, housing the bank and the McKee & Lott dry goods and grocery store, was destroyed by fire at four o'clock this morning, causing a loss estimated at \$30,000.

The fire is believed to have originated in the dry goods and grocery store and spread to that part of the building occupied by the bank before it was discovered. The bank owned the building, and the firm of McKee & Lott was occupying the rear portion of the building, which was separated by a rock wall.

The bank building and fixtures were listed at \$20,000 in the last statement made by the bank, and insurance in the amount of \$13,500 was carried by the bank on the building and fixtures.

McKee & Lott carried \$4,500 insurance.

McKee & Lott's loss was complete, nothing being saved from the fire. The front of the bank building remained intact and part of the sidewalk can probably be used in reconstruction. The fixtures were damaged by smoke and water. The vault remained undamaged and no loss resulted on securities, books, etc.

The second floor of the bank building was occupied by Dr. C. W. Herndon, Judge W. D. Jennings, A. H. Lewin insurance office and the city offices. All was complete loss with no insurance, except a small amount carried by Dr. Herndon. Judge Jennings lost his library, office fixtures, etc., and the city suffered a loss of all its records, fixtures, etc., and had no insurance.

The Miles National Bank suspended business on Feb. 1st, and has been in the hands of a bank examiner since that time. A move was on foot and good progress was being made towards reorganizing the bank. The destruction of the building will probably cause a delay in re-opening the bank.

BARN BURNS AT OLFEN

A large barn on the F. G. Hoel-seher farm near Olfen, ten miles South of Ballinger, was destroyed by fire about six o'clock Monday morning. It was not known how the barn caught fire, the building being enveloped in flames before the fire was discovered. No livestock was burned, but a quantity of feed and other goods stored in the barn were destroyed, and the loss amounts to considerable. The loss was partly covered by insurance.

HEALTH WEEK PROGRAM HERE

AUSTIN, March 6.—This week having been proclaimed "health week," Gov. Neff, Dr. Florence and the state health department today called upon the people of Texas to observe the week and do everything possible to help rid Texas of contagious diseases and sickness.

This is "health week" in Texas, and every progressive city and community will be on the job looking after the welfare of the public in matters sanitary, and carrying on a campaign of education for better health.

The week is to be observed by a general clean-up campaign, war on insects, rodents and disease carriers. Pure food is to be stressed in the home and boarding houses. Schools, churches, clubs and municipal organizations have been requested to take a hand in the campaign, and in Ballinger the Civic League has charge of the movement.

Display cards have been posted in conspicuous places over the city, and these will be followed up throughout the week with personal visits by health authorities, and inspection committees, and if you do not clean your premises of all disease breeding places, the committee will bring some pressure to bear to get you to do so.

Ballinger cannot afford to lag in this important work. A clean up campaign now will give the city a clean start for the summer months, and create pride among the home owners which will carry the city through a healthy season.

The following program has been recommended by the state health department, which stands ready to lend every aid possible in making the health week a great and inimicable to deadly diseases:

- Monday, March 6th—Health Appraisal Day.
- Tuesday, March 7th—Clean-up Day.
- Wednesday, March 8th—Day of War on Insects, Rodents and Disease Carriers.
- Thursday, March 9th—School Health Day.
- Friday, March 10th—Pure Food Day.
- Saturday, March 11th—Education and Child Welfare Day.

HOTEL BUILDING ALSO A CHURCH

NEW YORK, Mar. 6.—A seventeen story building for a combination church and hotel will be New York's latest novelty building, according to reports of architects who are making the plans. The structure will provide Sunday school space in the basement, while the first three floors will be occupied by a church and missionary school. The roof and the rest of the building will be used as hotel and guest rooms.

PRIEST SAYS PRO-GERMAN CAUSED ACT

AMARILLO, Mar. 6.—G. Keller, Catholic priest of Slaton, who was taken from his home to a spot North of Slaton last Saturday night and severely beaten and then tarred and feathered, and told to leave town, is in Amarillo today.

When called on here by newspaper reporters, Father Keller authorized the statement that the Slaton incident was the climax growing out of sentiment created against him following pro-German charges made against him during the war.

He was denied final citizenship papers by the federal court here last June, on the grounds that he registered as a German subject after taking out his first naturalization papers.

Keller is not a naturalized citizen of the United States, he said today, stating that the court ruled that to become such now he would have to make reapplication for his first papers, since he registered as a German subject, and go through the entire proceedings again, which he stated that he had not had sufficient time to do since the court's ruling.

TREATY MAY EFFECT OTHER AGREEMENTS

WASHINGTON, March 6.—The Senate today adopted a resolution asking President Harding to inform the Senate what effect the ratification of the four power Pacific treaty would have on the Lansing-Ishihara agreement between the United States and Japan.

RATE CASE DISMISSED; COURT UPHOLDS I. C. C.

WASHINGTON, March 6.—The Supreme Court today dismissed the case brought by the State of Texas challenging the constitutionality of the Interstate Commerce Commission's control over state rates and other features of the transportation act in 1920, including the legality of the Railroad Labor Board.

DIRECTORS TO MEET 5 O'CLOCK TUESDAY

The meeting of the Board of Directors of the Young Men's Business League for this week will be held at 5:00 p. m. Tuesday in the league offices.

Capt. Wright Armstrong, Divisional Inspector of the 36th Division, will meet with the board and explain the proposition of securing a National Guard company for Ballinger.

G. P. Teague, of the Ballinger Electric Co., is also on the program for a short talk on the radio-phonograph, and the possibilities of its use. A radio-phonograph station is to be installed in Ballinger at an early date, and arrangements made for the Y. M. B. L. to secure and post market and stock reports, etc.

WELFARE CLUB IN CONFERENCE AT UNIVERSITY

AUSTIN, Mar. 6.—A conference of citizenship, education and home welfare opened at the University of Texas today. The conference will continue until Friday night. It was called by the university at the request of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, the Texas Congress of Mothers, Parent-Teachers Association and the Texas League of Women Voters. Many questions of vital interest to the welfare of the causes for which all the organizations named are working will be discussed during the week.

CUT RATE FOR OIL PRODUCTS

WASHINGTON, March 6.—A reduction in freight rates on petroleum and petroleum products from Burk Burnett and Ranger oil fields in Texas to points in the Mississippi valley and the mid-continent areas, was ordered today by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The commission refused to grant the claims of the oil producers for identical rates out of two other oil fields, and left the general structure showing that the Ranger rates were slightly above the Burk Burnett rates.

BAD MONEY IN CIRCULATION HERE

In the course of making change in transacting business Monday, Troy Simpson got hold of a bad half dollar. The coin was of the new half dollar coinage and was a perfect counterfeit, and could only be detected by the material from which it was minted. The worthless piece of money had no doubt passed through many hands since put in circulation by the counterfeiter. There may be other bad half dollars in circulation here, and you should be sure you are getting real money when accepting a half dollar.

The Newark library is pretty well known among librarians about the country, but the sort of work it does is not imitated as generally as it might well be.
