TRAFFIC COP MAKES BIG HAUL

The arrest here Thursday of Jack Gordon, charged with auto theft, was only a link in a chain of circumstances which uncovered the largest gang of organized thieves ever known in the state.

A traffic detective left Thursday afternoon for Belton with Gordon, also taking one of the cars recovered here and which will be returned to its owner in Temple. Complaints will be filed, it is alleged, against Gordon and his associates in a dozen or more Texas cities, including Brownwood, Belton, Cleburne, Corsicana, Waco, Brady, San Saba and Abilene. No complaint filed, it is alleged, against Gordon here, but charges of disposing of stolen property will be filed later it was stated by the officers.

The arrest of Rex Lewis at Belton, and the alleged confession of Lewis, disclosed the wholesale stealing and selling of autos. Lewis was trailed to Temple, from Waco and when arrested he weakened and gave the whole plan away. It was first reported that the headquarters of the gang was in Fort Worth, when the headquarters garage is maintained at Waco, where the stolen cars were carried from points over the state, prepared for sale by changing numbers, removing other marks of identification and then driven out to distant points and sold.

Of the fourteen cars sold in this county by Lewis and Gordon, according to Lewis' confession, seven have been recovered, and three returned to their owners. Sheriff Flynt is holding the others pending identification, and it is expected that other stolen cars will be brought in by the victims of the alleged thieves as soon as they learn that they purchased stolen cars.

Most of the cars sold here were Fords, including Ford sedans, coupes, roadsters and touring cars, and some of the machines were practically new, having been driven only a few days and in some cases were sold for about half price.

In his confession it is alleged Lewis gave the names of about twenty men, and the officers are rounding up the men and making arrests. At first the officers were inclined to discredit Lewis' confession, but the story of his transactions in Russell county and his connection with Gordon tallied out perfectly when the officers got on the case here and arrested Gordon. Lewis is alleged to have told the officers that certain cars would be found in the possession of certain men at Rowena, and they were found just as he directed. He stated that Gordon was a member of the gang, and made headquarters at Brady, being assigned this territory in the sale of stolen cars. Gordon's dealings were linked up just as Lewis related.

Lewis is said to have prominent family connections, being closely related to prominent citizens residing in West Texas, and he had been dealing in San Angelo and other places for the past several years.

No estimate of the number of cars handled by the gang has been made but the sale of at least fourteen of the cars in this county indicates that the gang did a thriving business. Cars sold here showed that they were registered in San Saba, Brady, and other places by Gordon and Lewis as new cars, and the proper transfer was made by them when a sale was made here.

The purchasers of the cars have no recourse further than the prosecution of the men charged with the thefts, or recovery of the purchase price from the men, which is hardly probable, and the owners of the cars can get them when identification is made and proof established.

The heaviest losses in the county perhaps are Joe Sidell and Ed Kubella, of Rowena, who it is claimed purchased several of the cars and resold them. Parties buying cars from Sidell and Kubella will probably hold

SNOW STORM IN N. TEXAS PASSES

AMARILLO, Mar. 10.—Following one of the most severe snow storms in recent years which yesterday and last night swept the entire Panhandle of Texas, Eastern New Mexico and Western Oklahoma, this section is "digging out" today.

The snowfall ranged from four to seven inches with deep drifts in different parts of the territory. The temperature varied from twenty to twenty-five above zero, the lowest points registered last night.

This morning found the storm passing with clear weather and rising temperature and the snow melting rapidly. High winds accompanied the snow and deep drifts interfered with traffic, but in the city men are employed to clear the streets.

It was at first reported that the livestock loss would be appalling, but later reports state that the loss will not amount to much due to the short duration of the storm and generally high temperature which is unusual with such heavy snow.

SICKNESS STOPS OPERATIONS AT RUSSELL WELL

It was announced Friday morning that operations at the Russell well had been temporarily suspended on account of the illness of a son of Contractor Soles. Mr. Soles has been in charge of the drilling. He left Friday morning for Abilene where he caught the Sunshine Special en route to Indiana, in response to a message that his son was seriously ill. E. A. Giesecke carried him to Abilene.

Bill Soles, another son, who has been here with his father, and H. Giesecke, will go to San Antonio, where they will be for several days, and work at the well is at a standstill.

No further developments are expected at present, and it will be ten days or two weeks before it is definitely known whether the new well will prove a paying producer or not, no test having been made of the well.

MOTOR CROOK MUST GO TO PEN

NEW ORLEANS, March 10.—The United States Circuit Court of Appeals today affirmed the conviction and sentence of William Livezey, former president of the Little Motor Kar Company, who was convicted in February, 1921, at Dallas, on charge of using the mails to defraud and sentenced to five years in Leavenworth prison.

They are responsible for the purchase price, and Sidell and Kubella will have to look to the men from whom they received the cars.

DAYS OF 1919 RECALLED HERE

The dust storm which swept this country Thursday was the worst experienced here since February, 1919, when day was turned into darkness by a dust storm which broke all records for the weather history of West Texas.

The dust storm Thursday of this week was a continuation of a strong wind from the West which swept dust through the air Wednesday, the wind increasing in velocity throughout the day Thursday. Minor damage was reported, but nothing serious resulted from the storm.

The storm recalled the dust storms of 1918 and 1919, and led to some discussion as to the date of the former bad dust storms. Some contended that the worst dust storm ever known here came in 1918, while others fixed the date as of 1919, and a few even declared it was in 1917.

By referring to The Ledger files it was disclosed that both 1918 and 1919 suffered severe dust storms. In April 1918, a dark duster came up late in the afternoon just as the ladies who were doing war work were leaving the Carnegie Library for their homes, but the severest dust storm ever known here and the one which turned day into night occurred on the 21st day of February, 1919, when a wind from the West which sprang up early during the day, increased in velocity until three o'clock when it became as dark as night, the power was cut off, school dismissed, business suspended and considerable excitement prevailed.

We give the above just to keep the record straight about dust storms as the chances are we will experience more thrills along this line before March passes out like a lamb.

BIG DEVELOPMENT IN RADIO PHONES

WASHINGTON, March 9.—Allocation of twenty-wave lengths among the various classes of wireless telephony senders and government control in the establishment of all commercial wireless transmitting telephone stations was recommended by the three committees of the government radio conference, and made public today.

Other recommendations are that wave lengths below 5,000 meters should in a general way be reserved for radio telephone service, but that those wave lengths which become fixed in service for telegraph service within the range of such S. O. S. signals shall be retained.

The committee's report expressed the hope and expectation that the radio telephone may ultimately keep the whole range from zero to 6,000 meters.

The recommendations do not provide for government control of the receiving stations, which Secretary Hoover said had increased into hundreds of thousands within the last few months.

Amateur transmitting stations, under the committee's proposal would be given exclusive use of wave lengths of one hundred and fifty to two hundred meters and share with technical and training schools wave lengths of 200 to 275 meters.

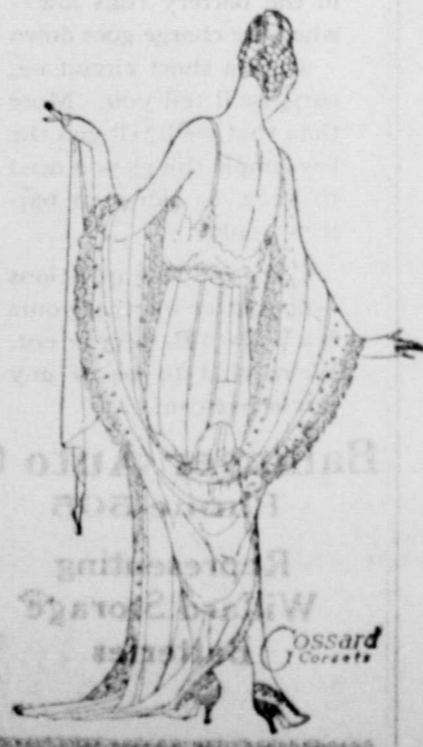

CHICAGO, Mar. 10.—Cyril Woodward-Club Ely Armstrong, a self-made Chicago lawyer, whose struggle for a living has been only moderately successful, was today informed that he was today informed that he was the sole heir to an English earldom. The news had little effect on him, and he calmly informed newspaper reporters who called for an interview, that he already possessed the greatest title in the world—that of an American citizen, and that he desired no other title, although it did carry with it much wealth.

MORE ABOUT NATL. GUARD

Clint Penn has been appointed as Captain, and N. J. Wardlaw as 2nd Lieutenant of the Headquarters of the 142 Infantry, 36th Infantry, 36th Division, which unit of the National Guard is being organized here by Captain Wright Armstrong, Division Inspector for the 36th Division.

The duties of this company in maneuvers will be to establish and maintain lines of communication between battalion and regimental headquarters.

The company will consist of one captain, one second lieutenant, three sergeants, five corporals, fifteen privates first-class, and forty-two privates.

The pay will be the base pay of a regular army officer, non-com or private for the period devoted to drills, conferences, or rifle range practice.

The U. S. government will equip the company and each individual member with full army equipment, and will also provide two horses, and pay one man \$125.00 a month for their care.

For the two weeks encampment, Pullmans will be provided to transport the company to the point of mobilization, and the men will receive 17 days full pay for this service.

A new feature of the Guard is that it is controlled by the Secretary of War, and cannot be called out by the governor alone, as was recently done to quell disorder in Mexico.

Enlistment will soon start, and it is expected from the number and character of applications already received that the company will be an unusually strong one.

In securing the establishment of this company in Ballinger local boosters are putting one over on San Angelo, who was also trying to secure the company for that city. It is now up to local

enthusiasts to fill the company to enlistment strength if Ballinger is to retain this valuable asset.

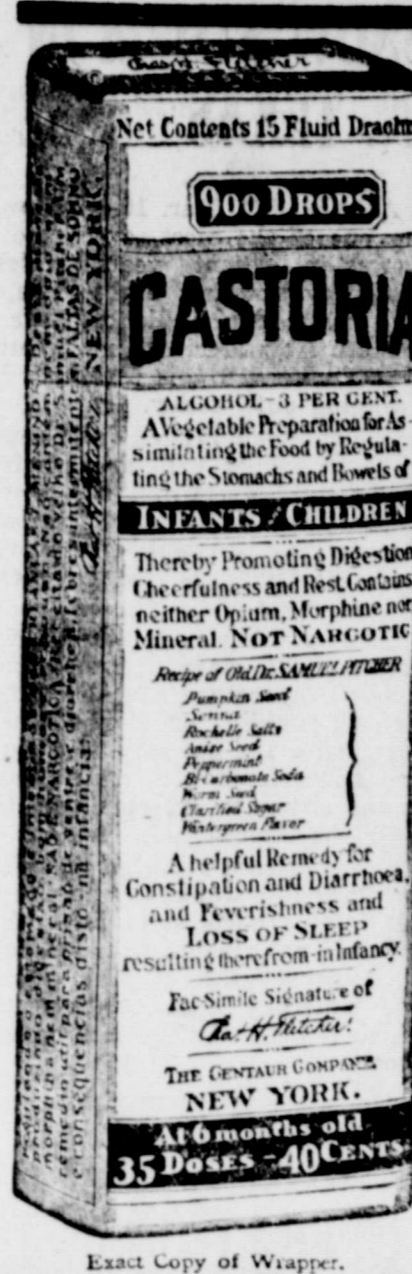

Zimmermann; and the minor defendants Lorena Ash and Virgil Ash, duly served in person with citation in accordance with law, appeared by their guardian ad litem and attorney, Chas. Barrow, a licensed practicing attorney of Austin, Texas, heretofore appointed by this Court to represent said minor defendants, there being no guardian of the estate of said minor defendants. The defendants Etta Marks and J. N. Marks, husband of said Etta Marks, joined herein pro forma, having been duly served in person with citation in accordance with law and having failed to appear, judgment is here rendered against said defendants, Etta Marks and husband, J. N. Marks, by default. Said W. F. Gunn having in open court announced that he had transferred and assigned to plaintiffs, Mary Eliza Brown and J. M. Harrell all his interest in the notes of L. P. RADIO PHONE FOR COTTON FIRM

Nicholson & Baker have placed an order for the installation of a radio phone station in their offices over the Ballinger Loan Company building, and radio messages will be received here as soon as the station can be installed.

R. A. Nicholson stated Friday morning that the services to be furnished by this station would include receiving of market reports, speeches, sermons, musical programs, baseball games and other announcements and reports which might be broadcasted from broadcasting stations located from points in Canada to California.

The service is primarily for receiving market reports," said Mr. Nicholson, "but we will get everything going thru the air, and give it to our friends free. We will entertain with sermons broadcasted from cities, and receive important reports broadcasted from the sending stations throughout the country."

Many stations in the larger cities are broadcasting news daily and nightly by the radio system, the largest broadcasting station in Texas at present being located at College Station, and another very large one at Dallas. Reports can be picked up here from Washington, San Francisco and Canadian points, and it will be rather a novel thing to stand off with your hands in your pocket in Ballinger and hear President Harding delivering an address at Washington, or hear the broadcaster at the Polo Grounds in New York giving a baseball game between New York Yanks and Cleveland Indians play by play.

And for Sunday night's program the receiver can be tuned up for catching George Truett, or some other noted divine's voice, and those who are not satisfied with the sermons of the local preachers can turn out and listen to the religious radio waves.

With the announcement made a day or two ago by G. P. Teague that he would install a radio-phone receiving station, this gives Ballinger two stations, and in a short time many homes will doubtless be equipped with sets. It all goes to show that Ballinger is keeping pace with the progress of the world, even if we are in a country where dust storms sometimes take the place of spring rains.
