Zimmermann; and the minor defendants Lorena Ash and Virgil Ash, duly served in person with citation in accordance with law, appeared by their guardian ad litem and attorney, Chas. Barrow, a licensed practicing attorney of Austin, Texas, heretofore appointed by this Court to represent said minor defendants, there being no guardian of the estate of said minor defendants. The defendants Etta Marks and J. N. Marks, husband of said Etta Marks, joined herein pro forma, having been duly served in person with citation in accordance with law and having failed to appear, judgment is here rendered against said defendants, Etta Marks and husband, J. N. Marks, by default. Said W. F. Gunn having in open court announced that he had transferred and assigned to plaintiffs, Mary Eliza Brown and J. M. Harrell all his interest in the notes of L. P. Ash upon which this cause of action is based and that he is no longer interested in the subject matter of this suit, and said W. F. Gunn having in open court requested that he be dismissed from this suit and that judgment be rendered in favor of plaintiffs Mary Eliza Brown and J. M. Harrell, in accordance with plaintiff's Original Petition herein, it is ordered and decreed by this Court that said W. F. Gunn be dismissed from this suit. The demurrers filed by the guardian ad litem and attorney for said minor defendants Lorena Ash and Virgil Ash, being by the court overruled and it appearing that the cause of action of plaintiffs Mary Eliza Brown and J. M. Harrell is proved by six certain promissory notes in writing, dated January 10, 1917, signed by L. P. Ash, payable to the order of W. F. Gunn, being Note Number One (1) for the principal sum of Five Hundred and No-100 (\$500.00) Dollars, due two years after date; Note Number Two (2), for the principal sum of Six Hundred and No-100 (\$600.00) Dollars, due four years after date; Note Number Three (3) for the principal sum of Seven Hundred and No-100 (\$700.00) Dollars, due six years after date; Note Number Four (4) for the principal sum of Eight Hundred and No-100 (\$800.00) Dollars, due eight years after date; Note Number Five (5) for the principal sum of One Thousand and No-100 (\$1,000.00) Dollars, due ten years after date; and Note Number Six (6) for the principal sum of Twelve Hundred and No-100 (\$1,200.00) Dollars, due twelve years after date; all bearing interest from date at the rate of eight (8) per centum per annum, said interest payable annually on January tenth, said notes providing that all past due interest and principal shall bear interest from maturity thereof until paid at the rate of ten per centum per annum and that failure to pay any installment of interest thereon when due, shall at the option of the holder thereof mature said notes; and it appearing to the Court from the evidence that, as alleged in plaintiff's petition payment of said notes is secured by a valid and subsisting Vendor's Lien retained in said notes and in deed of conveyance granted by said W. OWNER CLAIMS STOLEN CAR

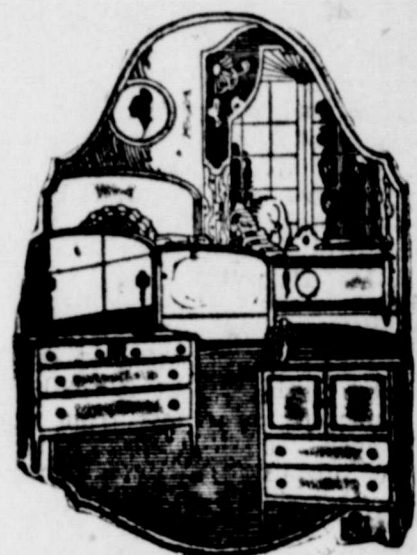
