FINDS BODY IN CHANNEL; TWO HELD

WAXAHACHIE, May 18.—The alleged confession of the slaying of W. R. Simms, whose body was found in a ship channel near Goose Creek last Saturday, has been obtained from Mrs. Laura Simms, wife of the dead man; and Earl Beavers, her brother-in-law, according to Sheriff Bindford. In her confession Mrs. Simms declared that killing was the outgrowth of alleged cruelty to her, the officers said.

SUPPLIES COMING FOR GUARDSMEN

Capt. C. B. Penn, of the Headquarters Company, 142nd Infantry, Texas National Guard, received a bill of lading Thursday for several thousand dollars worth of equipment for his company. The supplies were shipped from Camp Mabry on May 15th, and should be here within a few days.

The equipment allotted to the local company includes uniforms (four for each member), rifles, tents, cots, overcoats and in fact a regular army outfit, and the boys will be stationed in their armory next door to the Brewer Jewelry Co.

The local company has been drilling once each week since the company was mustered in about a month ago, and it will not be long before it will be in shape to pass the reviewing stand.

SIX MISSING IN BRIDGE COLLAPSE

MARLIN, Tex., May 18.—A detachment of army engineers were expected here today to construct a pontoon bridge across the Brazos to temporarily replace the bridge which collapsed under pressure of the flood Tuesday afternoon.

The dead and missing list was increased to six today by the finding of the bodies of two negroes, who are believed to have been on the bridge when it collapsed. Other bodies may be found as the waters recede. Mayor Stallworth, Dr. W. S. Allen, and the seven year old son of Clayton Briggs, are still missing, and a search for the bodies continues. They are not expected to be found alive.

CONFESSES TO POLICE MURDER

CHICAGO, May 18.—The police today made public a confession said by them to have been obtained from John Miller, alleged driver of the car from which the shots were fired killing two policemen in the so-called labor war. There were two men with Miller in the car, according to the confession, and their names were given as Chas. Daudzauskis and Floater Stanley. A search for the two men has been started.

Echoes from Four Great Annual Church Meetings

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., May 18.—Women were admitted to membership on the executive committee and various boards of the Southern Baptist convention here today.

DES MOINES, Ia., May 18.—The 134th General Assembly of the United States convened here for an eight day session, at which a score of reports touching on all phases of Presbyterian activities will be presented. Chief interest in Presbyterian circles center on the report of a special committee of reorganization and consolidation of boards, considered by some the most important subject to come before the assembly.

Reports also will be presented on the World League on International Friendship Thru the Churches; the Federal Council of Churches; church co-operation and union; work in Europe; the every member plan; American Bible Society; evangelism; the Alliance of Reformed Churches Throughout the World; the General Council of Presbyterian and Reformed Churches in America; men's work; chaplains in the army and navy; Christian life and work; Interchurch and New Era debts; vacancy and supply; the Presbyterian Magazine; the Digest; education; theological seminaries and boards of home missions for freemen and for church erection.

HOT SPRINGS, Ark., May 18.—Texas was brought into the limelight at the Central Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South here this week by the election of two Texans as bishops; Dr. Sam R. Hay, of Houston; and Dr. H. A. Boaz, of Dallas.

One of the big questions being discussed in the conference is the question of a union of the Methodist Episcopal Church and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Many of the leaders in the two churches declare that the time has come when the two branches of the Methodist church in the United States should be reunited.

Dr. David G. Downey, of New York city, one of the leading spirits in attendance at the conference, and who is book editor for the church representing 4,500,000 members of the old denomination, has gone on record as endorsing the move for the union.

NON-AGGRESSION PACT IS ADOPTED

GENOA, May 18.—A non-aggression pact was adopted unanimously at the plenary meeting of the political sub-commission of the economic conference this afternoon. The pact was not signed, but was adopted in the form of a resolution, each state pledging to respect it.

COAL MINERS TALK TROUBLE

MUSKOGEE, Okla., May 18.—With the bars down for a general discussion of the dissensions with the coal miners union, delegates to the special convention of District No. 21, United Mine Workers, opened their fourth session here today to hear further argument for and against the international organization.

President Farrington, of the Illinois miners, yesterday flayed International President Lewis, declaring that he had done more than any other one man to destroy the United Mine Workers of America.

WASHINGTON, May 18.—Secretary Hoover obtained today the approval of the leading operators in the non-union bituminous coal fields of the government plan for getting the coal industry by voluntary action to put a stop on the increased coal prices during the period of the strike.

ELOPERS HELD FOR BIGAMY

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., May 18.—Jack Coseby is being held here on a charge of concealing and criminal conspiracy in connection with the disappearance of Miss Opal Rex Roat, of Ardmore, Oklahoma, heiress, who disappeared last week. The man today waived extradition and he will be taken back to Ardmore by a deputy sheriff.

U. T. Rex Roat, father of the girl, is awaiting advices from Houston, Texas, where the eloping couple were reported to have been arrested last night.

John A. Weeks went to Dallas, where he will be for several days on business.

MEET TO PLAN STEEL MERGER

WASHINGTON, May 18.—Attorney General Daugherty today invited representatives of the eight steel companies named in the Senate resolution directing an inquiry into the proposed merger of independent companies, to meet him next Saturday to discuss plans for the proposed merger.

COUNTRY DOGS ALSO IN DANGER

Whether a country dog has a right to loaf in the city is a question which perhaps will come up for settlement as the dog law is enforced.

Chief of Police B. W. Pileher, who is also official dog executioner, shot a dog belonging to a farmer on the streets Wednesday. The dog killer says the dog was not legally tagged, and that he had no way of telling whether he was a city dog or a country dog. The officer has instructions to kill all dogs caught "loafing" in the city without a 1922 dog tag attached to his collar.

To be on the safe side farmers who let their dogs follow them to town should tie the dogs when they reach the city, or keep the dogs with them. The dog killer says that he does not want to kill an "innocent" dog.

ROWENA COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES TONIGHT

Rev. Jesse Mitchell will deliver the commencement address for the Rowena High School tonight. It was at first announced that the commencement exercises would be held Friday night, but the date was changed to Thursday night, and quite a number will go out from Ballinger to attend the closing exercises of the Rowena public school.

TRAIN GOES OFF BRIDGE; TWO KILLED

ARDMORE, Okla., May 18.—Two men were killed and another probably fatally injured when a Frisco freight train plunged thru a bridge over Boggy River, near Sopher, at midnight last night, according to word received here.

Five cars and the engine dropped off the embankment, killing Harvey McDaniel, brakeman; J. F. Hume, engineer; both of Hugo, Oklahoma.

LOCAL FANS GETTING BUSY

An enthusiastic bunch of baseball fans started the ball to rolling at a mass meeting held at the Maeroy Theatre Wednesday afternoon. The fans were in session less than thirty minutes, but it was business from start to finish, and the baseball proposition put over in double-quick time.

The crowd was of one mind, and that was to play ball. The question of perfecting the organization took form rapidly when officers and directors for the proposed club were elected.

C. S. Guin called the meeting to order and briefly stated its object and told what other towns in the proposed circuit had done, and called for action. R. L. Harvell was immediately elected president of the club; H. C. Gardner, vice-president; James Skinner, secretary-treasurer; R. E. George and E. P. Talbott, with the officers, constituting the board of directors.

A motion was made and rapidly put through creating a committee to work out financial plans. W. A. Francis was made chairman of the committee, and H. C. Gardner, Lefroy Nicholson, E. Shepperd, Elmer Talbott and Troy Simpson named as the committee.

It is the purpose of the local club to get the funds in hand at once with which to build a baseball park, and organize a team. It was pointed out that Ballinger needed a good baseball park regardless of whether the proposed league was organized or not.

It is the opinion of those who have the work in hand that at least four of the proposed towns, Brady, Ballinger, Coleman and Winters, will play ball. Brownwood has the college team problem to contend with, it being declared that if the Brownwood college players came in the league they would be outlawed as college players, and for that reason it is possible that Brownwood will not come in. Comanche would make up the sixth town, if Brownwood should come in.

The proposed plan calls for a season of seventy games, which would give each team thirty-five at home and thirty-five away from home. The local club will get all the gate receipts when at home and the visiting club receive a flat \$35 per day for expenses when on the road.

On this basis it is the opinion of the fans that the games will be self sustaining, the receipts being sufficient to defray all expenses, pay salaries, etc., after the park has been provided and a team put in the field. It is a foregone conclusion that Ballinger will experience no trouble in financing the start.

As soon as the local club has been financed and work commenced on the park, the other towns will be called together to perfect plans for the league in detail and a schedule adopted.

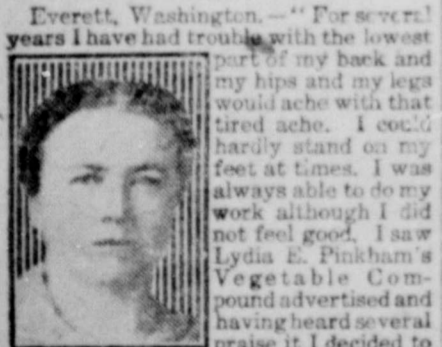

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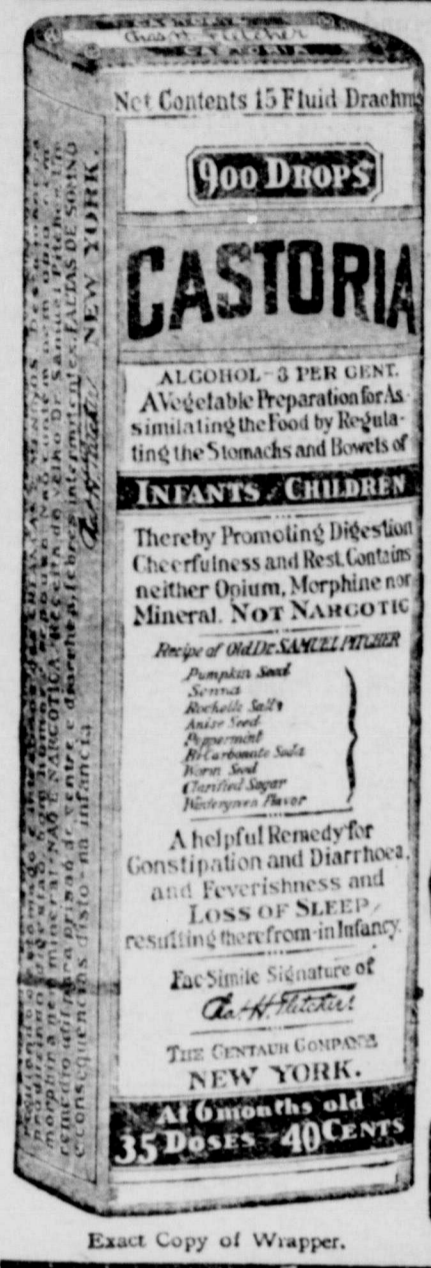
