FORMER CITIZEN ELECTED TRUSTEE OF UNIVERSITY

CHICAGO, June 17.—Melvin A. Traylor, President of the First Trust & Savings Bank of Chicago, was elected a trustee in the Northwestern University today. Mr. Traylor was admitted to the bar while a city clerk at Hillsboro, Texas, and began his banking career at Ballinger, Texas.

Mr. A. Traylor is known to nearly every citizen of Ballinger, and they have watched his rapid climb in the commercial world with a great deal of interest. He came to Ballinger in January 1908, and was first associated with the Citizens National Bank as cashier. In August 1909, the Citizens National and the First National banks consolidated and Mr. Traylor remained with the new bank until in April 1911, when he tendered his resignation to the regret of all Ballinger. At the time he tendered this resignation he was president of the First National Bank.

Mr. Traylor went from Ballinger to the Stock Yards National Bank of East St. Louis, remaining there only a short time and going to the Live Stock Exchange National Bank of Chicago. Not long ago he accepted the presidency of the First Trust & Savings Bank of Chicago, and has been in that capacity since holding the office of vice-president in the First National Bank of Chicago, and serving on the board of directors of the last named institution.

C. A. Orbeck, formerly with the Ballinger State Bank & Trust Company, passed thru Ballinger Friday. Mr. Orbeck is making his home at Clifton, and was on his way to San Angelo, accompanied by Emile Lee. They were making the trip thru the country in a car.

MANY ATTEND BAND CONCERT

The boys played the big crowd with their concert and every number drew good applause. The program was well arranged and the instrumentation of the band balanced in a way that gave harmony.

The young men arrived in Ballinger by truck at 5:00 o'clock Friday afternoon and were met by a committee from the Y. M. B. L. and distributed to various homes in town, where they received entertainment while here. They came to Ballinger from Miles, where they played a concert Friday afternoon. About twenty-five made up the party and while here they made many friends and went away from Ballinger leaving a feeling that a finer aggregation of young men never visited here and the citizenship hopes to see them return soon.

MALE QUARTET HERE TONIGHT

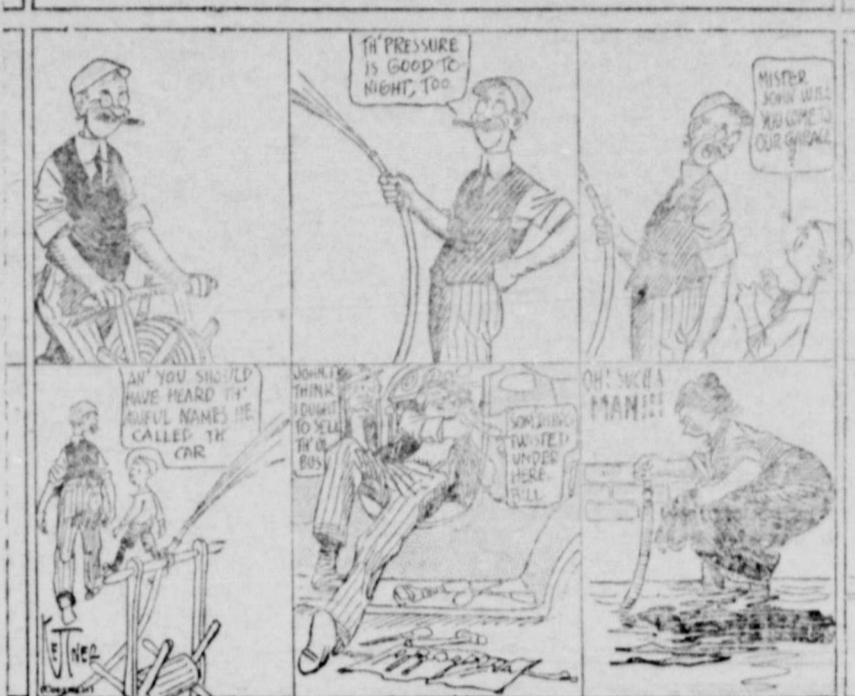

Confidence that steps could be taken to meet the requests of President Harding for prompt consideration of the ship subsidy bill, which threatened a delay, was expressed by Chairman Campbell after a visit to the White House.

UNION CHIEFS TO HOLD JOINT MEET TUESDAY

COURT CANNOT CRUSH UNIONS

CINCINNATI, June 17.—Labor's interpretation of the Supreme Court decision in the celebrated Coronado coal case holding the international unions subject to damage suits under the Sherman anti-trust law, was presented today to the American Federation of Labor in its convention here by the federation's executive council.

That the Supreme Court cannot crush the labor movement without endangering the foundations of society, it was declared in the report. It is said that the workers will find a way to preserve the liberties which have gained more as time passes.

PLAN TO RETURN ALIEN PROPERTY

WASHINGTON, June 17.—Formulation of the administration's policy with reference to the return to owners of sequestered German property which was seized by the alien property custodian during the war, was discussed at a conference at the White House today between President Harding, Secretary of State Hughes, Attorney General Daugherty and Alien Property Custodian Miller. The discussion, it is understood, centered largely around how was best to return the property, having in mind the protection of the poorer classes of Germany whose property was sequestered, and the determination of the value of such property with reference to its immediate return.

CINCINNATI, June 17.—Chiefs of the United Mine Workers of America and rail union heads agreed here today to hold a meeting Tuesday night to discuss a joint strike action by the coal miners and railroad men.

CHICAGO, June 17.—Majority members of the United States Railroad Labor Board, who yesterday ordered another slash of wages for railroad workers, today retaliated at the criticism of the minority members with the charge that the latter in its report had presented "incendiary argument in the sustained exaggerated effort to inflame employees to strike against the decision of the board."

The decision lopping off nearly \$27,000,000 from the wages of 352,000 railway clerks, signalmen and stationary firemen, brought the total reductions effective July 1st to \$135,000,000.

CHICAGO, June 17.—A rejoinder from the majority members of the United States Railroad Labor Board said "It is something new for labor members of the board to issue incendiary arguments to employees in favor of striking against a decision of the board. Giving advice of this kind has heretofore been left to outsiders who are not under any official obligations, imposed by the transportation act, the main purpose of which is to prevent railway strikes and to protect the public."

LICE EXPERT WILL NOT COME TO BALLINGER

A message was received in Ballinger today from R. R. Reppert, expert entomologist from A. & M. College, who had been requested to come here to fight the plant lice which have been destroying the cotton, to the effect that he would be unable to come here at present, and stated that he could not help the situation, as natural weather conditions would be about the only remedy. Mr. Reppert stated that a few sunny days would put an end to the trouble. The insects, he said, multiply most rapidly in warm moist weather, and the ladybugs and other insects, which ordinarily attack the lice cannot increase except after comparatively high temperature. The expert also stated that spraying was not practical where the acreage was large, and that preventive measures were about the only tactics to be pursued.

County Agent Eaton stated Saturday that he thought the condition in this county was improving and if the sun continued to shine hot that the pest would soon be under control.

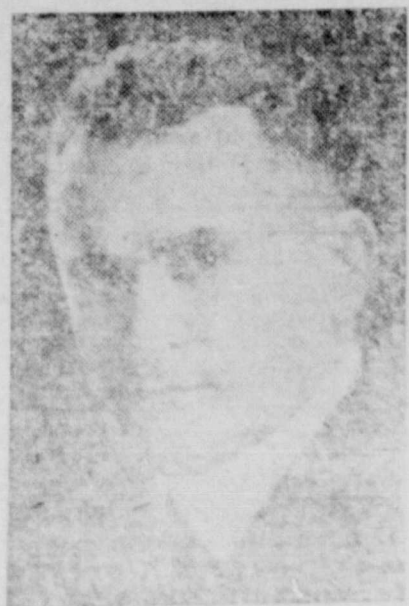

BLANTON SPEAKS TO GOOD CROWD



Congressman Thomas L. Blanton spoke to the biggest crowd Friday night on the court house lawn that has greeted a political speaker here this year. He took the stand immediately following the band concert rendered by the John Tarleton College band, and the crowd that remained for the speaking was variously estimated from 250 to 400 people. S. D. Williams, of Ballinger, introduced the speaker and the candidate's address was delivered from the hand stand in the open air.

Mr. Blanton said that he had faithfully kept every promise to the people. That he had forgotten self and worked unceasingly and sacrificing the pleasures of Washington and the popularity that he might have made with his colleagues to put first the interests of the tax-burdened people. That he had fought graft, waste and extravagance of every kind.

The speaker then took up the waste in maintaining a big army and navy and said that the people were tired of wars and that the other countries of the world were crippled and could not think of war for at least 25 years and that today the United States has 8,720 more officers and 23,660 more men in the army, and 3,923 more officers and 40,920 more men in the navy than we had when the war began in 1917. He pointed to the fact that over 200,000 officers and over 3,000,000 men had been discharged who were trained and could be called on if the emergency arose.

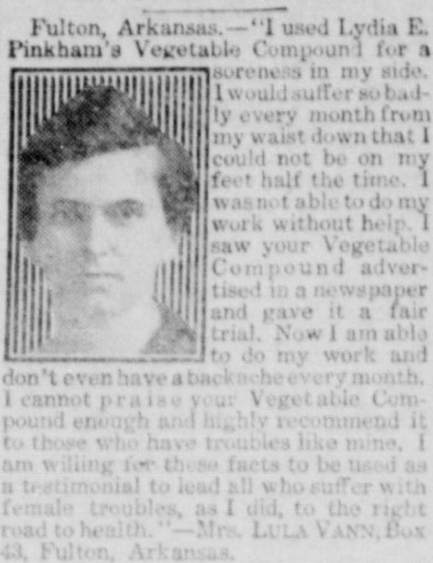
The congressman spoke of the other extravagances and waste that he had fought at Washington and in part said:

"By investigating, filing minority reports, and fighting them, I have blocked the passage of numerous private claims, wholly without merit, aggregating over \$100,000,000. Thru tireless effort I have caused millions of dollars to be stricken from bills, by making proper points of order at the crucial time. My fight killed the merger bill, saving nearly a million each year. My fight stopped the proposed \$375,000 inaugural ceremonies. My fight in the fall of 1920 stopped the navy department from sending our two huge fleets, embracing 200 fighting ships, around the globe. My speech on December 14, 1920, showing the enormous rents being paid by our departments and bureaus, and specifying the office space then vacant in government buildings caused the Shipping Board to move from rented buildings, thus saving \$58,278.40 annual rent on that bureau alone. My investigation showing that the government was employing 1,128 shifts of guards to watch 376 scattered liquor warehouses, caused the present proposed move to concentrate and save millions.

"I have fought all graft from the petty items that benefit congressmen to the \$800,000,000 grafted by the Shipping Board. We can never stop big graft until we stop indulging in all petty graft ourselves. I have fought against the treasury paying the losses of members' restaurants; against paying the salaries of our barbers, bath room attendants and body-rubbers; against members receiving cedar, pine and oak chests; against free trips to Panama; against world-junketing; against our bachelor members drawing \$2,191.44 mileage each congress against the stationery allowance of \$375 per congress being spent for all purposes; against taxing the people to pay for pleasures, school privileges and cheap taxes in

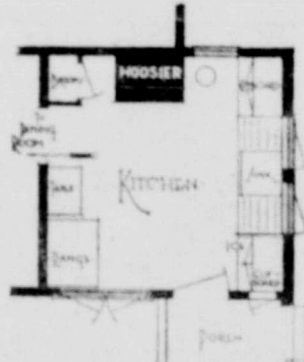

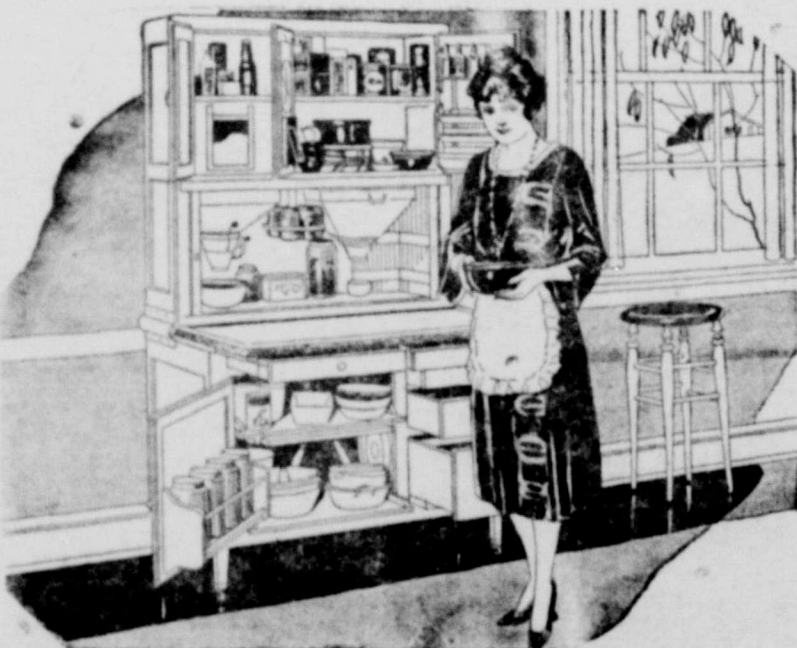
