TEXAN HURT AT U. C. V. REUNION

After speeches this morning and a reception for visitors at the governor's mansion, the exercises in connection with the laying of a wreath on General Davis' monument formed the afternoon program, while the annual reunion ball will be held tonight.

Candidate for U. S. Senate Makes Talk on Live Issues

After addressing an audience at Winters Monday afternoon, Hon. Clarence Ousley, candidate for United States Senator, received a good hearing at Ballinger Monday evening, addressing a crowd of men and women on the court house lawn.

Mr. Ousley arrived in Ballinger Sunday. He spent the forenoon meeting the people of Ballinger and went to Winters shortly after noon, accompanied by a committee of his local supporters, including D. E. Eaton, Lynn Stokes, W. W. Farmer, and several others.

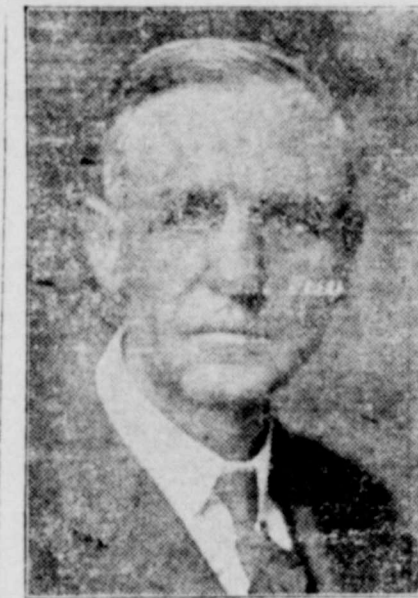
Mr. Ousley was introduced to the Ballinger audience by Mr. Eaton and the candidate for the important office launched into discussion of the questions most paramount in the present campaign, and for more than an hour he held the close attention of his hearers.

Declaring that at least two of his opponents were trying to inject or revive the liquor question into the campaign, Mr. Ousley began his address by briefly referring to these questions as dead issues. He stated that the prohibition of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors had been written into the constitution of the United States, and that any man who tried to make the people believe that the country was in danger of having thrust upon it the liquor traffic again was either a fool or was trying to fool the people. The speaker declared that every man who took the oath of office from the lowest county office to the highest office in the nation swore to uphold the constitution and that the prohibition amendment was a part of the constitution.

"There is not a man living whose grandchild will ever see the return of the open saloon," declared the speaker, "and whether it suits us or not, we had as well become reconciled to that fact and face the conditions as they now exist and look to the future in solving other problems."

Mr. Ousley discussed what he declared were issues in the campaign, and which he said would have to do with the future destiny of the people. Among the propositions discussed were the question of foreign trade, transportation, credits, marketing, and the labor question.

The speaker favors the adoption of some system which will make it possible for the farmer to market all his products in a sane and judicious way. He sees no way for the farmer to become independent until he solves the marketing problem. Mr. Ousley is well posted on agricultural

problems, and he is receiving the support of the leaders among the farmers.

Mr. Ousley favors a law through which congress can adjust the tariff so it would have a favorable effect upon the agricultural interests of the country, and which would give the farmers the protection they should have in regard to producing the raw material and then further adjust the tariff governing the manufactured product. With this done, he claims that industrial conditions would in time adjust themselves automatically.

The speaker referred to the federal reserve banking system as one of the greatest financial measures ever inaugurated by any government, but he at the same time criticized certain methods of the system, which by proper laws can be regulated.

Mr. Ousley discussed other phases of the financial and industrial situation and his presentation of the questions which the next congress will have to deal with shows that he has given such question much study and that he is well posted on what will be the duties of the senate.

ALIENS TO GET PROPERTY BACK

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Legislation is being prepared, with President Harding's sanction, to return to approximately 30,000 Germans and Austrians, property taken over by the government during the war. The property has been in the hands of the alien property custodian since the war, pending disposition of it through the proper channels. It was announced at the White House today that the claims of ten thousand dollars or less would be returned to the owners.

ATTACKS HENRY FORD'S OFFER

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Henry Ford's offer to purchase or lease the government power and nitrate projects at Muscle Shoals, Alabama, was attacked today in a report to the House which was prepared and presented by Representative Kearnes, Republican member of Ohio. The report was signed by several other Republican members of the House military committee, and the report declared with the opinions already presented to the House by other members of the committee and the signatories denounced what they described as "one of the most insidious propagandas the nation has witnessed for many days."

LAREDO, June 20.—Hundreds of Mexicans were rendered homeless and scores of houses were washed away, the Laredo light and power plant put out of commission, and much livestock drowned, when the Rio Grande flood reached the crest of 45 feet here at nine o'clock this morning.

SAN ANTONIO, June 20.—Twenty-one thousand acres of Rio Grande Valley land with crops valued at two and a half million dollars, have been flooded in Hidalgo county and are today under water as result of fresh rises in the lower stretches of the Rio Grande. With this flood sweeping away crops a cloud burst flooded the upper Rio Grande and the crest is nearing Laredo, according to a summary of the flood situation given out by the weather bureau early today.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—War department records are still waiting today communications thru the state department from the Mexican government which would authorize the establishment of a pontoon bridge across the Rio Grande River at Eagle Pass. The proposed pontoon bridge would replace temporarily the international bridge which was washed out by the recent floods.

The Baptist are gradually rounding out plans for their new church home on Eighth Street. The emergency for such a building demands speedy action.

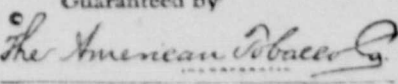
CARTER BOY RELEASED FROM BROWN CO. JAIL

Willie Carter, who had been held in the Brown county jail since making an effort to retract his testimony in the George Hornsby case and save the neck of the man who paid the penalty of J. N. Weatherby at Brownwood, was released from jail at Brownwood Monday. The boy was the

state's star witness in the trial of Hornsby, and was implicated in the murder of Weatherby, but on account of his age and the fact that a term in a juvenile reform school was all that the law could do with him, he was released some time ago. He later, and a few days before the date of Hornsby's execution, tried to retract his testimony, declaring that he lied, and that Hornsby was not guilty of the murder. It was then that the boy was re-arrested and the grand jury investigated his connection with the case again, but failed to find a bill, and now the boy is out to either reform or become a further menace to society. According to Carter's own statement, he carried the message from Hornsby which brought Weatherby to the scene of his death, and later the boy and Hornsby fled across the country to Fort Worth and on to other places where they were later arrested.

Volunteer Workers Will Improve Tourist Park

The directors of the Young Men's Business League at their meeting yesterday afternoon issued a "broadcast" invitation to citizens of Ballinger to meet at the tourists camping ground next Monday afternoon at 6:30 p. m. to spend an hour or two in improving the grounds. The directors of the League armed with rakes and hoes will head the delegation and it is expected to have the grounds in first class condition when the work is completed. Scores of tourist cars are passing thru the city every day, and many of them have been complaining about the condition of the grounds. While the present camp at the foot of Eighth Street is only a temporary one, it is hoped to make it a credit to the city instead of a drawback.

The League will be hosts to the Ford dealers of this district next Friday, when thirty or forty retailers will meet here in convention. The Southwestern manager for the Ford company will be among the guests. A fish fry with the necessary "fixins" has been planned for the visitors.

The committee on a "white way" for Ballinger's business streets reported that all of the city officials seemed to be in favor of installing a uniform system of light standards before the street paving was started. In order to ascertain public sentiment on this proposition it was voted to circulate a petition asking early action on this needed improvement.

AIRPLANE SEARCH FOR GRAIN PESTS

Remarkable Survey Being Conducted in Texas by U. S. Agricultural Department.

RUST SPORE BEING SOUGHT

Annual Loss in Wheat Alone Due to Stem Rust is Estimated at 64,000,000 Bushels—Mexico Believed to Be Source of Spore.

San Antonio, Tex.—One of the most remarkable surveys ever made under the direction of the United States Department of Agriculture is now in progress in Texas. It is that of searching the air for the spore that causes rust on growing wheat and oats.

It is estimated that the annual loss in wheat alone due to stem rust is approximately 64,000,000 bushels. It is the theory of some agricultural scientists that the source of the spore which causes this enormous loss is in Mexico or perhaps South America and that it drifts through the air to the wheat fields of Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas and other states.

Airplane Search in Progress. During the last two weeks an airplane search for the spores has been made at high altitudes above San Antonio. For this purpose an airplane from Kelly field is used, with Lieut. T. R. Booker as pilot and Wallace Butler as scientist.

Armed with a "spore trap" Mr. Butler has made six exposures at varying altitudes on each aerial journey. These plates have been sent to the office of cereal investigation for examination. Thus far no reports have been given out of the findings.

Anyone who walks through an oat field in this part of the state now will come out with his shoes covered with a yellowish powder which has brushed off from the innumerable little yellow leaves.

This powder any farmer will tell you is rust, in this case the leaf rust of oats. Every little yellow spot on the leaf is a pustule of leaf rust, each pustule being made up of from one to several thousand tiny seed bodies or spores which are pushed up through the epidermis of the leaf from a sort of root structure or mass of threads which are growing within the leaf. These threads are very minute and can be seen only by the aid of the microscope. The spores which are borne in such multitudes on the ends of little branches from these threads are also microscopic in size. The powder on the shoes after a trip through the oat field consists of millions of these spores.

Dew Helps.

When one of these spores falls on a drop of dew or other moisture on a leaf of oats it soon sends out a little root-like projection which curls around this way and that, finds its way into the breathing pore or opening in the epidermis of the leaf and so gets into the leaf tissues. In due time it becomes the mass of threads which again send up the mass of spores, and so the process is repeated with favorable weather conditions about every two weeks.

SINGLETARY CASE TO JURY WEDNESDAY

In a letter to Mrs. A. K. Doss from Judge Doss, who is attending court at Karnes City as counsel for the plaintiff in the Singletary damage suit, he states that it is requiring longer to try the case than was at first expected due to the fact that the railroad is making a hard fight and contesting every point in the case.

This is the suit in which Mrs. M. B. Singletary is seeking to recover damages from the railroad for the death of her son, Jack, who was killed by a train as he was crossing the track in an automobile. Doss & Baugh of this city, represents Mrs. Singletary in the suit. The letter stated that the case would not go to the jury until Wednesday and that the Ballinger people would not be home until the last of the week, probably Friday or Saturday. The plaintiff counsel expects a favorable verdict, according to the letter.

REGULAR PLEDGE TO GOVERN HERE

The Democratic Executive Committee of Runnels county met Monday and canvassed the applications filed for places on the ticket by the various Democratic candidates, made a budget for election expenses, and fixed tentative assessments for creating a fund for defraying expenses of the two primary elections.

The committee declined to adopt the pledge recommended by the State Democratic Executive Committee which required voters to declare that they voted for the Democratic nominee in the last general election before being permitted to participate in the primary, and adopted the regular pledge as fixed by the Terrell election law, which pledges voters to support the nominees of the Democratic party.

Due to the fact that election clerks now draw \$3 per day instead of \$2 as heretofore, it will require about one-third more to defray the expenses of the coming primaries than it did two years ago, and while assessments will fall pretty heavy on some of the county candidates, the fee will not be as high as it has been in some previous elections. The highest assessment made this year will be for \$100, while the maximum has been as high as \$125.

The ticket for the county and precinct offices is being arranged and when the state committee supplies the copy for the state offices, the order for the tickets will be placed and they will be in the hands of the various election boards in time for the primary July 22nd.

On account of the rush on the farm very few of the rural precincts of the county were represented at the meeting Monday. Ballinger, Miles and Winters precincts were represented.

EOLA LADY SHOTS SELF ACCIDENTALLY

Last reports from San Angelo, where Mrs. Amalee Kral was carried after shooting herself at her home near Eola, stated that the woman was getting along as well as could be expected with some chances for recovery.

Mrs. Kral is supposed to have shot herself accidentally. The bullet entered the left breast and lodged in her back. The accident occurred about a week ago. Mrs. Kral is the daughter of John Psencik, one of the best citizens of the Eola country, and their friends deplore the tragedy.

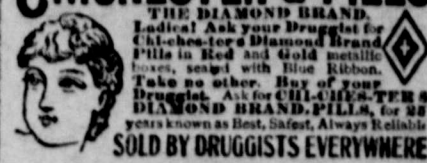

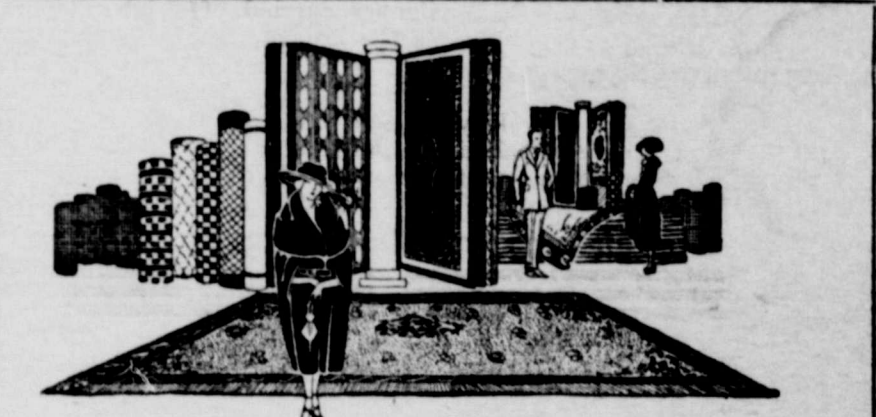
