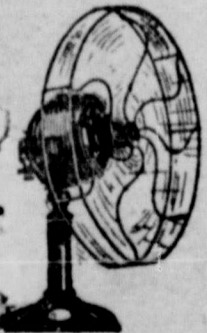

DRILLERS BUY HUNTER WELL NEAR CITY

J. B. Gordon and O. Wilson, of Breckenridge and Ranger, experienced drillers and oil field developers, have taken over the Safety First well on the Allen pasture three miles West of Ballinger, and if given the proper encouragement and assistance will sink the well to a sufficient depth to make a complete test.

Mr. Wilson has been in the oil game all his life, and is at present operating in the Breckenridge field. He has been in charge of the Safety First well here for some time under the former management, but a deal has been made whereby he and Mr. Gordon get control of sufficient acreage to justify them pushing to completion the test, and they are now in full charge of the development.

"We hope to be able to dispose of a sufficient amount of the acreage at a fair price to help in financing the fuel and water bill," said Mr. Gordon, "and speaking from the experience we have had I don't think there is any better bet anywhere in wild cat territory in Texas."

Mr. Wilson stated that prospects were all that could be wished for in the development of wild cat territory. He stated that the general formation and geological reports were good and he would not be putting his own money in the test if he did not have the most optimistic confidence in the proposition. Mr. Wilson owns the tools, as well as the tools which he is operating in proven fields.

The Safety First well is now down to a depth of 2790 and the hole is in good shape. Casing is being reset after being pulled to fish-out a section of the casing which was lost at the bottom, and as soon as the casing is reset down to the six inch section, drilling will be resumed, and while the contract Mr. Wilson has with the owners of the land only calls for a 3150 depth, it is probable that the hole will be drilled to a depth of 3300, if necessary. The geological report calls for production at from 3000 to 3150. Conditions at the 3150 depth will determine whether the well shall go deeper or not.

The gentlemen now in charge of this well feel that they should receive some encouragement thru the sale of a limited amount of acreage. Much money has been spent to get the well down to its present depth, and to abandon it at this stage would be to lose what has been expended, and still leave the test uncompleted, and the field in doubt. If this well is not completed, it will probably be a long time before another is started, and it would be folly to start another test without completing the one already so well underway.

This is a Ballinger well, being located right at our very door, and it is one in which the public is generally interested and has been watching with interest since it was spudded in. The well has experienced many difficulties and received some hard knocks, but there is time yet to start an oil boom here with it.

BANDITS FREE SIX AMERICANS

WASHINGTON, June 30.—Dispatches today from Consul Shaw to the state department indicate that eighty-five employees of the British owned La Corona Oil Company, including a half dozen Americans, who were reported to be held yesterday for a large ransom by outlaws, had been released.

The message was very brief and not clear and the department immediately telegraphed for further information and explanation of the affair.

TEXAS LEADS IN LYNCHINGS

CULLEN THOMAS HERE JULY 7TH

ABSENTEE VOTING LAW EXPLAINED

Legally qualified voters who expect to absent themselves from home on primary election day, July 22nd, can file their votes under the terms of the absentee voting law which was passed by the 37th legislature in 1921 and which is known as Chapter 113 of the acts of that legislature, and in brief which provides as follows:

"At some time not more than ten days, nor less than three days prior to such election, any qualified elector who expects to be absent from his or her residence on the day of election shall make his or her personal appearance before the county clerk of his or her residence, and if personally unknown to such clerk, shall be identified by at least two reputable persons of such county and shall deliver to such clerk his or her poll tax receipt, or exemption certificate, entitling him or her to a vote in such election, and said clerk shall deliver to such elector one ballot, which has been prepared in accordance with the law for use in such election, which shall then and there be marked by said elector apart and without the assistance of any other person in such manner as said elector shall desire same to be voted.

"The above applies where the voter is at home within the time, not more than ten days nor less than three days prior to date of such election.

"Also, all qualified voters who are away from their places of residence, may between July 2nd and July 12th, make their personal appearance before a notary public and deliver to such notary public their poll tax receipt, or make affidavit that such has been paid, which poll tax or affidavit shall be mailed by such notary public to the county clerk of such county where the elector resides, who shall verify such by examining the poll tax records, and then mail to such voter an official ballot for use in such election, and such voter may vote a legal ballot, and have same mailed to the county clerk who will turn it over to the election manager of the voting precinct of such elector, either in person or by mail on election day."

THIRTY DEAD; FIFTY INJURED IN IRISH FIGHTING

DUBLIN, June 30.—Insurgents who have been occupying the four courts building, surrendered at four o'clock this afternoon, it was officially announced, says the Press Association.

An explosion which blew up a section of the building preceding the surrender a few hours and it is believed that a considerable number of insurgents were wounded by the explosion, although they were not occupying that part of the building which was blown up.

LONDON, June 30.—Dublin dispatches to the Central News Bureau this morning say that the four courts buildings held by the insurgents under Roy O'Connor, have been completely occupied by the free state forces. Another dispatch says that the four courts buildings are on fire.

DUBLIN, June 30.—An unofficial estimate of the casualties in two day's fighting here between the Irish factions, places the number killed at 30 and the wounded at 50.

POLICE ROUT STRIKE RIOT

PUNXSUTAWNEY, Penna., June 30.—A detail of state police arrived here today to take over the coal strike situation, after a night of disorder in the mining district around Punxsutawney. A band of marching men estimated to number three hundred, destroyed the scale house and wrecked a motor truck carrying coal and cut the tires of another truck. The band was broken up by a squad of troopers who rode thru the crowd. No casualties are reported.

FIND CLUE TO DEATH OF MAN

FT. WORTH, June 30.—Special agents of the Texas & Pacific Railroad have been detailed at Ft. Worth and Terrell to investigate the killing of Conductor Edward R. Stevenson, on his train Tuesday night near Terrell.

Several clues have been found, it was stated and arrests are expected immediately.

CHICAGO, June 30.—The assurance that both the railroads and their employees will abide by the law and orders of the United States Railroad Labor Board was the basis upon which the board pinned its hopes today for throttling the threatened rail strike.

From authoritative sources it was learned that practically all railroads have been contracting work to outsiders in violation of the law and the board's orders. The board will enter an official investigation, and the roads announce that they are ready to comply with the board's ruling.

KATY ROAD TO BE SOLD SOON

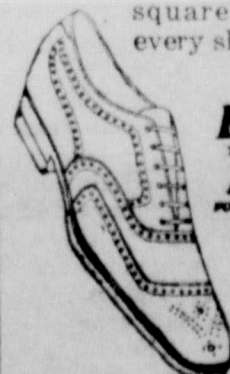

ST. LOUIS, June 30.—A receivership for the Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railroad company will be dissolved today when United States Circuit Judge Sanborn signs a decree prepared by the security holders authorizing the road's sale by special master for not less than twenty-eight million dollars.

Judge Sanborn announced that he would sign the decree late today after minor changes had been made in the order of sale, etc. The sale will be made at Colbert, Oklahoma, in about six weeks, and it was said that financial interests headed by the Seligman Company and the Hallgarten Company, of New York, have planned for a reorganization of the road, and these companies expect to buy it in at the sale.

To the resident property tax-paying voters of Ballinger Independent School District:

Take Notice that an election will be held on Tuesday, the 11th day of July, 1922, within said district in obedience to an order duly entered by the Board of Trustees on the 8th day of June, 1922, which is as follows:

On this the 8th day of June, 1922, the Board of Trustees of the Ballinger Independent School District convened in regular session with the following members present:

W. C. Penn, N. K. Freeman, F. M. Pearce, T. S. Lankford, C. W. Hardin, W. E. Bartlett; and among other proceedings had by said Board of Trustees was the following:

There came on to be considered the petition of C. L. Baker, and 141 other persons asking that an election be ordered upon the question of levying and collecting a tax for the maintenance of the public free schools in the Ballinger Independent School District and

It appearing to the satisfaction of the Board of Trustees that said petition is signed by at least twenty qualified property tax-paying voters of said school district, and is otherwise in conformity with law, the Board is of the opinion that said petition should be granted, and said election as prayed for should be ordered:

Therefore, be it ordered by the Board of Trustees of the Ballinger Independent School District:

That an election be held in said Ballinger Independent School District on the 11th day of July, 1922, which is not less than thirty days from the date of this order, at which election, in accordance with said petition, the following proposition shall be submitted to the resident qualified property tax-paying voters of said school district for their action thereupon:

Proposition

Shall the Board of Trustees of the Ballinger Independent School District have the power to levy and collect annually a tax upon all taxable property in said school district for the maintenance of public free schools therein of and at the rate of seventy-five (75c) cents on the \$100.00 valuation of all taxable property in said school district until the same shall be discontinued as provided by law.

The said election shall be held at the City Hall of Ballinger in said Ballinger Independent School District, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of said election:

J. F. Lusk, Judge; Edwin Day, W. C. McCarver, H. C. Gardner, and N. J. Wardlaw, Clerks.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

FOR MAINTENANCE TAX AGAINST MAINTENANCE TAX.

Each voter shall mark out

with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote.

None but resident qualified property tax-paying voters of said Ballinger Independent School District shall be allowed to vote at said election.

The Secretary of this Board of Trustees shall forthwith issue a notice of said election stating in substance the contents of this election order and the time and place of said election, and said Secretary shall post a copy of such notice at three different places within the boundaries of said Ballinger Independent School District, which posting shall be done not less than three weeks prior to the date fixed for said election.

Immediately after said election has been held the officers holding the same shall make returns of the result thereof to the Board of Trustees of said school district, and return the ballot box to the Secretary of said board for safekeeping.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as near as may be, by the General Election Laws of this State, except as modified by Chapter 24, of the General Laws passed by the Thirty-Seventh Legislature at its regular session, 1921, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

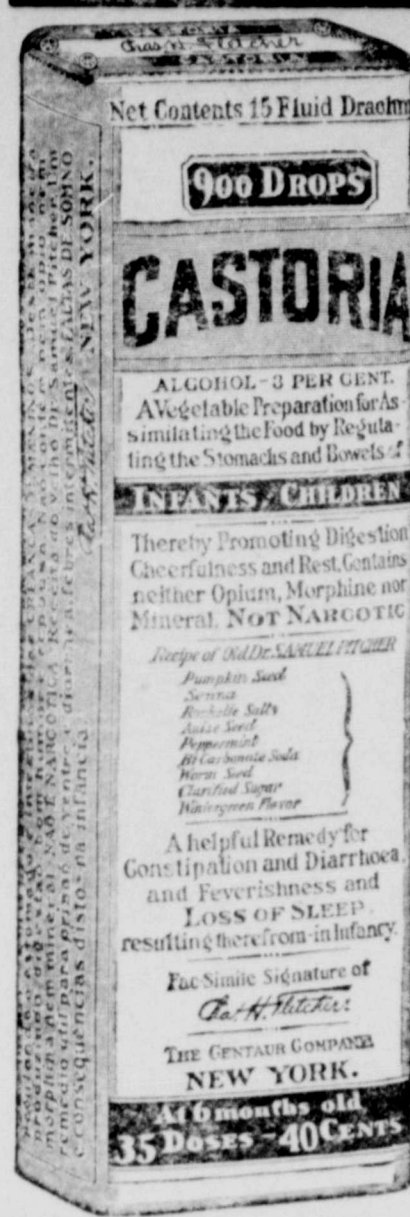

**R. R. RUSSELL
LAID TO REST**

The funeral of R. R. Russell, who died at San Antonio Wednesday evening, was held at that place and interment made in San Antonio cemetery, according to information received at Ballinger.

The San Antonio Express gives the following account of Mr. Russell's death:

"Richard R. Russell, director and stockholder in many of San Antonio's largest financial and commercial enterprises, died at 8:00 o'clock last night following an operation at the Physician's and Surgeon's Hospital.

"Mr. Russell had suffered from a digestive trouble for nearly three weeks, but did not drop his business activities until last Friday when he went to bed and a doctor was called. He was informed that an operation was necessary and he laughingly refused to consider its possibility. Finally he called for W. W. Collier, vice president of the Central Trust Company, of which Mr. Russell was a director and life long friend. The family asked Mr. Collier to persuade him to consent to an operation as they were afraid of the consequences if it were not performed.

"Mr. Russell is survived in San Antonio by his widow, his daughter, Mrs. O. H. Judkins, and his mother, Mrs. Ophelia Strickland. Another daughter, Mrs. French Spencer lives in Austin and is now at the Russell residence at 304 Brooklyn Avenue, accompanied by her husband, Judge Spencer of the State Court of Appeals. Mrs. Judkins and her husband, Dr. O. H. Judkins, live on Belknap Place and Summit Avenue, but are now at the Russell home.

"In addition to the immediate relatives in San Antonio, he is survived by three brothers who live in West Texas, a married sister in New Mexico, and another sister, Miss Jennie Russell, in Del Rio.

"Mr. Russell at one time served on the State Ranger force,

and was for several terms Sheriff of Menard county, Texas. At the time of his death he owned the famous Wylie Ranch in Runnels county, the Grape Creek Ranch in Concho and Runnels, the Simpson Ranch in Runnels, the Menard Ranch in Menard county, and the Canyon Ranch in Pecos county. He owned 75,000 acres of land in Runnels county alone.

"In this city he was controlling stockholder in the Russell Coleman Cotton Oil Company, a director of the Central Trust Co. and the City National Bank, besides interests in other large corporations. He was also interested in cotton oil companies in Ballinger, San Angelo, Coleman, and other places, and owned a large interest in the Farmers & Merchants State Bank of Ballinger."

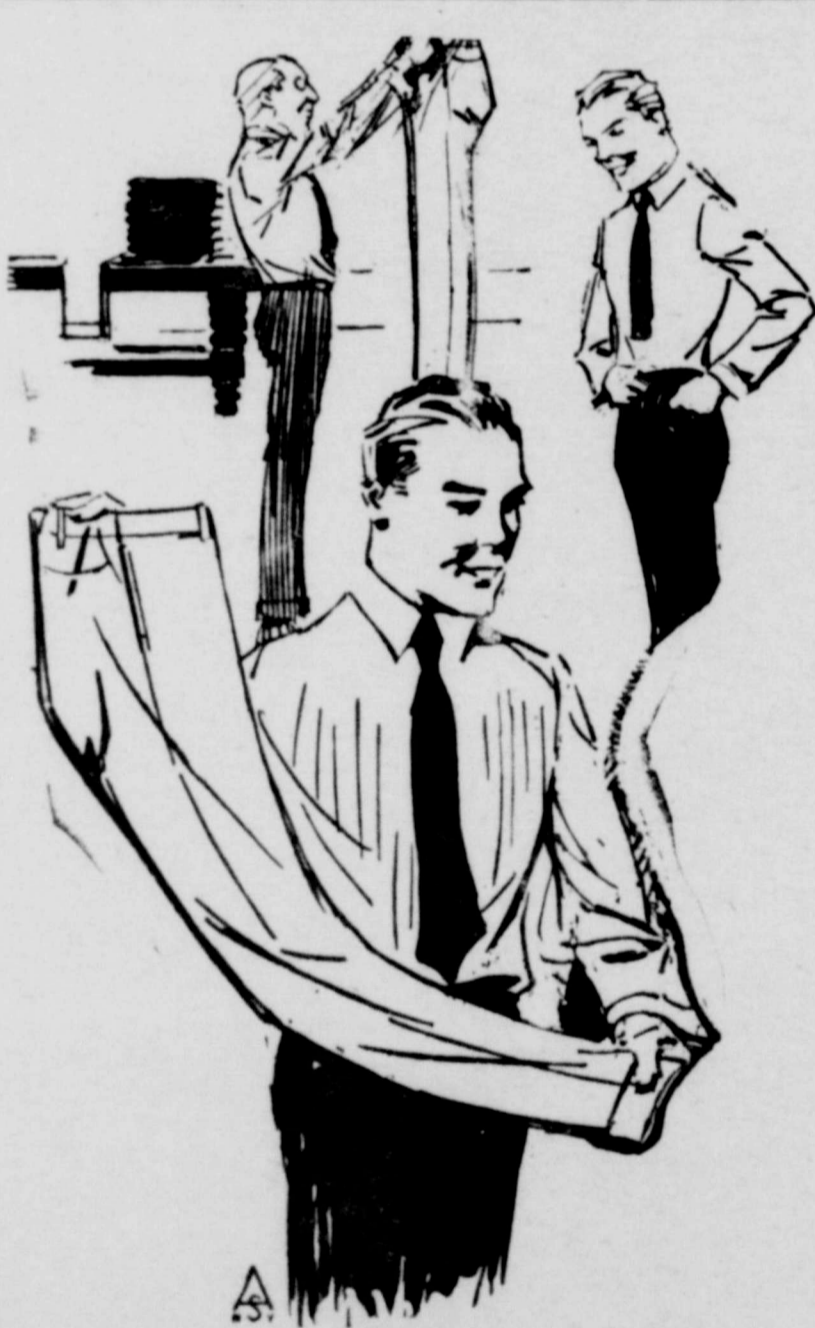
