SHOPMEN STRIKE

Thousands Employees Drop Tools and Quit Work; Every Big Railroad in Entire Nation is Affected

WANTING TO LIVE OUT TO END COAL STRIKE

WASHINGTON, July 1.—President Harding, in convening the conference of coal operators and miners officials at the White House today to devise means for negotiating a settlement of the nation wide coal

miners strike, both parties to arrive promptly in an understanding of the strike.
"For your good, and for the country on good," said Mr. Harding must reach some agreement promptly and the mines reopened.
About thirty officials, with Secretary of War, Davis, and Fall, were present. Mr. Harding said he would be a warning to the operators if the matter they interest must be asserted in the name of the people who common good is first at the present concern.

EAST ST. LOUIS, July 1.—Eleven hundred shopmen of the Toledo, St. Louis and Western, Clover Leaf railroad, declined to strike today because President Ross of that road, refused to reduce their wages, and paid no attention to the United States Railroad Labor Board's decree.
The employees announced that they would remain at work as long as their wages were not cut according to the labor board's ruling.

CHICAGO, July 1.—Thousands of railway shopmen dropped their tools at ten o'clock this morning and joined the nation wide strike ordered by the international president of the six shop crafts unions.

The strike went into effect peacefully over the entire country except at Ivy City, Maryland, where there was a slight clash reported between workmen and officials.

By noon strikes were reported from every big railroad in the East, South and Central West, and the early reports indicated that shop mechanics and helpers from the Eastern roads to the Western transcontinental lines, are generally joining the walk-out movement. The first report received at headquarters stated that the men quit work on the hour.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—The entire fabric of the new rate schedules on cotton moving from the Mississippi valley to consumption, through seaboard ports to Northern cities, which the railroads prepared and attempted to put into effect last fall, was set aside today by the Interstate Commerce Commission.
A general system of new rates was requested under the commission orders, carrying out the spirit of the long and short haul clause. The interstate commerce act requiring road to cease maintaining rates on certain Mississippi valley shipping centers to outlet points, which were lower than the rates in effect for shorter districts over the same routes.

MORALE IRISH REBELS BROKEN

DUBLIN, July 1.—The free state government of Ireland today turned to the task of clearing out the remaining nests of insurgency following the fall of the four courts building, the chief stronghold of the rebels, and the surrender today of more than fifty rebels.
This was heralded as evidence that the morale of the republicans is weakened.
Total casualties are estimated not to exceed one hundred fatalities.

STILL USING STATE'S FIRST TYPEWRITER

AUSTIN, July 1.—The first typewriter ever used in the state capitol was in use in the State Department of Education, an investigation recently disclosed. This was in 1897 or 1898, the exact date of its advent into the state house being unknown. Until that time all records, correspondence and other matter were written in long hand.
With the appearance of the first machine the long hand was quickly abandoned and today the number of machines in the capitol department runs well over three hundred.
This typewriter investigation was brought about by an argument that followed repairs on what is said to be the oldest machine now in use.
It is in the capitol press room.

J. W. LINDLEY DIES AT MEXIA

A message was received here by relatives late Friday announcing the death of J. W. Lindley at Mexia, Texas, or near that city, where Mr. Lindley went a short time ago on a visit to relatives. The message stated that the remains would arrive here Sunday at noon and the funeral would be held Monday afternoon and interment made in Evergreen cemetery. It is probable that the remains will be carried to the late home of the deceased, five miles southwest of Ballinger and the funeral held from that place.
Mr. Lindley had been in bad health for some time and about three weeks ago he went to Mexia to visit relatives. He was accompanied by Mrs. Lindley, who was at his bedside when death came.
Deceased had been living near Ballinger for several years, and has many friends here who will be grieved to hear of his death. This is the third death in the Lindley family within the last year. Mr. Miller, Mrs. Lindley's brother, died about a year ago, followed a short time later by Mrs. Boozer, a relative of the family, who was making her home with them.

DALLAS, July 1.—All union shopmen on the Texas & Pacific Railroad walked out today, according to the receiver of the company. The strikers included about fifteen hundred along the system from New Orleans to El Paso.

Reports from the various lines said that ninety men were out at Galveston, 350 at Amarillo, 300 at Wichita Falls, 200 at Waco, 60 at Beaumont, 400 at Houston, 1500 at San Antonio, 1200 at Marshall, and 1,000 at Denison.

HOUSTON, July 1.—2500 men are affected on the railroads running out of this city, four-fifths of the Southern Pacific employes joining the strike.

UNEARTHED BONES OF LARGE ANIMAL

P. W. Smith, of Valley Creek, was in the city Friday and brought along the jaw bone of a prehistoric mastodon which he discovered on the creek a few days ago. The bone and teeth were well preserved in a petrified state and showed to be that of some animal larger than any living creature which inhabits the earth today. It was unlike any mastodon bones ever seen here before and no one could be found who could tell to what animal tribe the bones came from.

Some months ago large bones were found near where Mr. Smith found the large jaw bone, and it is believed that from time to time the high water in the creek has washed out the banks and scattered the bones from where they had been lying in a petrified state for perhaps many centuries.

LYNCHING RECORD IN U. S. FOR SIX MONTHS

The Tuskegee Normal and Industrial Institute, for colored young men and women, located at Tuskegee, Oklahoma, has sent out a report on lynchings in the United States for the first six months of the year.

There has been 30 lynchings in the U. S. according to the negro school's report, for the first six months of 1922, which is six less than for the first six months last year and 18 more than for the first six months of 1920. Texas and Mississippi is charged with 19 of the 30, or almost two-thirds of the total number.

Of those lynched, 2 were white and 28 were negroes. Eleven of those put to death were charged with the crime of rape and nineteen were charged with other offenses. Five of those put to death were burned at the stake and 3 were first put to death and then their bodies were burned. Four of those lynched in the year 1921, were burned at the stake and three were first put to death, and then their bodies were burned.

The states in which lynchings occurred and the number in each state are as follows: Alabama 1; Arkansas 2; Florida 1; Georgia 4; Louisiana 1; Mississippi 7; South Carolina 1; Oklahoma 1; and Texas 12.

WHY ARE BUBBLES ROUND?

A SOAP bubble, to use as an example the most familiar kind of bubble, is merely a hollow ball of water with air inside. The soap, partially dissolved, forms a very thin film or skin over the air which is endeavoring to force its way through it. This air exerts an equal pressure in all directions and thus forces the soap film out at an equal distance from the center of the compressed air, thus forming a perfect sphere or ball at the moment the bubble is first made. However, after the bubble has been floating for a few moments, the water drips down toward the bottom of the ball and collects there in drops. The weight of these pull the bubble out of shape—spoil its perfect symmetry—and increase the pressure of the air inside to such a degree that it breaks through the film and the bubble bursts. 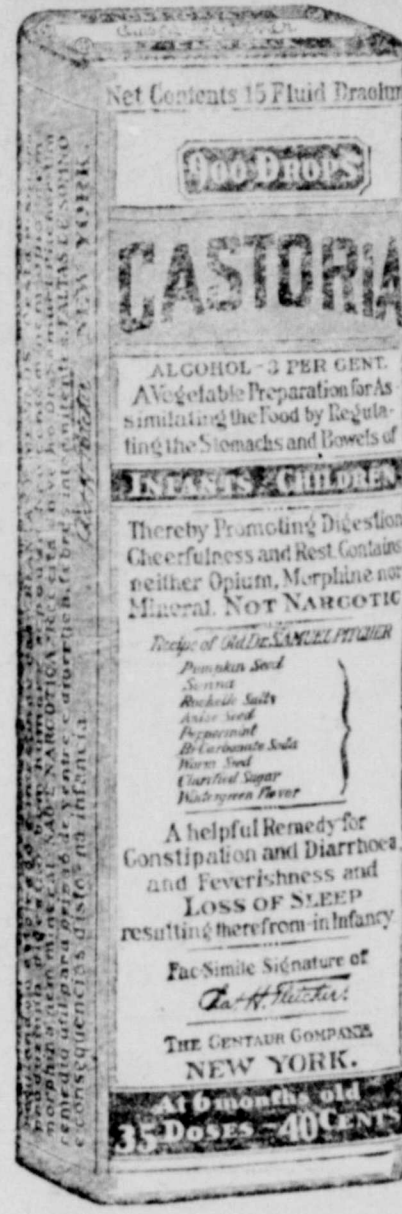
I LOVE to roam the Hills of Sleep,
