RACE FOR SECOND PLACE STILL IN DOUBT

SERIOUS CHARGES MADE AGAINST PRES. HARDING

 WASHINGTON, July 24.—The Chemical Foundation and its president and former alien property custodian, Francis Garvin proceeded against the government for return of the German chemical patents, was defended in the senate today by Senator Underwood, of Alabama, democratic leader.

Mr. Underwood criticised President Harding and the administration on account of the action taken against the Chemical Foundation, and denied that there was any fraud or collusion of conspiracy for the acquisition of the German patents by the Foundation. Senator Underwood charged that German interests were supporting the administration's course against the Chemical Foundation in the hope of securing restitution of the property and also a damage claim for its use by the American government.

BLANTON MUST GO IN RUN-OFF

 ABILENE, July 24.—Congressman Thomas L. Blanton did not receive a majority vote in Saturday's primary, and will be in the second primary, according to incomplete returns received here today, and compiled by the Abilene Reporter.

Returns from fifteen counties out of the nineteen in the district including Eastland, Nolan, Runnels, Shackelford, Palo Pinto, Brown, Coleman, McCullough, Comanche, Concho, Llano, Taylor, Callahan and Stephens, shows the following result:

Calloway	6,019
Cunningham	6,343

While Mr. Blanton carried every county in the district with the possible exception of Comanche, the home county of Oscar Calloway, the incomplete returns indicate that Calloway and Cunningham are running neck and neck for second place, and either Calloway or Cunningham will go into the second race against Blanton. Cunningham is leading Calloway by 324 votes for second place up to this hour.

FIRST WORK ON NEW CHURCH

Quite a crowd gathered on the site for the new Baptist church at nine o'clock Monday morning and witnessed the dirt breaking ceremonies which marked the first physical work for the new building.

Dr. Alvin Swindell had charge of the services, and short talks were made by several, following which the pastor, board of deacons, building committee, contractors and those representing the different departments of the church took part in the dirt breaking, each lifting a spadeful of dirt from the excavation for the foundation.

Mrs. Hill Jackson represented the woman's work of the church in the dirt breaking ceremony, handling the spade after each member of the board of deacons and building committee had used it. Robert Lee Maddox represented the boys of the church, and Mamie Gene Hale represented the girls work of the church.

B. C. Kirk made a short talk in behalf of the board of deacons. Rev. W. H. Doss spoke for the ministers of the city and A. W. Sludge represented the community on the program.

Dr. Swindell briefly outlined the plans of the new building, stating that it was modern in every detail, and had been placed with a view of service.

Actual work has started on the building, and it will be pushed to completion.

TEXAS COMPANY TO DRILL NEAR PAINT ROCK

The Texas Company will carry out a drilling contract with land owners near Paint Rock and will spud in a well within the next thirty or forty days, according to reliable information received at Ballinger. The well will be backed by one of the strongest companies in the state, and those in close touch with the development move declare that it will be rapidly pushed down.

Reports received here state that there is considerable activity in average traffic in the vicinity of where it is expected the well will go down, one \$3,200 deal having been made last week. The exact location of the well has not been fixed but it will be nearer Paint Rock than any test so far started in Concho county.

KU KLUX KLAN NO ISSUE IN SECOND PRIMARY

 DALLAS, July 24.—If Earl Mayfield and James E. Ferguson are the two candidates left in the race for the democratic nominee for the United States Senate, the issue will revolve around prohibition and the labor question and the money systems, according to a statement issued by both Ferguson and Ben Richards, manager of Mayfield's campaign.

In a statement to the Associated Press today Mr. Ferguson said that if he was in the run off the issues would be made along the same line as those in the first campaign. "They will be the money question, or federal reserve banking system question, the labor and the prohibition question," said Mr. Ferguson.

He declared that the question of the Ku Klux Klan or anti-Ku Klux Klan will not be so much emphasized in the second primary as in the first.

BALLINGER BOY WINS IN WILLIAMSON COUNTY

News from Williamson county places Diaz Wood in the lead for county attorney in that county. Mr. Wood did not receive a majority as there was more than one candidate against him, but he will be in the run-off having received plurality in the first election. Diaz stands a good chance to win in the second race and he deserves success.

COUNTY CANDIDATES NOMINATED 1ST PRIMARY

James Ferguson received plurality vote for senator in Runnels county and Neff lead the ticket for governor, according to complete but unofficial returns. Thomas ran second for the senate, having 136 votes less than the leading man, Ferguson. Ousley ran third with 457 and Mayfield and Henry and Culberson in order named.

Unofficial returns shows that all the old members of the board of county commissioners were elected. Deens defeated Smith in the Ballinger precinct; Yeager defeated Jayroe in the Winters precinct and Currie defeated Lender and Mills in the Miles precinct, receiving a majority over both of his opponents. Commissioner Miller of the Wingate precinct had no opposition.

E. F. Batts defeated J. P. Booths in the Ballinger precinct for cotton weigher.

S. D. Williams has a small majority over J. E. Powell for county surveyor.

The candidates for county offices had almost a full vote, with few exceptions. Brown,

 DALLAS, July 24.—Returns from 230 counties, including 28 complete counties, up to noon today, showed that James E. Ferguson was leading Chas. Culberson for second place in the senatorial race by 8,520 votes. The corrections of earlier figures from Rockwall county and Rusk county took 300 votes from Culberson in Rockwall and 100 from him in Rusk county.

Governor Pat Neff will not be obliged to go in the second primary as his majority is decisive over his three opponents. Others nominated in the first primary are Allison Mayfield for railroad commissioner, Marrow for court of criminal appeals, Lon A. Smith for comptroller.

Those who will go into the run off on August 26th are Davidson and Mayfield for lieutenant governor, Garrett and Terrell for state treasurer, Bentley and Marris for superintendent of public instructions.

It is still a question as to whether Ferguson or Culberson will be in the run off against Mayfield for the senate as there are a sufficient number of votes out to bring Culberson up for second place.

GIRLS SUMMER CAMP OPENS

TEMPLE, July 24.—Today marks the opening of the first summer camp for girls of Temple on Village Creek near Fletcher, under the supervision of Miss Martha Kostha, girls' work secretary of the Young Women's Christian association of Temple. The camp will continue for ten days and is designated especially for high school girls.

Following the first camp, another session will be held in the form of an outing for business girls, August 5th and 6th. A week's camp for girl reserves of the Y. W. C. A. will be held from August 7th to 14th, and a second girl reserves' camp from August 17th to 24th.

The Village Creek camp offers the highest type of outing for the girls, according to Miss Kostha, and is one of the most complete of its kind in the state. The activities of camp will be in army fashion. Reville will take place at 6:30, followed by setting-up exercises and a swim. The camp clean up will follow breakfast with inspection, flag raising and assembly. Recreation hour will be from ten to eleven each morning at which time the girls will be taught to play tennis and other games. Study hour, with lectures, will follow from 11 to 12. Quiet hour, camp craft, reading, boating and swimming will be features of the afternoon program.

Taps will be sounded each night at 9:30. Evening programs as outlined for the first camp include singing song and pep meeting, dedication of camp world fellowship study, astronomical study, health play, story hour, evening Vespers, parent and stunt night.

The Village Creek camp has just been completed for the Y. W. C. A. session. It will be run for girls from Temple each summer, according to Y. W. officials.

MIDSUMMER FROCKS ARE OF PRINTED FABRICS



PRINTED foulards and crepes, embroidered linens and crepes and printed cottons are among the fabrics that make midsummer dresses distinctive and brilliant. The crepes are naturally in the lead in these figured fabrics, simply because they are crepes and this is a crepe season. They are followed by foulards which make light frock dresses, and both these materials lend themselves to the fashionable draperies that vary the straight-line figure while they preserve the slender silhouette. Embroidered linens and crepes are even more simply designed than their printed rivals, but simplicity is characteristic of frocks made from all fabrics having large, all-over printed or embroidered figures.

Costume suits make use of the same printed materials when the pattern shows figures smaller and colors a little more sedate. The printed silk is used for a long overblouse, worn with a plain, wool skirt, and a cape or, perhaps, a coat, of wool like the skirt, lined with silk like that in the blouse.

Both these dresses indicate that designers are experimenting with a higher waistline and that they like to relieve and set off a figured fabric by introducing a plain one in the composition.
