FOUR THOUSAND SHEEP UNLOADED

Four thousand head of Ramboulette, three year old ewes were unloaded here Thursday by D. G. Vick of Young county, who owns a ranch fifteen miles east of Woodson. Mr. Vick bought this herd at Big Lake, Texas and shipped it here over the T. & P. railroad. The herd will be driven overlaid to his ranch.

The Vick ranch consists of 35,000 acres all fenced wolf proof and stocked, after the addition of the present shipment, with 12,000 sheep and 2,000 angora goats.

Mr. Vick reports that he sold 80,000 lbs. of wool last week at 17c per pound and estimated that his spring clip would yield about 100,000 pounds.

"Every farmer" Mr. Vick stated ought to have fifty or one hundred head of sheep on his place. They would pay him a regular dividend that would be just a pick-up; he would get a wool crop a lamb crop, mutton to supply his table with meat, and the flock would absolutely clean up the woods around his premises—all that with scarcely no trouble at all.

Again he adds: "I can take 100 head of sheep at the present price of cotton and make more money on them than any farmer can on fifty acres of cotton and do it with a great deal less labor and trouble."

"People," he adds, "have got to get back to having some sense. The farmer, who depends on cotton alone, is going to find himself cast on the rocks." He further stated that sheep were very little trouble

to care for; that with 12,000 sheep and 3,000 goats, he and his boys with the help of one extra hand cared for them. But he said, "We have to work hard, but what difference does that make?"

Another matter of interest mentioned by Mr. Vick was that during the last three years 350 timber wolves and about 50 bob cats had been caught in the vicinity of his ranch by a government trapper. These animals are great enemies to the sheep or goat raiser.

Mr. Vick has been a resident of Young county for thirty years, was in business in Graham for forty years, and has been in the sheep business for the past 15 years. He is very optimistic and believes there is a silver lining to every cloud. When the writer, on taking leave of Mr. Vick, wished him success in his adventures, he remarked:

"I am just having a darn good time—not grieving about anything. If I make it all right, if I lose, all right."

That on March 19, 1930, plaintiff was lawfully seized and possessed with the following described land and premises, holding and claiming the same in fee simple, to wit: All that certain tract or parcel of land situated in Eastland County, Texas, and being a part of the E. Finley survey, and more particularly as and bounds as follows: BEGINNING at a stone in prairie on the E. B. line of tract conveyed to W. F. Hale, and 256 1-2 vars south from said Hale's Northwest corner; thence south with the East boundary line of said W. F. Hale tract to the center of Leon River; Thence West with the meanderings of said river to a point where said Hale's west boundary line crosses said Leon River; Thence North 59 vars; Thence East 950 vars to the place of beginning, containing 117 1/2 (52) acres of land, more or less and being the same land conveyed to Charles Hartman and F. M. Oldham to E. C. Stewart and wife by deed dated May 21, 1907, recorded in Vol. 63, page 502 of the Deed Records of Eastland County, Texas.
That on said March 19, 1930, defendants unlawfully entered upon said premises and ejected plaintiff therefrom and unlawfully withheld from him the possession thereof to his damage in the sum of \$500.00 save and except 4-64 of the oil, gas and any and all other minerals in and under the above described land and premises.
Not waiving the foregoing, out insisting upon same, plaintiff, plaintiff made, executed and delivered to James L. Walker his certain deed in writing, conveying the above described land and premises, save and except 4-64 of the mineral rights in and under the land and premises heretofore described; that as a part of the consideration for said conveyance said James L. 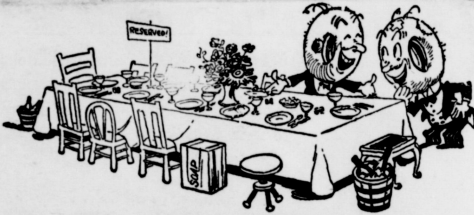

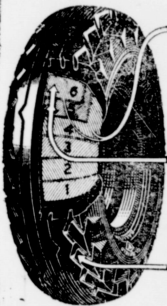
