3 DEAD; MANY HURT IN FIRE

(By Associated Press)
HASKEL, Okla., Aug. 25.—An explosion in a drug store here early today, caused a loss of one life and the injury of several people and a property loss estimated at \$50,000. The explosion occurred when Ezra Dickey, age 22, attempted to light a cigarette in the room at the rear of the drug store building in which escaping gas is thought to have been present.

Dickey was instantly killed by the explosion, and several guests in an adjoining hotel were slightly injured.

MUSKOGEE, Okla., Aug. 25.—Three persons were reported dead and a score injured, and more than a half of the business district of Haskell, Oklahoma, is in flames this morning.

The fire is believed to have been caused by the ignition of gas fumes by a cigarette. The Muskogee fire department rushed to the town, about 22 miles northwest of here, and are fighting the flames.

RUSSIA BUYS MEAT IN ARGENTINA

MOSCOW, Aug. 25.—The Russian Government Grain Produce Company has purchased 2,000,000 pounds of meat in the Argentine, paying 500,000 gold rubles in cash, and the balance in Russian raw products, according to local newspapers.

TEXAN CAUSES ARREST OF 33 CONFIDENCE MEN

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 25.—Using the basement of a church in order that the raid might not be tipped off while in progress, Denver police and Colorado state rangers early today completed a round up and arrest of thirty-three persons alleged to have conducted confidence operations in Colorado, Florida, Cuba and other tourist centers.

The district attorney announced that the information which led to the arrest of the gang was supplied by J. Frank Norfleet, of Hale Center, Texas, who had been "spotted" as a victim. Norfleet, according to the attorney, is the man who unmasked the operators of the so-called Joe Furey gang of con men, which resulted in sending a man to the penitentiary after chasing him across the United States, the prisoner recently dying in the Huntsville penitentiary.

IMPORTANT CHANGES IN STATE GAME LAWS

The open season for killing doves opens September 1st and ends December 15th. No more than fifteen doves may be killed in any one day. The open season for quail does not begin until December 1st and the duck shooting season opens October 16th. Wild turkey gobbler hunting season has been changed, due to the action of the last legislature. The general season thru the state now opens Nov. 1, with a season limit of three gobblers. Due to the scarcity of turkeys there is no open season, and even gobblers may not be shot in Cameron, Hidalgo, Willacy, Kennedy, Starr, Brooks, Jim Hogg and McMullen counties.

OFFICERS SEEK FOUR CONVICTS

HOUSTON, Aug. 25.—No trace has been found, according to the officers early today, of the four convicts who late yesterday, overpowered the guards at the Eastham farm near Trinity, and made their escape. Prison guards and officers throughout East Texas counties are engaged in the man hunt.

The sheriff told the party that the negroes had been removed to some other point, and the party then continued on their way, apparently giving up the hunt.

MENACED BY DEATH CRIPPLE DROPS HIS CRUTCHES AND RUNS

PARIS, Aug. 25.—A miracle for which Lourdes, in some quarters, is given credit, is reported from Macon.

A pilgrim train bound for Lourdes was waiting in the station at Dijon and several pilgrims had crossed the tracks to the refreshment room when the whistle called them back. Among them was a paralyzed man who could only move with difficulty even with the aid of two crutches. As he was between the rails on his way back an express train was seen to be entering the station. A cry of horror went up from those who saw his dangerous position, but the man who had hobbled half way across with his crutches, now put them under his arm and ran for safety, escaping what seemed certain death.

MANSFIELD, La., Aug. 25.—A party of fifty or more men, traveling in ten automobiles, presumably from Shreveport, arrived here early today in search of Robert Sewall and Louis Sims, negroes, who confessed yesterday that they attacked a couple who were motoring from Houston to Shreveport, and seriously injured both persons. The couple gave their names as William A. Green and sister-in-law, Mrs. Green. Mrs. Green was beaten into unconsciousness by the two negroes.

DEMAND FOR TECHNICAL MEN IS ON THE INCREASE

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Aug. 25.—The demand for engineers and technical men of almost every type has increased so much within the last month that many sections of the country are experiencing difficulty in filling vacancies, says the report of the employment department of the American Association of Engineers.

Largest activity has been displayed in the building industry with highway and municipal work progressing with added vigor, the report states. The demand for architectural and structural draftsmen and designers with building or plant experience has far exceeded the supply in almost all sections of the country.

"While the general conditions are better at this time than they have been for more than two years, there is still some irregularity but the main trend shows improvement supported by prospects of further gain," the report continued. "Added reasons for a more hopeful feeling appear in the continued increase in the operation of the iron and steel industry, the diminishing of unemployment of skilled and unskilled labor and the active progression of building operation."

MANY PEOPLE HEAR SANDERFER

A crowd estimated at from 1,000 to 1,500 heard Dr. J. D. Sanderfer deliver the speech which closed the present political campaign at Ballinger Thursday night. The large crowd occupied seats on the lawn on the South corner of the court house square and in autos which were parked along the curbing, and listened with close attention for about two hours at an arraignment of Ferguson, Catholicism, and the liquor interests and at a defense of Mayfield, prohibition, protestantism and the Ku Klux Klan.

Dr. Sanderfer was introduced by Judge A. K. Doss, and the crowd who heard the speaker was made up of citizens from different sections of the county, those occupying seats on the platform being S. W. Caswell, of Norton, Jeff Brooks and W. D. Jennings, of Miles, B. J. Clayton, of Benoit, Dee Oliver, R. E. Willingham, Scott H. Mack, C. P. Shepherd, T. S. Lankford, J. L. Chastain, Rev. Jess. Mitchell, Judge Doss, and others.

The speaker denied the claim made by Ferguson speakers that the status of the prohibition law could not be changed should wet members make up the national congress, and he pointed to the fact that while the Eighteenth Amendment had been adopted, that congress must fix the enacting laws, governing prohibition, and that congress could from time to time repeal or amend the enacting laws governing the percentage of alcohol in liquor, defining what constitutes intoxicating liquors, and that should the anti elect a wet congress booze could be placed on sale in every drug store and other place of business which wanted to sell it.

Dr. Sanderfer reviewed the various charges on which Mr. Ferguson was impeached, and declared that while Mr. Ferguson was appealing to the people to remove the stigma from his name, that he had never repented of the sin and had never made an apology for robbing the state. He charged that Ferguson was not only being backed by the liquor interests of Texas and the United States, but was being backed by the liquor interests of Europe, and that \$300,000 was deposited in a Dallas bank recently to be used in the Texas campaign. "Practically all foreigners, and practically all Catholics who vote in this election will, vote for Ferguson," said the speaker.

Dr. Sanderfer defended the private record of Earl Mayfield, stating that he made a personal investigation of the charges which he said were never heard of until Ferguson entered the run-off against Mayfield, and that he talked to men who had been closely and daily associated with Mayfield for the past sixteen years, and that these men branded Ferguson's charges as false. The speaker stated that affidavits had been made refuting Ferguson charges.

Dr. Sanderfer defended the private record of Earl Mayfield, stating that he made a personal investigation of the charges which he said were never heard of until Ferguson entered the run-off against Mayfield, and that he talked to men who had been closely and daily associated with Mayfield for the past sixteen years, and that these men branded Ferguson's charges as false. The speaker stated that affidavits had been made refuting Ferguson charges.

The speaker defended the Ku Klux Klan, briefly stating what the Klan stood for and referred to a number of instances which had come under his observation in his home town of Abilene, where the Klan had proved very beneficial to society. He denied the charges that the Klan went out masked and whipped people. He stated that in his town they went out unmasked in broad open day light and cleaned up some cases where the law had failed to serve the purpose. He declared the Klan was here to stay and was growing by leaps and bounds, no other secret or-

MEET ENDS WITHOUT AGREEING

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—All attempts to end the rail strike by separate settlement with the individual railroad heads failed today. The conference was broken off and the railroad heads are preparing to leave town.

In announcing the breaking off of negotiations, David Williams, head of the Eastern strike committee, said, "Nothing else could have happened."

One of the brotherhood leaders said after the conference, "The mediators made every possible effort to bring about a settlement."

Both sides indicated that there was no likelihood at present that negotiations would be resumed.

From official sources it was learned that the breakup between the brotherhood mediators and road executives came when the labor group rejected the proposal advanced by the roads which was regarded by the executives as representing a big concession.

The statement by the executives disclaimed any desire to take advantage of the strike situation to curtail the pensions of the strikers, or curtail other privileges which the strikers had earned before quitting, and expressed a willingness to restore all strikers with pension privileges unimpaired.

The labor unions gave out a statement at labor headquarters to the effect that they were prepared for a fight to the finish.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—The brotherhood chiefs and the railroad executives again faced one another across the conference table today in an attempt to settle the shopmen's strike, by effecting agreements with individual roads. The brotherhood representatives are acting as mediators for the striking shopmen, and when the conference adjourned yesterday both sides were still arguing the question, with no decision in sight.

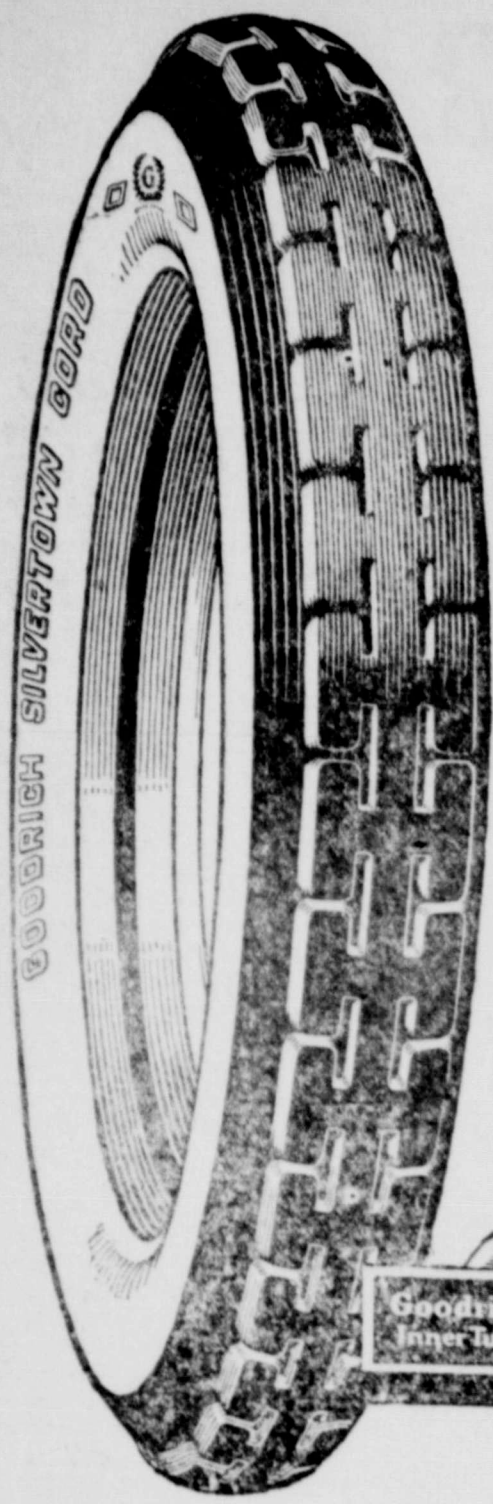

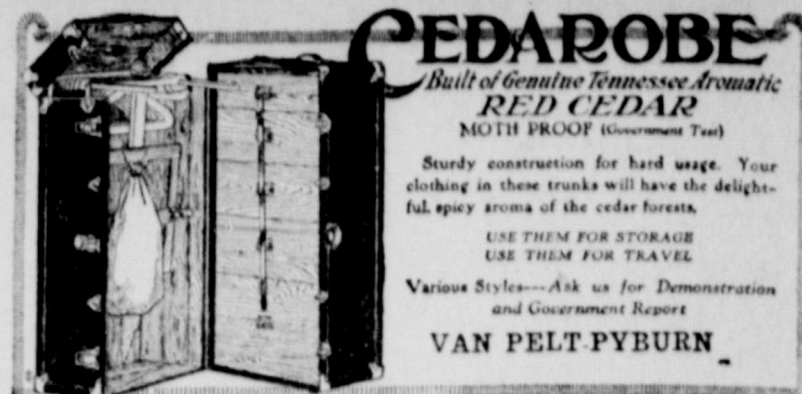

DEAUVILLE, France, Aug. 25. Deauville will see a notable gathering of kings during this month and next. King Albert of Belgium, King Alfonso of Spain, King Ferdinand of Rumania, the Shah of Persia, and the Emperor of Annam all are expected to spend several weeks in this fashionable watering resort. Most of them will bring their wives, and a gay season is anticipated.

Deauville hopes that King Constantine of Greece may be lured temporarily from his throne to taste some of the pleasures and diversions of the smart seaside town, and that King Alexander of Yugoslavia and his youthful consort, Queen Marie, may spend a part of his protracted honeymoon here.

AIRPLANE AND TRACTORS AID ALASKA'S PROGRESS

(By Associated Press)
 ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Aug. 25.—Remote sections of Alaska, weeks and months away from the railroad under the old transportation methods, are being brought closer to the seaports and railroad towns by the airplane and tractor.
 Two sections of Alaska, the Iditarod and the great Kuskokwim country, reached from here in the winter only after a fifteen days' trip with a dog team, can be made in two or three days by airplane.
 The tractor's part in the revolution of transportation methods comes in hauling ore and coal from the mines to the railroads. The army-type caterpillar tractor, dragging from 20 to 50 tons, breaks its own trail over the snow and is rapidly taking the place of the horse in many places.
 Sections of the far away Alaska peninsula and Aleutian islands with their oil possibilities, are soon to be prospected by airplane for a group of Anchorage business men. The machine will be of the hydroplane type and will alight in the rivers, bays and lakes for shore work.
 One aviator, C. O. Hammontree, is considering establishing a chain of stations in the interior to which he can carry supplies by the air route. At present the prospectors on the "inside" generally spend their spring months hauling supplies in over the snow trails. Hammontree's plan is to carry supplies to established

posts and thus save the prospectors the heavy task of pulling their food and equipment over the snow. The stations would be on the lakes or rivers so the plane could light on the water.

BULLETIN SAYS PLOWING BARN LOTS HELPS HOGS

(By Associated Press)
 WASHINGTON, August 25.—Hog raisers may accomplish two desirable results by plowing up the barn lots at least once a year, says the United States Department of Agriculture. In the first place, hogs need good succulent pasture as much of the time as is possible, and in the second place they need protection against internal parasites such as roundworms, the eggs of which remain in the soil.
 Turning over the soil in the lots helps to get rid of the pests and the crop of forage makes it a profitable operation. In addition to providing cheap protein feed, pasture crops aid as a laxative and require the hogs to take a certain amount of exercise, which is necessary to breeding animals and growing pigs.
 Rye is probably the best crop

to use for fall, winter and spring pasture for hogs, the department's circular states. In warmer climates the crop may be put in at various times up to as late as December. By putting in successive plantings from two to four weeks apart it is possible to have fresh pasturage all the time

DEATHS

Mrs. C. S. Herring died suddenly at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Shannon McWilliams, 14 miles Northwest of Ballinger. Death came at 4 o'clock Thursday afternoon, Mrs. Herring passing away without warning, and unexpectedly. She enjoyed a hearty noon meal, but complained of not feeling as well as usual and went in to her room to rest. Later Mrs. McWilliams found her dead on her bed.

Mrs. Herring was the widow of Andrew Herring, a pioneer of Runnels county, who died about seventeen years ago. She was seventy-five years and four months old, and for thirty-five years had been a citizen of Runnels county. She was born in

Germany, but came to the United States at an early age and moved to Runnels county from Austin county in 1887. Mr. and Mrs. Herring located in the Pean Springs country, where they purchased a large block of land, later subdividing it into smaller tracts, and all the Herring children were given homesteads.

Deceased is survived by three sons, five daughters, and one step daughter, and forty-four grand children and seven great-grand children. The children are August and Andy Herring, Mrs. L. C. Jamison, Mrs. Henry Knox, Mrs. C. F. Reasoner, of Talpa; Mrs. Feb McWilliams, Mrs. Jim Clayton and Mrs. Shannon McWilliams, and Robert Herring, of Ballinger; and Mrs. Mary Spreen, step-daughter, of Ballinger.

The funeral services were held Friday afternoon. The funeral procession formed at the home of Mr. and Mrs. McWilliams on Valley Creek, where death occurred, and the remains were followed to the Herring family burial ground eight miles North of Talpa where interment was made. Rev. B. Bierbaum conducted the funeral services. Quite a number from Ballinger and from Talpa, and surrounding country attended the funeral services and paid the last sad rites and tribute to the pioneer woman.
