CONFERENCE MAY LEAD TO STRIKE SETTLEMENT

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—Administration officials who have been keeping in close touch with the industrial situation, declared today that a settlement of the shopmen's strike is "probable" as the result of conferences which are scheduled to be held in Chicago within the next two or three days.

CHICAGO, Sept. 8.—B. M. Jewell, head of the federated shop crafts; William Johnston, president of the International Association of Machinists; and Martin Ryan, president of the Brotherhood of Carmen, arrived here today from the East. Upon their arrival they were served with notices of temporary injunction granted by the government against the strikers last Friday.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Sept. 8.—The inauguration of the impeachment proceedings against Attorney General Daugherty as proposed by the New York Labor Council, will be brought before the executive council of the American Federation of Labor when the council meets here tomorrow, according to the announcement of Matthew Welt, vice-president of the federation. The labor unions are requesting that impeachment proceedings be pushed against Daugherty on account of the injunction suit filed by him against striking shopmen.

"FLYING PARSON" BOUND FOR HOME

RUTLAND, Va., Sept. 8.—The body of Lieut. Belvin Maynard, "flying parson," who was killed with two companions when their plane fell here yesterday, is today homeward bound for Maynard, North Carolina.
The "Flying Parson" was killed while giving an exhibition flight at the Rutland fair grounds yesterday, and the two companions who went up in the plane with him had their lives crushed out at the same time. Maynard and his companions circled Bald Mountain near the city and returning attempted to loop the loop. He is believed to have misjudged his height and when he came over for the last time one of the wings of the plane struck the ground and the men were crushed into a post and instantly killed.

DALLAS NEGROES TO HELP BUILD ROADS

Two trucks loaded with fifteen or twenty negroes, passed thru Ballinger Friday morning en route from Dallas to San Angelo, where the negroes will be employed on highway work. Farmers here on the lookout for cotton pickers, and thinking the negroes were coming here to pick cotton, interrogated them. When asked if they couldn't make more money picking cotton than working on the road, one negro was heard to say, "no sir, boss, I can't pick cotton; don't know nuffin 'bout dat stuff." The negroes stopped here for breakfast.

STEPHENS PLACED ON THE DEMOCRATIC COMMITTEE

GREEK CABINET ATTEMPT TO KILL IS OVERTHROWN PRES. MILLERAND

ATHENS, Greece, Sept. 8.—The Greek cabinet resigned yesterday and steps were taken today looking to the forming of a new ministry immediately.
The resignation of the old cabinet was the result of pressure brought to bear by public opinion resulting from military reverses in Asia Minor.
PARIS, Sept. 8.—Rumors that King Constantine of Greece intends to abdicate is current in several European capitals today. The reports have been given more color by the sudden recall of the Greek heir apparent, Prince George, to Athens from Bucharest.

COLORADO MAY SUPPLY WATER

(By Associated Press)
U. S. HAS NO MONOPOLY ON LABOR TROUBLES
NAGASAKI, Japan, Sept. 8.—The sea weed gatherers of Mayekatamura have adopted "direct action" with a vengeance. Dissatisfied with rate of pay, 300 employed by Fujimatsu Usami, who enjoys the monopoly right to gather edible sea weeds and to engage in fishing along the village coast, stormed the home of their employer and breaking into the warehouse, carried away quantities of sea weed. The villagers are given four per cent of what they bring in as wages. The price of sea weed recently experienced a remarkable rise and is now quoted at 2.50 yen per kit. This makes Usami's business very lucrative. The villagers, convinced that the sea weed off the coast of the village was common property, and deeming the four per cent wage insufficient, appointed a representative to present a demand on their employer for an additional allowance of 1.25 yen for men and 1 yen for women per diem. This being denied they carried away about 900 kin of sea weed stored in the warehouse.

37 BILLED IN MINE MASSACRE

MARION, Ill., Sept. 8.—A recheck of the list of men indicted yesterday by the grand jury which has been probing the Herrin mine massacre, shows thirty-seven instead of thirty-eight indicted. Through an error one man was indicted twice under different names. Four of the men indicted are now in jail and the officers are searching for others and they will all be placed in jail, as fast as apprehended.

YANGTZE RIVER TO BE IMPROVED

SHANGHAI, Sept. 8.—The Yangtze River Commission which is directing a project for the improvement of the great waterway has appointed George G. Strobe, chief survey engineer in connection with the project. Mr. Strobe was in the Philippine government service for 12 years as hydraulic engineer, designing irrigation, river and harbor works. Before he went to the Philippines he was graduated from Chicago University in 1902 and received a degree from the University of Michigan in 1904, subsequently teaching civil engineering at the University of Michigan for a period of years.

NEARLY MILLION BALES GINNED

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—A board of investigation by the senate agricultural committee into the methods and practices employed in marketing cotton was ordered today in the adoption of a resolution offered by Senator Smith, Democrat of South Carolina. The resolution seeks to determine whether there is any interference with the law of supply and demand in the cotton market.
The cotton ginnings for the 1922 crop prior to Sept. 1st amounted to 817,171 bales, and following is the report by states, according to the government census report made Friday:

LOOKING AFTER COTTON GAMBLER

(By Associated Press)
PITTSBURGH, Pa., Sept. 8.—The second section of a Pennsylvania system mail train, No. 11, was derailed West of Altoona, and two postal clerks and one passenger slightly injured. The cause of the derailment has not been determined.
Within less than a month five bridges have been burned in Oklahoma under mysterious circumstances, and other instances of tampering with railroad equipment and endangering lives of train crews and passengers have been reported to the authorities.
Four men are being held today in connection with the burning of a bridge near El Reno on August 17th. One of the men has made a confession, it is alleged, and the confession indicated a well organized plot among the strikers to destroy bridges and terrorize train service by intimidating the crews with a view of bringing about a general walk out of the railroad workers of the state.

DALLAS—Data in the office of the Texas Railroad Commission show that there are 375 natural gas wells in Texas. The potential capacity of these wells, according to reports to the commission amounts to one billion, three hundred and sixty million cubic feet each day of 24 hours. According to the U. S. Geological Survey in 1920, natural gas was used in Texas to the extent of 9,894,000,000 cubic feet for domestic purposes; 4,524,000,000 feet for manufacturing; 30,634,000,000 for oil field power; and other industries used 4,415,000,000 cubic feet.

AUTO THIEVES GET FORD HERE

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Passing up a Pierce-Arrow and an Essex roadster parked in the same garage, auto thieves rolled a Ford car from the garage of Mrs. R. A. Nicholson Friday morning and made a good get-away with it. No clue was left behind.
The members of the Nicholson family used the Ford Thursday night, meeting the midnight train and driving the car in the garage about twelve-thirty. Mrs. Nicholson heard the car when it was driven away about two o'clock Friday morning, but thinking it was a neighbor leaving in his car paid no attention to it.
The Ford had been in use almost a year, and was covered by theft insurance which would have expired the 24th of this month, the policy being in the Robert F. Lane insurance agency.
This is the second Ford stolen here within the last few weeks, indicating that the thieves are operating in West Texas, and have picked Ballinger as a good field.

"THE MAN WHO MARRIED HIS OWN WIFE" FOTOSHO

Following is a review of the picture to be presented at the Fo-to-sho Theatre, Ballinger, Friday and Saturday of this week: "There is released in the forefront of this picture as vivid a line of action as has started a serial off to big returns. The scene is the bounding deep with a storm-tossed schooner buffeted about by the angry waves. The skipper is a brutal type and his orders are usually emphasized by a strong right arm and a closed fist. The director has balanced his action so that some excellent miniature effects are shown in conjunction with some genuine shots. The storm, the sinking of the boat after its collision with a yacht which carries the heroine—gives the spectator a treat in picturesque action. It is great stuff. But like the storm that eventually subsides the story loses its punch, and thereafter becomes a fantastic melodrama revolving around a marital misunderstanding. When the two boats sink beneath the waves, the subsequent shot reveals a raft with the skipper, a mate, and the girl aboard. The next heard from them is in a subtitle which says that the hero a few years later, has emerged as a wealthy shipowner. It is a distinct shock to see Frank Mayo disfigured as a result of the collision on the high seas. And he has not done justice to his face in the make up. The close-up of a putty nose shows the manner in which it is placed into position. And a false beard does not add to his appearance. Realizing that his wife is losing interest in him and self-conscious over his injury he leaves home ostensibly to kill himself but in reality goes East to undergo an operation to make himself attractive in his wife's eyes.

The plot becomes quite involved because it touches upon an Enoch Arden vein and presents him living a dual life. Confident that he can win back his wife he returns to San Francisco. But he finds her madly in love with a young philanderer, altho she respects his memory. He has "faked" a suicide, leaving his "widow" his big shipping business. So he drops into his old offices and the stenographer recognizes him. And the other man also learns his identity. The climax shows the villain attempting to kill him on a yachting cruise and meeting his just reward. The story is unusual, but so highly improbable that it will be accepted as fiction and nothing else. Its originality however, will appeal to many screengoers.

IN AUTUMN'S FORMAL SUITS RICH ADORNMENTS APPEAR



IS IT the longer skirt that has turned suits into paths that lead to dignity and distinction, or does the cause lie as far back as the reaction that brought in the longer skirt? Anyway a change of fashion's mood appears everywhere, in all sorts of apparel, and it is a change that leads away from vagaries and flippancy and toward beauty and grace. Women have cause to rejoice in this rejection of sensational clothes.
 The procession of suits leads off, naturally, with the strictly tailored and mannish types that are to be worn day in and day out; the utility suits in which American tailors excel. They have charms of their own—neatness, fine lines, marvelous tailoring. For them English suitings, heather mixtures, pinstrip and other twills and serge are chosen. Their skirts are plain, just wide enough for comfort in walking, and hang in straight lines. Their coats vary in length and are occasionally braided-trimmed, but usually plain and have notched lapels, patch pockets, small collars and plain coat sleeves with narrow cuffs.

The dressier suits cannot be disposed of in general terms for they differ greatly. The cloths chosen for them are those with soft and supple texture and velvety surface like duchesse or velours. Embroideries, fur ornaments, buttons and tassels are elements that are skillfully used to elaborate the rich materials and there are many suits that include a dress and a coat instead of a skirt and coat. Velours appears in the handsome suit shown at the left of the two formal models pictured. It has a trimming of braided embroidery on the coat and skirt and gray caracul fur in the collar and deep cuffs. The sleeves and panels in the coat are managed inconspicuously. Another straight-line coat, in the suit at right, has set in sleeves and is richly brocaded. The collar and sleeve binding is of black caracul and the middle of leather.

SAY MOTHER'S METHODS ARE NOW OUT OF DATE

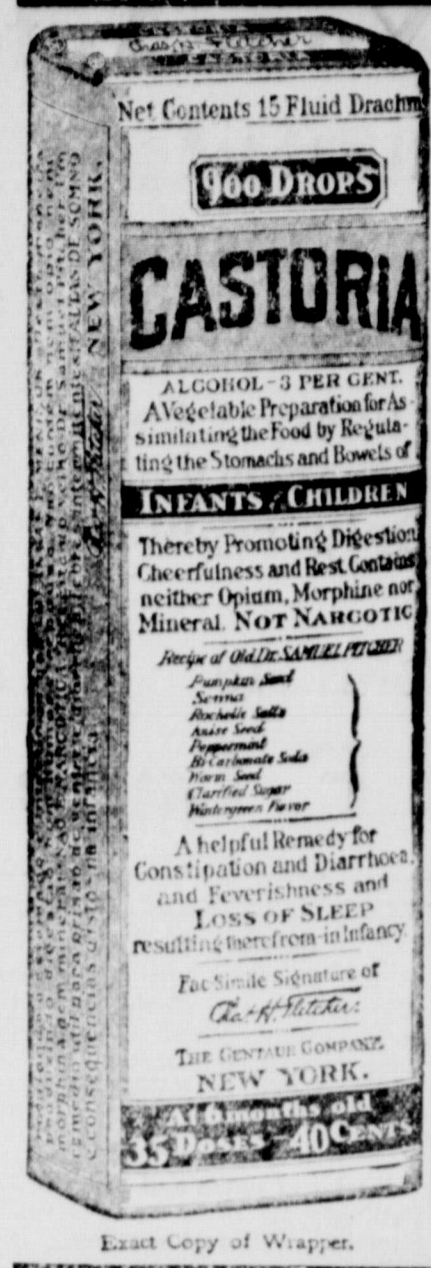
(By Associated Press)
 CHICAGO, Sept. 8.—Scientists will attempt to demonstrate that mother's methods in baking bread are out of date when the Bakery Exposition and conventions of national baker associations are held here September 11 to 16.
 How modern scientific control has taken all chance and possibility of mishap out of what was once mother's "intuition" in getting a good bake of family bread will be shown at the exposition to be held on the municipal pier.
 Huge steel-armed bread mixers, each having the strength and working force of 200,000 women, traveling ovens and other modern machinery will demonstrate the exactitude in the modern bake shop.
 Progress of the baking industry within the last fifteen years will be shown in machinery valued at more than \$1,000,000 which will be in operation, turning out bread, pies and cakes according to present day quantity production methods.
