Republicans Say Mayfield Is Not Legally Nominated

COUNTY EXHIBIT WINS FOURTH

Special to The Ledger: ABILENE, Sept. 27.—The committee in charge of the Runnels county exhibit at the West Texas Fair, filed a protest with the fair association last night as a result of the awards made by the judge passing on the various county exhibits. Runnels county was awarded fourth place, and the committee contends that the awards were not made according to rules governing the judging.

The Runnels county exhibit is one of the best ever made at the West Texas Fair and is attracting much attention, and favorable comment. The fair association gave the Runnels county committee a hearing last night, and will give the complaint further consideration and determine whether the judging was according to the rules or not.

Stuart L. Williams and C. S. Guin returned home from Abilene Wednesday morning. They are sorely disappointed at the treatment received at the hands of the judge who made the awards in the county exhibits, and feel that they have a just complaint. "We will not be so egotistical as to say that we had the best arranged booth," said Mr. Guin, "but it was generally conceded that for variety and quality we had them all bested." Mr. Guin stated that the judge did not take into consideration the variety of exhibits which was required according to the rules printed in the catalog.

EXCEPTIONAL CAST IN LATEST MINTER FILM

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Sept. 27.—A formal protest against the certification of the name of Earle B. Mayfield as the Democratic candidate for United States senator was filed with the Secretary of State by R. B. Creager, Republican state chairman.

Mr. Creager alleges in his petition that the Democratic primary elections at which Mayfield was nominated were not held in accordance with the state laws governing the holding of such elections, and it is upon these grounds that he bases his protest.

The protest against Mayfield's nomination upholds the legality of the nomination of George E. Paddy as the Republican nominee, Creager contending that Paddy's nomination was in due form and according to law, while Mayfield's nomination was not made according to law.

The protest filed by Creager declares that the Democratic primary elections were not conducted by "duly appointed and constituted election officers," as required by the act passed by the 1913 legislature. It further stated that the 1913 act providing for primary elections was unconstitutional under the subsequent decisions of the state supreme court, therefore the provision upon which the opponent to the Republican nominee bases his contentions are barred.

The protest has been submitted to the attorney general's department by Secretary of State Staples for a ruling.

URGE TREE PLANTING FOR EACH OF FAMILY

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, Sept. 27.—Plant a tree for every member of the family during Tree Planting Week, October 27 to November 3, is being urged by the Plant Another Tree Association.

Chambers of commerce and other civic clubs throughout the country are planning to observe the week in the planting of memory trees, birthday trees and many other observances of a public character, according to officers.

In addition, each family is urged to observe the week by planting trees about the home, naming each for some member of the family, and, if possible, making the observance a home-coming and reunion.

The week will be started with Arbor Day celebrations.

(By Associated Press) AMARILLO, Sept. 27.—Scores of men searched the country around Amarillo today for Arthur E. Stinson, local dairyman, who has been missing since last Monday.

Stinson's abandoned car was found yesterday with blood stains on the seat, and appeals were sent out for help to search the country in an effort to locate him. Officers called for help last night and a country-wide search began at once.

It is now believed that Stinson met with foul play and that his body has been carried off or destroyed.

FOUR HURT AS CAR TURNS OVER

While returning from Abilene Tuesday night, where they had been to attend the West Texas Fair, four persons were more or less injured and all the occupants of a Buick touring car had a narrow escape when the car turned over at a sharp turn on the Ballinger-Winters road about eleven miles from Ballinger.

Floyd Kennedy, owner of the car, of San Angelo, came to Ballinger Tuesday morning, and was accompanied to Abilene by Mr. and Mrs. F. Carr, Misses Eleanor Kirk, Kathleen Baker, and Tom Fry. Mr. Fry was driving when the accident occurred. He was not familiar with the road and when the car hit the sharp turn it went into the ditch, the wheels giving way and throwing the car completely over.

Mr. Carr suffered a cut on the head, Mrs. Carr was injured about the shoulders, Miss Eleanor Kirk suffered an injured back, and Mr. Fry came out of the smash with an injured hand. None of the injuries are believed to be serious. Miss Kirk suffered the greatest injury of any of the others of the party, and an X-ray examination will be made to determine the extent of her injuries.

The turn in the road where this accident occurred is a dangerous place, and this is not the first accident charged against it. A few months ago a car turned over at this point when a party of young folks from Ballinger were returning from Winters, and several in the car were injured and all experienced a narrow escape.

Mr. Kennedy, owner of the automobile, which was badly wrecked in the accident Tuesday night, was assembling parts Wednesday to make repairs. The steering wheel and wheels of the car were smashed and it was otherwise damaged. None of the parties were thrown clear of the car, all remaining in when the auto turned over, and they consider the escape from more serious injury or death as being nothing short of miraculous.

It is unofficially forecasted that the Kemal reply to the allied peace note contains conditions unacceptable to the allies, and that the Nationalists will insist upon the occupation of the Dardanelles for the transporting of troops to Thrace before beginning the peace conference.

(Associated Press Dispatch) LONDON, Sept. 27.—Greece is in the grip of a revolutionary movement. King Constantine is reported to have abdicated, and part of the navy has gone against the government. Several warships manned by the revolutionaries are believed to be advancing on the capital from the Aegean Islands where the revolt originated.

Order for the demobilization of certain troops is said to have caused the mutiny. An officer named Gonatas is leading the insurrection. Central News Agency dispatches from Athens announce that Constantine signed the abdication decree without reservation.

ATHENS, Sept. 27.—King Constantine has accepted the resignation of the Grecian cabinet, which quickly followed the receipt of two ultimatums from the Cruiser Lemnos. The ultimatums demanded the dissolution of the national assembly and the formation of a people's cabinet friendly to the entente.

ISSUES CALL FOR TARIFF MEETING

(By Associated Press) FT. WORTH, Sept. 27.—A session of the Southern Tariff Congress will be held in Washington on October 6th and 7th to discuss the McCumber foreign tariff measure and its effect upon every community in the South. This was a statement in a call issued today by headquarters of the congress here. John H. Kirby, of Houston, president of the tariff congress, signed the call for the meeting.

CONCHO COUNTY VALUES DECREASE

Special to The Ledger: PAINT ROCK, Sept. 27.—The valuation of real and personal property for taxes in this county amounts to \$5,071,309.48, which is \$205,672 less than last year. The Commissioners' Court has approved the tax rolls. The county is reported to be in good shape financially, the bonded indebtedness amounting to only \$17,000.

From time to time and many times throughout the year, efforts are made to call the people together in religious, political and other meetings, and only a small per cent of them can

attend on account of being unable to get seats. The autos are responsible for increased attendance at all such public meetings, and it is up to the citizens to provide accommodations or quit inviting the people from the surrounding country to come to Ballinger on such occasions.

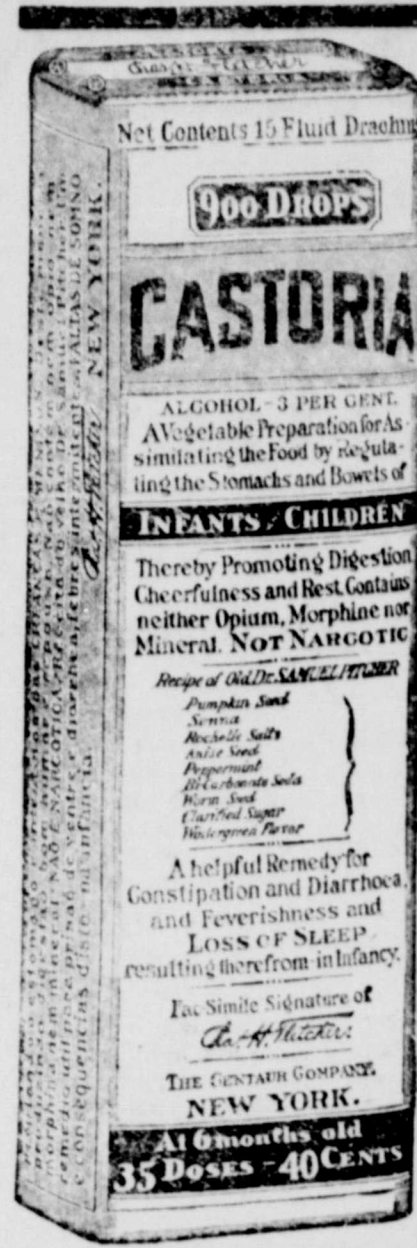
GINS HUMMING ALL NIGHT
 Local gins could be heard humming all night Tuesday night, and cotton receipts are rapidly increasing at the local yard. The local gins have turned out about 2500 bales up to today. The Day gin experienced a break down which caused a day or two's delay. This gin is being used exclusively for Mebane long staple cotton, farmers having made a contract to pay a little higher rate to get the gin exclusively for long staple in order to keep the seed from becoming mixed with other varieties of cotton.

The cotton crop is moving fast and with favorable weather most of it will be picked within the next six weeks.

TO HOLD NATIONAL POULTRY CONGRESS

HAMLINE, Minn., Sept. 27.—Organization work for the National Poultry Congress, which will give its first exhibition in connection with the National Dairy Show at the Minnesota State Fair grounds, October 7 to 14, has been completed, and Geo. W. Hackett, of Minneapolis, has been chosen first director of the congress.

Mr. Hackett, who was the government poultry specialist in Minnesota during the war until promoted to the district superintendent of eight states, is at present divisional director of the American Poultry Association.

Canada has been asked to cooperate in the congress and it is planned to make it international in scope, Mr. Hackett said today. The dairy show management, leading farm paper editors and poultry interests everywhere, boys' and girls' clubs and agricultural colleges throughout the country have promised support of the show.

Work on the premium lists has been begun. Judging teams from leading agricultural universities will be given places as selectors. Speakers nationally prominent in the poultry industry will be placed on the daily programs, it is announced.

NEW TUBE TO AUGMENT RADIO BROADCASTING

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Sept. 27. — The world's largest vacuum tube, standing three feet in height and three and one-half inches in diameter at the bottom, has been completed in the laboratories of the Western Electric Company, officials announced today.

The tube is capable of supplying 100,000 watts, 200 times the power required for the usual radio broadcasting stations of 100-mile range.

The difficulty in experiments was to make the whole tube air tight and to set the wires for the filament and grid into the tube while keeping them insulated against about 20,000 volts.

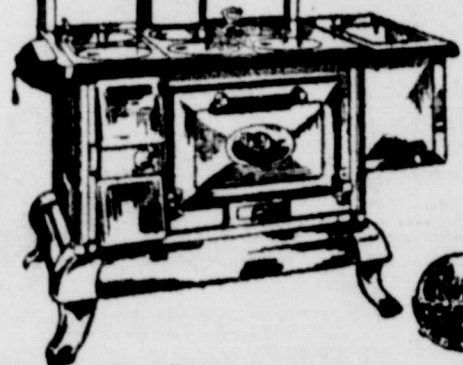
After much study the problem was narrowed down to finding a way to make an air-tight joint between the heavy copper tube which forms the "plate" and the glass of the upper part of the tube and to bring the heavy wires thru this glass.

Credit for the answer is due W. G. Houskeeper, a company engineer, who discovered a way to seal copper to glass which would make an air-tight joint that would not crack at any ordinary working temperature.
