WOMAN SUCCEEDS WATSON IN SENATE

NEW ORDER IS GRANTED A CHARTER

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Oct. 3.—The Daughters of the American Republic, a national non-profit organization, was chartered by Secretary of State Staples today. The purposes as given in the application for the charter are for "encouraging a religious spirit, a spirit of equality and help to protect the unfortunate, encourage Sunday law observance, respect for God, Christianity, church, state, flag, and the constitution of America, and for the active participation in the enforcement of the law thru the regular channels."
Tyler, Texas was named as headquarters for the new order.

FINAL REPORT ON EDUCATION

AUSTIN, Oct. 3.—The final report and recommendations for improvement of a higher educational system in Texas are being prepared by the higher educational survey commission which was provided for by the last legislature. The commission is in session here today, and their recommendations and report will be presented to the next legislature.

ORGANIZE BAND BIG MEMBERSHIP

Twenty-four men signed for membership at the first meeting and since then about ten others have been lined up, giving the band a membership of over thirty to begin with. The old members of former bands are very enthusiastic over the beginning and think that within a very short time Ballinger will have one of the best bands in West Texas.

Troy Simpson was elected as Secretary and General Manager with an executive committee to act in an advisory position, composed of Mayor Raby, Stuart L. Williams, Harry Lynn and Fulton Lane. Mr. King was elected Director and the work of lining men up for different sections was completed at the Sunday meeting.

The executive committee is looking for suitable quarters for a band hall and will hold the first rehearsal Wednesday night and will announce at what place tomorrow.

Among old musicians who have helped to make bands a success here before and who have lined up with the present organization are N. Passur, Chas. Boyd, Fulton Lane, Harry Lynn, Troy Simpson, Billie Cordill, James Ladwig, and others. Many of the new members signed have had quite a little experience on some instrument and will be in shape to play in a short time.

It is the plan of the band to play the first concert in about a month and while the band is a young institution Mr. King feels that with the amount of old material he will be able to stage a concert in that length of time.

BROTHERHOODS SIGN AGREEMENT WITH R.R.

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Oct. 3.—A new agreement for maintaining the old rates of pay and rules of working conditions was signed today by representatives of approximately forty-nine railroads and subsidiaries and the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen and the Order of Railway Conductors. The agreement will be in effect until October 21, 1923.

All disputes as to rules and working conditions now pending before the United States Railroad Labor Board will be withdrawn by both sides. The Western roads are said to have made some concessions.

The agreement signed today included the principal railroads entering Chicago and traversing the territory West of the Mississippi River. The roads included are the Santa Fe, Rock Island, Ft. Worth & Denver City, Texas Midland, and Trinity & Brazos Valley.

TAX PAYING GETS GOOD BEGINNING

Tax Collector Brown reports a good day for the first day of the tax paying season. Mr. Brown opened his tax rolls for the issuance of receipts Monday morning, Sept. 2nd, and C. R. Stephens was the first tax payer to draw Poll Tax Receipt No. 1, giving Mrs. Stephens No. 2. Six poll tax receipts were issued during the first day, Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Wilson, of the Winkate country; Mrs. W. P. Jones, of the Valley Creek country; and Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Miller, of Norton, making up the list of the first to come.

In addition to issuing the six poll tax receipts Collector Brown reported that he collected about \$1,000 in tax money, which was a good start for the day. All those who paid their poll tax also paid all their other taxes, and are now in good standing with the county and state.

Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Miller paid what they said would be their last tax paying in Rannels county. They have sold out and are leaving for Briggs, Texas, where they will make their home. They have been citizens of this county for many years.

The tax rolls contain more than 6,600 polls this year, and while next year is an off year in politics there is sure to be some demand for a poll tax receipt, to say nothing of the moral obligation which rests upon man and woman to pay, and the payments will no doubt be up to the high mark.

GINNERS REPORT IS ABOVE '21

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—A reduction of 440,000 bales of cotton during the month of September in prospective cotton production this year was shown in the Department of Agriculture's forecast today. The forecast placed the crop at 10,135,000 bales.

The forecast for Texas is given at 3,412,000 bales, and the Texas crop condition is given at 52 per cent, which is two per cent higher than the condition for the entire cotton region.

The condition of the cotton crop in the United States on Sept. 25th was given at 50 per cent compared with 42.2 per cent condition on the same date a year ago.

The ginners' report shows that up to Sept. 25th this year 3,853,006 bales of cotton had been ginned as compared with 2,920,392 on same date last year.

The crop estimate for the present is given at 10,135,000 bales against 6,537,000, the estimate made on the same date last year.

The ginners' report and condition report as made public by the Census Bureau had little effect on the market.

According to official count 14,995 bales of cotton had been ginned in Rannels county up to the close of business Sept. 23rd. At that time it was estimated that the total yield for the county would be about 33,000 bales. It is reported that the total ginnings up to Saturday night, Sept. 30th, amounted to a little better than 20,000 bales, and some claim that not more than half the crop was picked at that time. The more conservative forecasters say the county will produce between 30,000 and 35,000 bales.

TEXAN IS COTTON BELT PRESIDENT

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 3.—Daniel Uptegrove was today elected president of the Cotton Belt railroad. He had been acting as president of the road since the death of President J. M. Herbert on August 5th.

Mr. Uptegrove is a native Texan, and has seen service with the road for many years. He announced that the Cotton Belt was contemplating using oil burning engines on its Texas lines.

DEAN BROTHERS BUY HOLMES TIRE STATION

A deal was closed last week in which T. H. Holmes sold his tire and battery service station to George and John Dean. Dean Brothers took charge of the business on the last day of September, and will continue to conduct same, placing their boys in charge. Mr. Holmes will remain with the station for a few days.

Mr. and Mrs. Holmes came to Ballinger more than a year ago, and opened up the Holmes Tire and Battery Service station, and Mr. Holmes has built up a good trade. They are undecided as to what to do, or whether they will remain in Ballinger or not.

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 3.—Mrs. W. H. Felton, 87 years old, of Cartersville, Georgia, was appointed by Governor Hardwick today to fill the vacancy in the United States senate caused by the recent death of Senator Thomas E. Watson. Mrs. Felton will serve until the people of Georgia can elect a successor to Senator Watson. The election is to be held in November.

Mrs. Felton is the first woman to go to the United States senate. Gov. Hardwick announced immediately after making the appointment that he would be in race to succeed Mr. Watson, and a special primary election has been set for Oct. 17th to nominate a candidate for the place.

BUSINESS LEAGUE MOVES OFFICES

The Y. M. B. L. is moving to new quarters across the street directly opposite the old stand and will occupy the rear offices which have been fitted up for the organization in the building formerly occupied by Stone & Thorp.

The Robt. F. Lane insurance agency occupies the front of the Stone & Thorp stand, and the Y. M. B. L., the Retail Merchants' Association and the County Farm Agent will occupy the rooms in the rear, three separate offices having been partitioned off for the respective organizations.

The move is made for the purpose of obtaining more room for the three organizations named, all these organizations having been handled from the old Y. M. B. L. stand since the Young Men's Business League was organized more than two years ago.

In the new quarters the secretary of the League will have an office 10x10, the assistant and secretary of the Retail Merchants' Association will have an office 10x10, the County Farm Agent will have an office 10x10 and the directors of the Y. M. B. L. will have a room 13x21. This makes a combination which will work to the mutual advantage of all and serve to keep the rent down.

Rufus Wheeler and Joe M. Simmons will occupy the offices vacated by the Y. M. B. L. in the Ledger building.

STATEMENT FROM CITY COMMISSION

TO THE CITIZENS OF BALLINGER.

In the last few days some opposition has developed to the City's program for widening the sidewalks on Hutchings Avenue and Eighth Street in connection with the street paving. The city originally decided to widen the sidewalks as a matter of public convenience and to accommodate the crowds and to lessen the paving upkeep, and with the full approval of the advisory committee, this move being also strongly recommended by the City Engineer and other experts consulted by the city. In accordance with this program the full plans and specifications for paving have been drawn by the engineer, approved by the commission, and bids have been advertised in the leading dailies and trade journals. To change this program now would necessitate an enormous lot of work as all plans and specifications would have to be redrawn, would greatly delay paving, would not reduce the cost to the property owners, and would eliminate a much needed change, as the present sidewalks are entirely too inadequate to accommodate our visitors on Saturday and other trade days, and also would necessitate the removal of all of the new poles which have been recently installed by the Telephone Company, which have been set out in the street so as to be at the proper distance from the edge of the sidewalk when widened.

We sincerely trust that those who oppose this plan will investigate its advantages as we earnestly desire the harmonious cooperation of the whole community in putting this work through, and with that in view have freely and at all times consulted with the Advisory Committee and we assure the public that we are actuated with the sole desire to get the most benefit from the money available and to please the taxpayers in every way in our power, but in making decisions as to the best manner and method of paving we must be guided by the opinion of experts to a large extent, but we will continue to consult the advisory committee from time to time, and through them do our best to meet the wishes of the public.

LONDON, Oct. 3.—The enormous increase of cigarette smoking among women, says the medical correspondent of the London Times, calls for some protest by the medical profession. He de-

clares the habit in many instances is passing beyond a pleasure and becoming a vice.

"The absorption of nicotine, which is the danger element in the matter," the correspondent proceeds, "produces a condition of nervous distress which is frequently painful to observe. From this proceed palpitations and exhaustion and outbursts of emotion. Women's delicate nervous organism was certainly not intended to endure large doses of this poison. Her functions as a mother cannot but be interfered with when she indulges in it to excess."

It is the habit of many English women and girls to smoke cigarettes in public, and not a few may be seen in restaurants and hotels smoking long, slender pipes. Women's organizations and social improvement societies have begun a crusade against this "inelegant and unwomanly practice."

RESCUE CAR FROM ARGONAUT MINE TO BE AT STATE FAIR

STATE FAIR CROWDS TO SEE DEMONSTRATION OF RESCUE WORK OF FIREMEN

A big feature of the State Fair of Texas at Dallas, Oct. 6-15, will be demonstrations of rescue work by the crew of the mine rescue car which worked so faithfully at the recent Argonaut mine disaster, at Jackson, Calif.

The demonstration will be given in connection with a life-saving and rescue exhibition by members of the Dallas fire department, under Fire Chief Myers. A building is being erected before the grand stand, from which, as flames and smoke pour from its windows, a person supposed to have been overcome by gas and smoke, will be rescued.

Carried from the burning building by the firemen, the work of resuscitation, as obtains at a mine, will be carried out by the crew of the mine car.

The car will be sent to Dallas by order of the Bureau of Mines, and will be in charge of Foreman Miner W. F. Sullivan. The orders have been issued by the Bureau of Mines at Pittsburg, Pa.

VETERAN CHALLENGES ALL COMERS TO WALKING MATCH

John W. Dixon, a veteran of the Civil War, seventy-six years of age, has challenged all comers, over forty, to meet him in a five-mile walking contest on the State Fair grounds race track, Confederate Day at the Fair, Oct. 11. Mr. Dixon says he can do the five miles in an hour, and the only restriction he puts on his opponent is that he shall not be any taller than himself. Much interest has been manifested in the competition.

M'GRAW MASTER OF HIS OWN CLUB

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—In late years Manager John J. McGraw of the Giants has almost ceased to develop young ball players, and due somewhat to the local competition of the Yankees for the city's patronage, has been forced more and more to go into the marts and buy his pennant winners with the coin of the realm.

McGraw has developed marvelous players and has combined them effectively in his time but of the present team only four of those who can be classified as "regulars" received their tutelage from John J. The others were bought or traded from other major league clubs or picked up as virtually finished products from the minors.

Of the first string pitchers Arthur Nehf and Jess Barnes, veterans of last year's series, and Hugh McQuillan, were obtained from Boston. Catcher Frank Snyder was taken from St. Louis several years ago. Earl Smith made a record in the International League but he bears the trademark of a McGraw product.

At first base George Kelly learned most of what he knows from McGraw, as did Frisch, the regular second baseman. At shortstop Captain Davy Baneroff came from Philadelphia and at third base, Heine Groh, once of the Giants, has spent too much time in Cincinnati to be included among the home-grown.

Nor is McGraw's record bolstered by the insertion of Johnny Rawlings into the infield. He has been there much of the summer, due to a series of injuries to Groh. Frisch has gone from second to third and Rawlings has subbed at second, but, like his mate at shortstop, Rawlings came from the Quakers.

In the outfield only Ross Young is considered a McGrawite. "Irish" Meusel came with the troop from the Quaker City, as did Casey Stengel.

The quartet of men that McGraw trained who are on the team, however, are near to the top of the league at their positions.
