## NOTIFIED PUT MAYFIELD ON BALLOT

### EUROPEANS TO FIGHT PROHIBITION IN U. S.

(By Associated Press) PARIS, Oct. 28.—A large fund reaching many millions of francs has been pledged by the wine interests of Europe to make a "merciless" campaign against prohibition in the United States and other countries. The fight will be begun and waged through a newly organized international league against prohibition and the wet headquarters will be established in this city.

### NOT TO ATTACH MEXICAN FUND

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—A writ of attachment issued by the supreme court of New York against the funds of the Mexican government is to be vacated insofar as it relates to the property of the New York city consulate, it was said today at the state department. As protest against the issuance of the writ attachment in favor of the Oliver-American Trading Company recently the above writ was ordered vacated today. The consul general suspended business in New York yesterday. The agreement to vacate the attachment was reached after a conference between the New York authorities and counsel for the Oliver-American Company, and after the Mexican embassy had protested that the court acted in violation of international law.

### JUDGE RAMSEY WILL BE BURIED AT CLEBURNE

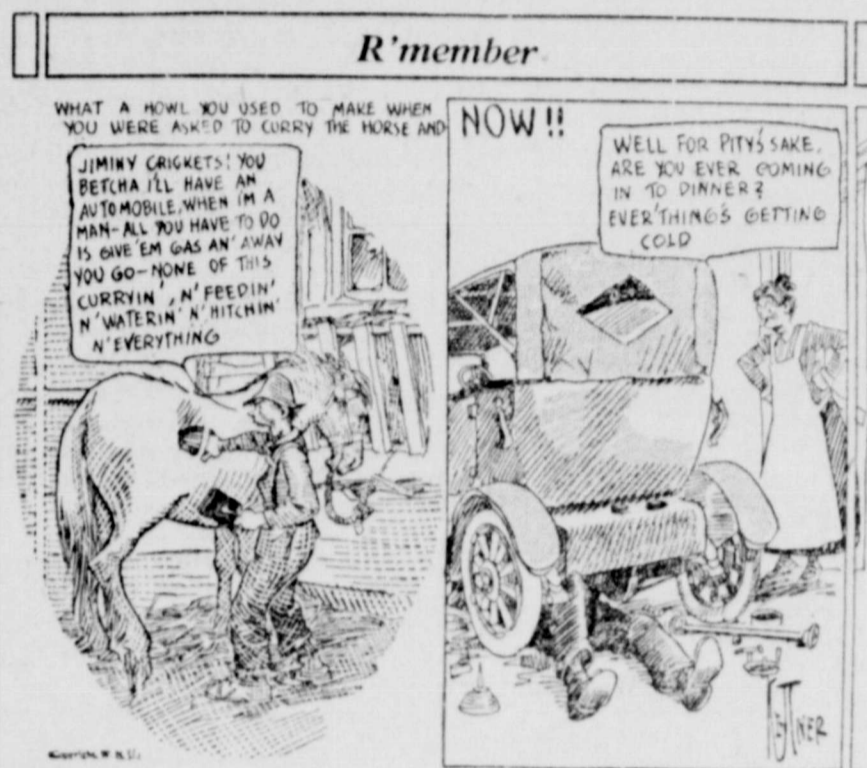
(By Associated Press) DALLAS, Oct. 28.—The funeral of Judge William F. Ramsey, federal reserve agent here, and one of the most prominent bankers and jurists in the Southwest, will be held at his home here tomorrow. Following the funeral services the body will be carried to Cleburne, where it will be laid to rest.

Judge Ramsey died last night. He was 67 years old. He had just returned from Washington, where he went to confer with government officials, returning home ill, his condition rapidly grew serious and the physicians soon announced that there was no hope for his recovery. Deceased was one of the most prominent jurists and business men in Texas. He was at the head of the Federal Reserve Bank at Dallas, and several months ago he accepted the chairmanship of the State Advisory Board for the Salvation Army. He made the race for governor several years ago.

### WILL OBSERVE POPPY DAY HERE

An enthusiastic meeting of the American Legion Auxiliary was held Friday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Stuart L. Williams. The ladies decided to assist in the annual state wide sale of poppies to the business houses for decorative purposes and to make the sales on the streets to the crowds that will be in Ballinger for the Armistice Day program. The funds derived from the poppy sale will be divided between the local post and state headquarters, the local post using their share to take care of the disabled soldier who they have adopted, and the state headquarters dividing their share between the state hospital fund and the state welfare fund for disabled soldiers outside of hospitals. The large poppies for decorating are being sold at 25c each and the smaller ones will be disposed of at any price not less than 10c, which the buyer cares to give.

### THIEF STEALS OFFICERS' CAR

Auto thieves are no respecters of persons, and County Attorney Shepherd is short a Ford. Mr. Shepherd drove his Ford to the carnival grounds Friday night, and the jitney was missing when he got ready to return home. The car was not insured against theft. It is the opinion of the officers that the car was stolen by parties wishing to get out of the country, more than for any revenue that it might bring, as the peculiar markings of the car would make it easy to identify in case the thief tried to sell it. The Ford had white wheels, large steering wheel, spot light, and other extra equipment which would make it conspicuous in case the thief undertook to dispose of the car. Mr. Shepherd left the car parked at the corner of the Massey House on Broadway, and he believes that the thief got away with it about eight o'clock.

### AGENT ROUNDS UP MEN FOR PEN

Bud Russell, transfer agent for the state penitentiary, was here Saturday and received from the local sheriff two prisoners for the prison. The two prisoners were not sent up from this county, but were brought here for safe keeping and held until the transfer agent could come for them. Oscar Benson, who was recently convicted for violating the prohibition law at Paint Rock, and sent to the pen for one year, was one of the men turned over to the transfer agent, and a man sent up from Fort Stockton, the other prisoner. The Ft. Stockton man was brought here several days ago and held for the transfer agent. Mr. Russell left with the two men from Brownwood Saturday morning, going from there to Stephenville to get a prisoner and then to Fort Worth for a bunch of convicts, and will land them all at Rusk early next week.

### IRRIGATORS TO MEET IN BRONTE

The third annual meeting of the Colorado Valley Irrigation Association promises to be the most interesting of all the meetings and conferences which the Association has held. The meeting is to be held in Bronte on December 9th, and a strong program is being arranged. John A. Norris, chairman of the State Board of Water Engineers, in a recent letter to the Association states that the Board will have some definite statements to make by that time. The completed report may not be presented at this meeting, but in all likelihood the report which is made will be of vital interest to land-owners and business men throughout the valley. Major John B. Hawley, of Fort Worth, former federal engineer, and one of the most eminent hydraulic engineers of the Southwest, writes that he will be present at the meeting. Several noted engineers and attorneys will attend the meeting to lend assistance to the furtherance of the irrigation plans. Officers and directors for the ensuing year will be elected.

A message from Alfred Luckett and Mrs. C. P. Shepherd, who were called to Toyah on account of the serious illness of their father, Capt. H. H. Luckett, states that they found their father some better than when they received the first notice. Mr. Luckett suffered an attack of acute indigestion and paralysis and was in a serious condition for a time.

### PUSHING STREET LIGHT PLANS

Fifteen ornamental street lights will convert Eighth Street into a "white way" if a plan being pushed by a committee of citizens goes through. In discussing lights for the residence district of the city some time ago, L. Cohen suggested the plan of interesting citizens in contributing for white way lights on the principal residence streets, and the suggestion reached form at a recent meeting of the Y. M. B. L. when a committee was appointed to confer with citizens on Eighth Street or any other street where the property owners wanted the ornamental standards and were willing to pay for them. J. A. Weeks and Mr. Cohen went out for a short time Friday afternoon and presented the proposition to property owners on Eighth Street. They met with considerable encouragement, and stated that everything indicated that the lights would be installed. The plan provides for installing ornamental lights down the center of the street, fifteen four hundred candle power lights being located at the intersection of all streets on Eighth, and the cost will be in the neighborhood of \$1400.00. Messrs. Weeks and Cohen stated that they received subscriptions to the fund ranging from \$25 to \$100. The lights, if installed, will be a continuance of the lights to be installed in the business district, the same design of posts, etc., to be used.

### County Attorney Refuses to Join in Suit Against Mayfield

(By Associated Press) CORSICANA, Oct. 28.—Efforts to get County Attorney Tarver, of Navarro county, to join in a suit seeking to prevent the certification of the name of Earle B. Mayfield as candidate for United States senator failed here early today. The decision was said to have been reached to prepare a new petition after the Supreme Court action at Austin late yesterday. W. W. Nelms, one of the attorneys in the injunction suit, and other lawyers, requested Tarver to join in the proposed petition, but he refused to do so. An attempt to file an application for an injunction to keep Mayfield's name off the ticket failed at Greenville last night. Attorneys for the Peddy interests made application for, but failed to obtain the temporary injunction.

### ITALIAN TROUBLE IN BETTER SHAPE

(By Associated Press) LONDON, Oct. 28.—Martial law was proclaimed in Italy today and was to take effect at noon, but the proclamation later was recalled. This was stated in dispatches from the Stefani News Agency at Rome. It is explained that the proclamation declaring martial law was withdrawn as a result of improvement in the situation.

ROME, Oct. 28.—The cabinet council has been in session since midnight to receive reports from the provinces to adopt the necessary measures to meet the situation, and ordered issued a proclamation urging the public to maintain order in face of the insurrectionary attempts to overthrow the government. The reports show that the Fascisti are extending their movement with a view of exerting pressure for the formation of a Fascisti cabinet.

### PHILIPPINES TO ASK FREEDOM

(By Associated Press) MANILA, Oct. 28.—Resolutions were introduced in the Philippine House of Representatives today asking the United States to recognize the right of the Islands to their independence. The resolutions were referred to a committee. The House also requested the United States government to fix a date for summoning a constitutional convention to frame a constitution upon which the independent Philippine republic would be founded.

DALLAS, Oct. 28.—Plans were made today to endorse Earle B. Mayfield as candidate for United States senator, according to members of the Democratic State Executive Committee here. The members are here for a call meeting, and it was announced in advance that the committee would endorse Mayfield. Resolutions also will be submitted approving a call for a state wide democratic rally here tonight it was said, and many prominent democrats are here for the meeting.

AUSTIN, Oct. 28.—On the advice of the attorney general, Secretary of State Staples this morning certified by telegraph to all county clerks the name of Earle B. Mayfield as democratic candidate for United States senator. The action of the secretary of state came following a conference between Mr. Staples and Attorney General Keeling.

The state Supreme Court last night decided in Mayfield's favor, and held that the district court at Corsicana was without jurisdiction to issue an injunction restraining the secretary of state from certifying the name of Mayfield to the county clerks.

The court's decision is believed to be final disposition of the Mayfield suit since the court directed the clerk to immediately certify the decision to the Dallas court of civil appeals without waiting for the rehearing period. The Dallas court received papers in the case this morning.

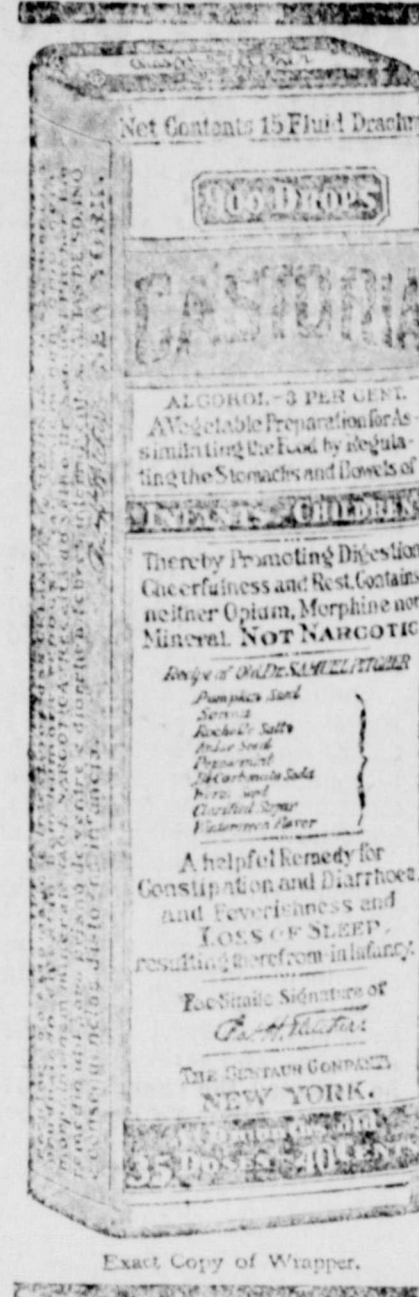
WORKING ROAD ON CUT-OFF ROUTE

Commissioner Deen's road crew is at work on the cut-off road which crosses Elm Creek at the upper dam. This road is being put in good shape, and when completed, and the grade settles and the road is finished down to a good road bed, it will be the best road into Ballinger from the North, barring the fact that the road crosses the creek. This road leaves the main road at the A. & S. crossing about two miles from town, and crosses the creek at the upper dam. It was surveyed out and made a public road several years ago when the land owners, or most of them, donated the land sufficient to make it the regulation width and prevailed on the county to adopt it. A good

road over this route will take much of the travel off the old dilapidated steel bridge spanning Elm Creek near the city.

## Will File Contempt Charges Against Officials of the State

### SOLDIERS CLASH IN ITALY

(By Associated Press)

ROME, Oct. 30.—Serious rioting broke out here last night. A bunch of Fascisti were attacked by a band of Communists. The Fascisti replied to the attack, with the result that one bystander was killed and one Fascisti wounded. The Fascisti, who were greatly outnumbered, had two of their men taken prisoners.

LONDON, Oct. 30.—The triumphant forces of the Fascisti were ready today to take over the government of Italy, according to dispatches received here. The revolt against the "politicians" began long ago by the Fascisti, many of whom are veterans of the World War. King Victor Emmanuel said that he would give Italy a government most suited to the new spirit pervading the country, and entrusted Benito Mussolini yesterday with the task of forming a new ministry.

### 34,670 IS TOTAL FOR COUNTY

According to gin figures compiled by Oscar Pearson, manager of the Ballinger Cotton Oil Company, 34,679 bales of cotton were ginned in the county up to Saturday night.

These figures represent an excess of more than ten thousand bales over the total ginnings of last year, and would have been even greater had the last two weeks not been unfavorable for picking. Cotton pickers were kept out of the field for the greater part of the last two weeks and gins have been idle.

It is believed that at least 5,000 bales more will be ginned in the county, altho some forecasters declare that the total yield will not reach 40,000 bales. Hands are plentiful and with favorable weather another week or ten days will put the county out of the cotton business for the present season. Quite a number of the gins in the county are now operating only on certain days during the week.

### Advises to Hold Up Ballot Printing Long as Possible

(Associated Press Dispatch)

AUSTIN, Oct. 30.—Secretary of State Staples and Attorney General Keeling conferred this morning on the injunction suit granted at Fairfield, seeking to keep Earle B. Mayfield's name off the official ticket.

Mr. Staples received inquiries from many county judges asking what to do about printing the tickets. Staples replied to the inquiries by saying to withhold printing of ballots as long as possible to await action of the court injunction.

FT. WORTH, Oct. 30.—Attorneys and campaign managers for Earle B. Mayfield conferred here today to decide whether Mr. Mayfield will go to Groesbeck on November 1st for the hearing of the Fairfield injunction case. Mayfield announced that he would be guided by the advice of his attorneys and managers.

No decision had been reached at noon today. However, it became known that a petition seeking a dissolution of the injunction had been prepared and sent to Dallas from Austin.

DALLAS, Oct. 30.—A motion requesting Secretary of State Staples and Attorney General Keeling to be cited to appear and show cause why they should not be held in contempt of court was filed in the Court of Civil Appeals here today by W. W. Nelms, counsel for C. E. King and others. The motion is based upon the notice sent to election officials Saturday by Secretary Staples advising them to place the name of Earle B. Mayfield on the ballot.

It is alleged in the petition filed today that the action of the state officials was premature and was taken before final entry of judgment in the court of appeals was made setting aside the temporary restraining order which the Corsicana district court granted.

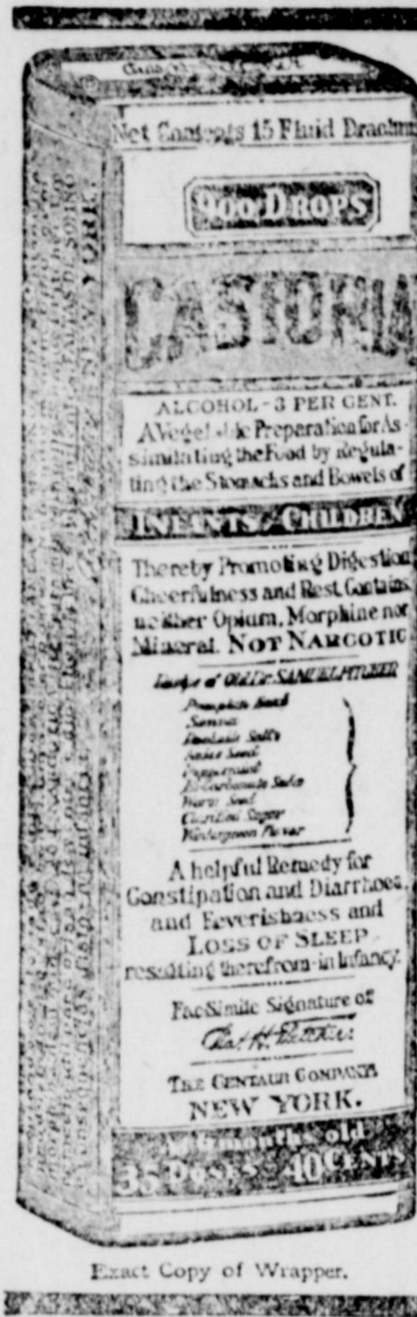
NINE CALVES AT FOUR BIRTHS

## W.S.S. MELON TO BE SLICED SOON

The largest money melon ever sliced open and handed around in this section will be cut by the U. S. government, January 1st, 1923, for owners of 1918 War Savings Stamps—this is less than two and a half months off, announcement was made today by Postmaster C. S. Guin.

War Savings Stamps of the 1918 series, bought in 1918 for four dollars and a few cents, mature for payment at \$5 each January 1, and each stamp will then have netted every owner not less than 75 cents or 4 per cent, compounded quarterly, Mr. Guin pointed out.

"Locally many individuals, business firms, and organizations own goodly amounts of 1918 War Savings Stamps, and they get in on the 'melon cutting.' In this Federal Reserve District, according to information I have received from Federal Savings Director Hume, of Dallas, our people own more than \$100,000,000 of 1918 stamps," the postmaster said. "Watch out for the 'sharper' who offers to buy your 1918 stamps. He is after your profit. Remember, too, these stamps are not legally transferable from one person to another. It is better to be safe than sorry; see your postmaster before listening to the person who wants to buy your stamps. Don't let the 'city slicker' do you out of your rightful profit."

Persons will be allowed to exchange their War Savings Stamps of the 1918 Series for Treasury Savings Certificates, registered against loss or depreciation in any way, which yield about 21.95 per cent interest in five years; or they will be allowed to cash them in for \$5 apiece.

"Owing to the popularity of Treasury Savings Certificates, we expect a great many 1918 stamp owners will exchange their matured stamps for Treasury Savings Certificates after January 1," Mr. Guin declared.

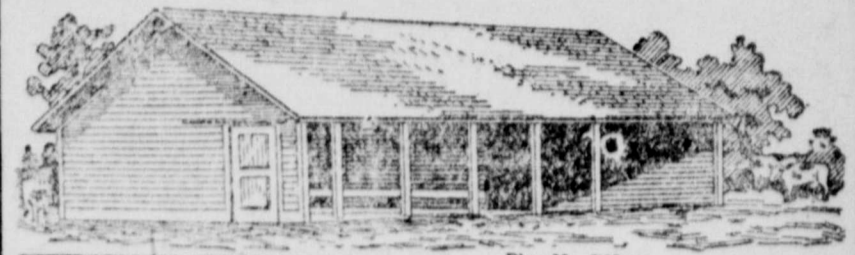
