SAFETY FIRST BIT READY TO PUNCTURE POOL

Drilling was suspended at the Safety First well Wednesday awaiting further advice from O. Wilson, who is at Breckenridge. Drilling stopped at a depth of 3324 feet after a two foot hole had been drilled into the gray lime, which is identical with the formation covering the Breckenridge and Eastland pools.

The bit passed thru the black shale Tuesday, and the men in charge of the well suspended work until Mr. Wilson could be heard from. F. W. Hunter declares that the outlook for a well is all that anyone could hope for, and he wired Mr. Wilson Wednesday to ship 400 feet of casing at once and send tools with which to drill in the well. "I know some folks have no confidence in the proposition," said Mr. Hunter, "because we have had so much hard luck, but I think we

will yet be able to show them an oil well." Mr. Hunter says if there is anything in the signs of formation, that this well is going to bring a surprise to the people as soon as the drill goes through the present strata of gray lime.

As the well now stands there is an open hole of 400 feet without casing, and while the hole is in good shape, the drillers say that it would be suicide to drill the well in without first setting the casing. There is no water to be eased off, but a blow-up might cause a blow-up which would take much time and money to repair, and as this well has been known as the Safety First since the Arizona company came here and started the development, it is better to be safe than sorry.

ANTI-KLANSMAN SUES PREACHER FOR \$100,000

(By Associated Press) EASTLAND, Nov. 15.—A suit for \$100,000 damages for the alleged defamation of character was filed by Robert G. Gordon, a local oil operator, against Dr. E. J. Bulgin, an evangelist who is holding a revival here.

In his petition Gordon alleges that Dr. Bulgin denounced him from the pulpit for the part Gordon is alleged to have played in adopting at a meeting of former service men a resolution criticizing the Ku Klux Klan. Gordon alleges that the evangelist damaged his character by the attack made on him from the pulpit, and he is seeking damages in the above sum. Gordon is said to have criticized the Ku Klux Klan while the evangelist was defending the Klan principles.

VERDICT OF GUILTY IN FIGHTING CASE

D. B. Davis, local wagon yard man, was convicted in justice court Tuesday on a charge of simple assault and battery. Mr. Davis had difficulty with a Mexican who was stopping in his yard, and when a complaint was filed against him he declared that he was not guilty and demanded a trial by jury. A number of witnesses were used, the state using the Mexican who Davis is alleged to have struck with his fist, and the Mexican's wife as witnesses. The jury brought in a verdict of guilty and assessed a fine of \$2 and costs. The jury was composed of John Loveless, E. M. Eubanks, Jas. E. Brewer, Dan Moser, W. R. Clark and B. F. Kemp.

U.D.C. MEETING IS IN SESSION

(By Associated Press) BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Nov. 15.—Mrs. Livingston Rowe Schuyler, president general of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, delivered her annual report at the convention here this morning. She urged the completion of the Jefferson Davis monument at Fairview, Kentucky. Great progress was reported in the proposed Jefferson Davis Highway. Mrs. Schuyler took a firm stand for carrying out the will of the former convention in rebuilding the Robert E. Lee memorial chapel at Lexington, Va., and warned the local chapters to shun the appearance of anything political.

MATTRESS PLANT POULTRY MARKET ESCAPES BLAZE IS AT LOW STAGE

Flames originating from a match in the lint machine at the Lankford Mattress Factory Wednesday morning flashed over the lint room and destroyed about one hundred pounds of cotton quicker than a twinkling, and if it had not been for the fact that the lint room was constructed so as to prevent spread of flames, the factory would have gone up in smoke again.

It will be recalled that Mr. Lankford suffered a loss of some five or six thousand dollars when his mattress factory was destroyed by fire some time ago. When he purchased a building up town and installed new machinery, he constructed a lint room with a view to guarding against fire, and this alone probably saved the building and mattress plant Wednesday.

When the match went through the machine a sheet of flame was blown into the lint room and the lint which was being prepared for a mattress was consumed almost immediately. But by turning a sluice of water into the openings of the room prepared for that purpose the fire was under control in a few minutes.

CASES REVERSED; CASES AFFIRMED

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Nov. 15.—A motion for a rehearing in the case of Clement Appolinar, sentenced to death for the murder of Theodore Barnhart in Bexar county, was denied by the Court of Criminal Appeals here today. The rehearing was asked on the grounds of insanity.

A forty-five year sentence imposed on Joe Henderson in Van Zandt county for killing Robert Killingsworth, was reversed and remanded for trial. This is a case in which the killing resulted from a controversy over the ownership of some turkeys.

A ten year sentence given Luther Kennamer for the murder of C. F. Davis in Jones county, was affirmed. The three year sentence of Hubert Cotton from Hunt county, convicted on a manslaughter charge in connection with the killing of Tom Green, was reversed and remanded.

SANTA FE ON BAD SCHEDULE

The Santa Fe passenger service on this branch of the road has been on the "punk" for the last few days, or a few times for the last several days. The train was late Tuesday, and also came in an hour late Wednesday. It is a common trick for the holidays, but it is entirely too early in the season to begin giving the public delayed schedules. MEXICO SHOCKED OVER LITTLE TEXAS LYNCHING

BRITISH WILL NOT ACCEPT TURK TERMS

(By Associated Press) LONDON, Nov. 15.—The British foreign office has telegraphed to the French and Italian governments a memorandum in which Great Britain declares that the main Turkish demands which are to come before the Near East peace conference at Lansanne, are not regarded favorably by the British government, and will not be agreed to. This was stated in authoritative quarters today.

The Turkish nationalist government has given formal assurance to the allies that the stipulations of the Mudania armistice agreement will be respected, a dispatch from Constantinople said.

PACKING HEAD CONFERS WITH U. S. OFFICIALS

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—J. Ogden Armour, head of the Armour Company, conferred today with officials of the federal government here regarding the situation in the packing industry. It was indicated some announcement of a realignment of the packing interests might be expected shortly.

GERMAN CABINET MAKES FAILURE

(By Associated Press) BERLIN, Nov. 15.—The German cabinet headed by Chancellor Wirth has failed. President Ebert will today undertake the appointment of a new cabinet.

The situation became serious last night and the night was one of utter confusion. President Ebert today conferred with the leaders of both the socialist and non-socialist parties.

The ministerial resignations filed last night were precipitated by the decision of the United socialists not to participate in the coalition of the ministry which included members of the German people's party.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—The Mexican embassy has made representations to the state department against the alleged lynching of a Mexican by the name of Elias Villareal Hearate, in Weslaco, Texas, last Saturday, and asked for guarantees for the Mexican consul in Hidalgo, Texas, whose life is said to have been threatened. The message also asked for protection for all Mexicans in Texas, and throughout the United States.

The embassy's communication was taken under advisement and the state officials of Texas will probably be asked for a full report and further information upon which to form a basis for a reply.

The Mexican embassy's representation is understood to charge tolerance or complicity in the lynching on the part of the authorities at Weslaco.

DeMOLAY MEETING AT ABILENE

The Robert McGregor Chapter, Order of DeMolay, will leave in a body Saturday morning for Abilene, where they go on invitation of the Abilene Chapter to spend the whole day.

The members will take part in a big parade and initiation ceremonies during the morning, and will attend a football game between Simmons College and another college in the afternoon. The day will be closed with a ball at night.

The local boys will be accompanied by several of the Advisory Council and other Masons, and are expecting to have a pleasant and profitable day with the neighboring chapter.

ONE AND HALF HOLIDAY RATES

The railroads are preparing to advertise holiday rates for the coming Christmas time. According to the tentative announcement a rate of one and a half will be granted for Christmas travel and the rates will go on sale about Dec. 15th. This will make travel heavier than for many seasons, and the roads are using good judgment in putting on the excursion.

NEW RADIO PLANS AT A.&M. COLLEGE

Special to The Ledger: COLLEGE STATION, Texas, Nov. 15.—The A. & M. College of Texas has begun the formulation of plans whereby the radio experimental activities of the electrical engineering students and the agricultural information collected and disseminated at the institution every day by the specialists of the college, may be joined in such a way as to give those who benefit by access to radio receiving sets periodical reports of an educational nature which may be of great value to them, particularly those who are engaged in agricultural enterprise.

President Bizell has appointed a committee of specialists representing the agricultural teaching division, the agricultural research division and the agricultural extension division to assist Dean F. C. Bolton of the electrical engineering department in sending out regular programs that will place the state agricultural college in a position of greater service to the general public. The Y. M. C. A. is also represented on the committee by the secretary, who has charge of all the social activities, entertainment programs and other features of interest at the college, assuring that entertainment features will also continue to be included on the programs broadcast from here.

"The roughest roads in the country are inside the city limits of Abilene," says the Abilene Reporter, and Ballinger has been claiming that dishonor all these many months.

RANNELS COUNTY'S BIG PROBLEM

There is no question but what the highway problem is the biggest problem confronting the people of Rannels county. Every man, woman and child is effected directly or indirectly by bad roads, and the present generation should not leave the problem for future generations to solve. We have been getting along on make shift methods long enough; let's do something.

This country has two designated and adopted highways which will come under the proposed seven per cent class the federal government is fostering, and it is probable that a third highway will cross the county. Rannels county is fortunate in this respect, as these highways will be maintained at the expense of the federal government, if we do our part towards completing them, and travel will come this way which will leave thousands of dollars to be circulated in local channels of trade.

The question confronting the people is how and what is the best way of pulling out of the rut and getting on a highway which the federal government will approve and aid in building. If a graded dirt road is the best, we should get busy and provide that character of highway and then see that it is kept up, dragged, etc. If we want the graded hard surface road, we should decide on that and call on the federal government to come to our aid.

The question is a big one, and one which concerns every citizen in the county. It is not a town problem, it is a county-wide problem and must be dealt with as such, until it is solved.

NEW USE FOR SCOTCH LAKES

Long Famed in Song, it is Now Seriously Proposed to Develop Their Water Power.

Scotland is waking up to the fact that its lakes and waterfalls may be made to serve other purposes than providing scenic attractions for tourists. As proof of this the "Gruampian Electricity bill" has been given a second reading in the house of commons. In this a company is empowered to collect and use the waters of 15 lochs and 50 small lakes, rivers, and streams over an area of 417 square miles.

The waters proposed to be utilized are estimated to be capable of generating 50,000 horse power to supply electricity in the counties of Perth, Kinross, and Forfar, and districts in four other counties. The capital is placed at \$4,500,000 (\$22,500,000).

That any of the beautiful lakes and falls of "Caledonia sterns and wild" should be used to set the wheels of industry spinning, many in Scotland regard almost as sacrilegious desecration. And that opinion is shared by not a few Americans who are accustomed to visit Scotland annually.

But the promoters declare that the preservation of the natural beauties of Scotland is expressly provided for by the terms of the bill. And they add that when the hum of the electrically driven wheels is heard in the land and dividends begin to come in, the cry of "desecration" will be heard no more.—New York Post.

DANGER IN STEEL HORSESHOE

Substitution of Copper, it is Believed, Will Lessen Possibility of Destructive Forest Fires.

Copper horseshoes as a means of preventing forest fires have recently made their appearance in several of the national forests of the West, and if the plans of certain forestry officials are carried into effect, this metal will supplant steel upon the hoofs of all horses to be used on public domains where there is any measure of fire hazard.

According to the supervisor of the Angeles National forest in southern California, steel horseshoes used in firey mountain regions may have been the cause of some of the mysterious fires that have started in the forest reserves. Heavy steel horseshoes striking against flint or hard granite may readily be the source of sparks which falling into dry grass or other inflammable material, would quickly cause it to burst into flames if fanned by a breeze.

The new horseshoes were given their first try-out recently in Colaveros county, California.—Popular Mechanics.

Moth-Proof Wool.

A moth-repellant has been introduced in the German market, which, it is claimed, will positively make the wool fabric absolutely moth-proof. An additional advantage of this product, known as Eulan F, is that it does not discolor the fabric, so that the wool can be dyed in bright shades without any difficulty. The product is a white powder which does not dissolve very easily in water. Acid must be added to make it dissolve. In this condition it is used in the textile mill, and it is preferable to put the woolen fabric through the moth-proofing treatment in the factory. Another form of the product is sold for use in the house hold. In this form the powder will dissolve very easily in water. The woolen fabric is then soaked in the solution and permitted to dry. Only a 1 per cent solution is required. Eulan F is now on the market in Germany.—From the Industrial Digest.

BOOTLEGGING IN HIGH SOCIETY

The Brownwood Bulletin observes that Armistice Day in that city was accompanied by entirely too much drunkenness for a dry country, and also points out the fact that the drunkenness was among men who should stand for law enforcement and instead of encouraging bootlegging help to put them out of business.

What the Bulletin says about Brownwood is true about other towns, even including Ballinger, and the question is asked almost daily where some of the men who move and have their being in the best society, get their booze. The Brownwood Bulletin perhaps helps to answer the question by saying: "We do not insinuate that liquor laws are being flagrantly violated in Brownwood. On the contrary, the liquor laws are being very carefully violated; the evidence of the violation may be found easily, by ordinary observation, but the bootlegger cannot be so easily identified."

The Bulletin goes further and says: "It is obviously a difficult task to find a bootlegger when he is given the protection of some of the so-called best citizens who are his regular patrons."

There are men who would not think of protecting a thief, forger, a swindler, and who would go on the jury and send such criminals to the pen; yet these same men will patronize and protect from punishment that class of criminals—the bootleggers, who stand lower in the scale of crime than either the thief, forger, or swindler.

The thief or the forger only robs a man of his money, while the bootlegger sneaks away in some secluded spot and manufactures a concoction which robs a man of his money, his health and his better self.
