YOUTH MURDERED BY NEGRO AT WACO

GIRL HELD THREE HOURS THEN THROWN FROM CLIFF

HARDING LAYS STRESS ON PASSAGE MARINE BILL DURING SESSION

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—The enactment of the administration's merchant marine bill was urged upon congress today by President Harding as being necessary to relieve the government of the present "staggering losses" in the operation of a war built merchant fleet, to establish a program of assured shipping to serve the nation in war, and to give a guarantee of commercial independence in time of peace.

President Harding appeared before the joint session of congress in person and in addressing the body he declared that the actual monetary saving to the government would result from the proposed measure. He challenged every insinuation of the favored interests of enriching the special few at the expense of the public treasury. Mr. Harding declared that the maritime nations of the world were in accord with the opposition to the bill.

The president said that there

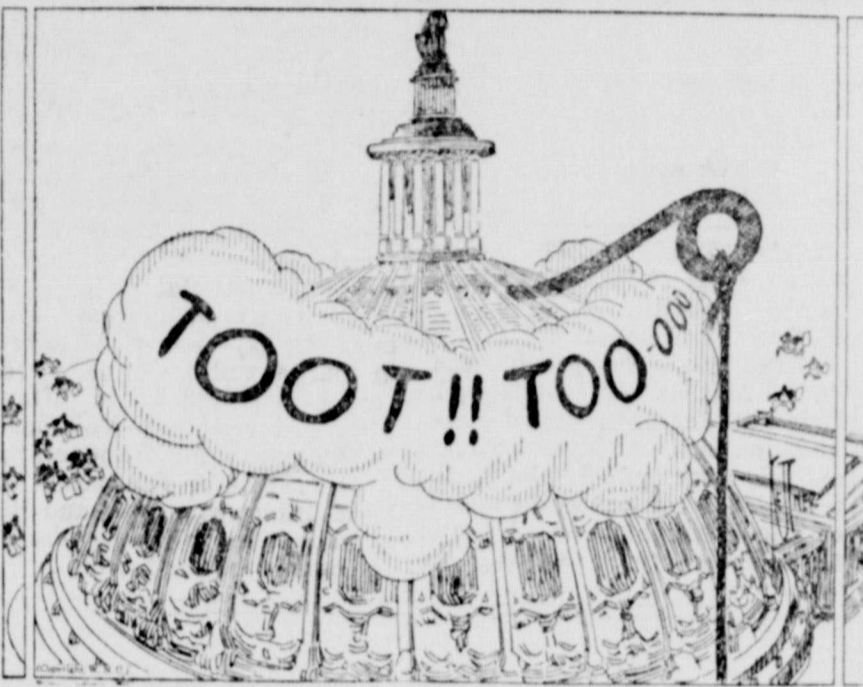
was an unavoidable task of wiping out fifty million dollars, annual loss and losses aggregating many hundreds of millions in worn out, sacrificed, scrapped shipping, in the present government operation of the shipping board fleet.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—The administration's merchant marine bill with amendments agreed to yesterday by the republican chiefs, was formally reported out by the House merchant marine committee today without a record vote, while President Harding was arranging to go to the capital to address a joint session of congress in the interest of the proposed passage of the bill.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—President Harding in his annual message to the regular session of congress early in December will recommend the broadening of the credit systems under the government's provision and control, with a view to relieving agricultural distress.

COMMERCIAL CONGRESS TALKS FOREIGN TRADE

CHICAGO, Nov. 21.—American commercial possibilities in Central and South America and Europe were discussed today at the second session of the Southern Commercial Congress by ambassadors, ministers and other representatives of several foreign governments.

RUSSELL WELL HAS FISHING JOB

The Russell Production Company has a fishing job at a depth of 470 feet. The bit is in the well, but it was reported that only a short time would be required in clearing the hole and drilling would be resumed immediately. The loss is not serious, or the delay will not be long. At the time of the accident the drill was making about one hundred feet a day. That is walking right along, and unless the drillers experience some unexpected delay the oil will be flowing from this well within two or three weeks. At least that is the way the promoters of the well express themselves, and they do it with an air of confidence that impresses the listener with the feeling that he is already living in a real oil town. The Russell field is about five years old, or it has been about five years since development started in that field, and the faith of the men who have put their money in the field promises to be rewarded and that liberally.

COUNTY COURT RELEASES JURY

County court convened for the November term at one-thirty Monday afternoon. The jury was dismissed a short time after court convened, and after the docket had been sounded out and it was determined that no cases would be tried before the jury.

Only three cases were slated on the criminal docket, and only one of these was tried. The case of the State of Texas vs. Carl Rogers, charged with passing a "cold" check on a local hardware store, was continued, the defendant being "out of pocket," and his whereabouts unknown.

The case of the State of Texas vs. J. M. and Addie Davis, charged with aggravated assault, in which it is alleged that the defendants made an attack upon Sheriff J. P. Flynt, while the sheriff was serving them with some papers in a civil case, was continued.

Malcolm McCrery, charged with disturbing public worship at a Nazarene revival in the Crews community, was tried before the county judge and acquitted.

WACO, Nov. 21.—Miss Naomi Boucher, who was attacked by a negro after he had murdered her companion, Grady Skipworth, near this city about nine o'clock last night, is today under the care of physicians and is reported to be in a serious condition.

Up to a late hour today the girl had not been able to give the officers and friends a detailed account of the murder, and the assault made on her.

A bloody automobile, believed to be the one in which the couple were out driving and which the negro used to make his escape from the scene of the murder, was found in Northwestern part of the city this morning.

WACO, Nov. 21.—Grady Skipworth, age 19, was brutally murdered last night by a burley negro near "Lovers' Leap" on the Bosque river, three miles from this city. A young woman companion of the murdered man was "roughly treated" by the black murderer, according to her statement, who in a dazed way, told of how she was dragged into the brush nearby and brutally assaulted.

Skipworth was shot in the neck with a shotgun, and instantly killed. After murdering and robbing the youth the negro threw his body over a cliff, and dragged the girl into a cluster of brush a short distance from the road, where he kept her for three hours, and then threw her over the cliff where he had thrown the body of the young man.

LABOR LEADERS PUSH CHARGES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—Plans to support the resolution introduced in the House by Representative Kellar, republican, of Minnesota, for the impeachment of Attorney General Daugherty, were under consideration here today by the executive council of the American Federation of Labor. It was said that the discussion would probably continue for several days, and definite arrangements would be made to have the federation represented at the hearings to be held by the House judiciary committee.

AUTO VICTIM IS IMPROVING

Will Murphy, Ballinger-Abilene service car driver, who was injured when the ring holding casing on the rim of a large auto, gave way and struck him on the head in the Ballinger Auto Co. garage, Sunday morning, is reported to be resting some better today. The young man has been in somewhat of a dazed condition and stupor since the accident, but he was considerably revived Tuesday afternoon. He will recover, it is believed now.

Value of Runnels County Land Proven

An indication of which way the wind is blowing in the respect of whether or not it will do to tie into Runnels county dirt, is disclosed in the following.

A certain Mr. Stone offered the snug sum of \$110.00 per acre to the owner of a certain highly improved farm of 110 acres adjacent the town of Draseo, located in the extreme Northern part of Runnels county, which the owner considered, but his wife declined to join in the deal.

In the sale of the E. H. Colburn place of 100 acres located in the Parramore & Lewis pasture six miles Southeast of Winters, at \$100.00 per acre, of which four-fifths was paid in cash, by the purchaser, J. W. Hendrick, both of whom are Runnels county citizens, having resided here for the past several years, being practically a cash over the counter deal, is a further disclosure that Runnels county citizens have full faith and confidence in the virginity of the soil of their own famous Runnels county.

There is a reason for this. When a farmer can produce fifty dollars worth of cotton on an acre of Runnels county dirt during a summer without rain, common sense teaches him that it would be folly to sell that land, if he intends to stay in the farming industry. An acre of good land in Runnels county is worth as much as an acre in some of the counties where land is listed at two hundred per acre.

We may have a drought here occasionally and short crops result, but while this condition prevails here, conditions equally as bad prevail in the counties with the higher priced land. If we are to choose between too much rain and too little rain, and between boll weevil and Jack rabbits, we will take the short rain and land of the Jack rabbits in preference to the land of the crab grass and boll bug.

BE CAREFUL WHEN YOU BUY A "USED" CAR

DALLAS, Nov. 21.—A campaign to educate the gullible public against buying "used" cars from strangers or tourists without first making a rigid investigation of the car's history is being waged by the Automobile Theft Bureau, according to Forest M. Spencer.

Spencer asks the public, as well as county and city peace officers to co-operate with the Bureau in combating the auto theft evil.

"Thousands of automobiles are stolen every year," Spencer said. "We recover many cars every day where the owner fully believes he has a genuine bill of sale to the car in his possession."

Automobile thieves carry a full line of seals, and an assortment of motor and serial numbers. The bill of sale given when a stolen car is sold looks alright to the average buyer but nine cases out of ten, Spencer said, the paper is not worth a cent.

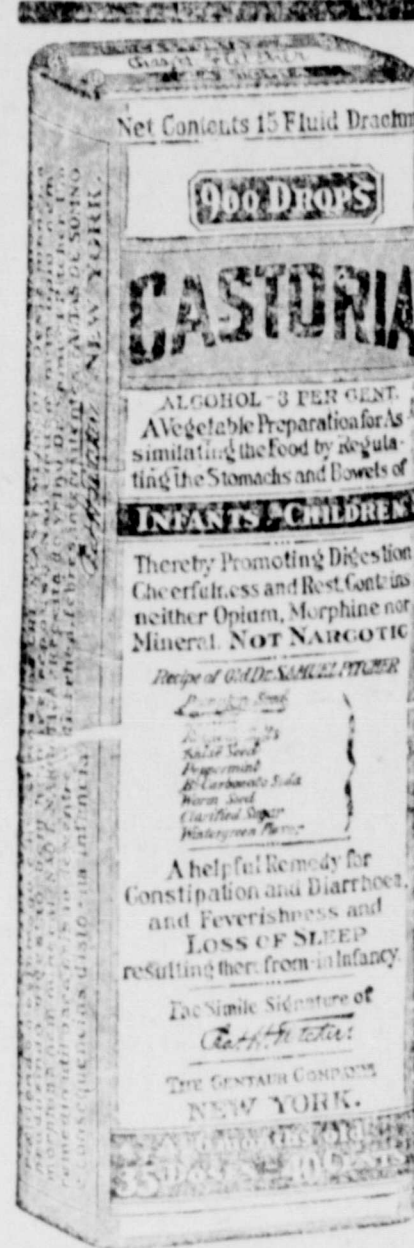
"Know the man from whom the car is purchased. If he is a stranger, have the local peace officers look up the records of stolen cars. He may find that the very car offered for sale is 'hot.'" The Automobile Theft Bureau has recently opened a branch office at Houston. An experienced detective is in charge, and has already recovered cars "wanted" in different parts of the state. "This bureau has no ax to grind," Spencer said. "We operate on funds furnished by insurance companies and merely want to make life as miserable as possible for the thief."

STATE CALLS FOR FINAL RETURNS

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Nov. 21.—An appeal to county judges to certify as soon as possible the returns of the general election in order that the compilation of final returns may be expedited, is made by Secretary of State S. L. Staples. Returns from the election up to the present time have been coming in slowly, Staples reports.

Under the general election law, county judges are directed to count the returns on state officials in their counties the first Monday after the election or as soon thereafter as possible, and certify such returns to the secretary of state. For representatives and senators, the county judge to whom returns from the various counties in the district are sent, is directed to open and tabulate such returns thirty days after the election.

Few more than fifty counties have sent in returns of the general election for state officials, according to Mr. Staples.

As a result of the slowness of county judges in sending in election returns, a change in the election law is advocated by a number of officials so as to make the law more stringent regarding sending in returns and fixing a penalty for delay. Such an amendment probably will be presented to the next legislature, it is understood.

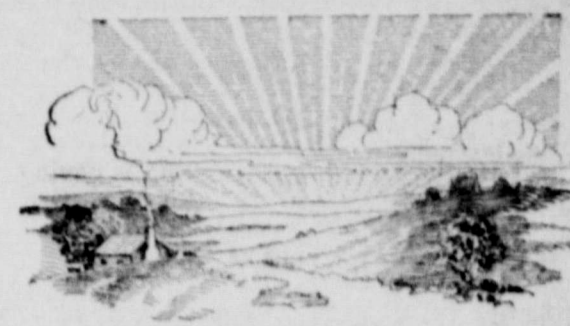
