ARRESTS MADE FOR LYNCHING MEXICAN CITIZEN

AUSTIN, Nov. 24.—Arrests have been made by county officials in Hidalgo county in connection with the alleged lynching on November 11th of Elias Villarreal Zapata, a Mexican citizen, according to information reaching here today. Ranger Captain Wright, stationed at Mission, has been ordered to investigate alleged disturbances growing out of the lynching of the Mexican.

PLAYS OFFICER AND GETS IN BAD

A man by the name of Dean, of the Northern part of the county, is facing charges of impersonating an officer and carrying a gun. He will be prosecuted on one or both of the charges, according to complaints filed Friday, and instructions from Sheriff Flynt to his deputy at Winters directed that the man be brought here to face the charges.

According to Sheriff Flynt, Dean applied to him for a deputyship several days ago, and Mr. Flynt declares that he not only refused to deputize the man, but told him that the office was not making a living for the sheriff and that he had all the deputies that he needed. The sheriff said it was the first and only time he ever saw the man.

It is alleged that Dean proceeded to arm himself and get on the job, and after watching a couple of men, guests at the City Hotel in Winters, play dominoes in the office of the hotel for awhile, and witnessing the players match dominoes for fun, the self constituted deputy sheriff informed the players that he was the strong arm of the law, and pulling his gun told them to dig up or go to jail. He informed the men that their fines amounted to \$25 each, later cutting the cost to \$25 for two—\$12.50 each, it is alleged, and according to a report of the sheriff.

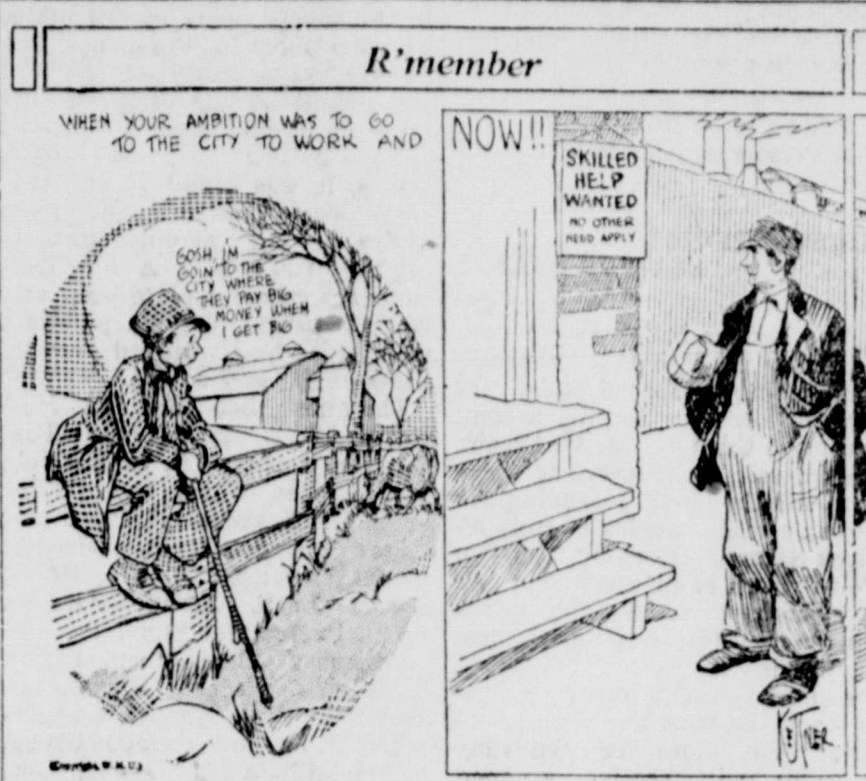
The men argued their case with the alleged pseudo officer and asked for a little time, and after backing out of the tight place they found themselves in, they reported the matter to friends and it developed that the man was not an officer and charges against him are being pushed by the aggrieved parties.

Dean claims that Sheriff Flynt deputized him, but the sheriff says the claim is absolutely false, and there is nothing on record to show that the man was deputized or authorized to carry a gun. The matter will be adjusted in court.

TAKES STEPS RECOVER BIG SUM FOR UNCLE SAM

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—Legal action to recover more than twenty million dollars alleged to have been fraudulently obtained from the government in the construction of four army cantonments during the late war, was instituted today by Attorney General Daugherty.

This is the first formal step in the far reaching prosecution of those who held contracts for building war camps. The camps where it is alleged there was fraud practiced in their construction are Camp Upton, Fort Jackson, Fort Sherman and Camp Funston.

OFFICERS SEEK STOLEN COTTON

Sheriff Flynt is engaged in working with the Santa Fe officials and detectives this week in trailing down the thief or thieves who got away with a bale of cotton at Rowena Tuesday night, or some time before Wednesday morning.

The cotton was stolen from the Santa Fe platform, where it had been assembled for shipping. The agent noticed a space on the platform where it appeared that a bale of cotton had been removed, and a check up showed that he was a bale short and the officers were put on the job.

Tracks showed that some one had backed up to the platform and loaded on the cotton and hauled it away. Up to Friday no clue of the cotton or the thief had been found.

There has been considerable cotton stealing in Rannels, Coke and Tom Green counties this fall, and the guilty party will no doubt be apprehended, and then the penitentiary population will increase.

MEN WHO QUIT TRAIN ON TRIAL

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Nov. 24.—Continued attempt at justification was expected today at the trial in the United States district court of the eight Brotherhood men charged with conspiracy in connection with abandoning a train at a desert point in Arizona last summer.

The attempt to prove that they were justified in abandoning the train while bringing it across the desert was begun yesterday. The defense introduced evidence to prove that the defendants were justified in walking out and leaving the train while en route because they discovered that the equipment was out of order and the condition of the train unsafe.

IRISH LEADER PUT TO DEATH

(By Associated Press)

DUBLIN, Ireland, Nov. 24.—Erskine Childress, chief lieutenant of Eamonn de Valera, was executed today for having an automatic pistol in his possession, according to an official bulletin by the National army.

The method of putting Childress to death was not announced, but it is believed that he was shot. He was arrested at Wicklow by free state forces on Nov. 10th.

The execution of Childress removes the most important figure in the republican movement in Ireland, and the man who stands next to de Valera.

Concerted machine gun firing in several districts in Dublin last night is believed to have been staged as a demonstration against the expected execution of Childress. The firing exceeded in its intensity that of the duration of all Dublin's previous experiences of this nature.

PEACE MEETING IN ONE PROGRAM

LAUSANNE, Switzerland, Nov. 24.—The plan to hold two distinct conferences on the Near East question has been abandoned, it was stated today. The problems of the Straits of the Dardanelles has been merged into a general conference. The original plan was for a conference for re-establishing peace between Turkey and Greece and between the allies and Turkey, and another to fix the status of the Dardanelles.

NEW MASTER FOR BOY SCOUTS

The local troop, Boy Scouts of America, has been called to meet at the Carnegie Library next Tuesday evening at seven o'clock, Nov. 27th, at which time there will be some reorganizing work done, and the new year launched for greater activity in Scoutcraft.

At this meeting Scoutmaster U. Stephens, who organized the present troop and who has handled the work so successfully, will retire and will be succeeded by Rev. Jess. Mitchell as Scoutmaster.

Mr. Stephens has asked the boys to release him as his work frequently calls him out of the city on Scout meeting nights, and other duties make it difficult for him to devote his attention to the Scout movement that is necessary for the greatest good. Rev. Mitchell has agreed to direct the boys and he will make a good leader, as he is a Scout himself.

After organizing for another year, the Boy Scouts will launch out on a more extensive program than in the past. The program for 1923 calls for some real outdoor work. To begin with a move will be put on foot to provide a gym, and the Scouts will be given the task of digging a cave in which the gymnasium will be fitted up.

There are quite a number of boys who are eager to get in the Boy Scout organization, and an effort will be made to admit all those who are qualified, and prospects for the largest Scout organization in the history of the work here is very promising. All the Scouts are requested to meet at the Library next Tuesday night.

PUBLIC HEALTH BOARD TO MEET

Mr. Bracey, representing the Texas Public Health Association, is here for the purpose of reorganizing the local board and arranging for the annual campaign and sale of Christmas seals. All the members of the County Health Board are requested to meet at the Carnegie Library tonight at 7:15.

The T. B. Seal Sale will be arranged for at the meeting tonight, and the seals will be put on sale here in due time for holiday shoppers to make a liberal appropriation for the purchase of the Christmas stamps which have become so popular, and the receipts from which go towards stamping out tuberculosis in Texas.

Texas' quota of stamps for the coming campaign is \$125,000 and Rannels county's quota will be announced later.

The design of the 1922 Christmas seal is intended to make an appeal to the artistic sense of the public as well as to its sympathy and generosity. The design shows a Christmas tree in white in the left foreground, with the double barred cross, the emblem of the international crusade against tuberculosis, in front. In the right foreground is a mother and child. At the bottom of the seal are the words, "For Health," and at the top the numerals, "1922."

NEW YORK MAYOR ORDERS WAR ON KU KLUX KLAN

NEW YORK, Nov. 24.—The police today were under orders from Mayor Hylan to rid New York city of members of the Ku Klux Klan. Preparations were reported under way to carry out the command of the mayor.

Police Commissioner Enright last night received orders from Mayor Hylan directing him to drive the members of the Ku Klux Klan out of New York before the organization gains a foothold.

"Treat this group of racial and religious haters as you would a bunch of reds and bomb throwers," said the mayor in issuing orders to the police commissioner.

BOSTON, Nov. 24.—Georges Clemenceau lashed back at his senate critics today in the first American interview granted to the Associated Press. He replied particularly to the criticism by Senators Hitchcock and Borah. He said that Hitchcock had called him a militarist, and he dared Hitchcock to go to France when he was out of the senate and learn the facts.

M. Clemenceau answered Hitchcock's demand that he explain why France insisted upon using black troops in her army of occupation, and declared that the senator had been misled by German propaganda. Clemenceau said that today there was not a single black soldier in German territory.

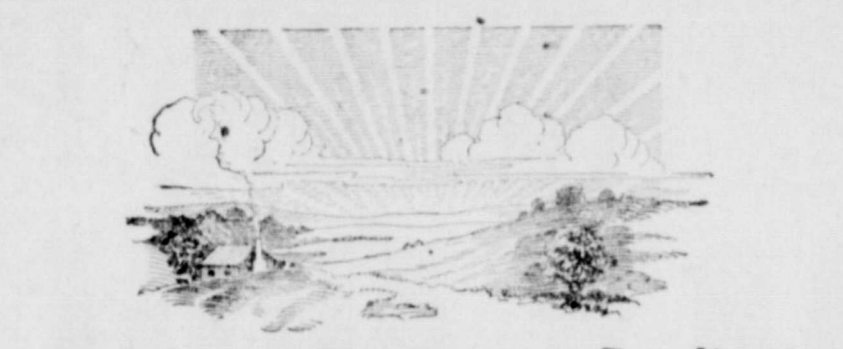


