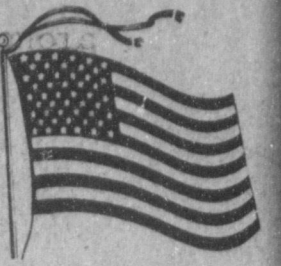

Ag '80 Outlook Subject Of Meet

A week before a new administration is inaugurated in Washington, farmers from across West Texas will gather at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center as a blue-ribbon group of agricultural specialists gazes into the year ahead for major farm products of the area.

Agricultural trends, the 1981 farm bill, the Reagan transition, commodity prices, and expected policies of the new administration are among the issues which will be examined in depth at the special outlook conference from 9:30 a.m. until 4:15 p.m. Tuesday, January 13.

The conference is the highlight of the annual meeting of the South Plains Development Program (SPD). SPD is a regional organization sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. It promotes economic

Visibility Hampered By Lingering Fog

With one-third of January, 1981 now becoming history, slight moisture has been recorded in the area.

On Thursday, low clouds ushered in spotty showers which deposited .05 in rain which failed to compensate for a lack of any moisture during the preceding month. This was the first rain recorded in Muleshoe for 1981. However, the clouds moved out of the area with little more than the teasing showers.

Friday, very damp, cold fog had the entire area all but 'soaked in' until the sun started burning the fog cover away around noon. During the afternoon on Friday, the sun continued to shine, gradually warming the air again.

With predictions from the National Weather Service that cold weather was in the picture to return to the area, Saturday morning the clouds had returned with a promise of more moisture.

NWS had predicted light rain with mixed snow to be falling by Sunday morning, and a gradual warmup again by the first of this week.

The overnight temperature on Friday remained just above freezing, but freezing temperatures expected to be recorded by Sunday, today.

Only light moisture was in the forecast by NWS, and included rain and snow mixed.

Muleshoe joined other cities and towns who were recording more than normal incidences of 'upper respiratory' illnesses, and West Plains Medical Center has been overflowing for the past two weeks.

Almost all hospitals are reporting very high incidences of illness, and the hospital here is no exception. However, Marshall Cook, administrator of the hospital here, said he was hesitant to indicate an epidemic of influenza, citing several other illnesses are helping keep West Plains Medical Center overflowing.

The meeting is scheduled to start at 7:30 p.m. at the school administration office.

Weather has also been a factor in winding up a drawn out cotton harvest.

Snows in November kept the cotton producers from harvesting their crops, and the lingering harvest was to have been completed by this weekend. However, a few cotton ginners have now extended the time for a completion. Some of the cotton gins in the area have already closed down for the season, but others had indicated a few acres of cotton still in the fields and light ginning operations to be continuing for at least another week.

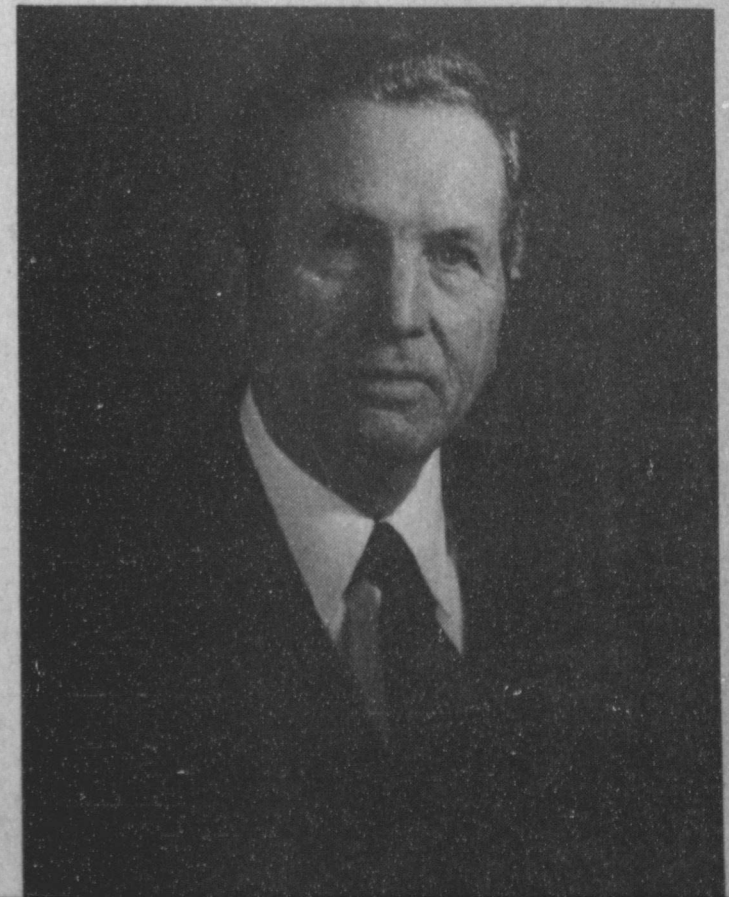

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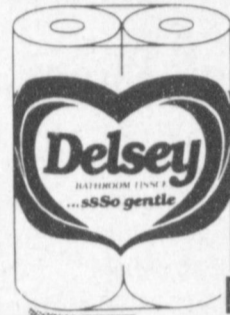

Step 1 - Isolate the problem

Parents should expect to solve only one behavior problem at a time.

Step 2 - Recognize the goal

The child may be misbehaving simply to get attention or for revenge.

Step 3 - Examine your own participation

Parents must make certain the goals they are setting for their children do not represent misguided strivings for personal superiority, such as domination and prestige.

Step 4 - Allow natural consequences

Parents need to increase

their faith in their child's potential to profit from his trials and errors. In many instances the natural outcomes of a sequence of events provide corrective learning.

Step 5 - Arrange logical consequences

On other occasions natural consequences are not permissible and the parents must intervene. The parent should arrange an appropriate, sensible consequence and allow the child to make a choice.

Step 6 - Acting on the goal

If a child fails to gain his goal by misbehaving, he may change his direction and choose another course of action.

Step 7 - Find additional ways to encourage the child

Since the problem child is usually a discouraged child, he must receive genuine encouragement to regain his courage and live as a fellow member of the group. He should be allowed to make as many decisions as possible.

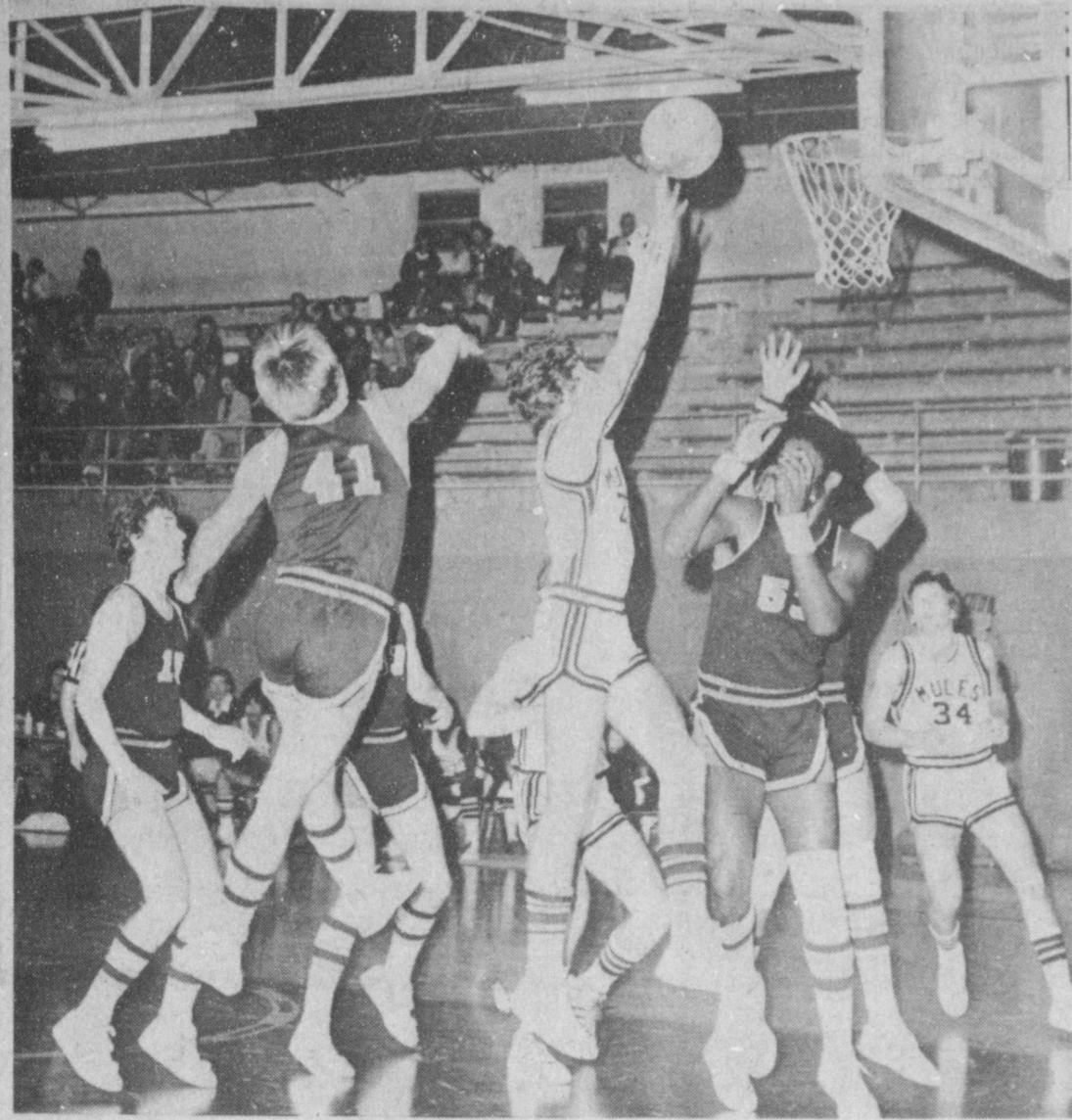

The Consumer Alert

Cold weather is upon us at last. Just as winter is sometimes late in arriving in Texas, especially the central and southern parts of our state, many of us are late in restocking our firewood supplies for the months ahead. So, if you are about to purchase this year's supply of firewood, here are a few things to keep in mind.

The most important step to take in acquiring firewood is to select a dependable firewood dealer. If you do not already have an established source, ask around for recommendations before you decide to buy. Although most consumers in the market for firewood never experience any difficulty, there are some who have been "burned" by a few unscrupulous dealers.

The most common complaint our office receives about firewood is that either less wood is delivered than was expected or that the price charged is more than was agreed on. The best way to get the amount of wood you want is to buy by standard measuring amounts. For example, a "cord" of wood, the standard unit by which wood is sold, contains 128 cubic feet and usually measures either 4 x 4 x 8 feet or 2 x 4 x 16 feet. Measure the area where wood will be stored so that when filled it will equal a cord. Then you will know whether all of the wood you ordered is delivered.

When ordering wood that is to be delivered, be sure to inquire into any extra charges for delivery or stacking. The price for the wood may seem extremely reasonable until the added charges are included.

Some dealers advertise wood at very inexpensive prices. Frequently, you will discover that they are selling

wood by the pick-up truck load or by some unit other than a cord. Since pick-up truck beds can vary greatly in size, this is a risky way to purchase wood if you plan to do any comparison shopping for prices. Never pay for wood in advance. Some dealers will deliver a partial load and demand full payment.

RED MEANS A LOT OF THINGS. Stop; danger; anger; political leanings and, it could mean you are losing up to 10 gallons of fuel a month through evaporation, if that's the color your fuel storage tank is painted. Red, or any other dark color can cause greatly increased evaporation rates, especially if storage tanks are located in the open, without shade. In order to stop this costly fuel waster dead in its tracks, simply paint your storage tank with a reflective color: white or aluminum are best, and will cut evaporation losses by about a third. You can cut your evaporation rate to about a gallon and a half per month by moving the tank to a shaded area and installing a pressure vacuum release filler cap. If the tank is properly shaded, you won't have to worry much about color at all. Look for tips on conserving fuel with equipment tune-ups and maintenance next week.

and should be determined before you buy. In Texas, oak is the most popular firewood for several reasons. It is a "hard" wood that burns slowly and it has a rough, decorative bark that many people like.

Mesquite also is a good firewood. Like oak it is hard and slow burning. Soft woods such as pine and cedar should be avoided for firewood. They burn fast and hot and are good for little more than kindling.

EDITORIAL

Back Iraq?

In the current war between Iran and Iraq, the United States has been faced with a serious problem. Iran holds our hostages, should not be needlessly irritated. With Iraq, the nation has not had especially close relations in recent years. Should Washington side with either?

The answer is clear when the nature of the regime in each country is examined. In Iran a fanatical, anti-western, Shiite, expansionist regime holds power. In Iraq a secular government (Baathist) stressing nationalism and socialism is in power.

Iran's tact is the really dangerous revolutionary force threatening stability in the vital Middle East. Iraq, while no staunch ally of the U.S., nevertheless represents stability and a desire not to rock the boat and overthrow other Arab regimes.

Add to this the fact that Iran was secretly seeking to overthrow the government in Iraq, for some months before war erupted between the two countries, and the war can be viewed in better perspective.

After the hostages are freed, which may be soon, the U.S. can be more openly concerned in seeing that Iranian fanatics don't expand their power with terror and revolution. That is a major threat to the West's oil supply and supply lines.

Thatcher's Example

Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher of Great Britain recently again demonstrated the courage and determination which have propelled her into the leadership of her country's government. She exhibited much more intestinal fortitude than most politicians.

In this case, she was confronted with a hunger strike by a number of Irish terrorists. Some had starved themselves so long that death was a possibility. An appeal went out to Mrs. Thatcher--supported by some well-meaning and good-hearted people--to grant the terrorists' demand. It was that terrorists (who have been responsible for so much killing) be given the status of political prisoners.

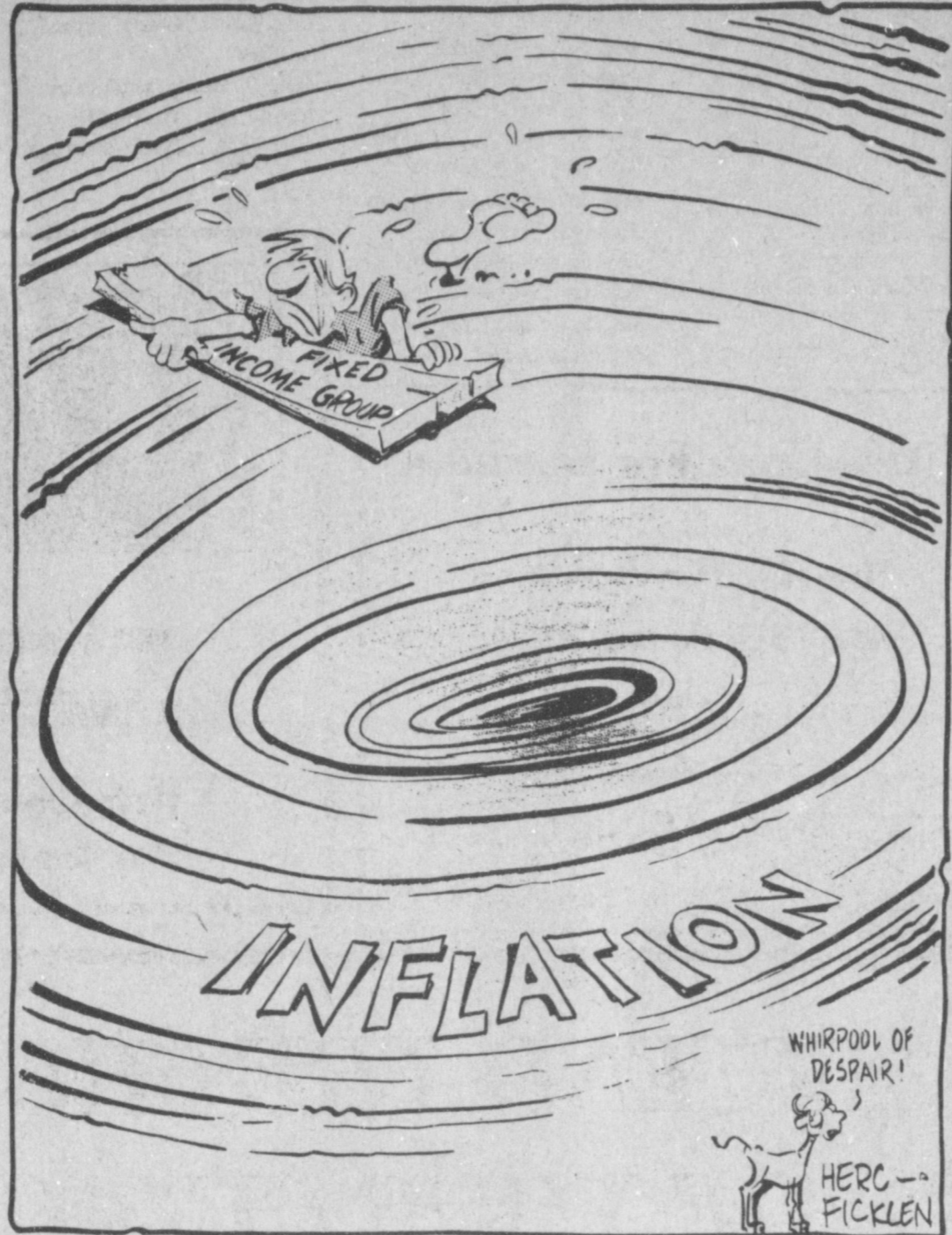
Mrs. Thatcher's response was that she was sorry the terrorists were fasting and hoped they would not starve themselves to death. But her government, she said, would not suddenly classify such perpetrators of violence and crime, as political prisoners--nor could any other government, she maintained.

And she made it clear that if these people starved themselves to death, it was they, not the British Government who would be responsible. She added there was no chance she would change her mind. So it was up to fasting terrorists to decide what they would do.

At that, the seven who had fasted longest, decided to end their fast.

This is another clear lesson in responding to terrorists, blackmailers, hostage takers and terrorist murderers. Governments cannot give in to their threats--or there will be no end to it and terrorism would be certain to escalate.

The Israelis have demonstrated that, also (though perhaps guilty of some terrorism themselves which one doesn't condone). In other words, bowing to the demands of terrorists leads only to more terrorism; that's a hard lesson for many good-hearted people to learn.

NEWS REPORT FROM WASHINGTON

Reagan's Foreign Policy Changes Certain-Iran & Reagan-Cuba & Poland

WASHINGTON, D. C. -- In approximately two weeks the United States will have a new foreign policy and the outlook as this is written is that both the hostage problem and the Cuba-inspired Latin American problem will be the same.

President Reagan is certain to approach these problems a bit differently. One school of thought--not likely to be adopted--is that Reagan should, first off, tell the Iranians there will be no negotiations about the frozen billions in Iranian assets until the hostages are freed.

The objection to this is the danger that the hostages might be harmed. But, on the other side of the coin, they might be harmed in any event. And Reagan could tell the Iranian regime bluntly that not only would there be no negotiations until the hostages are released, but that any harm to them would mean military action by the United States.

Those who favor such an approach are in the minority but it might just work, because Iranian interests are primarily to regain the billions in frozen assets. And if the U.S. were forced to intervene militarily, because of harm or death to the hostages, the present rulers would be kicked out of power totally.

Thus, not freeing the hostages would cost Iran billions of dollars. Harming them would bring on U.S. military intervention. In time, the odds are that even the militants running Iran today would see the light. It would

ON SOCIAL SECURITY

The increase in Social Security taxes, which took effect January 1, is substantial. The increase, voted by Congress two years ago, is intended to raise an additional \$15 billion for the Social Security retirement fund. And \$15 billion, even when divided among 115 million contributors, isn't peanuts.

be very much in their own interests to free the hostages.

Concerning Cuba, and Cuba's support of revolutionary movements in Latin America, Reagan is sure to give opponents of communism, even when they are not democratic elements, more support.

Concerning Poland, Reagan could issue a warning to Moscow that any military intervention would shatter the Helsinki accord, signed only a few years ago--and providing for respect of human rights and human freedom.

He could point out that invasions of East Germany, Hungary and Czechoslovakia preceded the Helsinki accord. If, therefore, the Soviet Union violates this solemn agreement, the United States would be forced to reconsider its position vis-a-vis 1962 agreement by Washington not to intervene militarily in the affairs of Cuba.

That kind of talk would probably get the attention of the leaders in the Kremlin. It would certainly escalate the cost of an invasion of Poland in the eyes of Russian leaders--because it would threaten to end the inviolate status of communist Cuba, something no Russian wants. It would give the United States a pretense to act in Cuba, although perhaps flimsy, but enough to cloud the legality issue. Thus, it's about the only high price the U.S. is today capable of forcing Moscow to pay for an invasion of Poland.

TRAINING & PRIDE

The Army intends next year to form some combat units in a new way it hopes will help fire up the troops. Soldiers and officers, under the plan just approved in principle by Gen. E. C. Meyer, Army chief of staff, will be kept in the same unit during their first tour rather than being transferred from one outfit to another, as they often are now.

AGING EIFFEL TOWER

PARIS -- At age 91, the Eiffel Tower is ailing and city officials have decided to close the first level of the world-famous monument for at least a year. The 7,500-ton grande dame of Paris is getting a face lift.

87TH ANNIVERSARY

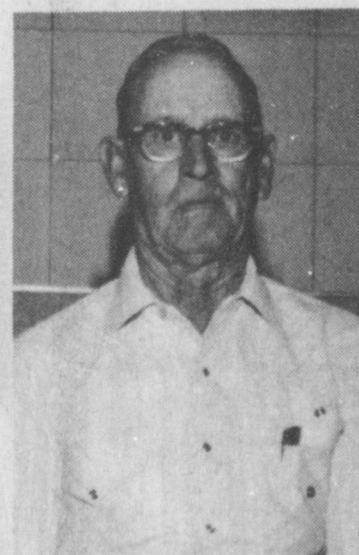
Morris Services Held Friday

Rep. de la Garza's Selection As Ag. Chairman Praised

AUSTIN -- Congressman Kika de la Garza's recent selection as Chairman of the House Agriculture Committee has been cited as "a real plus for Texas farmers and ranchers" by Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown.

De la Garza is from Mission, Texas.

"Representative de la Garza has pushed for Texas agriculture as a member of the Committee since 1965, and as chairman, we know that he will have the best interests of our state in mind as he directs this vital group," Brown said.

Through the Reagan Administration has not indicated that there will be major changes ahead in the Federal farm program. Brown noted that there are several issues important to Texas that need to be resolved by the Committee.

Brown commented on two problems that need immediate action--water and rising production costs for farmers and ranchers. "Representative de la Garza is well aware of the economic situation in Texas and other states resulting from the drought. I believe that he will promote research on new technology to increase the supply of water and to provide improved production methods that will enable farmers to realize better profits from their

land." "The predator control issue is still a concern for Texas ranchers, and we are hoping that we can get programs initiated that will help sheep and goat raisers stay in business," Brown said. Research is underway in Texas now on use of the toxic collar, "but we have seen before that research in this sensitive area does not always result in available programs for ranchers."

Making plans for the future is often a way of escaping work in the present.

Colorsounds aids reading, spelling

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) — What helps squirmy junior high students improve in reading and spelling? Colorsounds.
It uses songs to teach sight words and the 16 common vowel sounds of English. Color-coding the dictionary markings of the sounds is part of the program devised by Mike Bell, University of Texas doctoral student.

Youngsters first learn vowel sounds and their colors. Then, given the words to a song which is played in class, they identify the sounds in the song and color-code them. At home, students reinforce their learning by counting how many times each sound occurs in the song and by writing source words in a notebook.

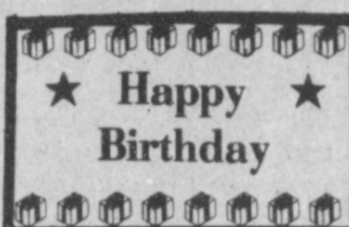
Student Council Attends District V Convention

The Freshman Class of Muleshoe High School have selected their favorites. They are Diane Bachicha and Mike Pecina.

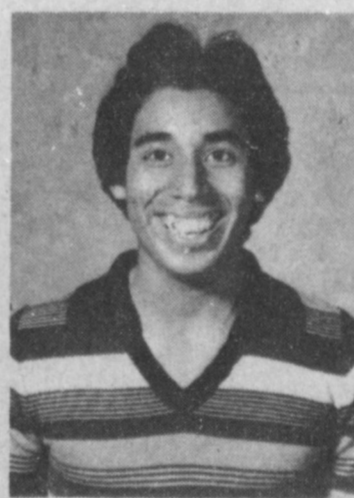
