MAN AND WOMAN HANG IN CANADA

(By Associated Press)
 FORT SASKATCHEWAN, Alberta, Canada, May 2.—Mrs. Florence Lassandra and Emilio Picariello were hanged today for the murder of Constable Lawson of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police, last September. The man and woman went to the gallows today both protesting their innocence. Picariello paid the penalty first, and forty minutes later Mrs. Lassandra was executed.

Mrs. Lassandra was the first woman to hang in Canada in twenty-four years. She declared to the last that she was not guilty of having anything to do with the death of the officer who was slain after an unsuccessful attempt to capture a party and auto loaded with liquor.

IRRIGATION IN SARDINIA OF INTEREST TO WEST TEXAS ENTHUSIASTS

 ROME, May 2.—An artificial lake 15 miles long by two miles wide is being constructed in Sardinia to harness the water power of the swift flowing River Tirso. It is proposed to develop millions of horse-power, and the project is said to be one of the largest ever attempted in Europe. Besides the development of power the lake will serve a double purpose in irrigating a vast area which, up to the present, has been nothing but a barren waste.

The production of grain in the low plains through which the river runs is expected to be augmented three-fold. Hitherto these plains have been nothing but marshy lands where cultivation has been undertaken only under the most difficult circumstances. With the Tirso harnessed, the distribution of water will be maintained and controlled to suit the needs of the lowlands, and the whole area transformed into a productive plain.

The marshy character of the low basin has made it unhealthy. Control of the river will convert the stagnant districts into healthy fields and permit their cultivation with the assurance that malaria will no longer be present. The immense hydraulic force which will be developed by the drop from the lake to the plain is expected to give a great impetus to Sardinian industry, and the mines throughout the island will be capable of greater output through the acquisition of cheap power.

NEW OFFICERS FOR BRONTE C. C.

BRONTE, May 2.—The annual meeting and election of the Bronte Chamber of Commerce last night was attended by a large number of Bronte citizens and farmers and ranchmen of the Bronte community. A delegation from Ballinger was present and assured the Bronte interests that Ballinger was with them in their efforts for the betterment of this section.

After a number of selections by the Bronte Brass Band, Robert Knerim, president of the organization, called the meeting to order. Short talks were made by W. L. Hayley, Rev. Anderson, Howard Wilkins and J. D. McCutcheon. Stuart L. Williams of Ballinger spoke on "Organized Community Salesmanship," and Carl Guin of Ballinger on "What the Bronte and Ballinger Organizations are Doing for this Section."

After the speeches, directors and officers were elected for the ensuing year.

Chief C. C. Holder made a special talk on the irrigation project, stating that the surveys would be completed in about ten days, and work would start immediately on the necessary mapping for the organization of the irrigation district.

NEFF SUBMITS 17 NEW BILLS

AUSTIN, May 2.—Seventeen additional subjects were submitted to the legislature by Governor Neff today. The message was sent to both branches of the legislature, and the list includes the abolition and consolidation of certain state departments, the passage of the electrocution bill to take the place of hanging, a renovation of the state health department, the blue sky law, amendments to the medical practice act, compensation of county commissioners and tax collectors.

A plan to set the Dinkle income tax bill for special order of the House tomorrow was decided by the farm bloc. Five new occupation tax bills, based on gross receipts of wholesalers were introduced in the House by Representative Patman.

The House refused to concur in the Senate amendment of the bill and asked for a free conference committee. The House also voted down the proposals for night sessions in order to avoid another special session.

ANOTHER DROP IN PRICE CRUDE

INDEPENDENCE, Kans., May 2.—The Prairie Oil & Gas Company today announced a cut of ten cents per barrel on all grades of crude oil in the mid-continent field. The reduced price is effective at seven o'clock today.

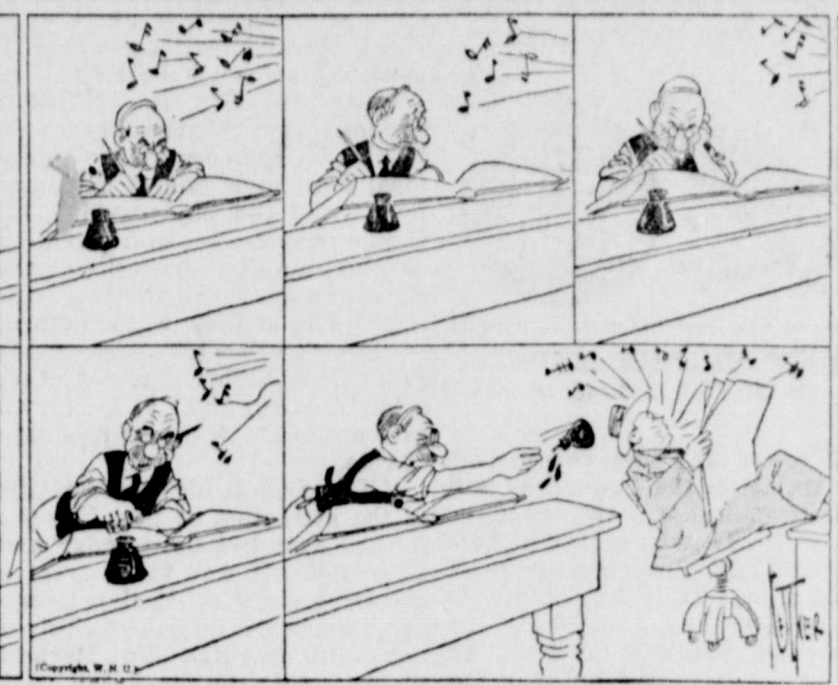
This is the second ten cent cut in crude oil since the recent advances. The new prices range from \$1.30 to \$2.40.

The new prices will be paid by the Prairie Company for crude purchased by it at wells in Kansas, Oklahoma and North Texas, the prices to vary according to the gravity of the oil.

A Letter to the School Board

State Superintendent Marrs has addressed a letter to members of independent school boards throughout the state, and the letter contains information which should also be placed before the patrons of the schools as well as the public. It is noted by the letter that high schools are not graded by the number of college entrance units, and that it is possible for a school granting only sixteen units to rank as a first-class school. The letter from Mr. Marrs to the school boards, in part, says:

"The Thirty-eighth Legislature enacted a law requiring all twelve-month contracts of superintendents, principals and teachers to begin July first and end June thirtieth, and school boards were given until July 1st, 1924, to adjust their contracts. You will please take notice of this law as it may be necessary for some persons to be paid in tenths or elevenths for the ensuing year in order that the yearly salary will be paid by July 1, 1924. This law was made necessary on account of confusion arising when superintendents, principals or teachers changed positions.

"I hope you will pardon another suggestion concerning the organization of your school. Optional subjects should not be offered unless as many as five pupils desire to be enrolled in the class. The per capita cost of high school instruction is sometimes excessive and is due very largely to the ambition of the faculty to secure a large number of college entrance units. Otherwise intelligent men frequently speak of the rank of a high school as determined by the number of college entrance units recognized. This is usually an utterly false assumption and the large majority of public school men know better but yield to the temptation to boost their high schools in this manner. A first-class high school of three teachers, doing exclusively high school work, should have sixteen units, and no more. Other units should not be requested until the enrollment in the high school grades demands sectioning on account of numbers. The cost of instruction in a new subject, under such circumstances will not add to the extra cost. Consequently a large high school with few units, while the work may be excellent, would probably meet the needs of the community by offering additional subjects.

"The great danger lies in the tendency to add courses in the high schools and neglect the intermediate grades. Probably your high school graduates have been criticised because some of them are weak in the fundamental subjects such as reading, spelling, writing, arithmetic, etc. In many school systems they are not to blame; they have been crowded in the intermediate grades forty to fifty to the room under poorly paid, ill-prepared teachers and they have been frequently promoted from grade to grade because their physical rather than their intellectual growth demanded it. The per capita cost of stu-

dents in the intermediate grades will not be excessive unless the enrollment is fewer than thirty and the salary of the teacher exceeds ninety dollars per month.

"May I suggest that before you introduce new subjects in order to secure additional units, you make a survey of the needs of the school and determine whether or not the extra money needed for additional teacher and equipment in the high school should not be used for strengthening the work of the intermediate grades? Remember that you cannot build a good house unless you take unusual care with the foundation, and I hope you will also realize that mathematics may be taught just as efficiently, and sometimes more efficiently, in a high school which has sixteen units as in one which has twenty-four units, and that after sixteen units have been secured the number of units should depend upon the number enrolled in the high school and the local demand for certain subjects. The public high school is not organized primarily to prepare five or ten per cent of the students to attend college; its organization should meet the needs of the ninety per cent who do not go to college and at the same time accomplish such thorough work that its graduates would be acceptable students in our best colleges. Your independent district is a corporation; your citizens are stockholders and you are the board of directors. Good business management demands an efficient organization of the force and careful consideration of all expenditures so that the produce may be standard and the operating expense not be excessive."

APPEALS TO U.S. HELP FIND CHILD

(By Associated Press)

DALLAS, May 2.—Federal aid in the search of the four year old child of R. Parmalee Jr., alleged to have been kidnapped from the children's home in Mexico City by the father, has been requested by W. F. Black, of Dallas, grandfather of the child. The request was contained in a telegram sent to United States Senator, Morris Sheppard of Texas.

In the message to Mr. Sheppard, Black said that he had received an unconfirmed report that Mrs. Esther Black Parmalee, mother of the child, had also been kidnapped in the Mexican capital. The kidnapping of the child is the culmination of long legal proceedings for the custody of the child between the parents who were divorced in Los Angeles.

SAN ANTONIO—Mexicans in San Antonio will gather May 5 in the annual "Cinco de Mayo" celebration. The celebration is to commemorate the battle of Puebla, when Gen. Ignacio Zaragoza defeated French occupation forces, May 5, 1862.

GERMANS RESUME NOTE WRITING TO DELAY DEBT

COAST GUARDS WATCHING RUM

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, May 2.—The government, which is centering a triangular attack on a rum fleet off the New Jersey coast, today seized a tug and motor launch carrying provisions and fuel to alien craft anchored outside the three mile limit.

WASHINGTON, May 2.—While government officials continue to be puzzled over the application of the Supreme Court's decision on serving liquor on ships, the coast guard headquarters issued an order concentrating all available coast guard boats on the North Atlantic along the New Jersey shore.

Officers of the coast guard headquarters said that henceforth all rum fleets massed off Atlantic highlands would be under surveillance of two coast guard cutters day and night.

DENIED BOND FOR KILLING OF TWO

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, May 2.—Milt Good and Tom Ross, of Gaines county, charged with the murder of W. D. Allison and W. F. Robertson, cattle inspectors who were recently slain in a hotel at Seminole, have been denied bail by the Court of Criminal Appeals on habeas corpus application. The court at Seminole denied the men bond and they appealed to the higher court, and today the appeals court remanded the defendants to jail without bond. Good and Ross are in jail at Lubbock, the case having been transferred to that point for trial on account of the intense feeling at Seminole.

With more than 300,000 aliens listed in Paris, there is one foreigner to every nine Frenchmen residing in the capital. Belgians lead with 56,500, followed by Italian, 41,000; Swiss, 30,000; British, 27,000; Americans, 25,000; Russians, 23,500; Spanish, 14,500; Poles, 10,000; and Germans, 2,000.

BERLIN, May 2.—Germany's latest reparations offer proposes that the sum total of her obligations in cash and kind under terms of the Versailles treaty, be fixed at thirty billion gold marks. The German government note was made public here simultaneously with the report by the entente to the Washington government, and proposes that twenty billion of the total amount be raised before July 1, 1927, by a bond issue at normal rates of interest on the international money market. It proposes that five billion be raised before July 1, 1929 in the same manner, and the remaining sum be raised in a similar way before July 1, 1931.

LONDON, May 2.—It was authoritatively stated today that the British government had gone to some pains to make clear to every party that Great Britain was in no way connected with the German reparations note which was sent out by the Germans today. Great Britain was in no way connected with the framing of the terms of the note, as had been suggested in certain quarters.

SAN ANTONIO C. OF C. FOR RECLAMATION BILL

SAN ANTONIO, May 2.—The San Antonio Chamber of Commerce recently went on record as opposed to the repeal of the \$600,000 reclamation and flood control bill passed at the regular session of the legislature. A delegation of San Antonio citizens recently went to Austin to appear at a public hearing in opposition to repeal of the law.

DOG CATCHER IS A BUSY MAN

Carrying out the purposes and intent of the dog law, Chief of Police Pileher is a busy man. He stated that he was making short work of all dogs found trotting around town without being properly tagged, and it is a common thing to see the dog catcher leading a dog to the death cell.

Mr. Pileher stated that there was another side to the dog law which he would enforce, and that was with reference to the dog tax. The city ordinance which directs that all dogs be tagged or killed also provides a penalty for the owner who keeps a dog without paying tax on same. Some dog owners have the idea that so long as their dog does not come to town, or is kept at home, that he is not subject to tax. Not so, and the city is ready to furnish you with a tag at so much per tag, or file complaint against you for violating the dog law.

SLIGHT CHANGE MADE IN SANTA FE SCHEDULE

Effective May 13th, two passenger trains on the Santa Fe will operate under a new schedule. Train No. 77, which arrives here now at 12:26 p. m., will arrive at 11:56 a. m. Train No. 78, due to depart from here at 4:10 in the afternoon, will leave at 4:36, or twenty-six minutes later than the present schedule. There will be a slight change also in the night train, but no change in the train going East at 9:40 a. m.

This change in schedule is the result of the Santa Fe reducing its time between Brownwood and San Angelo, cutting the time down about thirty-five minutes. The change will meet with the hearty approval of local citizens as it puts the West bound train in here before noon and East bound passengers can remain here about thirty minutes later. The change only affects points West of Brownwood and the same connections will be maintained with the main line points.

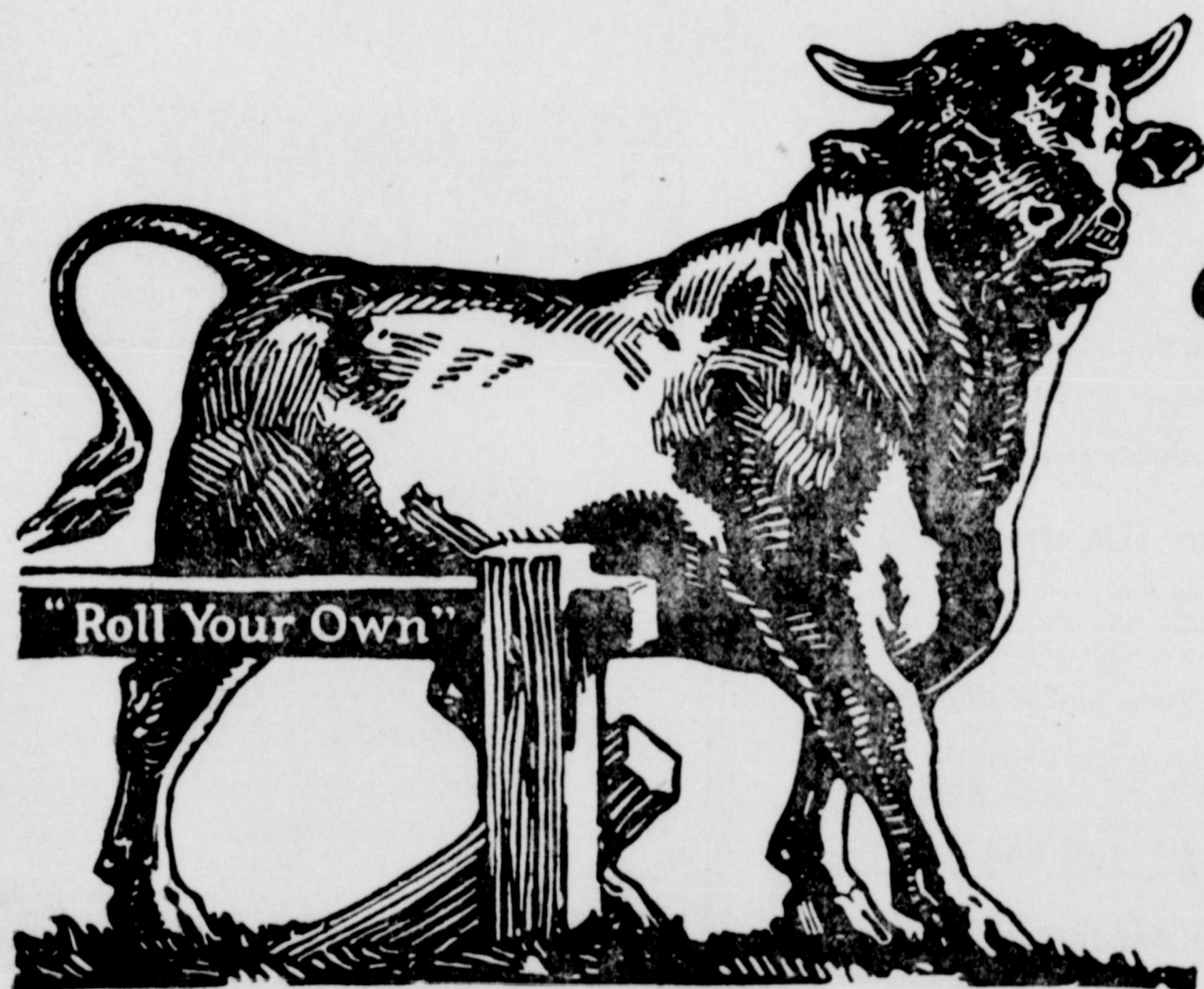

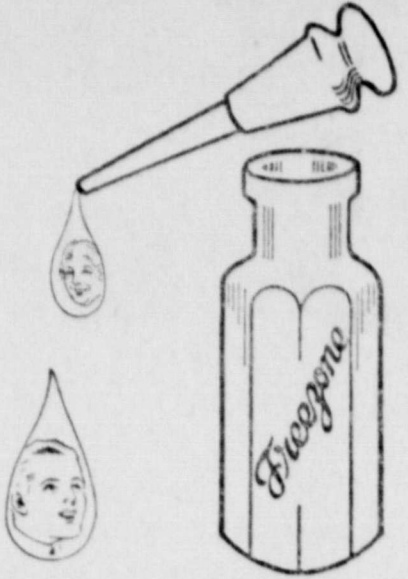
