MAN SUES FOR \$50,000 BREACH OF PROMISE

(By Associated Press)
 WASHINGTON, June 9.—Mannuel Herriek, a former representative of Oklahoma, who some months ago aired on the floor of the House some of his courtship experiences, today filed a breach of promise suit against his former secretary, Miss Ethylton Chrane. He asks for \$50,000 damages.
 Herriek recently paid a fine of \$5.00 on a complaint that he had annoyed Miss Chrane on the streets. Today, as on that occasion, he appeared as his own counsel and told the court that Miss Chrane had promised to marry him "in the presence of competent witnesses."

SENATE READY TO ADJOURN

(By Associated Press)
 AUSTIN, June 9.—The Down bill requiring sworn statements on property renditions and prescribing regulations for tax assessing, was engrossed by the Senate today. The Senate finance committee reported favorably on the Wood bill proposing an appropriation of \$600,000 for the erection of a state court building.
 The Coven substitute tax bill placing one cent a gallon on gasoline sold by wholesalers, was sent to the governor by the House when it concurred with the Senate amendments. The House declined to concur with the Senate amendments to the educational bill.
 A proposal was set to sine die adjournment next Monday night and made resolutions which were offered in the Senate by Senator Fairchild.

KILLS THREE THEN HIMSELF

 GALVESTON, June 9.—Advices were received at headquarters here of the Lykes Bros. Steamship Company today which told of the fatal shooting of Captain J. N. Neilson, wireless operator A. Glaiser and John G. Perry, by second officer S. Tsettos, on board the steamer Brave Couer, on June 6th.
 Neilson and Perry are residents of Galveston.
 The dispatch said that Tsettos committed suicide today to avoid arrest.

TRAIN WRECKED THEN ROBBED

 SAN ANTONIO, June 9.—A passenger train that is said to have carried a number of prominent citizens of Pueblo, Mexico, was wrecked last night, the express cars looted, and the crew executed by brigands, according to special dispatches received here early today. Troops were rushed from Pueblo to the scene of the outrage. No disposition of the passengers aboard the train is known. The wreck occurred between Jalapa Amozoc and Vera Cruz, the dispatch stated.

BOARD PASSES ON IMPROVEMENTS

The board of trustees of the Ballinger Independent School District met Friday afternoon in an important session and much pending business was transacted. The board has been at work for some time on an improvement program and this demanded most of the attention of the trustees at the Friday meeting.

Improvements contemplated will include all buildings and in some of the ward schools there is quite a bit of work to be done. All ward buildings will be worked over and put in shape for the ensuing school year. Library and state books that have formerly been kept in the Central ward building will be transferred to the High school and a library arranged on the third floor where there is some available space which can be transformed into one large room.

The question of getting more room in the High school was perhaps the most important problem considered, and it was announced that the board will build a wooden building somewhere on the campus to take care of two class rooms. The High school has been crowded for the past several years and this additional room will mean much to the teaching and will give enough room to thoroughly take care of the work. New seats will be purchased for these two rooms and for one room in the South ward school.

Another much needed improvement on the High school campus will be taken care of. The board proposes to build two additional toilets of stone structure. The one now in use will be worked over and used for the boys of both High school and Central, while the two new ones will be used for the girls.

There remains still one vacancy in the High school faculty, that of a Spanish teacher. At the Friday meeting Miss Lois White of Georgetown, Texas was elected to the faculty and will teach History and English. There will be two additional teachers in High school and one additional ward school teacher this year. The new ward teacher will be placed in South Ballinger.

The board endorsed Miss Deltz of Valley Mills, Texas as an expression teacher and granted her the use of a studio in the Central building, without pay. It is customary for these teachers to charge a tuition fee and those who care to receive this course can arrange with the instructor at the beginning of the school term.

CURB FIRM GOES BROKE

 NEW YORK, June 9.—Eluigo Lozade, a Filipino butler in the home of Dr. G. W. McAuliffe, confessed to the police today and said that he had strangled his fiancée, Miss Blossom Seeley Martin, who was employed by the doctor as a nurse.
 Lozade admitted that he took the body, wrapped in green portieres to Elizabeth Port on Slaton Island, 18 miles away, and was attempting to dump it from a ferry boat into the harbor when a policeman arrested him.
 Although the Filipino refused to tell why he killed his sweetheart police believe that his poverty caused her to break her engagement with him and through jealousy he strangled her to death.

Crop conditions are very fine in Central Texas, according to Mr. Dankworth. He reports that after they left Brownwood they saw their first grasshoppers and it appeared that much damage has been done.

CRUDE OIL SPRAY USED ON GRASSHOPPERS

After giving the method a trial, J. C. Dibrell is convinced that the crude oil spray is an effective method of fighting the grasshopper pest.

Crude oil costs \$2.00 a barrel at the well on the Dibrell ranch. He used a ten-barrel tank on wagon with a hand-force pump and spray nozzle, spraying a ten-foot swath around his field of cotton. The oil kills the hoppers which it touches as well as the vegetation where it falls and the scent of the oil, it is believed, prevents other hoppers from entering and crossing the treated strip. He does not set fire to the oil but lets it remain on the vegetation.

The cost of treating a 60-acre field Mr. Dibrell estimated at 50c per acre. Persons who have no pump, might use an ordinary garden sprinkler effectively, it is said.

County Commissioner Jim Skelton who lives South of Voss, stated Wednesday that probably 40 to 50 per cent of the cotton in his vicinity was already destroyed by hoppers, and most of it had been replanted but would not come up unless rain came. He called to mind the year 1919 when hoppers destroyed much of the cotton. He finished replanting his crop in 1919 on June 22 and as he remembers made a half bale to the acre. There was ample rainfall in 1919.—Coleman Democrat-Voice.

Little Known Game Bird.
 The francolin is a game bird related to the partridge. There are 40 or more species, most of which are found in Africa. The coloration of all species is rich and varied, and the plumage of both sexes is practically alike. Francolins travel in family parties, rather than in convoys, and fly swiftly and heavily. They feed in the morning and at evening, at which time they utter loud and shrill cries. Their food consists of insects, berries, seeds and bulbs. Their nests are well concealed and resemble those of partridges.

Six to fourteen eggs are laid in the fall and spring. The eggs are brown and buff in color, with small, dark spots. The francolin once abounded in southern Europe, but is now extinct there.

Got His Berries Easily.
 Two neighbor girls and I went black-berrying. It was a very warm day and we worked hard, getting our pails full. The berries were fine, so we carefully hid our picked berries under the bushes and filled other pails. When we came to get our first berries we found that someone had emptied our pails and taken our berries—who, we did not know. A few months later the man who had stolen them told the girls' brother how he had found black-berries hidden under the bushes in a certain grove and that he thought it such an easy way to get berries that he didn't stop to pick any others.—Chicago Journal.

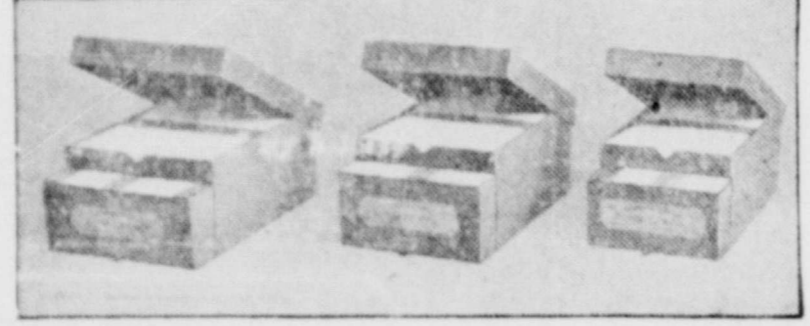
