NEGRO CONVICTS KILL OFFICERS

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, June 14.—Grand jury action is expected today in the case of Ernest Lawson and Blaine Dyer, negroes, and alleged convicts, who were arrested yesterday charged with the slaying of Policeman J. C. Gibson and Special Officer J. R. Crain, on the nights of April 19th and May 24th. Gibson was killed on April 19th and Crain on the night of May 24th, both men being slain by burglars whom they surprised while the burglars were trying to rob local drug stores.
The police announced today that both negroes had made statements, Lawson confessing to shooting Crain and accusing Dyer of killing Gibson. Dyer claims Lawson killed both of the officers.
Local detectives have been working on the cases since the two officers were killed and the arrest of the two negroes resulted yesterday.

DEMAND INCREASES FOR FARM LABOR

Farmers are calling for cotton choppers and quite a number of hands will be recruited for threshing machine crews. The grain acreage is not very large, but the crop matured heavily this year, and machines will be put in operation at an early date fanning out the grain.
The wage scale on the farm varies according to the class of work. It is reported that farmers are paying from \$1.50 to \$2.00 per day and board for cotton choppers, while thresher hands are said to be offered from \$2.00 to \$3.00 per day and board.

9 KILLED IN FIGHT ON BRITISH SHIP

NEW YORK, June 14.—A crew of four men and five Chinese passengers from the British schooner, Mary Beatrice, found drifting off Sandy Hook last night, were all killed with pistols and axes in a battle, survivors told immigration officials when the craft was brought into quarantine today.
Three of the fifteen Chinese survivors were taken to a hospital while the remainder are being detained pending investigation. The fight which resulted in the death of the crew and five passengers is believed to have occurred over a promise of the crew to land the Chinese secretly on American soil.

SCHOOL AID BILL PASSED TO NEFF

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, June 14.—The conference committee report on the emergency school appropriation bill placing the sum at four million dollars instead of six million dollars as passed by the last session of the legislature, was adopted today by both branches of the legislature after unsuccessful opposition to kill the bill in the House.
The House also disposed of another bill by adopting the conference report on the \$363,000 reclamation and flood control appropriation, instead of making it \$600,000 as passed at the first session.

The general education bill carrying a total appropriation of approximately eleven million dollars was disposed of in the Senate when it adopted the conference committee report.

The Senate held a brief Flag Day ceremony and a resolution by Senator Wirtz urging the teaching of the state and federal constitutions in public and private schools and stressing the principle of free speech, and freedom of religion was unanimously adopted in the Senate.

AUSTIN, June 14.—The rural school aid bill appropriating three million dollars for the next two years was sent to the governor today for his signature when the House without a record vote, adopted the conference committee report and passed the bill. No opposition was expressed to the bill, it being reported and passed practically as passed by the House.

The report returned by the conference committee on the emergency school appropriation bill, reducing the fund from six million dollars to four million dollars, and the agreement on the emergency school bill leaves only departmental appropriations to be worked out before the legislature adjourns.

MUCH DAMAGE DONE BY FLOOD

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., June 14.—Forewarned by government forecasts, the inhabitants of the Arkansas River valley today rushed repairs in fixing defects in the levees of the river and waited for the crest of the flood to plunge over the Northwest border tonight or tomorrow. The major crest of the high water had passed West Tulsa and Sand Springs, Oklahoma, the weather bureau observer at Fort Smith announced today.
Flood waters of the North Canadian River are rising rapidly in Southern Oklahoma City today, according to government reports. Sections of the country inundated two weeks ago are again under water and much damage is resulting.

Mr. Harding also said that it should not be forgotten that American citizens have another obligation, and that is to maintain unimpaired the things for which the American flag stands.

WASHINGTON, June 14.—Cotton consumed during the month of May amounted to 620,965 bales of lint and 54,728 bales of linters as compared with 577,396 bales of lint and 52,192 bales of linters for April of this year.

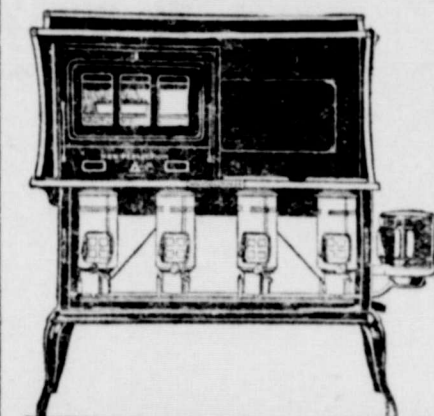

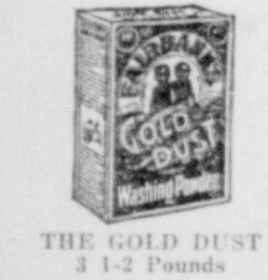

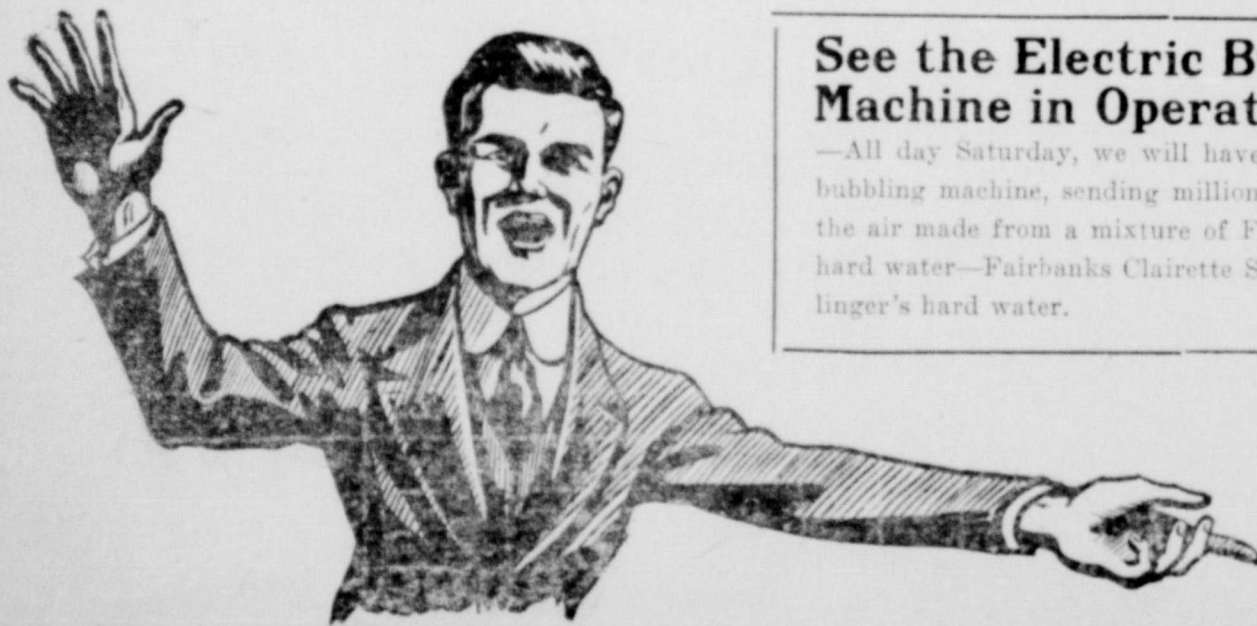
